### Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York.

Held Wednesday, September 20, 1916, at 10.30 o'Clock A. M.

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President; Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification by striking from the exempt class, under the heading "Court of Special Sessions," the following: Chief Probation Officer; Deputy Chief Probation Officer; and including in the Competitive Class, Part I (Ungraded Positions), Group 3 (Positions of a Special or Miscellaneous Character) the following: Deputy Chief Probation Officer.

Frederic Kernochan, Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions, and George Everson, representing the Committee on Criminal Courts, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. The President of the Commission submitted a communication addressed to him by the President of the State Probation Commission under date of Sept. 19, in favor of the proposed amendment. There was no opposition and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Friday, October 6, 1916.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present-Frank L. Dowling, Acting Mayor; Albert E. Hadlock, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Marcus M. Marks, President, Borough of Manhattan; Lewis H. Pounds, President, Borough of Brooklyn; Douglas Mathewson, President, Borough of The Bronx; James A. Dayton, Acting President, Borough of Queens; and Henry P. Morrison, Acting President, Borough of Richmond.

The Acting Mayor, Hon. Frank L. Dowling, presided.

Approval of Minutes (Cal. No. 1). The Minutes of the meeting held September 22, 1916, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD October 4, 1916.

### PUBLIC HEARINGS.

On Areas of Assessment for Benefit in Condemnation Proceedings.

Borough of Queens.

Hearing on the Proposed Area of Assessment in the Matter of Acquiring Title to Riker Avenue, from Steinway Avenue to 12th Street, Borough of Queens

(On September 15, 1916 (Cal. No. 14), the hearing was continued to September 22, 1916. On September 22, 1916 (Cal. No. 3), the hearing was again continued to October 6, 1916, and the matter referred to the President of the Borough of Queens and the Chief Engineer of the Board to consider and report in the meantime on the question of the railroad franchise in this street and on the feasibility of changing the location of the street so as to place the railroad outside the street lines.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had

been duly advertised.

The Secretary also presented a report of the Committee consisting of the President of the Borough of Queens and the Chief Engineer of the Board recommending that the opening proceeding be carried out in accordance with the street lines as they now exist, as, in the opinion of the Committee, no benefit would result in a modification of the street lines.

Edgar P. Foster appeared in opposition to the proposed area of assessment. The hearing was continued one week (October 13, 1916), to enable the property owners and the New York and Queens County Railway Company to confer on the advisability of placing the railroad right of way in the centre of the street.

Hearing on the Proposed Amended Area of Assessment and Reapportionment of the Cost and Expense of the Proceeding for Acquiring Title to 50th Street, Between Astoria and Polk Avenues, and to 51st Street from the Bulkhead Line of Flushing Bay to a Point 100 Feet South of Polk Avenue and from Corona Avenue to Queens Boulevard, Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 3).

(On July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 37), the report of the Committee on Assessments relative to the distribution of cost in this matter was presented and a resolution was adopted fixing September 15, 1916, as a date for a public hearing. On September 15 (Cal. No. 13), the hearing was continued until September 29, 1916, on which date (Cal. No. 2), it was continued to this meeting and referred back to the Committee on Assessments for a hearing and report in the meantime.)

The Secretary presented affidavit of publication showing that the matter had been

duly advertised.

The Secretary also presented a communication dated September 12, 1916, from Charles C. Steinert, representing the Civic Association of Corona, in opposition to the proposed area of assessment; a petition signed by several property owners on 50th Street, requesting that said street, from Astoria Road to Polk Avenue, be left at its present width of 50 feet; a petition from the North Corona Taxpayer's League in favor of the recommendation of the Committee on Assessments relative to the distribution of cost; undated petitions signed by various property owners requesting relief from assessment; a communication dated September 25, 1916, from W. J. Hamilton urging the adoption of the Committee's recommendation; a communication dated October 5, 1916, from Francis X. Goette, representing the Elmhurst Civic Association, in opposition to the 51st Street (Corona) opening; and a communication without date from Wm. A. Jones, Jr., representing the Kew Gardens Corporation, in opposition to the proposed amended area of assessment.

The President of the Borough of The Bronx, Chairman of the Committee on Assessments, presented the following report:

October 4, 1916. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York:

Gentlemen-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on July 27, 1916, the Committee on Assessments submitted a report relative to an amendment of the manner in which the cost of acquiring title to 50th Street, between Astoria and Polk Avenues and 51st Street from the bulkhead line of Flushing Bay to a point 100 feet south of Polk Avenue and from Corona Avenue to Queens Boulevard, in the Borough of Queens, is to be apportioned.

After a number of hearings the Committee recommended that, in view of the fact that the opening of at least a considerable part of 51st Street some years in advance of actual needs for ordinary street purposes was for the purpose of beginning the construction of an important outlet sewer serving an extensive drainage area, and in view of the further fact that the assessments on portions of this street are very heavy, reaching as much as \$400 a lot, it would be proper to place a portion of the cost upon the entire drainage area of the trunk sewer which is already partly constructed in this street, and the Committee recommended that 60 per cent. of the expense be imposed upon the area of benefit heretofore fixed and that the remaining 40 per cent. be imposed upon the entire drainage area, including the primary area of benefit. At the meeting on September 27 and at the request of some of the property owners within the area of benefit the matter was referred back to the Committee on Assessments for further consideration.

On October 2nd, the Committee gave a further hearing to those interested, and, inasmuch as the arguments in favor of an extension of the area of benefit had already been presented at length and had received careful consideration by the Committee, the arguments at the hearing of October 2nd were confined chiefly to those presented by owners of property within the drainage area or outside the primary area of benefit. Your Committee has given due consideration to these arguments, which laid special emphasis upon the fact that, although the property represented by the speakers was within the drainage area for this main sewer, they would not be able to avail themselves of it for some years to come and that they should not, therefore, be called upon to contribute to the expense of acquiring 51st Street at this time.

In spite of the arguments presented, your Committee has no reason to believe that it was mistaken in the recommendations contained in its report presented to the Board on July 27, and it renews the recommendation for a re-apportionment of the cost of the proceeding under which 60 per cent. of the expenses relative to the acquisition of 51st Street should be borne by the area of benefit already defined and that the remaining 40 per cent. be placed upon the entire drainage area for the 51st Street trunk sewer. Truman H. Baldwin, R. W. Kellogg, William A. Jones, Jr., representing the Kew Gardens Corporation, and R. D. Elder, Jr., appeared in opposition to the proposed amended area of assessment. Clinton T. Roe appeared in favor. No one else appearing, the hearing was closed.

The following was offered: Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, on April 6, 1911, authorized a proceeding for acquiring title to 50th Street, from Astoria Avenue to Polk Avenue; and 51st Street, from the bulkhead line of Flushing Bay to a point 100 feet south of Polk Avenue, and from Corona Avenue to Queens Boulevard, Borough of Queens, and directed that the entire cost and expense of the proceeding be assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby and located within an area of assessment laid out in the resolution authorizing the proceeding for acquiring title to the aforesaid streets; and

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment on the 27th day of July, 1916, declared that it was considering the advisability of reconsidering its action with respect to the distribution of the cost and expense of the proceeding, and of making a new determination concerning the same in accordance with the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, by placing the entire cost and expense involved in the acquisition of title to 50th Street and 60 per cent, of the entire cost and expense involved in the acquisition of title to 51st Street upon an area designated as Area "A" on the following diagram, and the remaining 40 per cent. of the entire cost and expense involved in the acquisition of title to 51st Street upon an area designated as Area "B" on said diagram; and

Whereas, The resolution adopted by the Board on July 27, 1916, fixed the 15th day of September, 1916, as the date for a public hearing upon the proposed action; and Whereas, It appears from the affidavit of the Supervisor of the City Record that due notice was given therein that the Board would hold a public hearing on the 15th day of September, 1916, at which all persons interested would be given an opportunity to be heard upon the proposed reconsideration and redetermination respecting the distribution of the cost and expense of the proceeding herein; and


Whereas. The public hearing was continued from September 15, 1916, to September 29, 1916, and on the latter date to October 6, 1916; and

Whereas, After due notice in the CITY RECORD, the Board afforded all persons

interested an opportunity to be heard on the proposed action; be it Resolved, In pursuance of the provisions of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment reconsiders its action of

April 6, 1911, placing the entire cost and expense upon a local area, and hereby reapportions the cost and expense of the proceeding herein as follows:

The entire cost and expense for acquiring title to the real property required for the opening of 50th Street, from Astoria Avenue to Polk Avenue, and 60 per cent. of the entire cost and expense for acquiring title to the real property required for the opening of 51st Street from the bulkhead line of Flushing Bay to a point 100 feet south of Polk Avenue, and from Corona Avenue to Queens Boulevard, shall be assessed upon the district shown on the accompanying diagram and designated thereon as area "A"; and the remaining 40 per cent. of the entire cost and expense for acquiring title to the real property required for the opening of 51st Street between the aforesaid limits shall be assessed upon the district shown on the accompanying diagram and designated thereon as area "B."

