COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 10.30 o'clock A. M., on Monday, May 16, 1904.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Edward M. Grout, Comptroller; Patrick Keenan, Chamberlain, and John T. McCall, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to the Staten Island Ferry matter:

NEW YORK, May 10, 1904.

Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor, Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—After conferring with the representatives of the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, the owner of the ferry franchise at present operating the Staten Island Ferry, and with the representatives of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, the owner of the property at St. George, Staten Island, relative to acquiring said property by the City for a ferry terminal, I beg to submit the following to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with a recommendation for its adoption:

First—That the City enter into an agreement with the Rapid Transit Ferry Company for a continuation of the operation of the ferry for one year from June 1, 1904.

This practically amounts to the extension of the present agreement for one year, all its terms and conditions remaining as they exist at present, with a stipulation to be contained in the agreement to the effect that the City is to have the right to carry on the work of reconstructing this terminal without unduly hampering the operation of the ferry, and to take possession of a portion of this property for the above purpose at any time after December 1, 1904.

Second—That the City enter into an agreement to purchase within one year from June 1, 1904, the ferry building and all appurtenances now belonging to the present ferry company, and used in the operation of the ferry, at the foot of Whitehall street, paying therefor the sum of \$175,000. This is the figure that is stipulated in the present agreement as having been agreed upon, that in the event of any other company securing the franchise it would pay the present holders for the structures erected by the present operating company.

Third—The City to enter into an agreement to purchase from the Rapid Transit Ferry Company the ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton" in one year from June 1, 1904, at their present estimated value of \$245,000, subject to such change of value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place at the time the City takes possession, which is calculated to be about June 1, 1905.

Fourth—The City to enter into an agreement to purchase from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, the owner of the present chartered ferryboats "Middletown," "Southfield" and "Westfield," in one year from June 1, 1904, for the sum of \$25,000 each, subject to such change in value or deterioration as may be found to have taken place between the present time and the date when the City calculates taking possession, namely, June 1, 1905.

The above valuations of the floating equipment of the ferry are the results of surveys taken to determine the value of these boats held a short time since.

Fifth—The City to purchase by agreement the property as shown on the map attached herewith at St. George, Staten Island, including a right of way for a viaduct over the tracks of the railway company from the owners, the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and to pay therefor the sum of \$525,000.

Sixth—The City to purchase by agreement the ferry terminal station and appurtenances now in use by the ferry company and the railroad company, which is comprised within the area of property to be acquired from the owners of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, for the sum of \$86,000.

The above, from 1 to 6, are recommended for adoption; after conferring with the President of the Ferry Company and the representatives of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, these various agreements can be entered into, and the property acquired for the above amounts by June 1, 1905; the City would then be in a position to operate the ferry with some, if not all, of the new boats, and by that time the terminal at St. George can be placed in position to accommodate the new boats. The old boats recommended for purchase will all be needed for the operation of the ferry service to Stapleton and Port Richmond. I cannot find, after diligent inquiry, any other boats suitable for this service at the figures given above, and it is further calculated that the City could come into immediate possession of the St. George terminal property and carry on the necessary reconstruction, at the same time continuing the operation of the ferry by the ferry company as at present.

It is further recommended that the property necessary for the ferry terminal at Stapleton, as shown on map herewith attached, be acquired by condemnation, pursuant to the provisions contained in chapter 624 of the Laws of 1903.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report of the Engineer of the Department of Finance:

MAY 16, 1904.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Commissioner of Docks, in communication dated May 10, presents for the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund six propositions relating to the continuation of the Staten Island Ferry service from June 1, 1904, the expiration of the present lease, and the purchase by the City of the terminal at St. George and the plant and equipment of the ferry company, which may be briefly summarized as follows:

1st. The ferry company to continue the service for one year under the same terms and conditions, except that the City is to be permitted to carry on the work of reconstruction of the terminals after December 1, 1904, without unduly hampering the operation of the ferry.

During the last fiscal year the City received a revenue from this source of \$45,500, and the company earned about \$50,000, or 5 per cent. on its outstanding stock of \$1,000,000.

2d. The City to purchase from the Rapid Transit Ferry Company the following:

(a) Ferry house and appurtenances at Whitehall street... \$175,000 00
(b) The ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton"... 245,000 00
(c) The buildings, dock, slips, etc., at the ferry terminal at St. George..... 86,000 00

Total..... \$506,000 00

3d. The City to purchase from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, owner):

(a) The land and land under water for the terminal at St. George, as previously approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund..... \$525,000 00
(b) The ferryboats "Middletown," "Southfield" and "Westfield," now chartered by the ferry company. 75,000 00

600,000 00

Grand total of expenditure necessary by the City for the plant and property..... \$1,106,000 00

In reply thereto I would report:

First—It is my opinion that the agreement for the continuation of the ferry service should be for a longer period than one year, as the contract for the boats to be built for the City is not as yet let and it is impossible to state when the boats will be delivered. I believe the agreement should be for two years and terminable at the pleasure of the City after one year, and at such time as the City will be enabled to run its own boats.

