

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

NEW YORK CITY, September 19, 1900.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at eleven o'clock A. M., at the office of the Mayor.

Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, and Brigadier-General McLeer.

The minutes of the meeting held September 12, 1900, were read and adopted by the following

A communication was received from Colonel Austen, commanding Thirteenth Regiment Heavy Artillery, N. G., N. Y., transmitting one from Edward M. Hoffman, the Adjutant General, in relation to the matter of an extension to the armory of that organization for the purpose of accommodating the heavy artillery.

On motion, it was referred to the Committee heretofore appointed.

The Committee to whom was referred the contractor's complaint in relation to his contract for an alteration and addition to the roof of the Twelfth Regiment Armory Building reported that an agreement had been arrived at between the contractor and the sub-contractor, subject to the consent of the Armory Board to such subletting and assignment of five thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$5,150), in compensation therefor.

The Mayor offered the following:

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Corporation Counsel, the Armory Board does hereby consent to the subletting of the part of the work pertaining to the cement roofing under the contract of W. R. King, of date June 7, 1900, with the Armory Board, for an alteration and addition to the roof of the Twelfth Regiment Armory, and an assignment of five thousand one hundred and fifty dollars (\$5,150) of the moneys due, or to grow due, therefor.
