**COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF  
THE CITY OF NEW YORK.**

**Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in  
Room 16, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M. on Thursday, September 26, 1918.**

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Edward J. Glennon, Deputy and Acting Chamberlain; Robert L. Moran, Acting President, Board of Aldermen; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held August 1, 1918, were approved as printed in the City Record August 13, 1918.

**Dock Department—Proposed Plan for Straightening, Widening and Improvement of Coney Island Creek, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 2).**

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearings held June 27 and July 12, 1918, in the matter of the proposed plan for the straightening, widening and improvement of Coney Island Creek, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, and for a ship canal 200 feet wide connecting Sheepshead Bay with Gravesend Bay and for the marginal street, wharf or place, 100 feet in width on each side of said ship canal, made pursuant to the provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1918, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks June 8, 1918, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

Affidavit as to publication of notice of hearing in the City Record on file with the papers.

This matter was considered by the Committee of the Whole July 25, 1918.

On motion, the hearing was adjourned to be continued at 11 o'clock in the forenoon on Thursday, October 10, 1918.

**Dock Department—Proposed Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront Between  
Highland Avenue and Warehouse Avenue, Gravesend Bay, Brooklyn (Cal.  
No. 3).**

The Chair called for a continuation of the public hearings held June 27 and July 12, 1918, in the matter of the proposed plan for the improvement of the waterfront and harbor of The City of New York, between Highland avenue and Warehouse avenue, Gravesend Bay, Borough of Brooklyn, adopted by the Commissioner of Docks June 8, 1918, and transmitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for approval.

The proposed improvement consists in establishing a pierhead line 400 feet offshore of Bay View avenue, also pierhead and bulkhead lines 650 feet apart along the entrance to the proposed ship canal, laid out under provisions of chapter 588 of the Laws of 1918, and then coincident with the lines prolonged of the ship canal.

The plan also provides for a marginal street 100 feet in width inshore of and adjacent to the proposed pierhead and bulkhead lines between West 37th and West 23d streets, on the southerly side, and between a point opposite West 32d street and West 23d street on the northerly side of the entrance to the proposed ship canal.

**Dock Department—Amendment of the Lease to the United States Government  
of Property in the Vicinity of South Street, St. George, Richmond (Cal.  
No. 6).**

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks.

Pier A, North River, August 22, 1918.

*Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City Hall, New York City:*

Sir—At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held on August 12, 1918, a resolution was adopted approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks of a lease to the United States Government of City property in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, for a term beginning on the first day of April, 1918, and ending on the thirtieth day of June, 1918, with privilege to renew the lease annually for the period of the present war on like terms and conditions.

Under date of August 19, 1916, General Theodore A. Bingham, of the U. S. Engineer Office, Second District, writes: "On account of the expense which must be incurred in dredging and in putting dock in good repair and in providing necessary accessories, the department feels that it must have a lease for five years with privilege of renewal for five years, otherwise the expense would not be justified."

This pier is used by the U. S. Engineer Office as a berth for the steamer which patrols the harbor, picking up drift wood and obstructions which may cause damage to vessels and whose activities are continuous and will not be terminated at the expiration of the war.

I therefore beg to recommend that the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be amended by making the term five years from April 1, 1918, and further, that the lessee shall have the option on not less than one month's notice in writing to the lessor, prior to the termination of the term thereof, to renew the lease for a further period of five years on like terms and conditions, excepting that the rental for the renewal term shall be one dollar per annum advance on the rental for the preceding term. Resolved, That the resolution adopted by this Board at meeting held August 12, 1918, approving of and consenting to the execution by the Commissioner of Docks, of a lease to the United States of America, of certain property in the vicinity of South street, St. George, Borough of Richmond, designated as the upland in the rear of

the crib bulkhead between the center line of South street and the South street approach leading to the Ferry at St. George as more particularly described therein, together with the layup pier in the basin at the foot of South street distant 100 feet north of the northerly wharf belonging to the United States Light House Department, for a term beginning on the first day of April, 1918, and ending on the 30th day of June, 1918, with the privilege of renewal annually for the period of the present war, on like terms and conditions, be and the same is hereby amended by making the term of the lease five years from April 1, 1918, and further, that the lessee shall have the option on not less than one month's notice in writing to the lessor, prior to the termination of the term thereof, to renew the lease for a further period of five years on like terms and conditions, excepting that the rental for the renewal term shall be one dollar (\$1) per annum advance on the rental for the preceding term.

**Dock Department—Request of, for an Issue of \$33,000 of Corporate Stock for  
the Construction of a Landing Pier for the Distribution of Ashes on the  
Meadows Between Barren Island and Mill Basin, Jamaica Bay (Cal. No. 7).**

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks, dated August 13, 1918, requesting the adoption of a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock in the sum of \$33,000 to cover the cost of constructing a landing pier for the distribution of ashes on the meadows between Barren Island and Mill Basin by the Department of Street Cleaning, and that he be authorized to enter into a contract for the construction of the pier.