Second—Purchase from the ferry company:

(a) Terminal at Whitehall street, \$175,000.

These structures were rebuilt in 1888 and 1889 by the then lessee of the ferry company, under an agreement made with the City dated August 4, 1888, in which it was agreed that at the end of the then existing lease if any other company should acquire the lease it should pay the former lessee the appraised value of the property. The lease was sold in 1894, and the property was previously appraised to be of the value of \$175,000. I am informed that the new lessee paid such sum, and the new lease, which is now expiring, contained a covenant in relation to the purchase of the property of the lessee by any other company securing the lease at a fair appraised valuation. No other company is to take the lease, but the City is to enter into possession of its own water front property and operate the ferry itself.

It would appear then that the City should not assume any more onerous obligations than imposed upon a rival company for the lease, which was to purchase at a fair appraised value. Certainly such structures erected in 1889 and appraised in 1894 at \$175,000 are not worth this amount to-day, after ten years' usage, and as it is the City's intention to reconstruct this terminal at an estimated expense of \$100,000 it can be readily seen that the value of the present terminal buildings is far from the amount proposed. Under the circumstances I believe \$75,000 would be a liberal amount for the City to pay.

(b) Ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton," \$245,000. This is the sum at which these boats were appraised in June, 1903, and as the price is subject to modification on account of deterioration at the time when the City takes possession of them, I see no objections to this proposition.

(c) Improvements made and owned by the ferry company at St. George, \$86,000. In the lease from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company to the Rapid Transit Ferry Company, dated November 1, 1894, the ferry company obligated itself, under certain conditions, to expend "the sum of \$75,000, or so much thereof as may be necessary, in the construction of a ferry house and other improvements, and to keep the same insured in the sum of \$75,000, the railway company agreeing to acquire the said improvements at a fair appraised value at the end of the lease with the City, provided the ferry company did not again secure the lease."

On behalf of the City Mr. Bryan L. Kennelly was retained to appraise the value of such improvements, and his valuation was \$65,000.

It must be remembered that hardly a dollar's worth of this property will be of value to the City, which now contemplates expending at least \$650,000 for improvements at this point.

I therefore consider that an offer of \$65,000 would be fair on the part of the City.

Third—Purchase from the railway company:

(a) Terminal land and improvements at St. George, \$525,000. Negotiations for the purchase of this property were opened in November, 1903, with Mr. George F. Randolph, General Manager of the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company, and now First Vice-President of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company (owners of the former company), and on November 23, 1903, Mr. Randolph offered the same to the City for the sum of \$500,000, subject to the following conditions:

1st. Substructure of docks, coal pier, ferry racks and platforms subject to lease of Rapid Transit Ferry Company until November 1, 1904.

2d. City to extend the tunnel to the new line of South street.

3d. A certain lease to be made to the company of a coal pier.

4th. That the easement of the viaduct for the trolleys be under a lease for a term of ten years with four renewals at \$525 per annum for the first term, and increasing 5 per cent. for each succeeding term.

On December 7, 1903, I reported to you on this proposition and stated that in view of the estimates of value made by the City's appraisers I considered the sum of \$500,000 excessive, and recommended that you offer the sum of \$435,000, the amount of Mr. Kennelly's appraisal.

A formal offer in writing was sent by you to Mr. Randolph under date of December 7, 1903, and an acknowledgment was made by Mr. Randolph on December 9, 1903, asking for further information in regard to the bond to cover the liens on the property.

On December 12 Mr. Randolph called, the matter of the bond was discussed, and he was furnished with the details of your appraisal.

Nothing further was heard from Mr. Randolph, and pursuant to your instructions Mr. Nichols called upon him on January 29, 1904. At this time Mr. Randolph stated that as the terminal plan for the steam and trolley roads had not as yet been determined upon, he would not enter into further negotiations, but would say that he would not recommend to the Board of Directors of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company the acceptance of the sum offered by the Comptroller, to wit, \$435,000.

Shortly afterward Mr. Randolph took up his residence in Baltimore and Mr. George H. Campbell, General Superintendent of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, took his place in this city.

On March 23, 1904, the Dock Commissioner received a communication from the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, signed by J. H. Maddy, asking \$580,000 for the same property.

