REPORT OF THE ENGINEER.

Hon. MAURICE E. CONNOLLY, President of the Borough of Queens:

Dear Sir—I herewith transmit a report showing the amount of work done by contract in the Bureau of Highways for the quarter ending March 31, 1913:

9,376 cubic yards earth excavation; 66,944 cubic yards earth embankment; 5,454 linear feet new bluestone curb set; 1,679 linear feet old bluestone curb reset; 10,646 square feet new bluestone sidewalk laid; 28,580 square feet old bluestone sidewalk relaid; 204 square feet new crosswalks laid; 553 square yards stone blocks relaid; 7,684 square yards stone block gutters laid; 1,142 square yards stone block gutters relaid; 176 linear feet 12-inch vitrified pipe for drains in place; 321 linear feet 12-inch cast iron pipe for drains in place; 17 catch basins built; 3 catch basins rebuilt; 22,311 linear feet timber piles driven for culverts and bulkheads; 92,715 feet B. 29 sheets of construction drawings were made; 102 copies of specifications were prepared.

Besides the above work, considerable progress was made in the preparation of plans and specifications for the 51st st. tunnel sewer, the mechanical installation for the screen in the 43d st. sewer and the screen house with its mechanical installation for the Myrtle ave. sewer in Flushing.

Numerous surveys were made for special investigations and a number of sketches and drawings prepared for the routine work of the Sewer Department.

Great progress has been made in getting ready for the printer the new sewer specifications, following as much as possible the standard specifications as prepared by a committee organized by the Board of Consulting Engineers for this purpose.

I have to repeat again a statement made in my reports of 1911 and 1912 as follows:

"Finally, the matter of office conditions has to be considered in view of the fact that the work to be done by this Bureau during the year 1913 will increase materially. There is not enough space under the present conditions and the ventilation in the present office is extremely poor. The conditions during summer or winter are extremely disagreeable and not proper for a drafting room."

## Drainage Plans.

During the first quarter of 1913 there were six drainage plans approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, covering about 450 acres. There were submitted seven other drainage plans during the first quarter, covering about 8,700 acres, which have not been approved up to the present time.

The following list, taken by wards, distinguishes between the six adopted and those still pending:

## First Ward.

## Adopted:

There were three small amended drainage plans, entitled amended 3-E, amended 6-A and amended 4-C, all being individual streets in the Astoria section.

## Not adopted:

Amended drainage plan of Drainage District No. 10, covering approximately 70 acres, which takes in the widening of Thompson ave.

## Second Ward.

## Not adopted:

A small amended drainage plan of District No. 21 in the lower-Ridgewood section.

## Third Ward.

## Not adopted:

Plan of Drainage District No. 33-C, covering approximately 270 acres. This plan covers a territory to the south of that covered by drainage plans 33-A and 33-B and in part amended No. 33-A, being part of the Ingleside district.

Plan of Drainage District No. 30-B, covering about 200 acres. The territory covered by this plan lies to the east of that covered by 33-A and is tributary to the Myrtle ave. trunk sewer. The territory covered by this drainage plan is the upper part of Flushing and Bowne Park.

## Fifth Ward.

## Adopted:

Plan of Drainage District No. 58-A, covering about 90 acres. This is a plan of sanitary sewers and was prepared in order to permit the construction of sewers in Redfern ave., Dalney and Leland sts.

## Fourth Ward.

## Adopted:

An amended drainage plan of District No. 40-A, covering approximately 150 acres. This plan covers the section known as Kew Gardens in Richmond Hill.

## Not adopted:

A drainage plan known as the tentative drainage area of Jamaica. A drainage plan of Yale ave. and Harvard ave. in Jamaica, covering about 15 acres, and designed in such a way as to make it possible to incorporate these sewers into the final drainage plan.

The plan known as the Jamaica tentative plan is a system on which the trunk sewers are laid down, giving the sizes, grades and points of discharge. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was asked to approve this plan tentatively so that we could start to work out the details and final system.

An extensive study has been made of the plan known as the Brooklyn and Queens dry weather flow interceptor. This sewer is to cut off the dry weather flow of all the territory south of the ridge in Richmond Hill and Jamaica as far east as Farmers road in Queens and carried by gravity to a disposal plant in Brooklyn.

A final plan is being worked out for the 2d Ward, covering the Woodside and Winfield sections, and that territory draining into the 12th st. trunk sewer.

A study has been under way since the first of the year covering the Rockaway and Far Rockaway sections with a view to designing two systems of collection for sanitary sewage and storm water flow.

A number of small amendments to drainage plans were worked out, but have not been finally completed as yet. Respectfully yours,

#### BUREAU OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

During the quarter the principal work performed under the direction of the Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices was as follows:

##### Queens County Court House.

Painting—The County Court room and Special Sessions room have been thoroughly renovated, all cracks in plaster cut out, sized and painted with four coats of paint on walls and ceilings, and the woodwork varnished. The base panels in rear hall have been prepared and grained to match marble in front hall, and received two coats of spar varnish. All broken and cracked glass have been replaced with new. Signs have been made and placed at doorways leading to the Sheriff's offices.