Dismantling and Removing the Plant, Structures and Material from the  
Foot of East 24th Street, Manhattan, and Installing the Same at Whale

*Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sir—I beg to request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock to the amount of \$20,000 for dismantling and removing the plant, structures and material from the Department Yard at the foot of East 24th street, East River, and installing same at Whale Creek, Borough of Brooklyn, as more particularly set forth in the accompanying memorandum. **Dock Department—Request of, for an Issue of \$15,000 of Corporate Stock for  
Dredging on the South Side of Pier 64, North River (Cal. No. 9).**

The following was received from the Commissioner of Docks:

August 26, 1918.

*Hon. JOHN F. HYLAN, Mayor, and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City Hall, New York City:*

Dear Sir—I am in receipt of a letter dated August 14, 1918, from the Anchor Line requesting dredging on the south side of Pier 64, North River, Borough of Manhattan.

The lease under which the company occupies the premises provides that The City of New York shall perform all the necessary work of dredging at the pier, but this Department has no funds available for the purpose.

The area was dredged last in 1911 by the City, at which time a depth of thirty feet at mean low water was produced, but the depth of water at the present time is only twenty feet, which is wholly inadequate for the berthing of ships controlled by the Anchor Line.

This shoal water has compelled the Line to abandon the use of the south side of the pier for the berthing of steamers, although it has continued to pay the rental provided under the lease for the use of the whole pier. Coupled with this manifestly unfair condition is the fact that the whole pier is imperatively required for the loading of ships of the allies with troops and munitions of war.

To reproduce the required depth of thirty feet at mean low water dredging to the extent of twenty thousand cubic yards is necessary, which at current prices it is estimated will cost \$15,000.

In order therefore that there may be no hindrance or delay in this essential overseas transportation, it is necessary that both sides of the pier be made available for use immediately, and I respectfully request that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Comptroller be authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the sum of \$15,000 to cover the cost of dredging on the south side of Pier 64, North River, to a depth of thirty feet at mean low water.

**Dock Department—Issue of \$11,000 of Corporate Stock for the Construction of  
Bulkhead South of East 115th Street, Harlem River, Manhattan (Cal. No.  
10).**

Sir—I transmit herewith certified copies of resolutions (2) adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment August 9, 1918, relating to above calendar number and affecting the Department of Docks and Ferries. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, and the recommendations of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted July 12, 1918, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding eleven thousand dollars (\$11,000), maturing not more than thirty (30) years after the date of issue; and the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized to issue corporate stock of The City of New York, maturing not more than thirty (30) years after the date of issue, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, the proceeds whereof to be used by the Department of Docks and Ferries to pay cost of material and labor necessary for the construction of the bulkhead south of East 115th street, Harlem River, Borough of Manhattan.

**Dock Department—Issue of \$31,500 of Corporate Stock for the Purchase of  
Material and Supplies for Construction Work (Cal. No. 11).**

The following was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Resolved, By the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that, pursuant to the provisions of chapter 658, Laws of 1918, and the recommendation of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund by resolution adopted July 25, 1918, the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized to issue, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, serial bonds of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding thirty-one thousand five hundred dollars (\$31,500), the proceeds to the amount of the par value thereof to be applied by the Commissioner of Docks to the purchase of materials and supplies for construction work contemplated by that department for the remainder of the year; the estimated minimum duration and usefulness of which is not less than fifty (50) years; the serial bonds thus authorized to be issued to an amount not exceeding thirty-one thousand five hundred dollars (\$31,500), to mature in equal installments within fifty (50) years from the date of issue; provided, however, that no encumbrance or expenditure by contract shall be made against said sum nor shall bids upon such contract be advertised for until

after approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the plans, specifications, estimates of costs, and forms of such contracts, which shall be submitted to said Board by the Commissioner of Docks, nor shall any architect, engineer, expert or departmental employee be engaged or employed as a charge against such sum except after approval by said Board of such employment and of the fee or wage to be paid by preliminary or final contract, voucher or budget schedule, which is to be similarly submitted, unless in the case of departmental employees such employment is in accordance with schedules approved by said Board.

Usher, Commandant, Third Naval District, that some method of disposing of ashes and rubbish be adopted other than dumping at sea, I would say that no ashes have been disposed of at sea by this Department since May 2, 1918.

It is only in cases of emergency that ashes are taken to sea, as when unloading plants are out of order or overtaxed, or when ice conditions prevent the use of the regular disposition points. The ashes and rubbish are now disposed of at Riker's Island, Hunt's Point, Port Ivory, Flushing Meadows and at various other land fills throughout the different boroughs.

**Health Department—Request of, for a Renewal of the Lease of Premises at No. 1354 Webster Avenue, The Bronx (Cal. No. 20).**

to terminate the lease and return the property to the Sinking Fund Commission in order that it may be turned over to the Health Department for use of the Willard Parker Hospital.