The objection raised by Mr. Randolph at the time when negotiations were suspended, that a terminal has not been settled upon, is removed; for the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted a plan on April 12, 1904, which plan I am informed was satisfactory to the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company.

I can therefore see no reason for an advance in the price formerly offered by the company.

It must be remembered that the City, in carrying out this purchase, is not depriving the railroad company of any of its present facilities, but, on the contrary, is greatly increasing and improving those facilities at its own expense, thereby adding to the value of the railroad company's business.

A second appraisal of this water front property made recently differs but \$25,000 from the original appraisal for the City, and in view of these figures I cannot recommend a higher figure than \$475,000, which is to include the easement for the trolley viaduct.

(b) The three ferryboats, "Middletown," "Southfield" and "Westfield," at \$25,000 each..... \$75,000 00

The appraisal of these boats in June, 1903, was as follows:

"Southfield" \$30,000 00
"Westfield" 23,000 00
"Middletown" 22,000 00

Total \$75,000 00

The Dock Commissioner, in communication of January 25, 1904, recommended that "the contemplated ferry service between Manhattan and Port Richmond, S. I., be not taken up until such time as the St. George and Stapleton Ferry were finally established."

In view of this I cannot see the use of the purchase of all three of these boats, which have been repeatedly declared to be antiquated and are certainly not such boats as the City should use in operating a municipal ferry.

When the time comes to operate the Port Richmond Ferry it would seem better for the City to build new boats at much greater cost. It may be necessary for the City to have one boat in reserve for the Stapleton Ferry, in which case the agreement might cover the "Southfield," but I cannot recommend the purchase of the other two.

Summarizing, my recommendations are:

1st. The agreement for the continuation of the ferry service to be for two years, but terminable after one year, at the pleasure of the City, and the City to have the privilege of reconstructing the terminals.

2d. Purchase from the Rapid Transit Ferry Company.

(a) Whitehall street terminal structures..... \$75,000 00
(b) Ferryboats "Robert Garrett" and "Castleton"..... 245,000 00
(c) Terminal buildings and structures at St. George..... 65,000 00

Total from ferry company..... \$385,000 00

—which sum, I am informed, is sufficient to pay off all the outstanding bonds of the company.

3d. Purchase from the Staten Island Rapid Transit Railway Company (Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company, owners):

(a) Water front property at St. George, with improvements..... \$475,000 00
(b) Ferryboat "Southfield"..... 30,000 00

Total from Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company..... \$505,000 00

Total expenditure by City for plant and property now in use for ferry purposes..... \$890,000 00

Discussion followed.

The Dock Commissioner and Mr. Edward Lauterbach were interrogated in regard to the matter.

On motion of the Chamberlain the matter was referred to a committee of three, consisting of the Comptroller, Chamberlain and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, with instructions to report back to the Board at a special meeting to be held at 10.30 o'clock A. M., on Monday, May 23, 1904.

The following application was received from the Mount Sinai Hospital for a sale of the City's interest in certain land between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-eighth streets, Lexington and Third avenues, Borough of Manhattan:

In the Matter

of

The application of the Mount Sinai Hospital of The City of New York, to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, for a sale of the City's interest in certain land on the east side of Lexington avenue in said City, near Sixty-seventh street, now occupied by the Mount Sinai Hospital for its hospital and dispensary.

To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

The petition of the Mount Sinai Hospital respectfully shows:

That it is a corporation organized and existing under the Laws of the State of New York, under the provisions of an act for the incorporation of benevolent, charitable, scientific and missionary societies, passed April 12, 1848.

The said corporation was originally incorporated as the Jews Hospital and the original object and purposes of its incorporation was "the giving of medical and surgical aid to persons of the Jewish persuasion, and all other purposes appertaining to hospitals and dispensaries."

The name of the said institution was changed from the "Jews Hospital in New York" to the "Mount Sinai Hospital," by chapter 627 of the Laws of 1866.

The constitution of the Mount Sinai Hospital from that date to the present time declared the object of said corporation to be:

"The establishment, support and management of an institution to be known as the

Mount Sinai Hospital for the purpose of affording medical and surgical aid and nursing sick and disabled persons of any creed or nationality."

By chapter 365 of the Laws of 1904, the objects and purposes of said corporation were declared to be:

"The support and maintenance of an institution to be known as the Mount Sinai Hospital, for the purpose of affording dispensary service and medical and surgical aid and nursing sick and disabled poor of The City of New York and others of any race, creed or nationality."

In 1855 this corporation opened its hospital and dispensary in West Twenty-eighth street, in The City of New York, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, and thereafter maintained such hospital and dispensary at that place until the year 1872.

