With the end of this Quarter, four (4) pavilions are occupied by patients and two (2) by male and female help respectively. The remaining two (2) pavilions and the Surgical building are about ready for patients, but additional funds are required before they can be opened. The Nurses' Home and Staff House have been put in use. The male employees have been transferred from 6 to 7 and the female employees from 3 to 2 and pavilions 6 and 3 occupied by patients. At the present time only pavilion 4 is used for female patients, there seemingly being no demand for more accommodation for them.

The buildings occupied are practically complete, except in small detail and adjustments, the only large item remaining to be finished in connection with them

being the mechanical food conveying apparatus.