### REPORTS.

### From Standing Committees.

Committee on Corporate Stock Budget.

Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Issue of Corporate Stock (Cal. No. 4).

The Secretary presented a communication dated July 11, 1916, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requesting an issue of \$17,500 corporate stock for furnishing and laying water main in Fort Schuyler Road, between Westchester Avenue and Eastern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx; and the

following report of the Committee on Corporate Stock Budget recommending approval thereof:

September 19, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen—On July 11, 1916, the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity requested an issue of corporate stock in an amount of \$17,500 for furnishing and laying a new twelve-inch water main in Fort Schuyler Road, between Westchester Avenue and Eastern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the matter was referred on July

14, 1916, reports thereon as follows:

"The proposed work consists of furnishing and laying about 5,600 feet of new twelve-inch water main to replace existing mains.

"The existing mains, which are to be abandoned, consist of about 3,600 feet of six-inch pipe from Eastern Boulevard to Ericson Place, about 350 feet of eight-inch main from Ericson Place to Zulette Avenue, and about 1,300 feet of twelve inch main from Zulette Avenue to Westchester Avenue About 500 feet twelve-inch main from Zulette Avenue to Westchester Avenue. About 500 feet of the existing twelve-inch pipe is outside of the present street lines.

"Most of the existing mains were laid by the Westchester Water Company

over twenty-five years ago and are not worth recovering.

"The immediate reason for the proposed work is the regrading of Fort Schuyler Road, which has caused the removal of the pipe in some cases; an insufficient cover in other places and an excessive fill over most of the existing twelve-inch pipe; but aside from the necessary changes due to regrading, there is real need of a larger sized main in Fort Schuyler Road.

"There are now about 150 houses dependent on this line and a twelve-inch main is necessary to provide for the development of the area north of Westchester Creek and east of Westchester Avenue and to strengthen the supply to the Fort Schuyler Section.

"The work is therefore an enlargement and extension of the distribution system and properly chargeable to corporate stock.

"The grading work will probably be completed this season with the exception of the portion next the Westchester Creek bridge, and it will be necessary to lay some of the pipe in places where the existing pipe is removed or exposed before cold weather begins.

"The estimate of cost is reasonable."

We recommend the adoption of the attached resolution authorizing the issue of \$17,500 corporate stock for furnishing, delivering and laying a new twelve-inch water main and appurtenances in Fort Schuyler Road, between Westchester Avenue and

Eastern Boulevard. Respectfully,

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to the amount of seventeen thousand five hundred dollars (\$17,500) for furnishing, delivering, and laying a new twelve-inch water main and appurtenances in Fort Schuyler Road, between Westchester Avenue and Eastern Boulevard, Borough of The Bronx, under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and that the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue said corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding seventeen thousand five hundred dollars (\$17,500), the proceeds thereof to the amount of the par value of the stock to be applied to the purposes aforesaid, provided, however, that no part of the proceeds of the corporate stock herein authorized shall be available until after the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has approved forms of contracts, plans and specifications and estimates of proval thereof: cost pertaining to the same.

Which was adopted by the following vote:

### Committee on Salaries and Grades.

#### President, Borough of Manhattan-Retirement of Philip F. Lloyd, Laborer (Cal. No. 5).

(On July 27, 1916 (Cal. No. 345), the request in this matter was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Grades.)

The Secretary presented a communication dated July 18, 1916, from the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan requesting retirement of Philip F. Floyd Laborer; and the following report of the Committee on Salaries and Grades recommending approval thereof:

September 25, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen-At a meeting of your Board held July 27, 1916, there was submitted a communication from the Acting President of the Borough of Manhattan, dated July 18, 1916, recommending the retirement of Philip F. Floyd, a Laborer in the the schedule, as revised, for the year 1916, as follows: Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, President, Borough of Manhattan. The Acting President's communication was as follows:

"Application is hereby made for the retirement under the existing Pension Law of Philip E. Floyd, Laborer, \$780 per annum, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, this department. Mr. Floyd is a veteran of the Civil War and has been continuously in this Department since February 25, 1895, a period of more than 21 years. He is 78 years of age, and his physical condition is such as to incapacitate him for efficient service in this Department.'

On September 12, 1916, Mr. Floyd was examined by the Board of Medical Examiners. The report of the said Board is attached hereto and states in conclusion: "Applicant is permanently unfit for duty, and we therefore suggest that you recom-

mend his retirement." Mr. Floyd is a veteran of the Civil War. His certificate of discharge states that he enlisted on August 1, 1862, in Company "E," Twenty-first Regiment, Veteran Reserve Corps, and was discharged July 11, 1865. A copy of said certificate is

Mr. Floyd's original appointment and subsequent changes in title and rate of compensation were as follows:

February 25, 1895, appointed as Cleaner, Department of Public Works, Man-

hattan, at \$2 per day. April 12, 1909, title changed to Laborer at \$2.50 per day.

January 1, 1916, compensation changed to \$780 per annum.

An examination of the payrolls and time sheets has been made sufficient to establish over twenty years of service as follows:

In an affidavit dated September 9, 1916, submitted herewith Mr. Floyd stated that he had never filed a claim nor brought suit against the City of New York for the payment of salary or wages or for any other claim.

A search of the records in the Law Department discloses no evidence of any action

brought by deponent. An examination of the Register of Claims in the Division of Law and Adjustment of the Department of Finance for the past six years shows that he has filed

no claim during that period. For the period from September 1, 1913, to August 31, 1916, Mr. Floyd's compensation as provided for in the budget was as follows:

"It is stated that in the taking of the United States Census enumerators include employers, jobbers, apprentices, or other woodworkers under the general title of Carpenter. To arrive at the probable number of journeymen Carpenters in Greater New York, a liberal deduction of, say, 45 per cent. for employers, jobbers, apprentices, or other woodworkers classed as Carpenters would show 22,793 remaining of the total of 41,442 Carpenters reported in the Census for 1910. Allowing for normal increase of ten per cent. for six years of 2,279 would make the probable number of journeymen Carpenters now in the Greater City 25,072.

"The General Agent of the District Council of the United Brotherhood of

Carpenters stated as follows:

"'The membership of the United Brotherhood of Carpenters in Greater New York is now 17,000. The Union membership has been as high as 22,000, but men went to other localities where there was a demand for Carpenters. Those men are now returning to New York, where Carpenters are in demand, and our membership may be in a short time 20,000.

'There are probably 1,000 journeymen Carpenters outside the Union in Greater New York with whom we are liable to come into competition, men largely employed at speculative construction work in the suburbs. There are also about 3,000 jobbers, who call themselves Carpenters, but are really handy men, who may also do painting or plastering.

"'About 1,500 of our membership are millmen engaged at machine and bench work. The rates paid to these men vary from \$18 per week to \$5.50 per day, according to the skill of the worker or the kind of machine used. Inside work is greatly specialized, from sand papering to laying out work from a blue print. Different rates are paid in different mills. Most of the mill work for our building purposes is done outside the Greater New York. All buildings of any size are now constructed in the Greater New York by Union labor.'