On account of the inadequacy of its accommodations the said corporation in 1872 moved its hospital to Lexington avenue, between Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, on the ground leased to it by The City of New York, as hereinafter set forth, and maintained its hospital and dispensary at that place from the year 1872 until the present time.

When, in 1894, the hospital obtained from The City of New York two leases covering the plot of ground on the north side of Sixty-seventh street, one hundred and fifteen feet in width and one hundred feet five inches in depth, it erected upon the said ground described in the one lease, and part of the ground described in the other lease, a six-story building to be used in conjunction with its hospital, in the lower two floors of which it conducted its dispensary and the upper four floors of which building were used for the education and training of nurses, and the balance of the land described in such lease was used as a recreation ground for its convalescent patients.

Said hospital has given free medical and surgical aid to sick and disabled persons without regard to creed or nationality at all times since its hospital was opened on Lexington avenue at Sixty-sixth street.

The extent of such free medical treatment has steadily increased, and up to and including the year 1902, it has given free dispensary treatment to upwards of 500,000 patients, and has given free dispensary consultations to upward of 1,300,000 patients. It has also given free treatment in its hospital to upwards of 67,000 free hospital patients, said patients receiving in the aggregate free hospital treatment equivalent to 1,750,000 days to one person.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, on the 31st day of May, 1871, leased to your petitioner a plot of ground on the east side of Lexington avenue, extending from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street, and extending to a depth of one hundred and seventy feet on each of said streets, which lease is recorded in the office of the Register of the County of New York on the 16th day of June, 1871, in liber 1179 of Conveyances, page 152, by which the said premises were leased to the Mount Sinai Hospital to be used and occupied only as a hospital by your petitioner, and for the charitable and benevolent purposes for which your petitioner was incorporated, and which lease provided for a term of ninety-nine years from the 31st day of May, 1871, at an annual rental of one dollar.

Your petitioner, shortly after the delivery of such lease, erected upon the said premises a hospital building which, from the time of the completion thereof until the present time, has been used in accordance with the provisions of such lease.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, on or about the first day of January, 1894, leased to your petitioner the following premises, to wit:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in The City of New York and bounded and described as follows, namely:

Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of the northerly line of Sixty-seventh street with the easterly side of Lexington avenue, running thence northerly along the said easterly side of Lexington avenue one hundred feet five inches; thence easterly and parallel to Sixty-seventh street, fifty-eight feet; thence southerly and parallel to Lexington avenue one hundred feet five inches to the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street; thence westerly along the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street fifty-eight feet to the point or place of beginning, which said lease is dated on that day, and is recorded in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, on the 23d day of October, 1894, in Block Series of Conveyances, section 5, liber 31, page 234.

And at the same time duly leased to your petitioner the following premises, to wit:

All that certain lot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in The City of New York and bounded and described as follows, namely:

Beginning at a point on the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street distant 115 feet easterly from the corner formed by the intersection of the said northerly side of Sixty-seventh street with the easterly side of Lexington avenue, and running thence northerly parallel with Lexington avenue 100 feet 5 inches to the centre line of the block; thence westerly along said centre line of the block 57 feet; thence southerly, parallel with Lexington avenue, 100 feet and 5 inches to the said northerly side of Sixty-seventh street; and thence easterly along the said northerly side of Sixty-seventh street 57 feet to the point or place of beginning, which said lease is dated on the first day of January, 1894, and is recorded in said Register's office on the twenty-third day of October, 1894, in Block Series of Conveyances, section 5, liber 31, page 237.

Both of said leases granted a term of ninety-nine years from the first day of January, 1894, at an annual rental of one dollar.

Your petitioner thereupon entered into the possession of said premises, which, taken together, are bounded and described as follows:

All that certain plot of ground in the City and County of New York bounded and described as follows, to wit:

Beginning at the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street, in said county; running thence eastwardly along the northerly side of Sixty-seventh street one hundred and fifteen feet; thence northwardly parallel with Lexington avenue one hundred feet and five inches to the centre line of the block; thence westwardly parallel with said street one hundred and fifteen feet to the easterly side of Lexington avenue; and thence southwardly along the easterly side of Lexington avenue one hundred feet and five inches to the point or place of beginning, and erected upon a portion of said premises a substantial and valuable building used as a dispensary and training school for nurses in conjunction with the hospital of your said petitioner, which is erected upon the block of land on the east side of Lexington avenue, extending from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street, in said county, and the said premises thus leased to your petitioner have since been used and occupied for the charitable and benevolent purposes for which your petitioner was incorporated.

