COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M., on Wednesday, May 13, 1914.

Present—John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor; Alexander Brough, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Henry Bruere, Chamberlain; George McAneny, President, Board of Aldermen; Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held May 6, 1914, were approved as printed.

The Commissioner of Docks appeared before the Board, asked for and received unanimous consent for immediate consideration of the proposed modification of contract of Holbrook, Cabot and Rollins, to include the building of a coffer dam and rock excavation from 44th to 46th street, North River, and submitted the following:

Pier A, North River, May 5, 1914. Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the

Sinking Fund:

Sir-I transmit herewith copy of a communication addressed by me this day to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, respecting the modification of Contract 1401. Class 2, Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, contractors, by eliminating certain items amounting to \$62.109.72, and providing for additional work at an estimated cost of \$202,109.72, making a net addition of \$140,000; also a new contract, No. 1431, for dredging at the site of the proposed improvement near the foot of West 44th street. The facts in relation to the matter are fully set forth in the letter to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I respectfully beg to request that a resolution be adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$140,000 for the extension of the West 46th street improvement, and \$30,000 for the additional dredging, it being understood that the resolution of your Board shall be of no force and effect unless the modification of Contract No. 1401, Class 2, be approved by the Board of Aldermen, with the concurrence of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and that the Board of Aldermen authorize and empower the Commissioner of Docks to contract with Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, without public letting, for extending the West 46th street improvement, southerly, to include

the wall along the northerly line of West 44th street. Yours respectfully, R. A. C. SMITH, Commissioner of Docks.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Sir-I have this day addressed a communication to the Board of Aldermen requesting favorable consideration of a matter, which you will realize is of the utmost importance to the City, and relief from which can only come through your Honorable body in conjunction with the Board of Aldermen. The request is for an extension of the contract of the Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation to enable the completion of that portion of the new 1,000-foot slips adjoining the pier at the foot of 44th street, North River. The permission requested is to award the contract to said Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, without public letting, upon the original unit prices, thus saving the City \$150,000.

If the southerly extension above referred to is built as a separate and new contract, it can only be commenced after the present contract is entirely completed, say in 18 months, and will cost, based upon the original unit prices as used in Engineer's estimate, \$290.000.

If, on the other hand, this extension is now made a part of Contract No. 1401, with Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, based upon the same unit prices used

in their contract, the work will cost, \$140.000.

The Engineering Bureau under my directions prepared plans only for the construction of the full pier at the foot of 46th street. Because of the complications surrounding the pier at the foot of West 44th street, it was not deemed wise to touch this portion of the work until it was ascertained that the City would not be called upon to pay damages for the removal of the present sublessees, who have still four years of occupancy, and until I had completed my negotiations for the transfer of the original lessees, whose lease runs to 1928. I deemed it of far more importance to proceed with the work on the one pier than to hazard the risk of complicating the entire improvement and possibly get into legal difficulties, which Railway Company—"Double-tracking road on New York avenue and Rockaway turn- in the end would be far more costly and result in interminable delays.

I am able to say that every obstacle has been removed and I can see no reason why the entire work should not be completed as outlined by our Engineering Department when this matter was first undertaken in the month of May, 1913.

The entire question can be summed up practically as follows: By securing the permission of your Honorable body, the City will save \$150,000, and advance the work two years, and enable the Department to complete the one full pier at the foot of 46th street, and make rapid progress towards the completion of the second full pier at the foot of West 44th street.

The following is a brief resume of the official actions taken on this improve-

April 10, 1913—Plans were submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the improvement of the water-front between West 44th street and West 46th street, providing for a pier 1,000 feet long at the foot of West 46th street, and for an extension inshore of the pier at the foot of West 44th street, so as to make two berths at the foot of West 46th street and one at the foot of West 44th street. April 30, 1913—There was a subject hearing on the proposed new plan, after which

it was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund. April 30, 1913—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment were requested to authorize condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the necessary property to be acquired for the improvement of the

waterfront under the new plan. May 21, 1913—Condemnation proceedings were authorized by the Commissioners

May 22, 1913—Condemnation proceedings were authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

July 23, 1913—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock to the extent of \$164,000, to meet the cost of dredging in connection with the construction of the 1,000 foot pier at the foot of West 46th street.

