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MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

New York, January 28, 1903.

A meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission was held at the Commission's offices, No. 61 Elm street, on Wednesday, January 28, 1903, at 3 p. m.

There were present President Ogden and Commissioners Mason, Banta, Perrine and Spencer.

The minutes of the meeting held January 14 were approved after correction.

The minutes of the meeting held January 21 were approved.

On motion, duly seconded, the request of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, submitted at the meeting held on the 14th instant, that the position of Ambulance Driver be included in the non-competitive class, was referred to the President.

The Commission then considered the request of the Department of Correction, submitted at the meeting held on the 14th instant, that two additional Chaplains be included in the exempt class, and on motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the classification of offices and positions in the Department of Correction, in the exempt class, as fixed by rule 68, be amended by striking therefrom the following:

5 Chaplains,
—and by substituting therefor the following:

7 Chaplains.

The Law Committee submitted reports in the following matters:

The request of the Secretary for further information as to the manner in which the opinion of the Corporation Counsel, with reference to increases in salaries, rendered December 18, 1902, should be construed, and especially requesting information as to the eligibility of a Clerk appointed in 1887 at a salary of \$1,300, after an examination in which the grade of appointment was not specified, for an increase to \$1,500 without further examination.

The Committee is of the opinion that the person referred to must pass an examination for promotion, for the reason that in accepting appointment he voluntarily included himself within the grade indicated by that salary. If any increase in salary is made subsequent to that time, beyond the maximum fixed for that grade, he must pass a civil service promotion examination, because he acquired no specific right at the time that he was examined. Where a position is not graded, and in Schedule E, this, of course, does not apply. If, however, a different view is to be taken of this case, the provisions of the civil service law with reference to promotion will be defeated. The promotion cannot be governed by the rules passed in May, 1902, but it must be governed by the rules and grades in force at the time the examination was taken.

The opinion of the Corporation Counsel, with reference to the power of a department to appoint such number of employees of particular classes as the needs of his department may require within the appropriation made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

This opinion holds that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen have fixed the amount of salaries, but have not fixed the number of employees, and that a department may increase the number of its employees at any time that it sees fit without further action of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, providing the salaries paid them are not different from those fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. In other words, it is held that under section 1543 of the Charter the number of employees in a department can only be limited by an ordinance of the Board of Aldermen, and that the action of the Board of Aldermen and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in fixing the number of employees in May and in November, 1902, was not such an ordinance as is required by the section of the Charter referred to. Therefore, if the Board of Estimate and Apportionment appropriates the sum of \$100,000 for the use of the Civil Service Commission, and has provided for three classes of Clerks, \$1,500, \$1,000 and \$500, the Commission may increase the salaries of any number of its Clerks to \$1,500 without any action on the part of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, provided the sum appropriated is not exceeded.

The letter from the Corporation Counsel, referring to a letter of the Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association recommending that the Civil Service Commission issue a statement to the heads of departments, setting forth the proper procedure in removing an employee, in line with the latest decisions of the Courts.

We do not see the wisdom of issuing such a statement. It is no part of the duty of this Commission to advise the departments how employees can be removed. It is entirely proper for the Corporation Counsel to issue such a statement, as he is the

legal adviser of the various departments and is the one to inform the heads of departments as to the proper construction of the law.

The peremptory writs of mandamus issued by Justice Gaynor of the Supreme Court directing the Commission to certify to the payrolls of Michael Gorman and others as Captains of police.

The Committee recommended that the writs be referred to the Corporation Counsel.

On motion, duly seconded, the reports of the Law Committee were adopted.

The Secretary stated that he had been notified by the Corporation Counsel that the latter did not believe it advisable to appeal from the decision of Justice Gaynor directing the Commission to certify the payrolls of Michael Gorman and others as captains of police. On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That in obedience with the order of the Supreme Court, dated January 22, 1903, the Secretary be and he hereby is directed to attach the certificate of the Municipal Civil Service Commission to the payrolls of the following-named persons as Captains of Police:

Michael Gorman, James Gannon, Francis J. Creamer, Michael E. Foody, Edward A. Gaus, John Buchanan, Edward Walsh, John F. Flood, John J. Lantry, John Cooney, John E. Colgan, Lawrence J. I also return original petition which accompanied above communication.

