That upon being questioned by Mr. Hawkins as to your whereabouts between the hours of 1 and 3:15 p. m., you replied that you had gone up the street to get a sandwich, and that when told to report at the office of the Superintendent of Ferries you replied to Mr. Hawkins that it made no difference where you were ordered to report, you would be reassigned to duty and would be paid for the time you were off.

"You are hereby notified by direction of the Commissioner to appear before him at the main office of this Department, at Pier A, North River, on the 17th day of May, 1909, at 10:30 o'clock in the forenoon, at which time and place the charges will be examined into and you will be allowed an opportunity to make an explanation.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to adopt a resolution authorizing the Commissioner of Docks to put into operation one of the City's extra boats between Stapleton and New York, to be operated under a schedule of 1-hour intervals at either terminal, and to appoint an additional force of men to operate this new ferry service; the ferry to be opened not later than May 28, 1909, the Commissioners were also requested to adopt a resolution that in case of accident or breakdown, the Commissioner of Docks be authorized to charter a ferryboat to keep in commission this service, at a cost not to exceed \$100 per day, subject to approval of the Comptroller.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was requested to authorize the transfer of Hans Tripka from the position of Dockhand to that of Marine Stoker, and of Edward J.