"The General Agent exhibited a list of 800 independent employers who have signed the agreement to pay the new rates, and he stated that those men employ the 12,000 Union men outside of the 5,000 employed by the Master Carpenters' Association and other organizations allied with the Building Trades Employers'

"The Secretary of the Building Trades Employers' Association stated as

"'The Master Carpenters' Association and the Master Carpenters' Association, Local No. 1, affiliated with the Employers' Association, entered into an agreement with the United Brotherhood of Carpenters to pay rates to Carpenters, on and after September 1, 1916, as follows:

"'There are 105 employers in the Master Carpenters' Association and Master Carpenters' Association, Local No. 1. These two organizations include in their membership firms engaged in large construction work and important

alterations to buildings in the Greater New York. 'Carpenters are also employed by organizations allied with the Building l Trades Employers' Association as follows: League of Master Cement Workers. Association of Interior Decorators and Cabinet Makers, Mason Builders' Association, Association of Manufacturers of Metal Covered Doors and Windows. the Parquet Flooring Association, Refrigerator Manufacturers' Association, Manufacturing Woodworkers' Association. The nine organizations employ about 5,000 Carpenters in the busy season.

"'The increased rates are paid to probably 90 per cent. of the Carpenters in Greater New York on new construction work; to 70 per cent. of the Carpenters on alteration work; and to 60 per cent. of those on suburban dwelling construction work.'

"The Amalgamated Carpenters' and Joiners' Association, an organization formerly independent, is now associated with the United Brotherhood of Carpen-

ters and working under the same scale of wages.

"In a department where men are schedulized, 'Carpenter or Ship Carpenter,' if they perform the duties only of Ship Carpenter, the men should be paid \$4 per diem, the rate prevailing in that trade. If there be a preponderance of the duties of Carpenter over those of Ship Carpenter the men should receive the rate for Carpenter.

"If the new rates for Carpenters be approved by this Board, it is suggested that heads of the four or five departments employing Carpenters in different Boroughs adjust their Budget schedules for 1917 so that men permanently assigned to a Borough shall be paid at the rate provided for Carpenters in that Borough. Men employed part of the time in a Borough and assigned temporarily to work in another Borough should be paid the rate provided in the Borough from which they are assigned.

"Under the standard specifications, in order to avoid multiplicity of titles, the duties of Cabinet Maker have been included in those for Carpenter, and the title of Cabinet Maker has been dropped. Men now working under that title have been considered as Carpenters in this examination.

"The number of Carpenters affected by the proposed increase is about 125. Twenty-nine others in six departments are now paid the rate requested of \$5

per diem.

"It is recommended that the City departments in which Carpenters are employed make application in their Budget estimates for 1917 for rates for Carpenters as follows: Borough of Manhattan, \$5.50 per diem; Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, \$5 per diem; Borough of Richmond, \$4.50 per diem, which appear to be the rates paid in private employ to a majority of Carpenters in the different Boroughs."

In view of the foregoing facts, we recommend that the City departments in which Carpenters are employed request in their Budget estimates for 1917 rates for such employees as follows: For the Borough of Manhattan, \$5.50 per diem; for the Boroughs of The Bronx, Brooklyn and Queens, \$5 per diem, and for the Borough

of Richmond, \$4.50 per diem, and that the attached resolution be adopted.

#### From the Department of Finance.

#### President, Borough of Manhattan-Modification of Schedule (Cal. No. 15).

The Secretary presented a communication, dated September 18, 1916, from the President of the Borough of Manhattan requesting a transfer of funds within the appropriation for 1916; and the following report of the Comptroller recommending approval thereof by modification of schedule: September 29, 1916.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On September 18, 1916, the President of the Borough of Manhattan requested transfer of \$1,000 within appropriations to his department for the year 1916. The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which this request was referred on September 19, 1916, reports thereon as follows:

'It is proposed to transfer \$1,000 within the line items of Code 424, General Repairs, Care of Highways, from the line 'Due to Fire Burns' to the line '424B, Roadways, Viaducts and Stone Pavements,' \$500, and to '424C-General,' \$500.

"The appropriations for the accounts '424B-Roadways, Viaducts and Stone Pavements,' and '424 C—General,' are practically exhausted, and as it is impossible to specify the quantity of work to be done, or its cost, it is estimated, upon the basis of past experience, that \$500 additional in each account will be necessary for the balance of the year.

"There is a sufficient excess balance in account '424D, Due to Fire Burns," to permit the transfer."

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning recommending that the Board approve of the award of the contracts for the removal of snow and ice for the winter season 1916-1917 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx to the lowest bidders; and report of the Comptroller relative thereto: Department of Street Cleaning, September 18, 1916. Snow Contracts. Hon. John Purroy Mitchel, Mayor, and Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York: Sir-On July 27, 1916, after due advertisement according to law bids were opened on five (5) forms of contract for the removal of snow and ice in the Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Brooklyn, during the winter season 1916-1917, No. 1, for the Borough of Manhattan entire. No. 2, for the Borough of The Bronx entire. No. 3, for the Borough of Brooklyn entire. No. 4, for the Borough of Manhattan by three snow removal districts. No. 5, for the Borough of Brooklyn by four snow removal districts. Twenty-two (22) bids in all were received, as shown on the table hereto attached. The forms of contract for the Borough of Manhattan entire, and by snow removal districts, are the same as those used last year and require the contractors to do the loading and hauling, the City furnishing the labor and implements necessary to gather and pile the snow and ice. The forms of contract for the Borough of The Bronx, for the Borough of Brooklyn entire and for the Borough of Brooklyn by snow removal districts, differ from the forms employed last year, in that the contractors are required not merely to load and haul the snow and ice but also to furnish the labor and implements necessary to gather and pile the same. For the Borough of Manhattan entire the lowest bid received was that of the Hemingway Company, of 312 West 92nd Street, New York City, which was 36.8 cents per cubic yard. Only one bid was received for the 1st snow removal district in this borough, and two bids for the second snow removal district. No bids were received for the 3rd snow removal district. The district bids were all higher than the borough bid. The price per cubic yard for last winter was 37 cents. The price now offered is two-tenths of a cent lower than that of last year. For the Borough of The Bronx the lowest bid received was that of Frank Brancaccio. of 303 Fifth Avenue, New York City, namely, 35 cents per cubic yard. The price bid for last winter was 30 cents per cubic yard; but, as explained above, the contractor was not obliged to do the piling. The price paid during the winter season 1914-1915, when the form of contract was similar to the present one, was 39 cents per cubic yard. For the Borough of Brooklyn entire the lowest bid received was that of the Robertson Construction Company, of 61st Street and 16th Avenue, Brooklyn, namely, 34 cents per cubic yard. Five bids were received for Snow Removal District No. 1 and two each for Snow Removal District No. 2. No. 3 and No. 4. The district bids were all higher than the borough bid. The price paid per cubic yard for the season 1915-1916, when the contracts were made by snow removal districts, averaged 31.6 cents per cubic yard, based on the area per district. As explained before however, the form of contract employed last winter did not require the contractors in Brooklyn to pile the snow and ice, as the City assumed this duty. The price paid during the winter season 1914-1915 in the Borough of Brooklyn, when the contracts were similar in form to the one now proposed to be used and which were let by snow removal districts during that season, averaged 33.66 cents per cubic yard. The price now bid is, therefore, 34/100 of a cent per per cubic yard higher than the price paid during the season 1914-1915. In view of the fact that it cost the City approximately eight (8) cents per cubic yard to plow, gather, pick and pile the snow and ice during the past winter, the prices demanded for the Boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn are reasonable and less than the total price for last season. As far as can be ascertained at the present time the successful bidders for the Brooklyn and Bronx contracts have the necessary qualifications, experience and finan-

cial responsibility required to perform the work, and the prices bid are low, considering the character of the work to be done and the prevailing labor market. Pursuant to section 544 of the Greater New York Charter I recommend therefore that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approve of the award of the contracts for the removal of snow and ice for the winter season 1916-1917, in Brook-

lyn and The Bronx to the lowest bidders, as follows:

Cubic Yard. No. 1, for the Borough of The Bronx entire, to Frank Brancaccio, No. 303 5th Ave., New York..... No. 2, for the Borough of Brooklyn entire, to the Robertson Construc-tion Company, 61st Street and 16th Ave., Brooklyn, at the price of... 34 cents

The low bidder on the Manhattan contract has had no previous experience on snow removal and the organization and management proposed for the work are in my opinion defective in the essential qualifications for success in carrying out the work expeditiously. The price per cubic yard (36.8 cents), considering the condition of the labor and truck market, leaves but a small margin of profit which would be wiped out by lack of experience and inefficient management. I am, therefore, forced to the conclusion that the interests of the City will best be served by the rejection of all bids on the Manhattan contract and the readvertisement of the work, which action I have

Past records of failures on snow removal have proved that such failures result in excessively high costs to the City and corresponding losses to traffic interests due to delays in forming new organizations under emergency conditions.