At 11 o'clock a. m., Present—Police Commissioner Greene, First Deputy Commissioner Ebstein, Second Deputy Commissioner Piper, Chief Clerk Kipp, Chief Inspector Cortright, Borough Inspectors Nicholas Brooks and Patrick H. McLaughlin, and the following Inspectors, viz: Elias P. Clayton, Thomas Murphy, James Kane, Adam A. Cross, William W. McLaughlin, John Brennan, Thomas L. Druhan and Walter L. Thompson, and the following Acting Inspectors, viz: Richard Walsh, Stephen O'Brien and James Campbell, the following instructions were given, viz:

Inspectors—I have called you together to speak of certain things which were not mentioned at the time of our first meeting, a month ago. The patrolling is not properly done and particularly in the thickly populated sections of the City, where the patrolman's posts are short, the Precincts are small and can be easily observed by the Captains. It is the duty of the Captains to make the Patrolmen do their duty and, to assist them, the Captains have the Sergeants on patrol, the Roundsmen on patrol and the plain clothes men, and if necessary, can use the men on reserve. If a Captain is brought to trial for neglect of duty, in regard to patrolling in his precinct, it will not be a sufficient defense for him to show that at the roll call of the out-going sections he gave orders for the patrolmen to properly patrol. He must see that his orders are obeyed. It is the duty of the Inspectors to inspect, and to report any neglect of the Captains to perform their duty in this as in other matters.

Under the provisions of the Liquor Tax Law about 2,400 hotel licenses have been granted in Greater New York, and all these places have the right to sell liquor on Sunday. Many of the cheaper hotels comply strictly with the law and others do not. Some of them are notoriously used for gambling and prostitution. The ordinary difficulties in getting evidence do not apply to these places, for they all hold public licenses and are subject to inspection by you and your subordinates whenever open. Written instructions on this subject will be issued to you to-day. It is your plain duty as Police Officers and mine as Police Commissioner to see that the law is enforced. In the report called for under the amendment to Rule 44, you and the Captains will report the places of each kind therein referred to which you have personally visited during the preceding month.

During the last month, in addition to 220 trials in the lower grades, resulting in penalties from dismissal to reprimand, there have been five trials in the upper grades, viz: one Inspector and four Captains. One Captain was acquitted and promptly restored to duty; another Captain was found guilty and promptly dismissed; a third Captain was found guilty of a minor offense and cautioned not to repeat it. The other cases have not reached me. In regard to these trials, it is well that you should understand the principles which have been laid down by the highest Courts of the State, viz: that they are administrative trials, held for the purpose of determining whether the officer accused is fit to remain in the Police Department; that they are not to be limited by the strict rules of evidence required in trials under the criminal law; and that the action of the Commissioner is final, except as it may be reversed by the Courts for manifest error. It is noticeable that in the case of these higher officers the evidence (in the most important cases) was obtained not within the Department but from those without the Department. The Inspectors of Police now have the opportunity, and it is their high privilege, to redeem the good name of the police and to purge the force of its dishonest and unworthy members. Other agencies, individuals, clubs, incorporated societies, various branches of the City Government, and, finally, the officers who administer the criminal law, are actively working in hearty co-operation to bring about these ends. With your intimate knowledge of police affairs you can easily accomplish what these other agencies can only accomplish with difficulty, but they surely will accomplish it. I trust that I may have your hearty co-operation to this end.

Appeal 18 of 1903, Alteration No. 4834 of 1902, No. 66 Water street, Brooklyn, Axel Hedman, architect and appellant; laid over at last meeting (pending receipt of Engineer's report from the office of the Superintendent of Buildings).

