SIR—In compliance with chapter 516, Laws of 1884, we herewith submit statements showing the results of an examination of the Chamberlain's office, covering the period from the date of our last report, February 7, 1890 (the date on which the term of Richard Croker, as Chamberlain of the City of New York, expired by resignation), to and including March 31, 1890, completing the first quarter of the current year :

The balance in the City Treasury, Sinking Funds and miscellaneous accounts, on March 31, 1890, was \$7,019,754.06, which agrees with the balances as stated in the Chamberlain's books, and also with the certificates of the officers of the several depository banks of concurrent date.

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting held at the Mayor's Office, pursuant to adjournment, at 1 o'clock P. M., on Thursday, May 15, 1890.

Present—Hugh J. Grant, Mayor; Frederick Smyth, Recorder; Theodore W. Myers, Comptroller; Thomas C. T. Crain, Chamberlain, and Walton Storm, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, Board of Aldermen.

The reading of the minutes of the meeting held on May 14, 1890, was dispensed with.

The Mayor stated that the leasing of Castle Garden to the Government was the subject for consideration, having been laid over the day before, and that a hearing would be given to the gentlemen present representing the Government and the Commissioners of Emigration.

The Comptroller then presented an application of John B. Weber, Superintendent of Immigration, for a lease of Castle Garden to the Government, with a report and resolution to authorize such lease, as follows:

GENTLEMEN—I am authorized by the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States to secure, if practicable, a lease for an indefinite period, of Castle Garden and its appurtenances, including all the premises heretofore occupied by the State Board of Emigration, at a rent at the rate of \$8,000 per annum, to terminate upon sixty days' notice from either party.

I respectfully ask that this proposition be considered by your Honorable Body at as early a date as is practicable, and beg to request that I be informed of your action.

I shall be pleased to attend your meeting if you desire it.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I present herewith an application of Mr. John B. Weber, Superintendent of Immigration, for a lease for an indefinite period of Castle Garden and its appurtenances, under the authority of the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, the lease to terminate upon sixty days' notice from either party.

The urgent necessity for a better accommodation of immigrants landing in this port than is afforded by the present arrangements at the Barge Office is well known, and need not be explained by me.

I have carefully examined the laws and ordinances relating to the leasing of city property, to determine the authority for a temporary lease of Castle Garden to the Secretary of the Treasury, and I think that they confer ample authority upon the Sinking Fund for the purpose.

Section 182 of the Consolidation Act expressly provides for the leasing of Castle Garden for the purpose of a landing for immigrants, as follows:

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund are authorized and directed to renew, from year to year, the lease of the premises at Castle Garden, now occupied by the Commissioners of Emigration, upon such terms and conditions as may be mutually agreed upon."

The express object of this statute authorizing the leasing of Castle Garden was the continuance of the premises for a landing place of immigrants, as a necessary provision for their accommodation. It applies directly to the purpose for which a lease is desired by the General Government, the use of it to be continued as a landing place of immigrants so long as necessary.

The inadequacy of the accommodations for the landing of immigrants at the Barge Office is notorious, and in my judgment, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund should grant a temporary lease of Castle Garden to the Government to relieve the overcrowded condition of the Barge Office.

The Castle Garden has been occupied by the Commissioners of Emigration as a landing place for immigrants since 1855, possession having then been given for that purpose, under a lease for the term of five years previously granted to an individual, which was assigned to them. The Commissioners of Emigration held over under that lease, which has been tacitly renewed from year to year, from the first of May, but no lease to them has ever been executed.

The term of the lease to the Commissioners of Emigration therefore expired actually on the first of the present month, and they have no claim for a renewal of the lease or possession after that date, as their function as Commissioners of Emigration has ceased and the premises are no longer used by them for the purpose to which it has been dedicated by the law and for which only it was specially leased to them by the City.

The function of the Commissioners of Emigration having ceased, they have no right whatever to retain possession of the premises for any other purpose than the landing of immigrants. Castle Garden is now needed for this purpose by the General Government, and I respectfully recommend that a lease be authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, for temporary occupation.

A resolution to authorize such a lease is respectfully submitted for such action as the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may deem proper.