July 31, 1913—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of corporate stock to the extent of \$164,000 for dredging.

September 4, 1913—Contract for dredging was awarded in the sum of \$80,193.75. The amount actually expended, however, was \$63,892.27.

October 23, 1913—The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$850,000, to be used for the construction of the pier at the foot of West 46th street.

December 11, 1913-The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the

Comptroller to issue corporate stock to an amount not exceeding \$850,000.

January 21, 1914—Bids were opened for constructing filled in portion of the new pier at the foot of West 46th street, together with concrete column foundations, pier and slip walls, cofferdam, etc. The following proposals were received: Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, \$487,812.90; Godwin Construction Company, \$508,618; Snare & Triest Company, \$543,793; Oscar Daniels Company, \$554,468; United States Realty and Improvement Company, \$564,417.45; Phoenix Construction Company, \$607,-916; MacArthur Brothers Company, \$504,519.50; L. A. Burke & Sons, \$654,468; W. P. Seaver, \$682,349.25; John Monks & Sons, \$690,349.50; G. B. Spearin, \$708,128.52. February 6, 1914—Contract 1401, Class 2, was awarded to the lowest bidder, Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, for \$487,812.90. The estimate of this Department's

Engineers for doing this work, based on unit prices, was \$497,500.

I respectfully request that this matter receive your immediate attention for the following reasons:

The contractors are willing to enter into a contract to build the extension on the unit prices under the original contract. They are now sufficiently advanced in the work so that any delay in reaching a decision would seriously inconvenience them; and, in fact, might defeat the entire proposal, as we cannot direct them to suspend any portion of their work without impairing the present contract. In addition, it is necessary that the Dock Department shall advertise for bids for the dredging, for which specifications and forms of contract have been prepared for some time past.

As I have stated above, this matter has been submitted today for the consideration of the Board of Aldermen and that Board has been requested to adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to eliminate from the contract the items which, owing to the modification of the contract, the contractor will not be called upon to perform. The Corporation Counsel is of the opinion that this action of the Board of Aldermen should be concurred in by your Board.

I therefore request that a resolution be adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to eliminate from Contract No. 1401, Class 2, the items amounting to \$62,109.72, shown in detail on the accompanying memorandum, entitled: "Estimated quantities under present Contract 1401, Class 2, to be deducted in order that the work may be extended to the northerly side of West 44th street, North River.

The Board of Aldermen has also been requested to adopt a resolution authorizing and empowering the Commissioner of Docks to contract with Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation, without public letting, for extending the West 46th street improvement southerly to include the wall along the northerly line of West 44th street, at an estimated cost of \$202,109.72. This estimate is based on Engineers' estimated quantities and on the unit prices made by the contractor for Contract No. 1401, Class 2 the items of which are set forth in detail on the accompanying memorandum, entitled: "Estimated quantities to be added under present contract to complete extension to West 44th street, North River, all as shown on the accompanying plan, entitled 'Modification to provide for extending the West 46th street improvement, southerly, to include the wall along the north line of West 44th street, North River, Borough of

I also transmit herewith plans, specifications and form of contract, No. 1431, for dredging at the site of the proposed improvement near the foot of West 44th street, North River. This contract has been based upon the removal of 85,000 cubic yards of material at an estimated cost of 35 cents per cubic yard, a total of about \$30,000.

In case of favorable action by your Board and the Board of Aldermen on the modification of the contract and the authorization to extend the work to the northerly side of West 44th street, I respectfully ask for your approval of the plans, specifications and form of contract for the dredging.