The said hospital grounds and buildings have, ever since the year 1897, proved insufficient, both as to space and as to accommodations to supply the demand made upon the said hospital, and your petitioner, for the purpose of procuring hospital buildings of much larger proportions and with better accommodations, purchased the block of ground in the Borough of Manhattan and City of New York, extending from One Hundredth street to One Hundred and First street and from Madison to Fifth avenue, and has erected thereon hospital buildings at a cost of upwards of two million dollars, which said buildings have now been opened and which accommodate about double the number of patients who could be accommodated in the hospital buildings on Lexington avenue, at and near Sixty-seventh street.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York were authorized by chapter 519 of the Laws of 1893 to so modify the lease hereinbefore set forth as to authorize the said hospital to lease the said premises and to devote the rents, issues and profits arising from such leases to the maintenance of another hospital in The City of New York.

By chapter 257 of the Laws of 1898 and chapter 166 of the Laws of 1900 the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York have been authorized to change both leases above mentioned from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York to the Mount Sinai Hospital to grants, so as to permit the said hospital to sell and convey in fee simple absolute the whole or any part of said property, the said hospital devoting the proceeds of sale to the maintenance and support of its new hospital in The City of New York.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York passed two separate resolutions, dated respectively, June 9, 1898, and October 26, 1900, changing said leases to grants, and formal deeds of such property from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York to the Mount Sinai Hospital were thereafter made.

The Appellate Division of the Supreme Court has recently, in an action pending before it, held that the said deeds, which were not based upon any pecuniary

consideration, were invalid. Your petitioner thereupon, without in any manner conceding the invalidity of its title, applied to the Legislature of the State of New York, and such Legislature duly passed, and the Governor of the State of New York duly approved a law, which is known as chapter 365 of the Laws of 1904, a copy of which is hereto annexed.

The said law authorized the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York to sell to the Mount Sinai Hospital, at private sale, all the interest of the City in said lands heretofore leased to the said Mount Sinai Hospital, for such consideration as the said Commissioners deem proper, as in and by said law hereto annexed will more fully appear.

The fair market value of the City's interest in said land at the present time is less than the sum of five thousand dollars, as your petitioner is informed and verily believes, and your petitioner now offers for the interest of the City in said lands the sum of five thousand dollars.

Your petitioner agrees to apply the proceeds of the sale of said land towards the payment of outstanding obligations that it has incurred in the purchase and erection of its new hospital, and to use the same for the objects and purposes of its incorporation.

Your petitioner therefore asks that said lands be sold to your petitioner for the above-mentioned price, and that the property be conveyed by The City of New York to your petitioner, and that your petitioner have such other and further relief in the premises as may be just and proper.

CHAPTER 365.

AN ACT for the relief of the Mount Sinai hospital of the city of New York, to extend its purposes and objects and to authorize a sale of certain property from the city of New York to said Mount Sinai hospital.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The purposes and objects of the Mount Sinai hospital of the city of New York are hereby declared to be "the support and maintenance of an institution to be known as the Mount Sinai hospital, for the purposes of affording dispensary service and medical and surgical aid and nursing sick and disabled poor of the city of New York and others of any race, creed or nationality," and its certificate of incorporation is hereby amended accordingly.

Sec. 2. The board of commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are hereby authorized and empowered to sell to the Mount Sinai hospital at private sale, for such consideration as the said board may deem proper, the property lying within the blocks bounded by Lexington and Third avenues and Sixty-sixth and Sixty-eighth streets, in the borough of Manhattan and city of New York, heretofore leased by the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city of New York, to the Mount Sinai hospital, and all the right, title and interest of the city of New York in said land or property.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

Local—New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond Counties.

Laws of New York.—By Authority.

[Every law, unless a different time shall be prescribed therein, shall not take effect until the twentieth day after it shall have become a law, section 43, article 2, chapter 8, General Laws.]

CHAPTER 94.

AN ACT to authorize the commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York to cancel and annul certain assessments and sales to the city of New York for assessments affecting property in the city of New York, and directing the comptroller to mark such assessments accordingly.

Accepted by the City.

Became a law March 18, 1904, with the approval of the Governor. Passed, three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. The commissioners of the sinking fund of the city of New York are hereby authorized and empowered, in their discretion, and on such terms as they deem proper, to cancel and annul any and all assessments and sales to the city of New York for assessments or any of them affecting property in the city of New York now belonging to the Mount Sinai hospital, and the comptroller of the city of New York is hereby directed to mark such assessments and sales for assessments upon the assessment books of the city of New York in accordance with the determination of the said commissioners.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.

In connection therewith the Comptroller presented the following report, with opinion of the Corporation Counsel, and offered the following resolution:

New York, May 9, 1904.