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and is hereby requested to prepare a lease from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York of the premises situated in Battery Park, known as Castle Garden, heretofore occupied by the Commissioners of Emigration as a landing place for immigrants in the Port of New York, to the Secretary of the Treasury of the United States, for an indefinite period not exceeding one year from the date of the lease, to terminate upon sixty days' notice from either party, at a rent of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000) per annum, payable quarterly, for the purpose of being occupied and used exclusively as a landing place for immigrants, under the charge of the United States Superintendent of Immigration, the premises to be kept in good sanitary condition, and all repairs and fixtures necessary, to be provided by and at the expense of the lessee, with the usual conditions and such others as the Comptroller shall prescribe for the protection of the interests of the City; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable, and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation.

The foregoing report and application for a lease having been read, the Recorder said that, in his opinion, the law did not authorize the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to lease Castle Garden to the Government, as proposed.

The Mayor invited gentlemen present to express their views.

The Hon. Joel B. Erhardt, Collector of the Port, said that, if the subject is open to discussion, he would, with the permission of the Board, say a few words. If, he said, there are legal and sound objections against any particular act he would never ask that that act should be done. If the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund have no power to lease Castle Garden to the General Government,

as desired, of course it must remain vacant, and the immigrants must continue to suffer by landing at the Barge Office until other and adequate accommodation can be provided elsewhere. If the steamship lines are to be inconvenienced and the commerce of the Port interrupted, and there was no help for it under the law, then, of course, that was an end of the matter. But as he was especially interested in bringing about the leasing of Castle Garden for the landing of the immigrants, now that they were arriving in such large numbers in this Port, and the Barge Office was found to be so inadequate, he hoped, if it were possible, that a lease could be given in some way, in the interest of commerce, of humanity and good government.

Mr. R. J. Cortis, of the White Star Line, addressed the Board briefly, as the representative of the steamship men, whose interest, he said, was one of very great importance. We have been suffering very great inconvenience lately on account of the immigrants we bring here, and we look upon this question of a proper landing-place where the duties of all concerned can be properly carried out as one of the greatest importance—of vital importance to us and to the interests of this city and the country. Speaking for the particular interest he represented, although there had been no serious trouble, at the same time it had been extremely difficult with all concerned—those representing the authorities of emigration and the Government, as well as those with duties to the passengers they bring—to land them properly, safely and conveniently. There had been great unanimity between all parties, and so far everything has proceeded reasonably well; but it is impossible, with the large grade now being done, and that which will be done in hot weather, that things should go on as they are now, much longer. It is not for us to discuss the question of legality or the powers of this body, but this much can be said on behalf of the steamship interests, it is a matter of vital importance that Castle Garden, or some other place equally spacious and convenient, should be designated where passengers can be landed as heretofore, with safety to themselves and dispatch.

Mr. Ridgway, President of the Board of Commissioners of Emigration, requested a continuance of their lease of Castle Garden, and tendered a check of \$4,000 for arrears of rent up to May first and in advance up to the first of August; he was told it could not be received by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, it should be paid to the Comptroller. The Comptroller said the check had been tendered before to him, and he had refused to accept anything but the arrears of rent to May first. Mr. Ridgway claimed the right to a continuance of the lease.

Mr. Stephenson wished to place the Commissioners in a proper light, and to say that before action was taken by the Secretary of the Treasury to remove from Castle Garden, they had offered him the privilege of the place for the landing and inspection of immigrants, and there was no reason for clashing of authority between the State and Federal officers; but the Secretary's reply was that he would have the whole or nothing. It is not the fault of the Commissioners of Emigration that immigrants are treated as they are, but entirely that of the Treasury Department. Castle Garden has been ready for the landing of immigrants. The Secretary has power over immigration, but the law gives him none over emigration. He has power to see to immigrants until landed, then his power ceases and that of the State begins. The Secretary of the Treasury has no power to say what Express shall handle the immigrants' baggage, what hotel he shall stop at, or what railroad he shall travel by, or broker change his money, etc.; these powers belong to the Commissioners of Emigration.

The Chairman of the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen asked Mr. Stephenson if he meant that the Government had the right only of landing the immigrants, and the Commissioners of Emigration the right to all the privileges? He replied, yes.

The Commissioners of Emigration submitted a protest against the leasing of Castle Garden to the General Government, as follows:

CASTLE GARDEN, }
NEW YORK, April 23, 1890. }

The Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Understanding that the Federal authorities, through the Superintendent of Immigration, lately appointed by the Secretary of the Treasury, or other agents of the Treasury Department, have recently made an application to your Board requesting that Castle Garden be leased to the Treasury Department as a landing place for immigrants at this port, the Commissioners of Emigration of the State of New York respectfully but earnestly protest against such lease being executed to the Federal authorities by reason of the attitude assumed and the views expressed by the representatives of the Treasury Department, which, if carried out, would seriously affect the interests of this State.

