SUBJECT: QUARTERLY REPORT ENDING MARCH 31, 1902.

To the Commissioner of Docks:

SIR—I have the honor to submit the following report of work done under my charge and supervision for the quarter ending March 31, 1902:

Breakwater at Pier "A," North River.

Under a resolution of the Board of Docks dated January 16, 1900, the work of constructing a permanent breakwater south of Pier "A" has been in progress. The plan of using upper course concrete blocks having been abandoned, concrete has been placed *in situ* in form substituted therefor. The form along what is designated as the "Island section" of the breakwater was built at the Fifty-seventh street yard and set in place by aid of the 100-ton derrick. Concrete was made and placed in this form and brought up to the level of the granite. Granite has been set on the outer and end faces of this section. The face on the inside of the breakwater is made of concrete. Coping has been set along the greater portion of both sides of the breakwater and a conduit pipe for holding electric wires and gas pipe has been laid between the coping for the greater length of the breakwater.

Pier, New 14, North River.

It having been found necessary to repair the outer end of this pier, work was done in rebuilding the crib and repairing the pier. The work was completed during the quarter under an order from the Board of Docks.

Pier, New 23, North River.

The Board of Docks by resolution passed on the 17th of May, 1901, authorized the extension of this pier from the outer end, and the work has been completed.

Pier, New 24, North River.

The Board of Docks by resolution passed on the 10th of June, 1901, authorized the extension of this pier from the outer end, and work has been in progress.

Piers, New 27, 28 and 29, North River.

The fender system in front of the bulkhead between these piers has been repaired by the Pennsylvania Railroad Company under permit from the Board of Docks.

Pier, New 36, North River.

The Board of Docks by resolution dated 3d of June, 1901, authorized the extension of Pier, new 36, North river, from the outer end. Work has been in progress during the quarter.

Pier, New 38, North River.

The outer end of this pier has been extended under resolution of the Board of Docks dated June 27, 1900. The work has been completed.

Pier, New 39, North River.

The Board of Docks by resolution passed December 7, 1900, authorized the extension of this pier from the outer end. Work has been in progress during the quarter.

Chelsea Section, North River.

On the 28th of December, 1900, the Board of Docks authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead wall between Bloomfield and West Twenty-third streets. The work of dredging certain localities has been in progress during the quarter, and a temporary fence has been erected to inclose this section. Work on the section is progressing as rapidly as it possibly can be, until the necessary property has been acquired from private owners.

Pier, West Thirty-fifth Street, North River.

The Board of Docks by resolution passed on the 9th of March, 1900, authorized the extension of this pier from the outer end. The work has been completed during the quarter.

West Ninety-fifth Street, North River.

The construction of a pile bulkhead in the vicinity of this street has been in progress during the quarter. Rip-rap has been deposited in the rear of the piles, and earth filling is now being placed back of the bulkhead. All this work is being done under resolution of the Board of Docks, dated June 21, 1901.

Claremont Section, North River.

The Board of Docks by a unanimous resolution passed on the 16th of November, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead wall in the vicinity of One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street and One Hundred and Thirtieth street, to be known as Claremont section. Substantial progress has been made in the work on this section during the quarter.

EAST RIVER.

Broad Street Section, East River.

By unanimous resolution of the Board of Docks, passed on the 22d of December, 1899, there was authorized the construction of a section of the bulkhead between Whitehall street and Pier, new 7, on the East river, and the construction of two new piers as well as the extension of Piers, new 6 and 7. Substantial progress has been made in the work on the section, and the bulkhead wall is now nearly completed. About fifty-eight linear feet of new wharfage room has been made on the E course during the quarter. Filling is being placed in rear of the wall and pavement laid in the vicinity. Piers, New 6 and 7, are being extended.

Fulton Section, East River.

The Board of Docks by resolution passed on the 26th of April, 1901, authorized the construction of a bulkhead wall in the vicinity of Fulton street. A temporary approach has been built to Pier, new 16, and substantial progress has been made in the work of building the wall.

Pier, New 16, East River.

The work of constructing a new pier to be known as Pier, new 16, has been in progress under Contract No. 709, and the work has been completed.

Catharine Section, East River.

The work on this section has been temporarily suspended, and no work done during the quarter. The wall has been completed as far as practicable until further property has been acquired.

Market Section, East River.

The Board of Docks by a resolution of the 23d of February, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead or river wall in the neighborhood of Market street. Progress has been made towards completion during the quarter, and filling is being placed in rear of the wall.