The Louisa Minturn Hospital occupies premises at the foot of East 16th street, Manhattan, under a lease entered into July 1, 1896, for a period of 99 years at a nominal rental.

The Commissioner suggests that such action be taken as will transfer the use of the property to the Health Department on the termination of the lease. The reason the Commissioner asks that this action be taken before the lease is actually terminated is because the Minturn Hospital trustees have a certain endowment fund that he is urging them to turn over to the City or to use in putting the Minturn Hospital in first-class repair before it is turned over to the City. The trustees are anxious to have the original purposes of the gift and endowment carried out and these can be carried out only by the use of the building for contagious diseases.

**Department of Plant and Structures—Renewal of Lease for, of Strip of Land Lying North of the Old Boston Road, Bronx, Occupied as an Approach to the Temporary Eastchester Bridge Over the Hutchinson River (Cal. No. 24).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sirs—On June 27, 1918 (Cal. No. 31), your Board referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures dated June 15, 1918, requesting a renewal of the lease of the premises lying north of the Old Boston road, Borough of The Bronx, occupied by the Department of Plant and Structures as an approach to the temporary Eastchester Bridge over the Hutchinson River, for a period of one year from October 15, 1918, at the same rental and upon the same terms and conditions as now occupied.

Provision for the renewal of this lease was made in the 1918 Budget.

These premises have been occupied for this purpose under leases made as follows: October 15, 1910-October 15, 1912, \$600 a year, June 26, 1907. October 15, 1912-October 15, 1913, \$600 a year, February 26, 1913. October 15, 1913-October 15, 1914, \$600 a year, September 24, 1913. October 15, 1914-October 15, 1915, \$600 a year, June 10, 1914. October 15, 1915-October 15, 1916, \$300 a year, July 30, 1915. October 15, 1916-October 15, 1917, \$300 a year, July 26, 1916. October 15, 1917-October 15, 1918, \$300 a year, September 13, 1917.

There is no City owned property in the vicinity that is available for this purpose. The nearest City owned property is the bridge property already in use.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

There is no similar rented property in the vicinity with which comparison may be made.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease of the plot of land 59 feet by 107 feet in the Borough of The Bronx located on the northeasterly side of Fisher's Landing road, 95 feet northeasterly from the intersection of the northwesterly line of the Old Boston Post road and the northeasterly line of Fisher's Landing road, to be used for the approach of the temporary bridge across the Hutchinson River during the construction of the permanent bridge at Old Boston Post road, for a period of one year from October 15, 1918, at a rental of \$300 a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes. Lessor, Lewis E. Field, 218 West 48th street, Manhattan.

Respectfully, LOUIS H. HAHLO, Deputy and Acting Comptroller.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and is hereby authorized and directed to execute a renewal of the lease to the City of the plot of land 59 by 107 feet in the Borough of The Bronx, located on the northeasterly side of Fisher's Landing road, 95 feet northeasterly from the intersection of the northwesterly line of the old Boston Post road and the northeasterly line of Fisher's Landing road, for use of the Department of Plant and Structures, to be used for the approach of the temporary bridge across the Hutchinson River during the construction of the permanent bridge at old Boston Post road, for a period of one year from October 15, 1918, at a rental of three hundred dollars (\$300) a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes; lessor, Lewis E. The following was received from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures:

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:*

Gentlemen—There is transmitted herewith, for your approval, a form of permit to the Quartermaster's Corps of the United States Army to use and occupy, beginning July 1, 1918, the middle slip at the Manhattan terminal of the Municipal Ferry, operating between Whitehall street, Manhattan, and 39th street, Brooklyn.

The matter has been taken up with a representative of the Depot Quartermaster, acting for the Quartermaster's Corps, and a rental has been fixed of \$150 per month, beginning July 1, 1918. A form of permit has been prepared and has met with the approval of the Government authorities. The terms and conditions are satisfactory to this Department.

Previous to July 1, 1918, when this Department assumed jurisdiction over the Municipal Ferries, the Quartermaster's Corps had been using this slip for some time under a permit from the Commissioner of Docks at a rental of \$100 per month.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby approve of the following form of permit to the Quartermaster's Corps of the United States Army to use and occupy the middle slip at the Manhattan Terminal of the Municipal Ferry:

Permission is hereby given by the Commissioner of Plant and Structures of the City of New York to the Quartermaster's Corps of the U. S. Army, Army Building, New York City, to use and occupy, from July 1, 1918, to June 30, 1919, inclusive, in connection with the operation of a ferry between Whitehall St., Manhattan, and Governor's Island, the middle slip at the Manhattan Terminal of the Municipal Ferry operating between Whitehall St., Manhattan, and 39th St., Brooklyn, and a space containing approximately 3,217 sq. ft. of floor area on the first floor of the terminal building, together with a joint use with the Department of Plant and Structures of the driveway leading to the said slip and to the westerly slip of the said terminal.