During the time that this Board were making the examinations of immigrants at this port, and when the Treasury Department first displayed a disposition to control this Department directly through its own agents without discussing their rights to do so (although that question is somewhat doubtful), the Collector of the Port of New York and other representatives of the Treasury Department claimed that Castle Garden was an improper place for the landing of immigrants, and that it should be removed to an island in the harbor. It was also claimed that the employees under this Board were inefficient and incompetent, and notwithstanding this statement, upon taking control of the examination of immigrants (whether rightfully or otherwise), the Federal Superintendent of Immigration has employed most of these people complained of, and some at an advanced salary, thus giving evidence that any statement made in relation to our former employees was not founded upon any honest belief.

Now that the immigrants are being examined and passed at the Barge Office, under the supervision of the Federal Superintendent of Immigration, it is surprising, in view of the statements heretofore made to the contrary, that it is now asserted that Castle Garden is the most proper landing place at this port.

This Board in no sense desires in any way to obstruct the proper conduct of the business of immigration, and as they have frequently expressed themselves heretofore, so they still believe, that immigration should be supervised under influences of co-operation between the Federal and State authorities, and that no national prejudices, and above all no partisanship should be permitted to usurp any rights that this State may have in the protection of its citizens.

In 1847 the State Board of Commissioners of Emigration was established, and since that time up to and including the year 1889, 9,639,635 aliens have landed at the Port of New York. Computing 3 per cent. increase in this population annually upon the arrivals of each year presents the enormous number of foreign-born and children of foreign-born parents emanating from this port alone during the period mentioned of 18,679,753, or about 29 per cent. of the entire population of the United States. And between 1876 and 1882, when no other means were provided for the care of these people, the State of New York appropriated upwards of one million of dollars, which was used for the care and maintenance of immigrants arriving here for distribution all over the United States.

And finally, the objection is submitted which appeals more particularly to the citizens of the City and County of New York, why Castle Garden should not be exclusively under the control of the Federal Government. The Secretary of the Treasury and the Solicitor representing him, has repeatedly stated, that under no circumstances shall any immigrant, after having been passed by the Superintendent of Immigration, be cared for at the expense of the Immigrant Fund; but that such as may become in distress or require aid within one year after their landing, that they shall become a burden upon the locality where such port of entry is situated.

If such a proposition as this could be maintained, it would prove a burden rather than an advantage to the State that contains such port of entry.

It was not then in fact Castle Garden that was objected to, but that the landing place for immigrants should be controlled by officers of the State of New York.

It was not the character of the people employed by the Commissioners of Emigration of the State of New York that were objected to, but the Federal authorities desired wholly to control their acts and wished to give no opportunity to representatives of this State to examine into the character of immigrants who desire to obtain a residence here.

We respectfully submit that no hasty action in this matter is necessary, and to request that your Commission will carefully consider the subject in all its bearings before reaching a conclusion, and remain,

The Recorder moved that the application of the General Government for a lease of Castle Garden, the report of the Comptroller and the protest of the Commissioners of Emigration be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion upon the power of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to grant the proposed lease, and the following resolution was unanimously adopted:

Resolved, That the report and resolution submitted by the Comptroller relative to the leasing

of Castle Garden to the Government of the United States be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation for his opinion and advice as to the power of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to grant such lease.

The Chamberlain referred to the subject of investment of moneys in deposit belonging to the Sinking Fund and submitted the following preamble and resolution:

Whereas, The proper investment of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt with a view both to its security and growth and its relation to the finances of the City is the proper concern of this Board; and

Whereas, There is now in the various city depositaries about \$3,000,000 belonging to this fund subject at any time to investment and now drawing but two and one-half per cent. of interest; and

Whereas, The City is at present in need of funds to meet its obligations and is borrowing from individuals and private institutions large sums of money at rates of interest ranging from three to four per cent; therefore be it

Resolved, That a Committee of three be appointed by the chair to consider and report to what extent the funds of the Sinking Fund now subject to investment can be properly loaned to the City upon Revenue Bonds.

Which were unanimously adopted, the resolution being amended by the appointment of four, instead of "three," members of the Committee, as follows:

The Recorder, the Comptroller, and the Chamberlain, to which members of the Committee was added the Mayor.