Gentlemen-On September 22, 1916, you referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning dated September 18, 1916, recommending that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 544 of the Greater New York Charter, approve of the award of contracts for the removal of snow and ice for the winter season of 1916-1917 in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx to the lowest bidders, and notifying the Board that all bids for the above work in the Borough of Manhattan had been rejected.

The Bureau of Contract Supervision, to which the matter was referred, reports

thereon as follows:

"On July 7, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted a resolution approving the terms and conditions of forms of contract and specifications submitted by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning under date of June 15, 1916, for the removal of snow and ice in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, during the winter season of 1916-1917, as follows:

"(1) Borough of Manhattan, entire. "(2) Borough of Manhattan by three snow removal districts.

"(3) Borough of The Bronx.

"(4) Borough of Brooklyn, entire.

"(5) Borough of Brooklyn by four snow removal districts.

"The forms of contract approved for the Borough of Manhattan, proposed to continue the system employed during the past winter, whereby the snow in the streets designated in the contract was piled by the department's snow fighting force, and the snow loaded and hauled to the disposal points by the contractor.

"In the Boroughs of Brooklyn and The Bronx the contracts were so modified as to require the Contractor to perform the work of piling snow and ice in advance of the loading operations, whereas during the winter of 1915-1916 this work was done by the department's force. This is a return to the system employed in all boroughs during 1914-1915.

"In all other important details the contracts were similar to those approved for the previous season.

"On July 27, 1916, bids for the above work were received, the bids for the Boroughs of The Bronx and Brooklyn being as follows: "Borough of The Bronx.

"1-\$0.35 per cubic yard. "2-0.42 per cubic yard.

"3-0.45 per cubic yard.

"4- 0.49½ per cubic yard.

"For the Borough of The Bronx the lowest bid received (\$0.35) is that of Frank Brancaccio, 303 Fifth avenue, New York City, which is 4 cents below the price paid during the winter season of 1914-1915 under a similar form of contract.

"The price paid during the past winter (1915-1916) was 30 cents per cubic yard, exclusive of the cost of piling snow and ice by departmental labor, which was approximately 8 cents, making a total of 38 cents.

"The acceptance of the bid under consideration will therefore result in a saving of approximately 3 cents per cubic yard (about 8 per cent) as compared with last winter's cost.

"For the Borough of Brooklyn, entire, the lowest bid received (\$0.34) is that of the Robertson Construction Company, 61st Street and 16th Avenue, Brooklyn, which is about one-third of a cent higher than the price paid during the winter season of 1914-1915 under a similar form of contract.

"The price paid during the past winter (1915-1916), when the contracts were made by snow removal districts, averaged 31.6 cents per cubic yard, exclusive of the cost of piling snow and ice by departmental labor, which, as in The Bronx, was approximately 8 cents, making a total of 39.6 cents.

"The bids per cubic yard for the work by snow removal districts are, with one exception, higher than the low bid for the entire borough and, as shown by the foregoing tabulation, no grouping of these district bids can be made which will reduce the average price per cubic yard for the borough to as low a figure as the low borough bid.

"The acceptance of the bid of the Robertson Construction Company will therefore result in a saving to the City of approximately 5.6 cents per cubic yard (about 14 per cent.), as compared with last winter's cost.

'The Commissioner stated that

"As far as can be ascertained at the present time the successful bidders for the Brooklyn and Bronx contracts have the necessary qualifications, experience and financial responsibility required to perform the work, and the prices bid are low considering the character of the work to be done and the prevailing labor market.'

"All bids on both forms of contract for the Borough of Manhattan have been rejected by the Commissioner and the work readvertised."

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution approving the recommendation of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning. Respectfully

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen-On September 19, 1916, the Commissioner of Docks requested transfer within appropriations to his department for the year 1916. This request was referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision on September 20, 1916, which bureau

reports thereon as follows: "It is proposed to transfer the sum of \$450 from Code 2855, Storage of Motor Vehicles, to Code 2824, Food Supplies, \$50; and to Code 2865, Motor Vehicle Repairs, \$400.

The accounts to be credited, with the facts in each case, are as follows: "Code 2824-Food Supplies (Meal Money)-There is at present an available balance of \$5 out of an appropriation of \$250. There are outstanding bills amounting to \$25. It is believed that, with the unencumbered balance and the amount to be transferred, sufficient funds will be provided to meet the needs for the balance of the year. Meal money in this department in 1915 amounted

"The reason that this fund has become exhausted is due to the fact the automobile which is used by the Commissioner and which was turned over to the Municipal Garage last fall for operation and maintenance has since been returned to the Department of Docks and Ferries. Since its return over \$200 has been expended on repairs. The original appropriation was made for ordinary maintenance cost of dockmasters' cars. The requested transfer of \$400 will be sufficient to provide for all necessary requirements for the balance of the year." I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request.

On November 20, 1914, your Honorable Board consented to a contract between The City of New York, acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District, Interborough Rapid Transit Company and Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the construction of a part of the Seventh Avenue-Lexington Avenue and Steinway Tunnel Rapid Transit Railroads, Routes Nos. 43 and 26, Section No. 1 (Park Avenue Extension) and appropriated the sum of \$1,548,656.25 for the purpose

of carrying out said work.

On July 30, 1915, said contract was modified so as to provide for the modification and rearrangement of the sewer work under said contract, including the construction of a new drop manhole at the west side of Park Avenue and 41st Street in substitution for the one at said location constructed as part of the Manhattan-Bronx Rapid Transit Railroad. The construction of this drop manhole would necessitate a protracted disturbance of the street surface condition and the construction of a working plant at the site which would probably have to be maintained for three or four months. The property owners in this vicinity objecting to this, a conference was held on May 16, 1916, between representatives of the Bureau of Sewers, Department of Public Works, of the Borough of Manhattan, the manager of the Belmont Hotel and a representative of the Public Service Commission in which it was suggested that the present manhole at Park Avenue and 41st Street be utilized and that a new manhole be constructed in the construction shaft of the City relief sewer at Madison Avenue and 41st Street for entrance and cleaning purposes instead of as originally planned at Park Avenue and 41st Street. This was agreed to by the representative of the Bureau of Sewers of the Borough of Manhattan.

The estimated cost of construction of the new manhole at Park Avenue and 41st Street was \$3,185, while the expense of adopting the old manhole at this location to the new requirements amounts to \$700, making a saving of \$2,485. Of this amount it was proposed to turn over to the Bureau of Sewers of the Borough of Manhattan the sum of \$1,990 which is to be applied toward the construction of a manhole at Madison Avenue and 41st Street as part of the work of constructing the City relief sewer, which work is being done by the Kingsbridge Contracting Company.

Subdivision 1 of section 37 of the Rapid Transit Act provides in part as follows: "In case the commission shall request the board of estimate and apportionment or other analogous local authority of such city to have any part of the work of restoration of street or park surfaces or property incidental to the construction of any such road or roads performed by or under the direction of any head of department or other official or board of said city or any subdivision of said city, the said board of estimate and apportionment or other analogous local authority of such city may set apart out of any appropriation theretofore made under the foregoing provisions of this section such amount as the commission may specify and shall make such amount available for the use of such head of department or other official or board for the purposes of such restoration of street or park surfaces or property.'