In consideration of the permission hereby granted the Quartermaster's Corps of the U. S. Army, acting by the Depot Quartermaster, hereby agrees as follows:

1. It will pay to the Commissioner of Plant and Structures at his office in the Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan, the sum of \$150 per month, payable at the end of each month.

2. It will keep and maintain the premises and every part thereof in good and sufficient repair and condition, including any necessary dredging at or in front of the slip, and at the termination of the period of this permit, it will have the premises repaired and restored to their original condition, subject to reasonable use and wear. Such maintenance and repairs shall be made in a manner satisfactory to the Commissioner of Plant and Structures.

3. It will not make any changes or alterations in the premises without permission from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures.

4. It will not sublet the whole or any part of the premises without the written consent of the Commissioner of Plant and Structures.

5. In case the Commissioner of Plant and Structures should for any reason not be able to use the westerly slip at the terminal, which slip is now being used for the ferry to and from 39th St., Brooklyn, the Quartermaster's Corps will allow the Commissioner of Plant and Structures to use the middle slip, temporarily, in connection

with the operation of the ferry to and from 39th Street, Brooklyn, when the said middle slip is not being used by the Quartermaster's Corps.

6. It will furnish, at its own expense, all water, heat and light needed for its purposes and uses.

7. It will give access at all reasonable times to all parts of the premises to any representatives or employees of the Department of Plant and Structures for the purpose of inspecting the premises or making repairs to adjoining property.

8. It will assume responsibility for all injury or damage to persons or property that may result from any operations under this permit.

9. It is understood that if the slip is destroyed by fire or other casualty, then this permit shall terminate immediately.

10. The Quartermaster's Corps reserves the right to quit, relinquish and give up the said premises at any time within the period for which this permit is made or may be renewed, by giving the Commissioner of Plant and Structures 30 days' notice in writing.

11. It is understood between the parties hereto that at the option of the Quartermaster's Corps, this permit, with all its covenants and agreements, may be renewed yearly as often as the needs of the public service may require, so as to give the Quartermaster's Corps continuous possession of the premises for the duration of the war and 12 months thereafter, but no renewal shall be made to include more than one fiscal year.

**Department of Plant and Structures—Approval of the Leasing by, of Plot of Land Between the East River and Water Street, Brooklyn, Under the Brooklyn Bridge (Cal. No. 26).**

The following was received from the Commissioner of Plant and Structures:

September 16, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York:*  
Gentlemen—This Department has received inquiries in relation to the leasing of bridge property between the East River and Water street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, under the Brooklyn Bridge. The plot proposed to be leased has an area of 70,945 square feet.

The bulkhead in front of the property along the East River is under permit from this Department to the Department of Docks and is used by the Flinn-O'Rourke Company under a revocable permit issued by the Department of Docks. The said company occupies under permit from this Department 12,960 square feet of the plot. The bulkhead and the 12,960 square feet of the property are used by the said company in connection with the construction of two East River subway tunnels, and it is anticipated that the said company will not need much longer the part of the property now occupied by it. The remainder of the plot is unoccupied, except for a stable used by this Department, and arrangements could be made to keep the Department's horses elsewhere.

The property if leased could be used for the storage of non-inflammable material or for the construction of a suitable fireproof building thereon. It would be advantageous to the City if the plot were leased as a whole and improved.

You are hereby requested to grant this Department authority to advertise for leasing the said parcel of property for a period of ten years at an upset or minimum price of \$5,000 per annum, with the privilege of a renewal for a further period of ten years at an increased rental of 10 per cent per annum over that paid for the first ten-year period.

The nearest City-owned property is on the south side of Pacific street, north of Court street, occupied as a public school.

There is no property in the vicinity now under lease to the City that is not in use or that could be made available for the purposes of this lease.

The rent for the renewed lease compared with other rents in the vicinity is as follows: Flats in the vicinity with about double the area of those occupied by the City rent for \$480 a year, without heat.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the City.

Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a renewal of said lease upon the same terms and conditions as the present lease, of the two front rooms on the second floor of No. 139 Court street, Borough of Brooklyn, for use of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for a term of one year from October 1, 1918, at a rental of \$300 a year, payable quarterly; the lessor to pay taxes and water rates and supply steam heat; the lessee to supply light and janitor service. Lessor, Michael Shannon, 32 Whitehall street, Manhattan.

The rent for the renewed lease compared with other rents in the vicinity is as follows: the space occupied under this lease is 238 sq. ft. and at the rental of \$240 a year is at the rate of about \$1 per square foot, including heat, light, water, elevator and janitor service—similar space in Heffner Building at 2806 3d avenue is rented for \$1.36 per square foot under the same conditions.

There is no other privately owned property that could be rented or used in lieu of the above premises to the advantage of the city. Under the circumstances the rent appears to me to be reasonable and just.