The report submitted by the Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen at the last meeting on the resolution to authorize the leasing of the ferry from the foot of Thirteenth street, North River, to Jersey City, was called up by the Comptroller, and after some discussion of the subject, on motion of the Comptroller, a vote was taken on the adoption of the resolution to lease the ferry, as amended, presented to the Board at its meeting held on April 30, 1890, which motion was lost by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Comptroller—1.

Negative—The Mayor, the Recorder, the Chamberlain and the Chairman of the Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen—4.

The Comptroller was requested to notify the applicants for a lease of the ferry of the decision of the Board.

The Comptroller called up the resolution presented at the last meeting of the Board, to authorize a lease of premises in the Twenty-fourth Ward for a reception hospital, as follows:

Resolved, That the Counsel to the Corporation be and he is hereby requested to prepare a lease to the City from John H. Eden of the premises known as No. 2456 Valentine avenue, in Fordham, in the Twenty-fourth Ward, for the use of the Department of Public Charities and Correction as a reception hospital, for the term of five years from June 1, 1890, with the privilege of renewal, at a yearly rent of one thousand and five hundred dollars (\$1,500), payable quarterly, with the usual conditions, and the lessee to pay Croton water rent; the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund deeming the rent fair and reasonable and that it would be for the interest of the City that such lease should be made; and the Comptroller is hereby authorized and directed to execute such lease when prepared and approved by the Counsel to the Corporation, as provided by sections 123 and 181 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882.

Resolved, That the claim of William F. Quinn, above referred to, be and the same is hereby denied.

On motion of Commissioner Tucker, the report was adopted.

The Committee also reported in favor of the adoption of the following resolution:

M.

On motion of Commissioner Scott, the hearing of the order to show cause by Heman Clark, contractor for the construction of Section 10B of the New Aqueduct, why the further work of construction of said section should not be discontinued, owing to the fact that the work is unnecessarily and unreasonably delayed, and for his failure to comply with the directions and orders of the Chief Engineer, and the further completion of said section done under the direction and supervision of the Aqueduct Commissioners, as provided in Clause P of the contract for the construction of said section, adjourned to this day, was postponed until Wednesday next, May 14, 1890, at 3 o'clock P. TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS.

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality, containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets, shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.

The act further provides that the owner of any such lot may notify the Commissioner of Public Works, in writing, specifying the ward number and street number of the lot, that he desires, for himself, his heirs and assigns, to be released from the obligation of such covenants, and elects and agrees that said lot shall be thereupon liable to be assessed as above provided, and thereupon the owner of such lot, his heirs and assigns shall thenceforth be relieved from any obligation to pave, repair, uphold or maintain said street, and the lot in respect of which such notice was given shall be liable to assessment accordingly.

The Commissioner of Public Works desires to give the following explanation of the operation of this act: When notice, as above described, is given to the Commissioner of Public Works, the owner of the lot or lots therein described, and his heirs and assigns, are forever released from all obligation under the grant in respect to paving, repaving or repairing the street in front of or adjacent to said lot or lots, except one assessment for such paving, repaving or repairs, as the Common Council may, by ordinance, direct to be made thereafter.

No street or avenue within the limits of such grants can be paved, repaved or repaired until said work is authorized by ordinance of the Common Council, and when the owners of such lots desire their streets to be paved, repaved or repaired, they should state their desire and make their application to the Board of Aldermen and not to the Commissioner of Public Works, who has no authority in the matter until directed by ordinance of the Common Council to proceed with the pavement, repavement or repairs.

PUBLIC NOTICE AS TO WATER RATES.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887, the following changes are made in charging and collecting water rents:

1st. All extra charges for water incurred from and after June 9, 1887, shall be treated, collected and returned in arrears in the same manner as regular rents have heretofore been treated.

2d. In every building where a water meter or meters are now, or shall hereafter be in use, the charge for water by meter measurement shall be the only charge against such building, or such part thereof as is supplied through meter.

3d. The returns of arrears of water rents, including the year 1887, shall be made as heretofore on the confirmation of the tax levy by the Board of Aldermen, and shall include all charges and penalties of every nature.

4th. A penalty of five dollars (\$5) is hereby established, and will be imposed in each and every case where the rules and regulations of the Department prohibiting the use of water through hose, or in any other wasteful manner, are violated, and such penalties will be entered on the books of the Bureau against the respective buildings or property, and, if not collected, be returned in arrears in like manner as other charges for water.

5th. Charges for so-called extra water rents of every nature, imposed or incurred prior to June 9, 1887, will be canceled of record on the books of the Department.