The Public Service Commission for the First District therefore requests your Honorable Board, pursuant to the provisions of the Rapid Transit Act to transfer for said purposes to the Bureau of Sewers of the Department of Public Works of the Borough of Manhattan the sum of \$1,990 for the purpose of carrying out said understanding, said sum to be deducted from the appropriation made by your honorable Board for the construction of Section 1 of Routes 43 and 26 as aforesaid.

The Commission requested the Board to consent to the award of the contract submitted, to prescribe the limit of \$810,265 to the amount of bonds to be issued to meet the obligations thereof and to direct the Comptroller to issue bonds to said amount to be charged against the combined appropriation of \$60,000,000, authorized by this Board on March 18, 1913, and the supplemental or additional appropriation thereto of \$7,750,000 authorized on July 27, 1916, for the purpose of carrying out the City's

obligations under contract No. 4.

This section of work extends under St. Felix street from the northerly building line of Hanson Place under the property of the Long Island Railroad Company, Atlantic avenue and City property to a point in the block bounded by Atlantic, Fifth and Flatbush avenues, about 687 feet from the point of beginning.

The subway structure for a length of about 430 feet will be constructed under the Atlantic avenue station of the Long Island Railroad.

The specifications contain a copy of the deed to the City of the right of way secured beneath this station under the terms of an agreement entered into between the City and the railroad company, which agreement is also made a part of the contract, as descriptive to the contractor of his rights and obligations in constructing his work.

This agreement was entered into between the Commission and the railroad company on January 31, 1916. It provides for the payment of \$200,000 for the right of way and casement, and the City to assume in addition the cost of a reinforced concrete slab four feet thick and from 58 to 70 feet wide to be constructed by the railroad under that portion of its tracks and platforms which are above the portion of their property to be tunneled for the subway. This slab and some under pinning work is to be done by the railroad at actual cost, with a maximum of \$300,000. The actual underground occupancy required for this subway is 20,000 square feet, so that the easement right has cost the City \$10 per square foot and the prospective cost of the company's work provided for, almost \$15 per square foot additional. This is at an average rate of \$1,200 per linear foot of this section of subway, the estimated construction cost of which is about \$1,180 per linear foot.

The work to be done by the company is at present 95 per cent completed and it is expected that the total cost will not exceed \$275,000, which will be reduced somewhat

by salvage on the plant acquired for this purpose.

The agreement referred to, of January 31, 1916, was not submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment nor to the Corporation Counsel for approval, the Commission maintaining that such being an easement acquisition matter, no such consent or approval was necessary.

On June 9, 1916, your Board approved an issue of \$60,000 corporate stock for repaying these approaches.

A contract has been advertised and bids have been received for the work of

repairing the south roadway approaches. Section 35, page 30, of the contract provides as follows:

"On each side of the expansion joints shown on the drawing the contractor shall lay one row of cast iron blocks 41/2 inches wide and 5 inches deep. \* \* These blocks shall be furnished ready for laying, to the contractor by the Department of Plant and Structures at the Williamsburg Bridge yard, Kent avenue and South Sixth street, Brooklyn."

#### Department of Health-Approval of Form of Contract, Plans, Specifications, Etc. (Cal. No. 38).

The Secretary presented a communication dated August 26, 1916, from the Secretary of the Department of Health, transmitting form of contract, plans, specifications, etc., for alterations and changes in and about various buildings on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital, foot of East 16th street, Manhattan, at an estimated cost of \$13,000; and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment: Gentlemen—On August 29, 1916, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication dated August 26, 1916, from the Department of Health, requesting approval of the form of contract, plans, specifications and estimate of cost in the amount of \$13,000 for alterations and changes in and about various buildings

on the grounds of the Willard Parker Hospital, foot of East 16th Street, Borough of Manhattan, in order to reduce the fire hazard at those buildings. The cost is to be charged to the corporate stock fund entitled "C. D. H.-19D, Department of Health, Fire Protection Work at Willard Parker Hospital," authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 21, 1915, in the amount of \$10,000 and approved by the Mayor on July 6, 1915; and in which there was on September 27, 1916, an unencumbered balance of \$9,302.32.

The communication also requests that the Board authorize additional funds in the amount of \$4,000 for this work, in addition to the \$10,000 originally appropriated. The form of contract is that usually employed for work of this character. The plans and specifications are definite.

The estimate of cost appears to be reasonable in view of the prevailing conditions as to the cost of materials and labor. As the work, in part, is in the nature of repairs, the Department of Health has agreed, as a substitute for an additional appropriation to provide \$3,700 towards the cost of this work from the budget fund for 1916, "Code 1870, Contract or Open Order Service, General Repairs." This will provide \$13,000 for this contract, of which \$9,300 will be chargeable to "C. D. H.-19D," and \$3,700 to Code 1870.

It is recommended that the request of the department be granted and the form of contract, plans, specifications and estimate of cost in the amount of \$13,000 be

approved. I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request, with

The Secretary presented a communication, dated September 22. 1916, from the Third Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities, transmitting form of contract, plans, specifications, etc., for fire protection work in buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department of Public Charities, at a total estimated cost of \$79,998, and the following report of the Bureau of Contract Supervision recommending approval thereof:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-On March 16, 1916, you referred to the Bureau of Contract Supervision a communication from the Commissioner of Public Charities, dated March 16, 1916, requesting the approval of plans and specifications and estimate of cost for fire protection work in the groups of buildings under the jurisdiction of the Department as follows:

Group 1—City Hospital Section ..... 28,668 00 18,615 00 Group 9-Miscellaneous and Isolated Buildings..... 350 00

The cost of the work was to be charged to the corporate stock fund of \$82,400 entitled "C. C. H. 56, Department of Public Charities, Fire Protection in Various Buildings," which was authorized September 21, 1915. Upon the recommendation of the Committee on Corporate Stock which was based upon recommendations contained in a report made in 1912, by Messrs. Himmelwright and Porter, Consulting Engineers. It was intended that the amount provided should be used in all of the institutions of the department excepting those on Randall's Island and the New York City Farm

The plans and specifications submitted in March provided for more work in some of the institutions than was recommended in the report of the consulting engineers, while the request did not include doing the work at the Metropolitan Hospital, Blackwell's Island, nor at the Coney Island Hospital, although it was intended that work

at these institutions should be done within the appropriation. It was therefore recommended to the officials of the Department of Public Charities, that the specifications be revised and that separate bids be obtained for work in each of the institutions of the department, as originally intended. Acting upon this suggestion, after beng duly advertised, bids were opened on July 26, 1916. Although these bids were made upon the several groups of buildings, the advertisement for bids and information to bidders, would have made it necessary in case of an award, to give the contract to the lowest bidder for the entire work. All of the bids were in excess of the appropriation, and as none of the bidders were willing to make a contract for any less than the entire work, as advertised, all of the bids were

rejected. The work was readvertised and bids received on September 11, 1916, resulting as follows:

The aggregate of the lowest of the bids for each group is \$109,288, or \$29,288 in excess of the sum of \$80,000, the unencumbered balance in the fund which is available

In a communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment dated September 22, 1916, the Third Deputy Commissioner of Public Charities submitted the amount of the lowest bid for each group except Group 2, New York City Home, B. I., and asked approval of the same. The total of the bids for which approval is asked is \$79,998 or two dollars less than the total appropriation authorized for the entire work including Group 2.

A study of the plans and specifications for Group 2 shows that the largest portion of the work contemplated consists in the construction of horizontal fire exit walls in the ward buildings which in most cases are one story in height, the present 22 and 26, 1916, from the Deputy and Acting Commissioner of Public Charities requestexits being within a few feet of the ground. It also developes that if the work in this district is carried out as planned, it will be necessary to expend considerable sums for the installation of direct heating in place of the indirect system which is now installed in many of the buildings, since with the wards divided by heavy brick walls as proposed, a free distribution of heated air would be impossible.

The plans and specifications in so far as they relate to the institutions other than the New York City Home are satisfactory and the estimates of cost, as submitted by the department on September 22, 1916, are reasonable, considering the very great increase in the cost of labor and materials which has occurred since the appropriation for the work was made.