At a meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held July 26, 1918, there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the President of the Borough of Richmond dated June 8, 1918, requesting that certain property owned by the City at Port Richmond, Borough of Richmond, be transferred to the Park Department for use as a public park.

The proposition was submitted to the Department of Parks and under date of September 14, 1918, an answer was received to the effect that owing to the lack of available funds for the care and maintenance of this property, the transfer of such property should be postponed until some future time.

**Police Department—In the Matter of the Request of, for Assignment of Room 6 in the Town Hall at Jamaica, Queens (Cal. No. 49).**

On July 25, 1918 (Cal. No. 22), there was referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Police Commissioner dated July 15, 1918, in which he requests the assignment to his Department of the room formerly occupied as the Coroner's Court, in the Town Hall, Jamaica, Borough of Queens.

He states that it is his desire to use this room for use of the District Detectives assigned to the 18th Inspection District, the office of the 18th Inspection District and the 120th Precinct, both being already located in this building.

An inspection of the building shows that while Rooms 1, 2 and 3 are occupied and were regularly assigned to the Fourth District Magistrates' Court, the Room (No. 6) in question is occupied by the Clerks attached to the Fourth District Magistrates' Court, although not regularly assigned to the Court.

**Public Service Commission—Request of, for Approval of the Sale of Lease by, of Premises on the Westerly Side of Flatbush Avenue, Near DeKalb Avenue, Brooklyn (Cal. No. 50).**

The Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

July 30, 1918.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Dear Sirs—At your meeting held July 12, 1918, you referred to the Comptroller a communication from the Public Service Commission, requesting the approval of the sale of a lease for a term of ten years, of the premises on the westerly side of Flatbush avenue, near DeKalb avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, at an upset rental of \$1,980 per annum, for the first five years, and \$2,480 per annum for the remaining five years of the term.

These premises are triangular in shape and are used as an entrance to the DeKalb avenue station of the so-called "Broadway-Fourth Avenue Line."

The assessed valuation is \$31,000.

This is one of the numerous parcels of property acquired for rapid transit purposes, and at the threshold the question is presented whether it is to be the policy of the City to lease such property for long terms, or to sell and dispose of it as rapidly as possible. So long as it is owned by the City no return from taxation is received.

In the present case the proposed rental for the first five year term is less than 5 per cent. on the assessed value of the property if there be deducted from the rental a sum equal to the taxes upon the assessed valuation.

The form of the proposed lease by the Public Service Commission permits the lessee to erect a building on the land and leaves it optional with the lessee whether to remove the building at the expiration of the lease. The probable effect of this provision is that the building would not be subject to taxation. There is nothing in the proposed form of lease that limits the use of the building to any particular purpose; on the contrary, the land and any building erected thereon, may be used for practically any purpose that does not interfere with the rapid transit operation. It is obvious that if a policy is adopted of permitting City property to be used for any purpose in direct competition with adjacent property in established businesses, it might very easily result in a serious injury to such established businesses, and consequent depreciation of private property and loss of taxes. The provision that the rental be payable semi-annually in advance would very likely have the effect of restricting competition at the public letting, if authorized. Many persons who might be willing to pay a higher rent and give proper security therefor for a proper use of the premises, might be disinclined to pay the rent for an entire half year in advance.

While the Rapid Transit Act permits the auctioning of the lease, after advertisement in the CITY RECORD only, which is the course proposed by the Public Service Commission in this case; nevertheless, the greatest publicity is desired in a case of this kind, and the advertising should not be limited to the CITY RECORD, but should be sufficiently diffused to attract the attention of prospective bidders.

In view of the reasons above set forth, I have not specifically referred to other provisions of the lease and the form of advertisement, nor to the fact that the lease does not appear to have been approved as to form by the Corporation Counsel.

Under the circumstances, I cannot recommend the approval of the proposed lease or sale at public auction upon the terms submitted. Respectfully,

**Law Department—Communication from, with Reference to Legislation Desired by the Commission for Introduction at the Next Legislative Session (Cal. No. 62).**

New York, September 4, 1918.

*Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, JOHN KORB, Executive Secretary:*

Gentlemen—It is deemed most advisable by the Mayor and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all legislation desired by your office be prepared and ready for introduction on the first day of the next legislative session.

This office is equipped and prepared to co-operate with the heads of departments and offices in drafting all needed bills and in procuring the submission thereof to the Legislature.

The advantages of such a plan are obvious. Therefore, will you please transmit to me not later than October 15th, a rough draft of such changes in the law as in your judgment you see fit to recommend, together with a memorandum setting forth in detail the reasons therefor? Bills may then be prepared accordingly, bearing in mind the rules of the Senate and of the Assembly and of the State Bill Drafting Commission, after which they will be submitted to you for final approval as to their practical operation.

