An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 12 of Section 373 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances Relating to Elevator Machinery Compartments.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Elevator machinery compartments. When any compartment which contains machinery for operating an elevator communicates with an elevator shaft, it shall be enclosed with partitions of the same material and construction as required for the shaft, and shall have fire doors in the openings.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen November 28, 1916.

Received from his Honor the Mayor December 12, 1916, without his approval or disapproval thereof; therefore, as provided in section 40 of the Greater New York Charter, the same took effect as if he had approved it.

No. 558.

An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 2 of Section 424 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, Relating to the Construction of Skylights in Buildings.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 2 of section 424 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

2. Glazing. Skylights placed over shafts of any kind shall be glazed with plain glass not more than 3-16 of an inch in thickness. No pane of glass in any such skylight hereafter placed in any building shall exceed 720 square inches in area.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen November 28, 1916.

No. 559.

An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 3 of Section 376 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York, Relating to the Use of Wire Glass in Protectives for Openings of Buildings.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 3 of section 376 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances of the City of New York is hereby amended to read as follows:

3. Use of wire glass. When wire glass is required or permitted by this chapter or the rules authorized thereunder, for fire doors, fire shutters or fire windows, the pane shall not exceed 720 square inches in area, and shall not be less than 3/4 inch in thickness, and shall be set not less than 5/8 of an inch in the frame. When the use of glass is permitted in any fire door or fire shutter only wire glass shall be used. For the glazing of fire windows only wire glass shall be used.

Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, the President of the Borough of Richmond be and he is hereby authorized and empowered to purchase highway material for the maintenance and repair of roads during the year 1916, to the extent of four thousand dollars (\$4,000), in the open market without public letting.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by Adding Thereto a New Section Relating to Persons Acting as Auctioneers.

Be it Ordained, by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 1a and to read as follows:

§1a. Persons acting as Auctioneers.

No person, firm or corporation shall represent or circulate or place before the public any announcement, nor insert nor cause to be inserted in any city, business or telephone directory, any notice that such person, firm or corporation conducts the business of an auctioneer without having first obtained a license as such from the city clerk.

Sec. 2. The ordinance relating to persons acting as Auctioneers, adopted September 26, 1916, and effective October 10, 1916, is hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. The table of section headings of chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York
Held Wednesday, November 8, 1916, at 10.30 o'clock A. M.

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class, under the heading "Fire Department," the following: Deputy Chief, Bureau of Fire Prevention; Chief Inspector, Bureau of Fire Prevention; Inspector of Combustibles; Clarence H. Fay, Deputy Fire Commissioner, appeared in opposition to the proposed amendment. Harry W. Marsh, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in favor of said amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the Exempt Class the following: "Board of Examiners—Clerk to the Board," and by including therein, under the heading "Board of Standards and Appeals" the following: "Chief Clerk." Harry W. Marsh, Assistant Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared in opposition to the exemption of the position of Chief Clerk for the Board of Standards and Appeals. Rudolph P. Miller, Chairman of the Board of Standards and Appeals, addressed the Commission in the matter. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held Oct. 21 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, that the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same hereby is amended by striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Fire Department," the following: Deputy Chief, Bureau of Fire Prevention; Chief Inspector, Bureau of Fire Prevention; Inspector of Combustibles.

On motion, it was

Resolved, that the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same is hereby amended by striking from the exempt class the following: "Board of Examiners—Clerk to the Board."

The Commission took no action in the matter of the exemption of the position of Chief Clerk in the Board of Standards and Appeals and approved the transfer of Edward V. Barton from the position of Clerk to the Board of Building Examiners at \$1,800 per annum to that of Chief Clerk in the Board of Standards and Appeals at \$1,800 per annum under the provisions of Chapter 503, Laws of 1916, Section 718, paragraph 1, said transfer to be effective as of Oct. 1, 1916.

Luther White, Superintendent of Industries, Department of Correction, appeared in connection with the employment of David R. Walker, of Natick, Mass., as Shoe Machinery Expert in that department. The matter was laid over.