I recommend the approval of the plans, specifications and estimates of cost, \$79,998, for work as requested by the department in its communication of September 22, 1916. Respectfully, TILDEN ADAMSON, Director.

The facts in relation to these items are as follows:

Item 1-The repairs to this boat were required by the Government Steamboat Inspectors, and consisted in making certain repairs to the steering gear, rails, stanchions and chock.

This work was imperative in order to continue the boat in operation.

Item 2—This is an emergency repair, which it was necessary to have performed without delay, and consisted principally in removing the burned out fire brick from the furnaces in boilers 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5, and furnishing, delivering and installing new fire brick in place thereof; also renewing the filling of dead plates. The bill for this item

Item 3-The repairs to boiler 6 consist principally in caulking and making tight about 24 rivets in the water legs. Repairs to boiler 7 consist in removing all the water bars from fire box, removing all the present tubes, furnishing and installing a complete set of new tubes, and installing a new brass boiler feed line. These boilers are used for the purpose of generating steam for power and heating purposes, and the repairs are necessary.

Item 4—This item is for the purpose of having furnished, delivered and installed complete and in place, ready for operation, a boiler feeder which will discharge directly into the boilers, the hot water due to the condensation which is now being wasted. The installation of this feeder will tend to reduce the fuel consumption at this plant.

Items 5 and 6—The pipe, valves and fittings called for are required in order to install and place in operation the Venturi recording water meters in the power plants of the City Home, and Metropolitan Hospital. These meters were furnished under a previous contract, and are for the purpose of automatically recording the quantity of water fed into the boilers.

The amounts given, as estimated costs, are in each case the amounts of lowest bids received, and are reasonable.

There have been reserved in the funds mentioned sufficient amounts from unencumbered balances of other items to pay the cost of these repairs.

The plans provide for a building consisting of a central portion of one story

and attic, with one story wings on three sides.

In the central portion on the first floor, is located the offices, day rooms, toilets and corridors; in the attic are the doctors' quarters. To the left of the central building are the reception ward and treatment ward; to the right are the recovery ward and convalescent ward. In the rear are the dining rooms and kitchen. The three wings are connected by the corridors in the central building. Communication between all wards except between the recovery and convalescent wards is controlled by steel grill doors, to prevent the association of the patients under the influence of narcotics, with those no longer requiring the use of drugs.

The front portion of the building, including the ward wings, is 143 feet long and 52 feet in width. The rear wing is 64 feet long and 37 feet in width.

The specifications provide for concrete foundation and walls to the level of the first floor. From the first floor to the eaves the walls are to be of common brick and terra cotta, finished with stucco. The floors are to be of wood, except in the toilets, which are to have cement floors, and in the kitchen, the floor of which will

be pressed cork tile. The specifications also provide that materials delivered to the dock at Riker's Island, will be transported from the dock to the site, by prison labor, free of charge. That all excavation, back fill, shoring and sheathing of banks, and pumping shall be done by the department; that the department shall furnish all sand, broken stone and cinders; also that the department shall furnish the materials and install with prison labor, the concrete floor, and metal lath and plaster ceiling in the cellar of the building. This work, if done by the contractor, it is estimated, would cost \$5,000; while, if done by prison labor, the cost will be reduced to \$300, which represents the value

of sand and cement which will be necessary. The contract form is standard, except that the form of bid requires that the

bidder, for each subdivision of the work, must make two tenders, as follows: 1. Bid A for complete construction, and 2, for a deduction from bid A, for construction, in case the attic is left unfinished. This form of bid should be made subject to the approval of the Corporation Counsel.

The cost of the work is to be paid to the extent of \$12,000 from an appropriation of that amount in serial bonds and tax rates authorized, under section 169 of the Charter, on July 27, 1916, entitled "C. D. C. 17A—Erection of Central Hospital on Rikers Island;" and to the extent of \$24,000 from private funds donated for the purpose. On September 25, 1916, no part of the \$12,000 fund had been expended.

The form of contract, with the exception noted, the plans and the specifications are satisfactory and the estimated cost is reasonable.

I recommend the adoption of the attached resolution granting the request, subject to the approval of the form of bid proposed, by the Corporation Counsel, and upon the condition that the sum donated to the extent of \$24,000, be deposited with the Comptroller, to be placed in a special fund against which specified portions of the cost of the contract can be registered. To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:
Gentlemen—On September 20, 1916, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requested authority to expend the sum of \$900 for the purchase of six snow plows, to be attached, when required, to six new tractors now being built for the department, the cost to be charged against the corporate stock fund entitled "C.D.S. 15, Department of Street Cleaning, Construction and Equipment of Model Street Cleaning District," for which an appropriation of \$250,000 was approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 9, 1914, and by the Board of Aldermen on August 27, 1914, and in which there is a sufficient unencumbered balance to permit

of the proposed expenditure. The snow plows which it is now proposed to purchase are identical in design with sixteen for which a contract was awarded in December, 1915, upon specifications approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 19, 1915.

The contract price paid for these plows was \$124 each. Due to an advance in the cost of structural material of from seventy to one hundred per cent. since last December, and the prevailing high cost of labor, it is estimated that the present cost of the plows will be about \$150 each.

The attention | and Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity and the of the Company's Treasurer has been called to this default on several occasions, and I am informed he has stated that the Company is not in a position to make the deposit and payment, but intends to renew its petition at some future time.

In view of this fact, I would suggest that the resolution granting consent be rescinded in order to clear the records, and as the failure to progress the matter is in no way due to the fault of the City, the Comptroller be requested to make demand upon the Company for the sum of fifty dollars (\$50) to cover the costs of examination, printing and publication, as is customary in all such cases.

Sir—There has been received by the Board a copy of a certain resolution adopted by the Twenty-eighth Ward Taxpayers Protective Association of the Borough of Brooklyn, protesting against the erection of any poles for any purpose on the residential streets in the section bounded by Flushing Avenue, Conway Street, Broadway and the Borough Line. This resolution was adopted in connection with the proposed erection of poles for the supplying of electricity to the new lighting system in the above described territory, and copies of the same are stated to have been served on the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the Commissioner, Deputy Commissioner Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

It is to be noted that the resolution does not request any affirmative action. This is presumably because of the fact that the Twenty-eighth Ward Association in 1915 requested the Board to take action looking to the removal of overhead wires and the poles supporting the same in the Bushwick and Ridgewood sections. This request had to be denied, however, because of an opinion of the Corporation Counsel. holding that were the Board to adopt any resolution in this connection, it might imply a recognition of the legality of the alleged franchises of the companies concerned, including the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, whose claims are now before the courts, and the New York Telephone Company, which has no municipal consent for underground construction in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The opinion of the Corporation Counsel in which the above was held was presented to the Board at its meeting held February 25, 1916, together with a report of

the Bureau in relation thereto. Under the circumstances, it would seem that the Board is prevented from taking any action in the matter and that the protest of the Twenty-eighth Ward Association must be considered by the local officers to whom it was addressed in their administrative capacity. ### From City, Borough and County Officials.

Fire Department—Salaries of Engineers (Cal. No. 54).

The Secretary presented a report of the Fire Commissioner on the petition of Committee of Engineers for an increase in compensation for the Engineers of the Fire Department from \$1,600 to \$1,800 per annum, stating that the Committee of Engineers took up this matter with him subsequent to the filing of his departmental estimate for the year 1917, and he suggested that they communicate directly with the Board. He also states that he is of the opinion that the requested increase in salary is deserving, as these engineers form a most important link of the fire extinguishing

(On September 22, 1916 (Cal. No. 50), the above mentioned petition was presented

and referred to the Fire Commissioner.) The report was referred to the Committee on Tax Budget.

Department of Health-Appropriation for Erection and Equipment of Various Buildings for Queensboro Hospital (Cal. No. 55).