In the event that no response to this letter is received on or before October 15th it will be assumed that so far as your office is concerned the present state of the laws affecting it is satisfactory and that you have no recommendations to make for legislative relief during the coming session.

We are anxious to have this appeal placed upon the calendar of the Sinking Fund Committee's hearings, and taking this opportunity of thanking you for past kindnesses, I am, respectfully,

*The Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, New York City:*

Gentlemen—At a meeting held on July 25, 1918, the following communication was referred to the Commissioner of Plant and Structures for investigation and report:

"The New York State Commission for the Blind, July 18, 1918.

*To the Commissioners of the City Sinking Fund, Municipal Building, New York City:*

Gentlemen—it has become necessary for this Commission to have additional space in its administrative office in the Hall of Records Building. On investigation, I have learned that a room in the basement of this building now used as a storeroom may possibly be available for renting. This room might be of service to us if satisfactory terms can be arranged. Would it be possible to give us information on this matter at an early date? Respectfully,

Report.

The room referred to is designated as No. 5. It is located on the north or Reade street side of the building and is directly accessible to that street. It is located over the boiler plant, however, and for that reason cannot be used for other than storage purposes.

At present the Bureau of Weights and Measures has temporarily stored several

miscellaneous measures and discarded material which it will remove whenever notified to do so.

The Public Administrator has also stored in this room filing boxes and other miscellaneous material. There is room, however, in their present quarters for most of this material, and if a small amount of space in the west side of Room No. 5 is assigned to them it would answer all their needs.

At present the President, Borough of Manhattan, has also stored in this room a number of old copy books of the Department of Public Works. There is room on the top floor of the Hall of Records for these books in a space already used for the storage of similar records.

This room has not been definitely assigned to any of the above occupants by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, and is therefore available for assignment.

The Secretary of the Commission for the Blind states that there is available \$300 in their budget for renting purposes.

The room contains 840 square feet. If a space three feet wide on the west side of the room is assigned to the Public Administrator for filing and storage purposes the Secretary states that the remaining area would be sufficient for the Commission's requirements.

I therefore recommend for your consideration the following resolutions, that:

(1) To the Public Administrator, 108 square feet on the west side of Room No. 5, in the basement of the Hall of Records for storage and filing purposes, be assigned.

(2) That the Comptroller be authorized to execute a lease with the State Commission for the Blind, for the 732 square feet remaining in this room, at an annual rental of \$300 a year for the first year, and at whatever rate he may determine fair and reasonable for further extension of the lease. **To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:**

Gentlemen—I, the undersigned, beg leave to apply to your Honorable body for the privilege of erecting a booth and vending therein cigars, candy, etc., within the colonnade of the Municipal Building, occupying space against the wall at or near Tryon Row and Park Row corner, as shown on plan submitted with this application.

If your Honors will approve this plan, I propose to erect a booth which will enhance the appearance of the entrance, and, as the plans and specifications show, will be erected of the finest material that money can produce and will cost approximately twenty-one hundred dollars.

I offer for this privilege, the sum of eighteen hundred dollars per annum, payable in equal monthly installments, for a term of five years, and twenty-one hundred dollars per annum for the following five years.

I believe that a stand such as I propose would be of great convenience to the City's employees in the Municipal Building and to the many thousands of people who have occasion to use the subway trains at the stations underneath the building. This application is made pursuant to the provisions of section 221A of the Greater New York Charter, which provides that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York, upon the written certificate of the Comptroller of said City approving the same, may, in their discretion, and upon such terms as they may deem proper, by a unanimous vote cancel and annul all taxes, assessments and water rents, and sales to said City of any and all of the same, which at the time said section became a law were, or might thereafter become, a lien against any real estate owned by any corporation entitled to exemption of such real estate owned by it from local taxation under article 1, section 4, subdivision 7 of the Tax Law, which was the actual owner of such real estate and entitled to such exemption during the time when the taxes, assessments or water rents, from which it seeks relief, accrued and became liens thereupon.

It appears from the petition submitted, which is duly verified, that the petitioner is a corporation incorporated under the Laws of the State of New York, and is the owner in fee simple of the above described premises, having acquired the same in the years 1866, 1869 and 1890; that it has owned the above described premises continuously since said dates and is still the owner thereof, and that the same now are and have always been exempt from local taxation, under said provision of the Tax Law, during the periods when the liens hereinafter set forth accrued. Said premises are used as follows:

For maintaining a home, elementary and trade schools and playgrounds for children committed by the courts to its care, between the ages of seven and sixteen years, wherein they are supported, educated and instructed in useful trades and employments; also for those children who may be entrusted to said corporation for protection or reformation by their parents or guardians; also for those children who may be transferred to said corporation at the option of the Commissioners of Charities and Correction.

It appears from an examination of the Assessment Rolls that all of the parcels above described have been exempt from local taxation for the year 1912 and since, except as to lot 88, block 3946; lot 60, block 3960, and lots 60 and 66, block 3961, all of which were exempt in 1914 and have been since, and the aggregate valuation for the year 1916 of the various parcels included herein is \$1,370,200.