In order that no time may be lost I have requested the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution recommending that your honorable Board authorize the Comptroller to issue corporate stock for \$140,000, required to complete the extension to West 44th street, and \$30,000, both contingent upon favorable action being taken by your Board and the Board of Aldermen on the modification of the contract and the authorization of the Board of Aldermen empowering the Commissioner of Docks to contract with Holbrook, Cabot & Rollins Corporation for the new work.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution relative to a renewal of the lease to the City of parcel of land located on the westerly side of Lefferts avenue, Glen Morris, Borough of Queens, for use of the Board of Education:

May 6, 1914.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen-The Secretary of the Board of Education in a communication to your Board under date of April 23, 1914, states that at a meeting of that Board held April 22, 1914, a resolution was adopted requesting the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of a certain tract or parcel of land located on the westerly side of Lefferts avenue, Glen Morris, Borough of Queens, occupied as an annex to Public School 46, for a period of one year from July 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$1 and taxes, and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the existing lease.

The Comptroller in a communication to your Board under date of March 24, 1911, recommended this lease for a period from April 15, 1911, to July 1, 1914, at an annual rental of \$1 and taxes, and said report was approved and lease authorized at a meeting held March 29, 1911.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just and it being the same as heretofore paid, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a renewal of the lease of a certain tract or parcel of land bounded and described as follows:

That certain tract or parcel of land, situate and lying on the westerly side of Lefferts avenue, Glen Morris, Queens, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point on the westerly side or line of Lefferts avenue, distant 100 feet southeasterly from the southwesterly corner of Lefferts and Hawtree avenues, and running thence (1) southwesterly and along the northerly line of lot 25 95.03 feet to the centre line of the block; thence (2) southeasterly and along said centre line 200 feet: thence (3 northeasterly and along the southerly line of lot 16 95.03 feet to the westerly side or line of Lefferts avenue: thence (4) northwesterly and along the said westerly line of Lefferts avenue 200 feet to the point or place of beginning, the aforesaid plot being more particularly known and described as lots 16 to 25 inclusive, Block 61, in the 4th Ward of the Borough of Queens, County of Queens, City and State of New York, and which are so designated and appear upon a certain map or plan entitled "Boulevard Terrace, Map of 1795 lots belonging to the Metropolis Land Company, situate in the 4th Ward, Borough of Queens, City of New York," surveyed June 22, 1906, by S. H. McLaughlin, Civil Engineer and City Surveyor, and duly filed in the office of the Clerk of the County of Queens on the 27th day of March, 1907.

The serum obtained from the said horse is of excellent quality and it is necessary to continue to inoculate this animal each week, but it would be practically impossible for Dr. Wadsworth to travel to New York solely for that purpose. It is therefore requested that the said horse be transferred to the State Department of Health, Albany, N. Y.

It does not appear that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have the legal authority to assign to the State of New York any personal property owned by The City of New York, neither is it possible to lease a horse. AN ORDINANCE relative to the abandonment of Fulton Market.

All that lot, piece or parcel of land lying and being in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, and bounded on the north by Beekman street, on the east by South street, on the south by Fulton street, and on the west by Front street, heretofore set aside by this Board as a public market and designated as "Fulton Market" is hereby declared to be no longer suitable for that purpose and such designation is hereby in all respects cancelled and revoked; and the President of the Borough of Manhattan is hereby authorized and directed to discontinue the maintenance thereof as such public market and surrender the said lands and buildings thereon erected to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for any other public purpose or for sale in the manner provided by law.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its approval by the Mayor.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller brought up to the matter of the proposed leasing of premises on Washington Heights for use as a new City Magistrates' Court laid over at the last meeting.

On motion the matter was referred to a select committee consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller and the Chief City Magistrate to obtain facts and figures in regard to building a building for court purposes either on Mr. Whalen's property at the southeast corner of 154th street and Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, or on some other corner.



No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or con sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the adversal of the security required in the adversal of the security required in the tisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the hond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter. The amount shall be as specified in the pro-posals or instructions to bidders and shall not

be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifica-

tions, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who s a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The centract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
