"You are hereby notified by direction of the Commissioners to appear before him at the main office of this Department, at Pier A, North River, on the 17th day of May, 1909, at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon, at which time and place the charges will be examined into and you will be allowed an opportunity to make an explanation.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT.

July 8, 1909.

The following proceedings were this day directed by Police Commissioner William F. Baker:

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held May 11, 1909, adopted resolution as follows:

An ordinance providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), to provide means for the furniture and for the equipment of the new headquarters building for the Police Department, located at Grand and Centre streets, Borough of Manhattan.

Be it ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment April 16, 1909, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), to provide means for the furniture and for the equipment of the new headquarters building for the Police Department, located at Grand and Centre streets, Borough of Manhattan, and when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid; and

Whereas, In the purchase of the necessary furniture and equipment for the occupancy of said building, it is impracticable to contract for the same under advertisement for competing bids;

Ordered, That the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Police Commissioner to purchase in the open market, without advertising for competing bids, such furniture, partitions, ceiling, shelving, lockers, book cases, awnings, carpet, linoleum, matting, electrical and mechanical appliances and such other equipment as may be necessary for the purpose of the new headquarters building, in amount not exceeding the sum of seventy-five thousand dollars (\$75,000).

On reading and filing certificate under date of July 7, 1909, issued under Rule XIV., paragraph 4, by the Municipal Civil Service Commission,

Ordered, That Thomas Carroll be and is hereby, under the provisions of paragraph 3 of Rule XIV., of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, transferred from the position of Secretary in the Borough Inspector as a salary of \$1,500 per annum (competitive class) to that of Secretary to the Police Commissioner at a salary of \$3,000 per annum (exempt class), to take effect July 7, 1909.