In the Matter of the Application of the Mount Sinai Hospital.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—I return herewith the petition in this matter, which was submitted to me informally, with a brief statement of the situation, as I understand it. The object of the petition is to obtain from The City of New York a conveyance of its interest in certain land on the east side of Lexington avenue, near Sixty-seventh street, now occupied by the Mount Sinai Hospital for its dispensary and hospital.

It is unnecessary to state at length the well-known relations between the City and the hospital in regard to this property and the history thereof. It is principally a matter of public record already. The land originally belonged to The City of New York, but was leased for long periods of years to this hospital, the last leases being in 1871 and 1894, and for the periods of nine-nine years each.

The validity of these leases has never been questioned, so that under them the hospital would be entitled to the possession and enjoyment of the property for an average period of eighty years at an annual rental of one dollar.

After the execution of the leases, however, arrangements were made for the sale of the property by the City to the hospital, and two deeds in fee simple were executed by The City of New York of this property to the hospital, one in 1898 and the other in 1900, whereby as it was supposed the title in fee simple was vested in the hospital, and the hospital, furthermore, entered into a contract for the sale of the property. The purchaser declined to take the title, and the hospital brought suit. This suit is entitled "Mount Sinai Hospital vs. Hyman," and a decision of the Appellate Division, First Department, was recently handed down, holding the title invalid under the provisions of section 14 of Article VIII. of the Constitution. This decision is reported in 92 Appellate Division, 270.

The Legislature, however, enacted chapter 365 of the Laws of 1904, which authorized and empowered the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York to sell to the Mount Sinai Hospital at private sale for such consideration as the said Board might deem proper, the property in question. It is under this authority that the Commissioners are now requested to act. It should also be noted that a question was raised as to certain assessments which were claimed to be liens upon the property.

An act of the Legislature was also passed (chapter 94 of the Laws of 1904) authorizing the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in their discretion and on such terms as

they deemed proper, to cancel and annul any and all assessments and sales to The City of New York for assessments affecting this property.

The question thus presented to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is whether they shall grant the petition, and if so, upon what terms. The first proposition of the hospital authorities was to pay to the City the sum of five thousand dollars for a deed releasing all of the City's claims to the property, including any claim that may exist for unpaid assessments for local improvements.

After further consideration of the subject and negotiations, the hospital authorities have raised the amount to ten thousand dollars.

In my opinion, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will be entirely justified in accepting this offer, if they are disposed to do so. It is to be observed that as the matter stands at present, the hospital is in possession of the property under an unquestioned authority to hold and occupy the same for its own uses and purposes for the period of about eighty years, at the nominal rental of one dollar a year, and the property if thus held under the existing leases, would be free from taxation for that period.

The City's interest is, therefore, merely the reversionary interest at the expiration of eighty years. The sum of ten thousand dollars placed at interest would, in that period, amount, it would seem, to more than the fee value of the property at the present time. Furthermore, if, as is contemplated, the property is sold to private individuals, it will become taxable on the same basis as other property so held.

The decision of the Appellate Division is, of course, not final as to the validity of the deeds, and if a different result were reached by the Court of Appeals they might become valid.

It would seem to me, therefore, that a settlement of the whole matter should be made if possible.

The proposition of the hospital authorities is, I think, a fair one, and if it meets with your approval may properly be carried into effect.

If that is done, you should determine what part of the ten thousand dollars should be regarded as paid in compromise of the assessments, so that it may be credited to the proper account.

SIR—In the matter of the application of the Mount Sinai Hospital of The City of New York for a release or quit-claim of the City's interest in certain land on the northeast corner of Sixty-seventh street and Lexington avenue and also the entire front of Lexington avenue, from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street, as shown on the diagram hereto annexed, I have the honor to report as follows:

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, on the 31st day of May, 1871, leased to the Hospital a plot of ground on the east side of Lexington avenue, extending from Sixty-sixth to Sixty-seventh street and running to a depth of 170 feet on each of said streets, which lease is recorded in the Register's office of the County of New York on the 16th day of June, 1871, in Liber 1179 of Conveyances, page 152, and which lease provided for a term of ninety-nine years from May 31, 1871, at an annual rental of one dollar. By chapter 519 of the Laws of 1893 the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were authorized to modify said lease, giving permission to the Hospital to lease the premises.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York leased to the Hospital for a term of ninety-nine years from January 1, 1894, the plot on the northeast corner of Lexington avenue and Sixty-seventh street, having a frontage on Lexington avenue of 100 feet 5 inches and a depth of 115 feet on Sixty-seventh street, which is recorded in the Register's office of New York County in block series of Conveyances, Liber 31, pages 234 and 237.