Pier, old 36, has been removed to make way for the proposed new Pier 28

Rutgers Section, East River.

This section has been practically completed, and granite pavement laid between Rutgers street and Catharine street. During the quarter some slight work of pointing granite joints has been done.

Freight Shed on Pier, New 33, East River.

A freight shed is being erected on Pier, new 33, under Contract No. 699. The contractors for this work have failed to complete their contract, and but little work has been done upon it during the quarter.

Pier, Fifth Street, East River.

The work of constructing a new pier with appurtenances at the foot of this street has been completed by the contractor under Contract No. 716.

East Twenty-third Section, East River.

By resolution of the Board of Docks work on this section has been divided into two parts, known as Sections A and B. The work has been in progress on both of these divisions during the quarter, and substantial progress made. Earth filling has been placed behind the bulkhead wall and is being graded. Temporary approaches to the piers have been maintained, and a portion of the marginal street has been paved with asphalt.

Recreation Ground Between East Seventeenth Street and East Eighteenth Street.

The Board of Docks by a resolution passed on the 31st of May, 1901, directed that the newly-made land between these two streets be regulated and graded for use as recreation ground. The work was begun during the previous quarter, and substantial progress has been made therein. Bluestone edging has been set. All the walks have been graded and asphalted, grass plots have been graded and covered with loam and sodded. About sixty-five trees and six hundred and fifty shrubs have been planted. Granite posts have been set at the corners of the entrance, and about seven hundred linear feet of granite coping placed and surmounted with iron railing. During the present quarter the park has been graded, the comfort house painted, coping was set at the base of the iron fence and drinking fountains placed.

East Twenty-fourth Street, East River.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at the foot of the street along the approach to the pier and continued out on the deck of the pier.

East Thirty-eighth Street Section, East River.

The Board of Docks by a unanimous resolution passed on the 4th of May, 1900, authorized the construction of a bulkhead wall in the vicinity of East Thirty-eighth street. Considerable work has been done at this section during the quarter, and filling is being placed in rear of the wall built. The foundation is being prepared for the tunnel and outlet pipes of the General Tunnel Engineering Company at their cost and expense. No work, however, has been done on this foundation during the quarter.

East Seventy-fourth Street Section, East River.

The Board of Docks having authorized the construction of a section of the wall at this locality by a resolution passed May 11, 1900, the work of construction has been in progress during the quarter. Loose stone and other material found on the rock bottom has been removed by pumps. Granite has been set and backed up with concrete. In this connection work has also been done in the matter of placing the intake and outlet pipe of the Manhattan Elevated Railway Company at the cost and expense of said company. A fender system has also been placed along the bulkhead wall between Seventy-fourth street and Seventy-fifth street for the same company.

Between East One Hundred and Seventh Street and East One Hundred and Tenth Street, East River.

The new-made land in this vicinity is being paved with asphalt pavement.

Between One Hundred and Thirty-first Street and One Hundred and Thirty-fifth Street, Harlem River.

A contract, No. 710, has been let for the construction of two crib bulkheads in this locality. Dredging has been done, and the construction of the two cribs is approaching completion.

One Hundred and Forty-seventh Street to One Hundred and Fiftieth Street, Harlem River.

Filling is being deposited to grade between the above premises by the Metropolitan Street Railway Company under permit from the Board of Docks. This work is in progress.

Third Avenue and Lexington Avenue, Harlem River.

A temporary wharf structure with certain other improvements is being erected at this locality by the Terry & Tench Construction Company under permit from the Board of Docks. An old platform has been removed by the same company.

Second Avenue and Lincoln Avenue, Harlem River.

Exits for the cable system of the Manhattan Elevated Railroad Company are being built by this company under permit from the Board of Docks.

One Hundred and Thirty-eighth Street West of Gerard Avenue.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by Jordan L. Mott under permit from the Board of Docks. This work was begun in 1895 and has been in progress from time to time.

One Hundred and Forty-fourth Street East Side of Harlem River.

Filling in this vicinity is being deposited by John Cromwell under permit from the Board of Docks. This work was commenced in 1895 and is in progress from time to time.

Morris Heights, Harlem River.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity and a retaining structure to hold the same is being erected by the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury Company Consolidated under permit from the Board of Docks. This work was begun in 1900 and is in progress.

Oak Point, Bronx River.