On motion, denied.

Appeal 21 of 1903, New Building No. 1798 of 1902, east side of Thirty-fifth street, Brooklyn, Albert Cassansese, appellant:

The buildings located as above described are one-family, frame, two-story and attic dwellings, 23 feet front and rear and 32 feet deep, built on plot of ground 36 feet front and rear and 100 feet deep. Section 65 of Building Code where the law requires eight inches of brick work around flues (furnace) is hereby asked in these buildings to be repealed by your Honorable Board of Examiners, and that you allow the flues to be built with four inches of brick and the same lined with the flue lining.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 23 of 1903, New Building No. 738 of 1902, northeast corner of Fifty-sixth street and Twelfth avenue, Manhattan, Alexander Stevens, Superintendent of Buildings of Fire Department, appellant;

The waiving of the objection in regard to the excessive area is urged on the ground that the building is to be not more than three stories high, and no part of it will be more than 56 feet from a street. Apparently the regulations are intended to prevent a building being erected in such a manner that part of it would be a considerable distance from any street, because the area allowed is increased in accordance with the number of streets on which a building fronts. This building, owing to its unusual length in proportion to width, would, it is believed, comply with the spirit of the regulations. The construction of the building will be slow-burning mill construction, using steel girders.

2. The stairways shown, while not all continuous, are believed to furnish sufficient means of exit, particularly as the building is so shallow. In addition to this, the number of men employed is only about sixty, and seventy-five per cent. of these will be on the ground floor, while ten per cent. are on the third floor.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 24 of 1903, Alteration No. 105 of 1903, No. 9 West Eighth street, Manhattan, M. L. & H. G. Emery, architects and appellants;

Objection No. 1. "Proposed conversion to a lodging house would be unlawful without first making building fireproof and conform to section 105 of the Code."

Objection No. 5. "It would be unlawful to occupy cellar wholly or in part as a dwelling. Section 1309, Charter of City of New York."

In reference to Objection No. 1: We have found upon investigation since filing the plans and application that the building was incorrectly described to be used as a lodging house, as it has less than the number of rooms comprehended in the designation "lodging house." There are but nine (9) rooms for sleeping purposes. The present building is not to be enlarged in any way, or its present accommodations increased. Fire escapes are to be provided front and rear. The plumbing is to be renewed throughout and the building improved in sanitary and other ways. The building occupies less than fifty per cent. of the lot, setting about five feet back of street line and having large yard in rear. We would petition that the building be constructed as a girls' "boarding" house, instead of "lodging" house.

In reference to Objection No. 5: We would repeat the foregoing statement as applying to this objection and further state that the space in front of kitchen windows is to be excavated and a large open area formed, materially improving the condition of light and air, and petition that the ruling in reference to using the rooms in question for a kitchen be waived.

Appeal 25 of 1903, Alteration No. 206 of 1903, south side East New York avenue, near Amboy street, Brooklyn, Henry Miles, appellant;

Laid over, pending appearance of applicant.

We propose to build and extend present building, which is frame construction, thirty feet in depth, for show-room purposes, to conform with present design and construction of building now on said property.

There can be no objection made from surrounding property owners, as we own the property on all sides of said proposed extension, which will ensure light, air and access to all parts.

This improvement is within five (5) feet of the fire limits.

On motion, approved.



For all lodging houses in The City of New York, containing rooms in which there are three or more beds for the use of lodgers, a permit from the Board of Health shall be required, and no person shall have, lease, let or keep, any such lodging house or the lodgings therein, or assist in the keeping, hire or assist in hiring, or conduct the business of any such lodging house, or the lodgings therein, except pursuant to the terms and conditions of such permit. The beds in all lodging houses and in every room in which beds are let for lodgers shall be separated by a passageway of not less than two feet, horizontally, and all the beds shall be so arranged that under each of them the air shall freely circulate, and there be adequate ventilation. Four hundred cubic feet of air space shall be provided and allowed for each bed or lodger.