Carpentry—Weather strips and stop bead mouldings have been placed on windows throughout the building, doors and windows repaired, door checks repaired, and repairs to furniture.

Plumbing and Heating—The plumbing in this building has been regularly inspected, repaired and kept in good condition, also the steam boilers, pumps and radiators.

Tinsmithing—The roofs, leaders and ornaments on roof have been repaired, leaders reset and soldered, and other repairs made where necessary.

Electrical Work—Additional outlet and fixtures have been installed in Judges' room, Part I, Supreme Court, batteries have been recharged, and repairs made to fixtures, switches and general equipment.

##### County Clerk's Office, Jamaica.

Carpentry—The main office has been enlarged by the alteration of partitions, two additional windows have been placed in partitions. Signs made and placed at the various windows, new flooring laid and desks built in office, several doors have been changed and new locks and springs placed on same.

Painting—The woodwork has been cleaned, stained and varnished, new glass put in windows where necessary, sash repainted and painted. The steam boilers have been overhauled and repaired, and new grates installed.

Plumbing—The toilets in the basement have been repaired by putting in new flush pipes and seats, all other plumbing in building has been repaired as occasion required.

Electrical Work—New batteries were installed for telephone system, buzzers, push buttons and batteries for call system, new pendant fixture added to office equipment, wires, mouldings and other fixtures were reinstalled after changes in partitions had been made.

##### Town Hall, Jamaica.

Carpentry—Doors have been repaired, and other repairs made to woodwork. Painting—The woodwork and desks in the Coroner's office have been cleaned and varnished, and broken glass in windows replaced by new.

Plumbing—The plumbing in this building and in the comfort station adjoining has been kept in good repair.

Electrical Work—Bell wires have been extended from the Magistrates' Court room to Janitor's room, in basement; wires, bells and annunciators have been repaired, and repairs made to switch, panel cut outs and switch boxes in the comfort station.

##### Borough Hall, Long Island City.

Tin ventilating pipes have been placed in the basement of this building, the steam boilers cleaned and replastered with asbestos. Partitions have been changed in the offices of the Bureau of Sewers, openings made in the walls on second and third floors, to connect with the Post Office building, all broken and cracked glass in windows have been replaced. The plumbing has been regularly inspected and repaired.

Electrical—Large sub-feeder wires have been installed in the office of Bureau of Buildings, Bureau of Highways and Street Cleaning, replacing new switches in halls, installing new private telephone lines between Highway and Sewer Departments, additional pendant fixtures installed throughout the building. Carpenter work and painting has been done as required.

Interior Bath—The plumbing, steam and hot water boilers and pipes have been repaired and kept in good order, electrical repairs have been made to panel cut out and fixtures, ventilating motor cleaned, etc. This bath is extensively used by the residents of Long Island City, the total number using same during the quarter was 7,407 males and 2,028 females. In addition to the above, all the other buildings under the supervision of this bureau have been kept in good repair and regularly cleaned. Janitors have been supplied with materials for cleaning, and the offices supplied with ice, water, drinking cups, towels, etc. New furniture and floor covering have been provided where necessary. The buildings under my supervision are at this time in a very good state of repair.

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#### REPORT OF THE TOPOGRAPHICAL BUREAU.

Long Island City, N. Y., April 1, 1913.

Hon. MAURICE E. CONNOLLY, President Borough of Queens:

Sir—In accordance with your instructions, I have the honor to submit herewith a report of the work done by the Topographical Bureau for the months of January, February and March, 1913.

Before proceeding to a detailed description of the work done by this office, a few words regarding its duties and organization may facilitate a better understanding of the details that follow.



The work of this Bureau falls naturally into two divisions: First, to quote from the Greater New York Charter, "To prepare a map of that part of the territory embraced within the Borough, of which a map or plan has not heretofore been finally established and adopted"; and, second, make the surveys and maps required by Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment.

For the better prosecution of this work, the force of this office is similarly divided into two divisions—one division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough; the other division charged with all work incidental to Street-Opening Proceedings.

The division charged with the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough is subdivided into three corps:

Monumenting Corps—Charged with all the surveys and field work incidental to the preparation of the Final Map and the monumenting of the Borough.

Computing Corps—Charged with all the computations incidental to the preparation of the Final Map of the Borough.

Draughting Corps—Charged with all draughting work required to prepare the Final Maps.

The division charged with the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment is subdivided into two corps:

Surveying Corps—Charged with all the field work necessary to the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

Office Corps—Charged with all the computations and draughting necessary for the preparation of the maps required by the Commissioners.

In addition to the several corps mentioned above, we have a small corps engaged in gathering data, and making reports, concerning the legal status of the various streets in the Borough.