The following resolutions were adopted after a hearing of each of the candidates named therein:

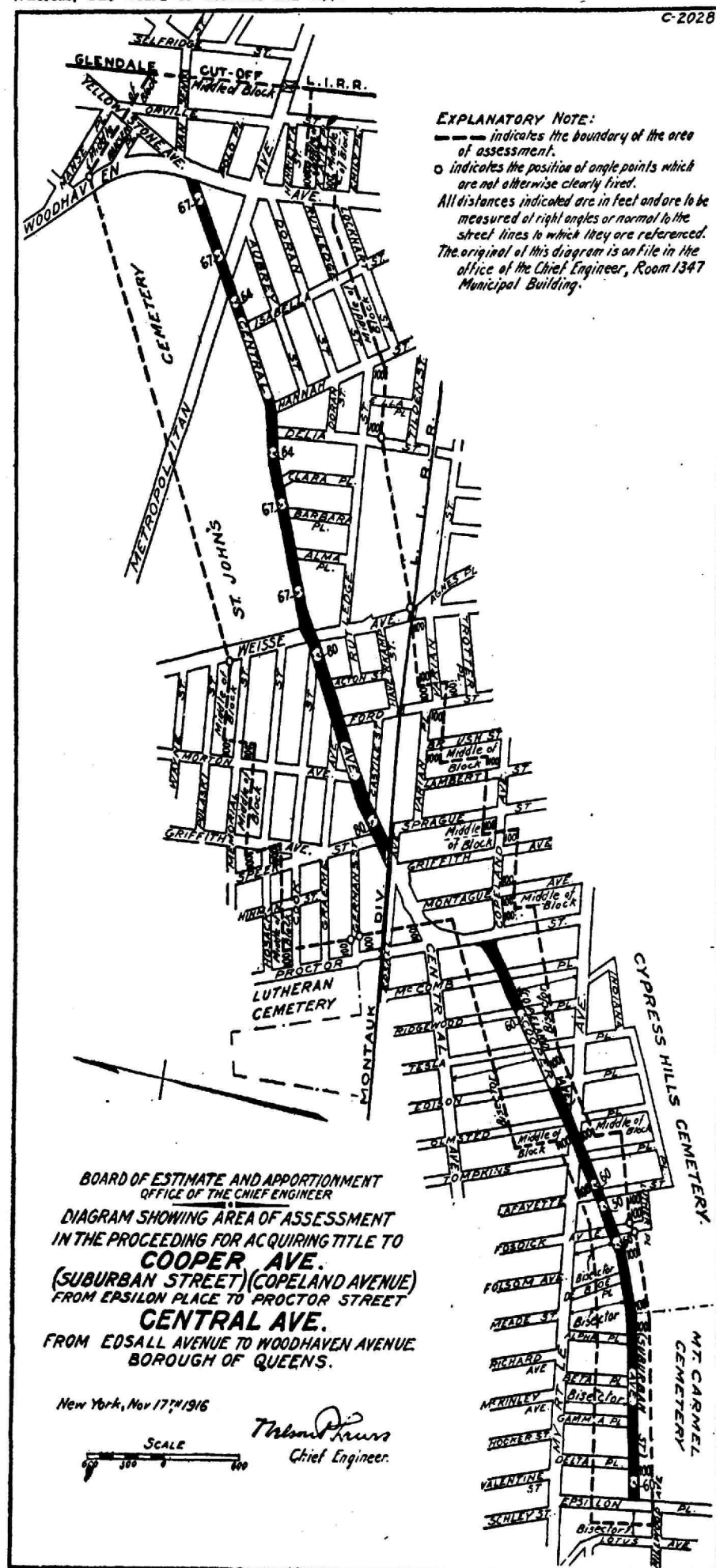

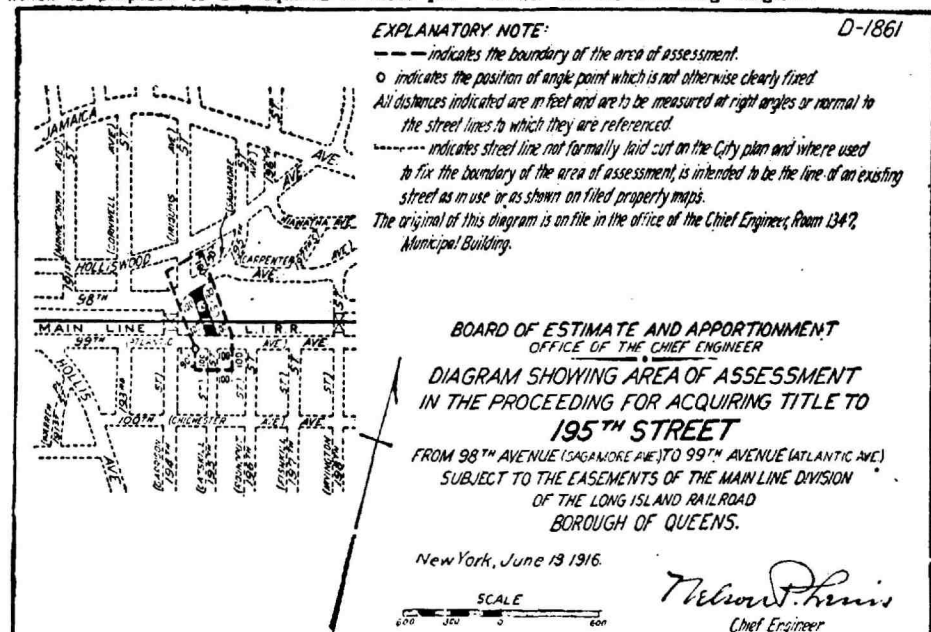

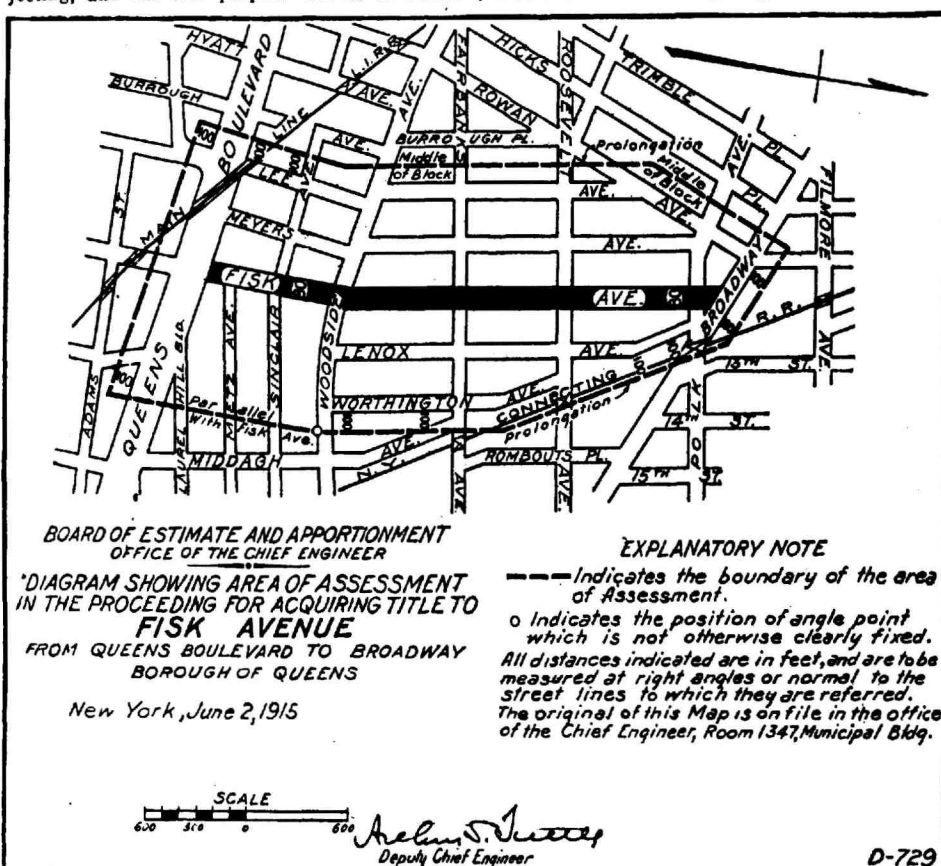

NOTICE TO BIDDERS AT SALES OF OLD BUILDINGS, ETC.

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS, ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 will be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expiration of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building, buildings, etc., purchased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant, fire, or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchman or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of the buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations and the sidewalks and curbs in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains, and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appur-

tenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed, and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the day of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials of labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furrings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, endorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of the City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to enclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