By chapter 257 of the Laws of 1898 and chapter 166 of the Laws of 1900, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were authorized to change both leases hereinbefore mentioned, to grants, so as to permit the Hospital to sell and convey in fee simple the property.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund passed two separate resolutions, dated respectively June 9, 1898, and October 26, 1900, changing the leases to grants, and deeds thereafter were executed.

I have had an examination made by Mr. O'Sullivan of this bureau as to the value of the property without the buildings. He reports that the plot deeded in 1898 comprises 13 3-5 city lots, known on the tax maps as Lot No. 20 in Block 1401, and assessed for 1904 at \$350,000. The Lexington avenue lots are worth \$50,000 for the corner and \$30,000 for the inside lots, or \$280,000 for the eight lots comprising the block front. A 25-foot lot on Sixty-seventh street, near or adjoining Lexington avenue, is worth \$30,000, or \$1,200 a front foot, and at this rate, 70 feet would be worth \$84,000. A 25-foot lot on Sixty-sixth street, near or adjoining Lexington avenue, is worth \$25,000, or \$1,000 a front foot, and the plot of 70 feet is worth \$70,000.

The plot deeded in 1901 comprises 4 and 3-5 city lots, known on the tax maps as Lots Nos. 21 and 24 in Block 1402, and is assessed for the year 1904 as follows:

The Hospital entered into a contract for the sale of the property. The purchaser declined to take title and action was brought. (See Mount Sinai Hospital vs. Hyman, 92 App. Div., page 270, which holds that the title is invalid under the provisions of section 14, article 8, of the Constitution.) By chapter 365 of the Laws of 1904, the "Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York are hereby authorized and empowered to sell to the Mount Sinai Hospital at private sale for such consideration as the said Board may deem proper, * * * the property in question."

The Mount Sinai Hospital, by its President, Isaac Wallach, "offers for the interest of the City in said lands, the sum of five thousand dollars." By chapter 94 of the Laws of 1904, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were authorized to cancel and annul any and all assessments and sales to The City of New York for assessments against said property, and I understand that the Hospital would be willing to pay the sum of ten thousand dollars for a deed releasing all of the City's claims to the property, including any claim that may exist for unpaid assessments.

The Corporation Counsel, in an opinion dated May 9, 1904, states:

"The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will be entirely justified in accepting 'this offer, if they are disposed to do so. It is to be observed that as the matter 'stands at present, the Hospital is in possession of the property under an unquestioned 'authority to hold and occupy the same for its own uses and purposes for the period 'of about eighty years, at the nominal rental of one dollar a year, and the property, 'if thus held, under the existing leases, would be free from taxation for that period."

"The City's interest is therefore merely the reversionary interest at the expiration 'of eighty years. The sum of ten thousand dollars placed at interest would, in that 'period, amount, it would seem, to more than the fee value of the property at the 'present time. Furthermore, if, as is contemplated, the property is sold to private 'individuals, it will become taxable on the same basis as other property so held."

I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution that, in consideration of the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to be paid by the Mount Sinai Hospital to The City of New York, that The City of New York sell all its rights, title and interests in the property lying within the blocks bounded by Lexington avenue and Third avenue and Sixty-sixth and Sixty-eighth streets, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, more particularly described in three certain leases to the Mount Sinai Hospital by The City of New York, recorded in the Register's office of New York County, in Liber 1179 of Conveyances, page 152,

and Liber 31, block series of Conveyances, pages 234 and 237, including any claim that may exist for unpaid assessments for local improvements.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—The Assistant Secretary and Chief Engineer, with the clerical force of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, now located in the City Hall, have requested the leasing of other quarters more suitable for their use in the Broadway Chambers Building.

The Commissioner of Licenses, appointed by his Honor the Mayor, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 432 of the Laws of 1904, in a communication under date of May 11, also requests the leasing of the three rear rooms on the eighth floor of the Broadway Chambers Building, No. 277 Broadway.

A number of offices located in buildings in the vicinity were examined, but none were found to afford the light as in this building. The building is owned by Edward R. Andrews, trustee, the agents being Frederick Southack and Alwyn Ball, Jr., and they have agreed to lease to the City for a period from the date of occupation to May 1, 1905, the entire eighth floor, or about 3,500 square feet, at \$2 per square foot, and to furnish light, heat, elevator and janitor service, and to make such changes in the partitions as may be necessary and required in accommodating the offices of the Commissioner of Licenses, the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the Assistant Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment with the clerical force.