The Secretary presented a report of the Commissioner of Health on the resolution adopted by the Medical Board of the Queensboro Hospital on August 12, 1916, urging an appropriation for the erection and equipment of a combined administration and residence building, and also a morgue and mortuary chapel for said hospital, stating hat this matter has had attention, but it is considered advisable to hold the same in abeyance temporarily, owing to the necessity for an infirmary building at Otisville and a kitchen building at Riverside Hospital.

The 6,000 square feet of land needed for the extension of Battery Avenue is owned by the Estate of Catherine Muspratt, and is assessed as Lot No. 6150. Should authority be granted for the relocation, it is the intention of the Board of Trustees to acquire

We also find that Warehouse Avenue was opened by the town of New Utrecht, and that the city merely has an easement and does not own the fee of the ground.

In reference to this petition and the petition for the striking from the map of certain streets, may we say that we are delaying going ahead on our plans, involving an expenditure of \$500,000, until we hear at least concerning the striking of the streets from the map? The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:

Gentlemen-On or about the 24th day of January, 1912, an action was commenced by the Croton Falls Construction Company against the City of New York to recover the sum of \$422,325.80, with interest from May 1, 1911.

The action arose out of a contract entered into between the City, acting by and through the old Aqueduct Commission, and James Malloy & Company, for the construction of the Croton Falls Reservoir, Reservoir "K," in the towns of Carmel, Southeast and Somers, Putnam and Westchester Counties. On or about March 5, 1907, the contract was, with the consent of the Aqueduct Commissioners, assigned to the Croton Falls Construction Company.

After a number of years of litigation it has been agreed between the attorneys for the plaintiff and the Corporation Counsel, with the approval of the Comptroller, to pay to the plaintiff the sum of one hundred and forty-five thousand dollars (\$145,000) in full settlement of the judgment recovered by the plaintiff, on condition that the plaintiff withdraw the notice of appeal to the Court of Appeals and execute to the City a general release of all claims arising out of or under the contract.

The amount of this judgment is payable from and chargeable to account "C. C. M.-2, Additional Water Fund."

An examination of this account showed the following condition on Aug. 1, 1916: 

Balance available ...... \$71,501 75 From this it appears that to meet the payment of \$145,000 it would require an

additional authorization of corporate stock amounting to \$73,498.25.

Owing to the discontinuance of meetings of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment during the summer months corporate stock could not then be authorized. In order to expedite the settlement of this judgment and so prevent any possible demand for accumulated interest it was found necessary to charge the deficit existing in account "C. C. M.—2, Additional Water Fund" (\$73,498.25) to account "R. F.

M.-19, Revenue Bond Fund for Judgments." It is now desired to replenish the Judgment Fund to the amount paid therefrom, on account of the aforementioned contract, from the proceeds of corporate stock, and I submit herewith a resolution for the purpose of authorizing the Comptroller to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$73,498.25 for that purpose.

The Secretary presented a joint resolution, adopted June 27, 1916, by the Local Boards of the Murray Hill and Greenwich Districts, Borough of Manhattan, initiating proceedings for this improvement; and the following report of the Chief Engineer: Report No. 15984. August 25, 1916.

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, Mayor, Chairman of the Board of Estimate and Ap-

bortionment:

Sir-Herewith is transmitted a resolution adopted at a joint meeting of the Local Boards of the Murray Hill and Greenwich Districts, Borough of Manhattan, held on June 27, 1916, initiating proceedings for reconstructing a sewer in Clarkson Street, between the North River and a point 275 feet easterly therefrom, and in West 13th Street from 6th Avenue to University Place, with provision that the latter sewer shall be placed at the same level as the one now in use. The estimated cost of this improvement is \$54,100.

From information presented with this resolution it appears that the trunk sewers now in use in this drainage district were built about 75 years ago, and that they have a capacity less than one-half that required to properly meet the drainage needs. It also appears that a large number of the lateral sewers are broken down and in an unsafe condition, the list including the one in West 13th Street to which the resolution relates. The latter sewer has a depth ranging from less than 5 feet to less than 9 feet, which depth, while possibly adequate to the present needs, would appear to be unsuited to the development which the opening up of new transit lines through the district will doubtless occasion. The papers submitted in this matter show that the Local Board has been asked to consider a comprehensive scheme of development designed to provide for a complete reconstruction of the trunk sewers with provision for treatment at the waterfront as will doubtless be required in the near future, with suitable hydraulic conditions designed to properly provide for the runoff and at the same time secure as much depth as practicable.

The need of similar reconstruction in a territory north of Canal Street located in an adjoining drainage district has also been brought to the attention of the Board with the result of granting preliminary authorization for an improvement of substantial magnitude designed to fit into a comprehensive scheme based on the concentration of the sanitary flow from this district with that now outletting at Clarkson Street and at Vestry Street at the foot of Canal Street, where it is believed that treatment could advantageously be applied before discharge.

In view of the facts now on hand it would seem unwise to undertake sewer improvements of an extensive character in any of these districts until after a definite plan has been prepared by the Borough President and approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment which will adequately provide for the future needs of this territory. The adoption of any other course would almost unquestionably necessitate the abandonment of such sewers as were reconstructed under the existing plan, or result in serious embarrassment when attempting to fit such sewers into a suitable drainage scheme.

No plan has been submitted to show the sewers which it is proposed to build under the Local Board resolution and which it would appear will differ to some extent from those now in use. For this reason it is clear that favorable action could not, in any event, be accorded at this time.

I would recommend that the resolution be disapproved, and that the attention of the Borough President be called to the desirability of carrying out the general plan herein outlined for the permanent relief of existing conditions, and to the end that all reconstruction work undertaken shall be along lines designed to be of a permanent character and co-ordinated to the ultimate installation of a modern and suitable drainage system. This course, it might be noted, will probably not entail a complete reconequal annual installments, to provide for the payment of certain fees and allowances struction at this time, although the first step would undoubtedly involve a large ex-NELSON P. Borough of Queens (Cal. No. 96).

The building of a concrete or steel structure would involve very great in Edgemere, Borough of Queens.

An adjournment has been taken to October 9th, 1916, to enable the City, through your Board, to express to the Commission its opinion as to the best method of elimi-

nating these grade crossings.

Your Board will recall that when the proceeding was initiated to eliminate the grade crossings in Far Rockaway, which crossings are to the east of those involved in the pending proceeding, I was directed by your Board to appear before the Commission and urge that on account of the large expenditure involved and the then financial condition of the City, this work should not be undertaken at that time. Your recommendation was not heeded by the Commission.

Apparently the real purpose of this Edgemere improvement is to take care of the spoil which is to be excavated and removed in connection with the Far Rockaway work, the argument being that it will be cheaper to use this spoil in Edgemere, now available, than it will to bring it from some far distant place in the future.

On the other hand, testimony was offered which would at least indicate that the spoil from the Far Rockaway cut can be used to advantage and sold for some profit in the work of top-soiling reclaimed lands on the Far Rockaway peninsula. President Connolly further intimated that such spoil could be used in the making of streets through this territory.

The Commission has expressed no opinion as to how this grade elimination be best taken care of, but is considering four different plans, three of these involving a grade elimination along the present line of the railroad and the other a railroad

above grade on a new right of way to the north.

This last named plan is opposed by the railroad. It is open to the further objection that such new right-of-way apparently would have to be acquired and the cost thereof, if properly a part of grade elimination expense, would have to be borne in part by the City. In such a case it would seem the old right-of-way would either revert to the original grantors or become the property in fee simple of the railroad

The original plan which was suggested so as to utilize the spoil from the Far Rockaway cut, was to elevate the tracks upon an earthen embankment on the old right-of-way. This plan apparently is opposed by all the property owners of Edgemere, who state that rather than have their property separated from the ocean by what they term a "Chinese wall," they would prefer that no grade elimination be had either now or at any future time.

The other two plans before the Commission are suggestions of the property owners and will be satisfactory to them. One of these plans contemplates a concrete structure, and the other an iron structure, both planned to carry the tracks above grade on the present line of the railroad. Involved in the last mentioned land now used for railroad purposes. It would be even more difficult than some of plan is the opening of a new city street underneath the elevated structure. I believe the problems presented in working out the Dual Transit System where railroads were a petition signed by a number of property owners has been filed with your Board, and is now before you for your consideration involving such a plan.