In a communication dated January 18, 1916, from C. Rockland Tyng, Esq., Secretary of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, to the Comptroller, relating to the various parcels of property hereinbefore described, Mr. Tyng states as follows:

"The properties marked exempt were so marked because they either were occupied by the buildings of the Protectory or were used for grounds and for raising produce for the use of the institution.

"In 1911 there was a project on hand to sell a number of the parcels named, and they were consequently assessed. The project was abandoned and the property reverted to the uses of the institution."

**COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.**

**Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in the Mayor's Reception Room, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M. on Saturday, September 28, 1918.**

Present—John F. Hylan, Mayor; Charles L. Craig, Comptroller; Alfred J. Johnson, Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

**Federal Government—Assignment to, of North Brother Island, with Buildings and Appurtenances Thereon, Together with Three Boats, Turned Over by the Health Department.**

The following was received from the Commissioner of Health:

September 27, 1918.

Hon. JOHN KORB, Secretary, Commissioner of the Sinking Fund, Municipal Building, Borough of Manhattan:

Sir—I am forwarding herewith in accordance with the directions of the Board of Health, a resolution adopted by the Board at a meeting thereof held on September

27, 1918, providing for the transfer of the land, buildings and appurtenances now under the jurisdiction and control of the Department, located on North Brother Island, heretofore used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons suffering from infectious diseases, and the boats known as the "Franklin Edson," the "Pelham" and the "Duchess," used for the transportation of such patients from different parts of The City of New York to North Brother Island, back to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The action taken by the Board in making such transfer was in response to an urgent appeal made by the United States Government to the City authorities requesting the use of North Brother Island for the duration of the war, in order that adequate facilities might be immediately provided for the isolation, care and treatment of men in the Federal Service affected with certain infectious diseases. A careful and comprehensive study of all the hospital facilities available and now used for the care of cases of infectious disease established to the satisfaction of the members of the Board of Health and the officials of the Department of Health that there are sufficient other available hospital facilities to care for all cases of infectious diseases which may hereafter occur in The City of New York. The Board has, therefore, determined that temporary transfer of North Brother Island and hospital buildings and facilities and of the three boats referred to will not deprive the citizens of The City of New York of that degree of protection against the spread of disease during the duration of the war, and a reasonable period thereafter necessary to conserve the public health, provided that the conditions proscribed in the resolution are complied with by the Federal Government, which conditions the representatives of the Federal Government have signified their willingness to have made a condition of the transfer.

The Board has certified in the resolution that the Department of Health will not require North Brother Island, its buildings and appurtenances or the boats known as the "Franklin Edson," the "Pelham" and the "Duchess," and respectfully urges your Honorable Board to immediately consider the action taken in turning the same back to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in order that the same may be assigned to the Federal Government for the duration of the war to be used for the care and treatment of men in the Federal Military Service.

I wish to add my personal appeal to that of the Federal authorities, and in support of the action taken by the Board of Health, and would request that your Honorable Body give the matter its immediate attention. Very truly yours,

Sir—At a meeting of the Board of Health of the Department of Health, held on the 27th day of September, 1918, the following resolution was adopted:

Whereas, The United States Army, acting through its Medical Department, has presented an urgent appeal to the Commissioner of Health to have the land, buildings and appurtenances located on North Brother Island, now under the supervision and control of the Department of Health and used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, and the boats, Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, used for the transportation of such persons to and from North Brother Island, transferred to the Federal Government for the duration of the war, in order that the same may be used and employed for the care, treatment and transportation of men in the Federal military service affected with infectious diseases; and

Whereas, The City of New York is anxious to be of the greatest possible service to the Federal Government consistent with its duty and obligations; and

Whereas, This Board, having given due consideration to the needs and requirements of the Department of Health in providing for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases in The City of New York during the period of the war, has determined that the land, buildings and appurtenances on North Brother Island and the boats, Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, would not be essential to the needs of the Department and the protection of public health for the duration of the war and eighteen (18) months thereafter, provided that the conditions set forth in the following resolutions are accepted by the Federal Government, it was, therefore,

Resolved, That the President of the Board be and is hereby directed to notify the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York that the Department of Health will not, for the period of the war and eighteen (18) months thereafter, require the land, buildings and appurtenances now under supervision and control, located on North Brother Island, and used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, or the boats, Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, used for the transportation of such persons to and from North Brother Island; and be it further

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to assign to the Federal Government for its use during the period of the war and for eighteen (18) months thereafter North Brother Island and the buildings and appurtenances now under the jurisdiction and control of the Department of Health, used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, and the boats Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess used for the transportation of such persons to North Brother Island, such assignment, however, to be upon the following conditions:

1. That North Brother Island and all of its buildings shall be given over to the National Government for the period of the war and for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months thereafter.