Filling is being deposited and other improvements made by the East Bay Land and Improvement Company under permit from the Board of Docks. This work was begun in 1891, and is temporarily suspended.

Fort Schuyler Road, Westchester Creek.

Filling is being deposited in this vicinity by J. L. Brush under permit from the Board of Docks. This work was begun in 1900 and is in progress.

One Hundred and Forty-first Street, Port Morris.

A pier and bulkhead is being constructed by the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company at this point under permit of the Board of Docks.

Harlem River Ship Canal.

Filling is being deposited on the property of the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company north of the northerly line of the Harlem River Ship canal under permit of the Commissioner of Docks. This work was commenced on the 18th of January and is in progress.

One Hundred and Fiftieth Street and Harlem River.

A crib bulkhead and filling in rear of same is being erected in this vicinity by the Messrs. Wilson Adams & Co. under permit from the Board of Docks.

Morris Heights.

A rip-rap stone wall is being built by the Gas Engine and Power Company and Charles L. Seabury Company Consolidated under permit from the Board of Docks.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Sheepshead Bay.

The Manhattan Hotel and Land Company are removing and depositing sand at Manhattan Beach. Work has been temporarily suspended.

Between Fifty-sixth Street and Fifty-seventh Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The water front in this vicinity is being improved by the Morse Iron Works and Dry Dock Company under permit from the Board of Docks. The work has been completed.

Between Twenty-fifth Street and Twenty-sixth Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Improvements are being made in the water front of this locality by the Brooklyn Dock and Terminal Company under permit from the Board of Docks. Work has been temporarily suspended.

Dutch Kills, Long Island City.

A plant for the storage of coal is being erected at Dutch Kills by the Long Island Railroad Company under permit of the Board of Docks, and work is now in progress.

Pier 38, Atlantic Basin.

A crib bulkhead is being rebuilt on what is known as Pier 38, Atlantic Basin, by the New York Dock Company under permit. The work has been temporarily suspended.

Conover Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

The construction of a basin at the foot of this street is in progress by H. P. Kirkham & Son under permit from the Board of Docks.

Between Fortieth Street and Forty-first Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

A shed has been erected on the extension to the pier between these streets by the Bush Company Limited under permit from the Board of Docks.

Fifty-third Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

A new pier is being built at Fifty-third street by the United States Projectile Company under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

Between Fifty-fourth Street and Fifty-fifth Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Coal pockets are being constructed on the water front between these streets by the Kings County Gas and Illuminating Company under permit from the Board of Docks.

Rockaway Beach.

A dock and marine railway is being built on the property owned by O. L. Roehr under permit from the Board of Docks.

Emmons Avenue and Twenty-second Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

Filling is being deposited on these premises by William Essmark for the United States Government under permit from the Board of Docks.

City Island.

A marine railway and plank walk is being constructed by Robert Jacoby under

permit from the Commissioner of Docks; also a float and new runway north of the New City Island Bridge is being rebuilt by Edward Rosenberger under permit from the Commissioner of Docks.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

A number of pieces of work have been done by private parties and supervised by the Department of Docks and Ferries.

Paving Marginal Street, North River.

Asphalt pavement has been laid at various places along the North river under Treasurer's orders therefor where necessary to repair pavement already laid. Pavement along the North river water front, between Pier "A" and West Fifty-seventh street, and between West Fifty-seventh street and West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street has also been kept in repair.

Pavement on the East River.

Pavement has been repaired along the East river water front as required.

Timber Basin, North River.

At the timber basin, timber has been received under Treasurer's orders and contracts, cared for and issued as required. The timber basin has been maintained in good order and condition.

Pile Basin.

The pile basin between One Hundred and Fifty-third street and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth street, and between One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street and One Hundred and Fifty-seventh street, on the North river, and at Sherman's creek, on the Harlem river, have been maintained in good order and condition.

Basin for Storage of Old Material, Borough of Brooklyn.

At this basin old material has been rafted and cared for.

Department Yards at West Fifty-seventh Street and East Twenty-fourth Street.

At the Department yards the force of the Department has been engaged in the construction of concrete blocks, the handling and cutting of granite, the care of materials and the issue of supplies for various pieces of work. The yards have been maintained in good order and condition.

Recreation Buildings.

Recreation buildings on the North and East rivers have been maintained and cared for, and repairs have been made where necessary.

Floating Property.

All the floating property of the Department has been cared for during the quarter and has been repaired from time to time when necessary.