The objection to both the concrete and the iron structures is mainly the large ad-

If your Board desires to pass upon these different plans and make any recommendation to the Commission, I will be pleased to see such recommendations are properly presented.

· Sir-Under date of September 20th, 1916, the Corporation Counsel has addressed a communication to the Board relative to the proceedings pending before the Public Service Commission involving the proposed elimination of grade crossings of the Long Island Railroad at four streets in Edgemere; namely, Grandview Avenue, or best method of effecting the elimination. The Corporation Counsel has reviewed the various suggestions which have been made as to the treatment of the problem and states that, if the Board desires to pass upon the merits of the different projects and make any recommendations to the Public Service Commission he will see that they are properly presented.

The proceedings as originally initiated included only the three streets first named the railroad is to be depressed and the waste material from the excavation could be advantageously and economically used to construct the railroad embankment in the Edgemere section. When a hearing was given on this project the property owners of Rockaway Beach protested vehemently against the building of the railroad embankment, claiming that in view of the limited width of the Rockaway Peninsula lying between the ocean and Jamaica Bay and its use for summer residences the construction of such an embankment, which at Beach 41st Street would be within about 600 feet of the ocean front, would destroy the natural advantages of the peninsula by interfering with the breezes and obstructing the view. They strongly urged that, if the improvement were undertaken the railroad should be carried on an elevated structure built either of a series of concrete arches or steel. Inasmuch as the preliminary estimates covering the elimination of the three crossings, but not including Rockaway Boulevard, were \$220,000 in the case of an earth embankment and \$750,000 in the case of concrete arches or a steel viaduct, and, if the scope of the improvement were extended to include Rockaway Boulevard, the cost would probably be 50 per cent. greater in either case, the Commission hesitated to adopt the more costly alternative.

might be compelled to share on the same basis as for the physical work of eliminating crossings on the present railway location. If, also, the present right-of-way were abandoned for railroad purposes, some portions of it at least might revert to the original owners from whom the land was acquired by the Long Island Railroad Company, although it is stated that the company has so perfected its title for nearly the entire right-of-way that it now owns it in absolute fee and there would be no reversion. It was suggested that the Railroad Company might properly be asked to surrender its present right-of-way in exchange for a new one, and that the much greater value of the present right-of-way, traversing, as it does, the built-up portion of the Rockaway Long Island Railroad Company-Elimination of Grade Crossings at Edgemere, | Peninsula, would create a balance which would go a long way toward paying for the physical work. The objection of the part of the people of Far Rockaway to a railway embankment might be much less on the proposed new location, but it is doubtful if it would be overcome, while the difficulties above referred to are such that the plan can scarcely be considered a practicable one at the present time, unless the Railroad Company would make concessions with respect to an exchange of its present rightof-way for a new one, which does not seem likely and which it would probably be difficult, if not impossible, to force upon the company.

In considering the treatment of the railroad on this particular part of the Rockaway Peninsula it must be remembered that it will soon be necessary to eliminate Sirs-Proceedings are pending before the Public Service Commission involving all of the grade crossings on this entire line, and whatever method is adopted for this expense, but the only solution of the problem will be to elevate the railroad as it will be impossible either to depress the road or to carry streets over it owing to the limited width of the peninsula. Not only would the cost of supporting the railroad on a concrete or steel viaduct be very great, but the effect upon the abutting property would, in my judgment, differ very little from the effect of the earth embankment, especially in view of the fact that the railroad right-of-way is approximately 100 feet in width and that railroad would not exceed 50 feet in width at the most, leaving an additional space 50 feet wide, and to most of which the Railroad Company has an absolute fee title and which could be used by it for any structures which might be found profitable, the character and use of which would not be determined with entire regard for the appearance of the neighborhood. It was stated by some of the property owners who opposed the earth embankment that the waste from the cut through Far Rockaway could be profitably disposed of in the immediate vicinity as top-soil or to cover the fine sand and prevent it from drifting, and that other material for the construction of an embankment, if such embankment were ever built, could be hauled from some inland point by the Railroad Company and the net cost of the embankment would be reduced rather than increased. The trouble with this argument is that, if the premises are correct, the Railroad Company would probably derive all of the revenue from the sale of this material and it would scarcely be possible for the City to secure a credit for the sums so received, while the provision of embankment hauled from some more distant point at a subsequent time when the grade crossing elimination work is carried further would greatly increase the cost and the share of the City and the State.

This problem has been presented in a new aspect by the receipt of a communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, through his Secretary, dated September 20th, 1916, transmitting a petition addressed to the Board and bearing a large number of signatures said to represent 57 different plots having a frontage of 10,453.5 feet on different streets, asking the Board to require the Long Island Railroad "to operate its road upon an elevated open steel structure and to acquire its right of way from Far Rockaway Boulevard (formerly Atlantic Avenue) to 5th Avenue, Rockaway Park, all in the Fifth Ward, for the purposes of a public street or highway." This would mean that the City acquire the railroad right-of-way for street purposes and that the Railroad Company should then be required to place its tracks upon an elevated structure in or over the roadway of this street. It is possible that such an arrangement might be made with the Railroad Company, but it is improbable that any agreement could be reached on terms satisfactory to the City, or which would not involve very large expense. An attempt on the part of the City to condemn this right-of-way for street purposes could probably be successfully opposed by the Railroad Company, as it would involve the condemnation of operated on the surface within the lines of existing streets, as was the case in New Utrecht Avenue and Gravesend Avenue. At any rate, it is possible that such a contract might be made by the Public Service Commission with the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but, if the existing right-of-way is to be acquired for street purposes, special legislative authority would be necessary. For a considerable part of the distance referred to in the petition, which covers the entire length of the Rockaway Beach Branch of the Long Island Railroad, the present I might add that both President Connolly and Chief Engineer Lewis of your railroad is so near to existing streets that the acquisition of the right-of-way for street purposes would provide street capacity in excess of the needs of this district. The proposed plan appears to involve so many difficulties and such enormous expense that the Board would probably not be disposed to consider it at this time.

While I am reluctant to suggest an abandonment of the grade crossing elimination work, especially for the admittedly dangerous crossing at Rockaway Boulevard, I believe that the difference in cost between an earth embankment and a viaduct is so great and the advantages of the latter have been so exaggerated that the Board should, in view of all the circumstances, advise the Public Service Commission that it favors the carrying out of the plan as originally proposed, by earth embankment, or the abandonment of the proposed elimination, except that already agreed upon Beach 35th Street; Seaview Avenue, or Beach 41st Street; Frank Avenue, or Beach through Far Rockaway, in which event the Public Service Commission should be 44th Street; and Rockaway Boulevard. The amount of the low bid, \$228,000, is \$55,000 in excess of the estimate of cost of \$173,000 approved by the Comptroller on August 16, 1916.

This estimate of cost was prepared by the Department of Education in December 1915, and was based on prices prevailing at that time.

It is known that the prices of materials and labor have since increased, so that it will be necessary to increase the estimate of cost. The question involved was whether the

lowest bid did not exceed the 1915 estimate to a greater extent than was warranted. The low bidder has submitted for the inspection of the Bureau of Contract Supervision the estimates he received from various sub-contracting firms and individuals for the several items of work comprising the general construction contract.

In all cases where the prices submitted were used, the lowest of these estimates were used and in some instances where these appeared high, a lower estimate was prepared and used.

The sum total of these low bids, plus five per cent for profit and contingencies, amounts to \$228,000, the amount of the low bid submitted. In view of the condition of the market today this amount is reasonable.

There is a sufficient balance in the appropriate fund to pay the additional cost







and conditions, shall in any case be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be re-located or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings

and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids; and he it further

Resolved. That while the said sale is held under the surervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Compttoller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

### GENERAL LASTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the ate and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or con-sideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The amount shall be as specified in the proposals or instructions to bidders and shall not be

in excess of 5 per cent.

The certified check or money should not be in-

closed in the envelope containing the bid or esti-mate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate. For particulars as to the quantity or quality

of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