The following detailed description of the work done by this Bureau is arranged according to the work performed by these several corps, and in the order in which they are mentioned above.

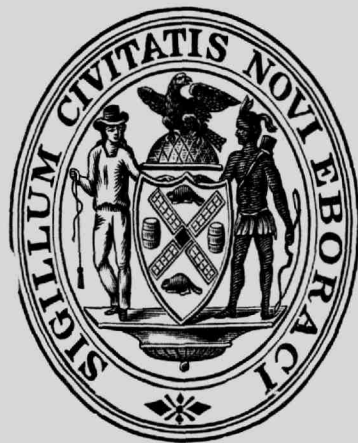

## Amendment to Sanitary Code.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held July 30, 1913, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That section 142 of the Sanitary Code be and the same is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 142. A public or church funeral shall not be held of any person who has died of smallpox, diphtheria (croup), scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, Asiatic cholera, measles or plague, but the funeral of such person shall be private, and it shall not be lawful to invite or permit at the funeral of any such person who has died of any of the above diseases or of any infectious disease, or at any services connected therewith, any person whose attendance is not necessary, or from or to whom there is danger of contagion thereby.

## Amendment to Rules.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health held July 30, 1913, the following resolution was adopted: Resolved, That the following method of procedure in the preparation, treatment and transportation of the remains of persons deceased from infectious diseases will be required to be observed by this Department on and after August 1, 1913:

1. In deaths from infectious disease where the remains are to be interred or cremated within the City limits:

(a) The undertaker shall notify the Division of Infectious Diseases immediately upon receiving notice of a death from smallpox, diphtheria, scarlet fever, yellow fever, typhus fever, plague, Asiatic cholera, measles or any other infectious disease dangerous to the general health of the community.

(b) An Inspector of Division of Infectious Diseases shall visit the premises wherein death has occurred, forthwith, to see that regulations of the Department are complied with as to treatment and enclosure of remains and sealing of coffin or casket.

(c) The certificate of death must be presented at the Department of Health forthwith, and attached thereto an affidavit made by the undertaker to the effect that the body has been properly prepared and enclosed and that the rules of the Department will be strictly complied with as to exposure of the remains, public funeral,

burial or cremation within twenty-four hours, use of draperies, rugs, etc.

2. In deaths from infectious disease where the remains are to be shipped by rail or boat:

(a) The Inspector of Division of Infectious Diseases shall determine who may accompany the remains to the place of interment or cremation.

(b) The undertaker, in addition to complying with rules heretofore specified, shall file with this Department a certificate of death and an affidavit to the effect that the rules of the State Department of Health have been complied with as to the preparation, disinfection, embalming and enclosure of the remains, specifying in such affidavit the rule or rules under which the body is being shipped or transported, and he shall notify in the name of the Department of Health of this City, by telegraph and before shipment of the remains, the health officer at point of destination, advising the date and train upon which the remains may be expected.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK, ACTING BY the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called "the Commission"), invites proposals to construct Section No. 1 of the Astoria, Woodside and Corona Rapid Transit Railroad.

The points within the City between which the said part is to run and the route or routes to be followed are briefly as follows:

A statement based upon estimate of the Engineer of the quantities of the various classes of the work and of the nature and extent as near as practicable of the work required is to be found in the schedule forming a part of the form of contractor's proposal. Bounded on the north by a line distant 100 feet northerly from and parallel with the northerly line of Skillman avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Skillman avenue; on the east by a line midway between Locust street and Packard street and by the prolongation of the said line; on the south by a line distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Borden avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Borden avenue, and on the west by a line midway between Locust street and Laurel Hill avenue and by the prolongation of the said line.

Fourth—That the abstracts of said estimate of damage and of said assessment for benefit, together with the damage and benefit maps, and also all the affidavits, estimates, proofs and other documents used by the Commissioners of Estimate and by the Commissioner of Assessment in making the same, have been deposited in the Bureau of Street Openings, in the Law Department of The City of New York, in the Municipal Building, Court House square, in the Borough of Queens, in said City, there to remain until the 12th day of August, 1913.

Fifth—That, provided there be no objections filed to either of said abstracts, the reports as to awards and as to assessments for benefit herein will be presented for confirmation to the Supreme Court of the State of New York, Second Department, at a Special Term thereof for the hearing of motions, to be held in the County Court House, in the Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, on the 23d day of October, 1913, at the opening of the Court on that day.

Sixth—In case, however, objections are filed to the foregoing abstracts of estimate and assessment, or to either of them, the motion to confirm the reports as to awards and as to assessments shall stand adjourned to the date to be hereafter specified in the notice provided in such cases to be given in relation to filing the final reports, pursuant to sections 981 and 984 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 658 of the Laws of 1906.

#### NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The break of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstance of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalk and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the opening of the main sewer

in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances, or portion as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless, The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam-ends, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the contractor.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement, to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