Taking all things into consideration, I consider the price named as being reasonable and just, the site most convenient to the other City departments, and I would respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the easterly or Broadway front of the eighth floor of the Broadway Chambers Building, containing 1,891 square feet, at an annual rental of \$2 per square foot from the date of occupation to May 1, 1905, for the use of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment now located in the City Hall.

I would further respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the westerly part of the eighth floor of the Broadway Chambers Building, containing 1,609 square feet, at an annual rental of \$2 per square foot, from the date of occupation to May 1, 1905, for the use of the Commissioner of Licenses, acting under and by virtue of the provisions of chapter 432 of the Laws of 1904.

The payment of the rental for the easterly portion of the building occupied by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to be paid out of the appropriation for expenses of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. The payment of the westerly part of the eighth floor to be paid out of the appropriation authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the maintenance of this Department. The owners to furnish light, heat and janitor service.

The report was accepted and the resolutions severally unanimously adopted.

The following communication was received from the Fire Department relative to a renewal of the lease of premises at No. 2801 Third avenue, Borough of The Bronx:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN, May 2, 1904.

The Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Under date of April 14 this Department turned over to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the premises No. 2801 Third avenue, which includes a portion of a lot in the rear held under lease from Emma Henneberger, of No. 612 East One Hundred and Forty-eighth street, at an annual rental of \$75. This lease expired January 1, 1904, no application for renewal having been made, for the reason that it was anticipated that the new quarters for Engine Company No. 41 in One Hundred and Fiftieth street would be ready for occupancy at that time. As there was a delay in completing the new quarters it was found necessary to continue the occupancy of the leased ground until the date when the Department vacated the premises. I have therefore the honor to request that your Honorable Board will authorize a renewal of the lease for a period of three and one-half months, from January 1 to April 15, 1904, covering the time it was in use by this Department during the current year, on the same terms and conditions as heretofore. The lessor has been notified that the premises were turned over to the City on the 14th inst.

Hon. EDWARD M. GROUT, Comptroller:

SIR—In relation to the premises known as the "Parshall Building," in the Eighth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, submitted as a location for the Fifth District Municipal Court, I have caused an examination to be made, and have the honor to report as follows:

This is a three-story brick building, located on the northwest corner of Fifty-third street and Third avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. The street floor is arranged as a large store for a big housefurnishing firm. The first floor, the one submitted to be rented, consists of one large hall with exceptional light and height of ceilings, size 43 x 65, and two small rooms 14 x 21 and 11 x 16, respectively, separated from the large room by a hallway. These small rooms have toilets connecting, and in the outer hall are large toilets suitable for the use of the public. There is a balcony extending along the northerly side of the hall overlooking the same, size 14 x 65. The building is provided with fire-escapes. The stairs are 6 feet wide and the entrance is modern in all respects, and suitable for the accommodation of a large number of people. The condition of the building is first class, and the large room would make a splendid court room. The building is heated by steam and lighted by gas and electricity. It is accessible, as it is located in the centre of the business section of the Eighth Ward, one block from an "L" station, and the various surface cars pass the building.

This hall is rented for meetings, festivals, dances, etc., at a rental of \$20 per night, and I am informed that during the season it is well patronized. The owner will make any alterations necessary to the small rooms to adapt them to the requirements of the Court, and agrees to supply light, heat and water, at a rental of \$1,300 per annum, and as the site recommended at Fifth avenue and Eleventh street, Borough of Brooklyn, in my report of April 8, 1904, has since been taken out of the market, I would respectfully recommend that, the rent being reasonable and just, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the second floor of the building on the northwest corner of Fifty-third street and Third avenue, containing an area of 3,265 square feet, for the use of the Fifth District Municipal Court, for a term of two years from June 20, 1904, at an annual rental of \$1,300, payable quarterly, lessor, George H. Parshall, to furnish the necessary heat,

light and water, and at the same time that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution assigning the Fifth District Municipal Court to said building, to take effect on the 20th day of June, 1904.

Hon. N. TAYLOR PHILLIPS, Secretary to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

SIR—I beg to recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund consent to and approve of the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease of the pier at the foot of West One Hundred and Fifty-second street, North river, to John C. Rodgers, for a period of two years from the first of the month following approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a rental of \$100 per annum, the lessee to have the privilege of maintaining on the pier such structures as may be necessary to enable him to carry on his business thereat in connection with the work of building Riverside drive, between West One Hundred and Forty-fifth street and West One Hundred and Fifty-eighth street, it being understood that the lessee will make, at his own expense, all repairs necessary to place the pier in condition for his use, and that such structures as may be erected upon the pier will revert to and become the property of the City of New York upon the termination of the lease.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
