SIR—Herewith I have the honor to submit my report for the third quarter of the current year. Monthly requisitions for medical and surgical supplies have been filed for the following institutions:

Bellevue Hospital, Bellevue Dispensary, Gouverneur Hospital, Harlem Hospital, Fordham Hospital, City Hospital, Blackwell's Island; Almshouse, Blackwell's Island; Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island; Randall's Island Hospitals, Superintendent Out-Door Poor, Photographical Department, Department of Correction (general use); Workhouse, Blackwell's Island; New York County Penitentiary, Blackwell's Island; City Prison (Tombs); District Prisons.

The Department of Correction has replaced the supplies received by wholesale purchases of drugs of an equal value.

The Manufacturing Bureau has prepared as many pharmaceutical and chemical products as are preferably made by the Department, amounting to about one-sixth of the total supplies. All supplies received have been carefully examined, and none were accepted that did not comply with the specifications and the recognized standards. The preparation and sterilization of surgical sutures has been continued, and the quality of the milk supplied to the Department has been controlled by daily inspection and examination.

Repaired lime box in gas house, using 13 feet 2 inches by 9 inches and 12 feet of 3-inch by 6-inch spruce, 2 feet of 1¼-inch pine, 2 pairs of 8-inch strap hinges, 2 dozen 1-inch screws, 8 pounds of spikes and 6 pounds of nails.

Repaired awning in waiting room, New York side, using 10 feet of 1¼-inch pine, 1 dozen screw eyes, 2 pounds of nails. Renewed sash cord.

Repaired door in office with 2 feet of ¾-inch pine, 2 dozen ¾-inch screws. Fitted 3 Yale locks and keys.

Made benches for lawns, using 175 feet of 1¼-inch yellow pine, 25 feet of 1¼-inch pine, 3 two-inch by four-inch spruce joists 13 feet long and 9 pounds of nails.

Renewed 1 sash cord in Ward No. 24. Put knobs on 2 shutters. Put 1 lock to door and fitted key for the same. Furnished key for door of ice-box. Repaired table, using ½ dozen 1-inch screws and 1 pound of nails.

Pumped water out of cellar of Pavilions A, B and C. Cut grass of Lawn fronting the river. Dug 48 post holes in Greenhouse; put down 48 posts. Trimmed gas coal in Gas-house shed.

Hauled ice to Ice-house. Mowed hay and made 4 stacks near Old Reservoir. Trimmed broken coal in coal yard. Trimmed, cut grass and cleansed ground from House of Refuge wall to Dormitory 2. Carted 40 loads of ashes to the henry for filling and grading. Cut grass and cleaned grounds on Laundry clothes yard. Hauled up and loaded scrap-iron from the Boiler-houses and back of Blacksmith Shop to Canal Dock. Hauled ice to ice-house; ice in August; packed up the same. Hauled 20 flags from Gas-house boiler-house to Quarry. Drove piles and hauled lumber to bath-house, from Dock. Dug at old Boiler-house. Carted 30 loads of ashes from north dump to Pavilions A, B and C, to fill in yard, leveled and graded the same. Carted 80 loads of broken bricks from South Hospital, dumped the same on road from carpenter shop to cow stable, leveled and graded. Hauled and packed ice from dock to ice house. Dug trench 390 feet long, 2 feet wide and 3 feet deep, from Croton water-main, back of Ward 26, to green house, to connect with boiler; filled in and finished the same. Dug trench 225 feet long, 2 feet wide and 3 feet deep from Kitchen cellar to North Hospital, in order to lay in hot water pipe; filled, drained and finished the same. Dug trench 96 feet long, 2 feet wide and 3 feet deep, from Croton water-main to Quarantine 33, to connect cold water pipe with boiler; filled and finished the same. Hauled 10 cart-loads of ashes from North Dump to back of office; graded and levelled the same. Carted 16 loads of broken stone from dock to Pavilions A, B and C, spread the same on back road leading to the Industrial Schools to the dock and around the Cottage. Carted 14 loads of sand to shed of Quarry and 6 loads to Plasterer's Cellar. Carted 50 loads of ashes from Gas-house Dump to grade yard in front of Pavilion F; levelled and graded the same. Carted 10 loads of ashes from Gas-house to Wards 14 and 16; levelled and graded the same. Carted 16 loads of ashes from Steamboat Dock to back of Pavilion F, to cover and clean dump near Bath House. Carted 30 loads of ashes to Cow Stable to spread in the yard.

Dug on sewer at Quarantine 31. Dump loam to fill in and grade around new Pavilion H, and also to fill in and grade back of new wing of A, B and C. Cleaned roads and walks. Kept grass on lawns cut and trimmed. Hauled coal to and carted ashes from boiler houses. Levelled and cleaned dumps.

DEAR SIR—I have received your letter dated September 27, 1901, in reference to a communication from Wilson Brown, Jr., to the Mayor, in regard to roads in the Town of North Salem. You state that you fail to see how the City can comply with the order to build this road, that it does not own the land, and there are serious legal questions as to whether it can be acquired.

I have also received a letter from the Mayor dated September 21, 1901, in reference to the same matter, inclosing a copy of a letter to him dated September 18, 1901, from Mr. Brown.

The City seems to be in an anomalous position in regard to this matter.

The mandamus proceeding brought by the Town of North Salem to compel the City to construct certain roads in that town resulted in an order requiring such construction. This order has been affirmed by the Court of Appeals. It appears, however, that the City does not own the land on which the mandamus requires it to construct the roads. Mandamus proceedings can be taken with effect only against officers of the City who could be judged guilty of contempt of court if they failed to act as required by the mandamus.

I am not satisfied, however, that the matter should be allowed to remain in its present condition. It is possible that the land required would be conveyed to the City voluntarily by its owners and thus one difficulty removed. It might also be that a mandamus would lie against the City officers to compel them to acquire title and to compel an issue of bonds to provide the means of doing the work.

It seems to me that a bona fide attempt should be made to do the act required by the court. If such an attempt is made and fails the City will be in a better position before the courts and before the public.

I would suggest in the first place, therefore, that you ascertain whether or not the land will be conveyed voluntarily by its present owner to the City for the purposes of the road, and if not whether any proceedings can be taken in court to acquire title thereto. If it is possible to acquire title to land in either of the ways suggested, an effort should then be made to secure the funds for doing the work and to enter into a contract for its actual construction.

In other words, I think the City officers should do everything they can to comply with the spirit of the mandamus and not rely upon technicalities to escape therefrom.