On March 16, 1902, by authority of the Commissioner of Navigation and in accordance with the regulations of the United States Treasury Department, the name of the tug "Pier" was changed to "Richmond."

On March 14, 1902, by authority of the Commissioner of Navigation and in accordance with the regulation of the United States Treasury Department, the name of the tug "Richard Croker" was changed to "Manhattan."

The tug "Brooklyn," built by Brown & Miller under Contract No. 705, was completed during the quarter and has been placed in commission.

Surveying Party.

All surveys of the water front and the structures thereon on the North, East and Harlem rivers, in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, have been made. An extensive survey of the water front of the Boroughs of Queens and Richmond is in progress. All the lines, levels, grades, soundings, surveys and examinations have been made and given as required.

Dredging.

All the dredging has been supervised, whether done by the Department or private owners.

Repairs.

Repairs other than dredging have been made at various places under order or permit from the Board of Docks. Repairs, alterations and other pieces of work by private parties under order or permit from the Board of Docks have been supervised during the quarter.

Draughtsmen.

In the office of the Engineer-in-Chief the Draughtsmen have been engaged on plans and studies for contract work, plans for the improvement of the water front, plans and specifications for new piers and repairs, change of lines, examination of plans submitted by private parties, solar printing and general routine work.

The total new wharfage room made by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the quarter amounted to 5,983 linear feet. The wharfage room destroyed by the City in preparing new improvements is 588 linear feet. The area of the City's piers has been increased 109,120 square feet.

The total increase of wharfage room made by private parties under permit from the Department of Docks and Ferries is 7,985 linear feet.

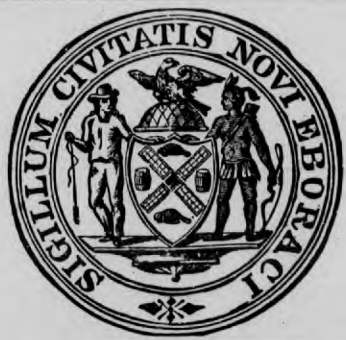

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, held June 11, 1902, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon the Board of Health of the Department of Health of The City of New York, section 194 of the Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and is amended so as to read as follows:

Section 194. Spitting upon the sidewalk of any public street, avenue, park, public square, or place, in The City of New York, or upon the floor of any hall in any tenement house which is used in common by the tenants thereof, or upon the floor of any hall or office in any hotel or lodging house which is used in common by the guests thereof, or upon the floor of any theatre, or of any building in which there is a public assemblage of people, or upon the floor of any ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, or upon the floor of any ferry house, depot, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, is hereby forbidden.

The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of any such building, ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, ferry house, depot, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier are hereby required to keep permanently posted in each of said places a sufficient number

of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and calling attention to the provisions of this section.

The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of the buildings, ferry boats, ferry houses, depots, station platforms of any elevated railroad or other common carrier are hereby required to provide sufficient and proper receptacles for expectoration, and also to provide for the cleansing and disinfection of said receptacles at least every twenty-four hours; and spitting into the street from the cars, stairs, platforms of the elevated railroads, or any public conveyance, is hereby forbidden.

It is hereby made the duty of every corporation or person engaged in the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes or tobacco, or conducting the business of printing, in The City of New York, when ten or more persons are employed on the premises, to provide proper receptacles for expectoration. Such receptacles are to be in the proportion of one for every two persons so employed and they are to be cleansed and disinfected at least once in every twenty-four hours.

A copy of the last paragraph of this section must be kept posted in a conspicuous place in every factory or printing office, mentioned in the preceding paragraph.

That the word "Physician" shall include dentists, and every other person who practices about the cure of the sick or injured, or who has the charge of, or professionally prescribes for, any person sick, injured, or diseased, and any person who pursues the business of or acts as midwife; that the phrase "contagious disease" shall be held to include all persons sick, affected, or attacked by or of a disease of an infectious, contagious, or pestilential nature (more especially, however, referring to cholera, yellow fever, small-pox, chicken-pox, diphtheria [including membranous croup], ship or typhus, typhoid, spotted, relapsing and scarlet fever, measles, acute and chronic ophthalmia (trachoma), and also including any new disease of an infectious, contagious, or pestilential nature, and also any other disease publicly declared by this Board dangerous to the public health; and every physician in said city shall at all times cause his or her name, office and residence, and also his or her kind and class of practice, to be registered within the Bureau of Records and in a manner according to the regulations prescribed by this Board.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the board of aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below. No bid or estimate will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