2. That at the expiration of the governmental use of North Brother Island, the buildings and equipment shall be returned to the City of New York in as good condition as when received; that any new buildings erected on North Brother Island shall be situated and erected where and in a manner satisfactory to the City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, and all such new buildings shall be the property of the City of New York.

3. That the Government of the United States shall immediately erect at Otisville a building, blue prints of which are already prepared and which is known as the Infirmary Building, in the manner originally planned and satisfactory to the City of New York, acting by its Board of Health. This building is to be erected on the foundation already laid and to be finished, complete in plumbing and fixtures, at a maximum cost of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to the City of New York forthwith the said sum of the two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

4. That the grounds of the institution known as the Louisa Minturn Hospital, or at the option of the City, Pavilion No. 3 at Kingston avenue, to be used for the forced-in venereal patients, shall be enclosed immediately by a fence, granite base and iron superstructure, of sufficient height to restrain the inmates, at a maximum cost of six thousand dollars (\$6,000); or if such a fence, granite base and iron superstructure is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to the City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in cash, and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

5. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately a wooden or temporary fence, cutting off the tuberculosis service of the buildings now located on the grounds of Kingston Avenue Hospital, and shall install a new floor in the building at Kingston avenue, called the "Old Diet Kitchen," these two items to cost not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or if such repairs are not made by the United States Government it shall pay to the City of New York forthwith said sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash, and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

6. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately on the grounds of Willard Parker Hospital a laundry building satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, completely furnished with laundry machinery, together with such additional boilers as may be necessary to operate the same, all of sufficient capacity to take care of the patients and staff of the Willard Parker Hospital, at a maximum cost of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000); or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay forthwith to The City of New York the said sum of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000) in cash, and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

7. The Government shall make such internal changes in the Minturn Hospital immediately as will fit it for its new uses, at a cost not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000); or if such changes are not made by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars

(\$6,000) in cash, and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction. 8. That The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, shall turn over to the United States Government the boats known as the "Franklyn Edson," the "Pelham" and the "Duchess," to be used under the same terms and conditions as the buildings upon North Brother Island.

9. All such equipment as may be needed by The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, to provide for the proper care of City patients usually sent to North Brother Island, shall be removed from the Island to such other buildings as may be determined upon by the City, acting by its Board of Health; all remaining equipment shall be turned over to the Government as per inventory; all stores and supplies except coal, shall be returned to the City, or paid for by the Government; all coal on the Island, when it is turned over, shall be taken by the Government at the market price.

10. So far as possible, the Government shall take over the light, heat and power employees, the clerks, laboring force and boat crews.

"Whereas, This Board, having given due consideration to the needs and requirements of the Department of Health in providing for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases in The City of New York during the period of the war, has determined that the land, buildings and appurtenances on North Brother Island, and the boats Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess would not be essential to the needs of the Department and the protection of public health for the duration of the war and eighteen (18) months thereafter, provided that the conditions set forth in the following resolutions are accepted by the Federal Government; it was therefore

"Resolved, That the President of the Board be and is hereby directed to notify the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York that the Department of Health will not for the period of the war and eighteen (18) months thereafter require the land, buildings and appurtenances now under supervision and control, located on North Brother Island, and used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, or the boats Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, used for the transportation of such persons to and from North Brother Island; and be it further

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be requested to assign to the Federal Government for its use during the period of the war and for eighteen (18) months thereafter North Brother Island and the buildings and appurtenances now under the jurisdiction and control of the Department of Health, used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, and the boats Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, used for the transportation of such persons to North Brother Island, such assignment, however, to be upon the following conditions:

"1. That North Brother Island and all of its buildings shall be given over to the National Government for the period of the war and for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months thereafter.

"2. That at the expiration of the governmental use of North Brother Island the buildings and equipment shall be returned to The City of New York in as good condition as when received; that any new buildings erected on North Brother Island shall be situated and erected where and in a manner satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, and all such new buildings shall be the property of The City of New York.

"3. That the Government of the United States shall immediately erect at Otisville a building, blueprints of which are already prepared and which is known as the Infirmary Building, in the manner originally planned and satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health. This building is to be erected on the foundation already laid and to be finished, complete in plumbing and fixtures, at a maximum cost of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

"4. That the grounds of the institution known as the Louisa Minturn Hospital, or at the option of the City, Pavilion No. 3 at Kingston avenue, to be used for the forced-in venereal patients, shall be enclosed immediately by a fence, granite base and iron superstructure of sufficient height to restrain the inmates, at a maximum cost of six thousand dollars (\$6,000); or if such a fence, granite base and iron superstructure is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

"5. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately a wooden or temporary fence, cutting off the tuberculosis service of the buildings now located on the grounds of Kingston Avenue Hospital, and shall install a new floor in the building at Kingston avenue, called the 'Old Diet Kitchen,' these two items to cost not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000); or if such repairs are not made by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith said sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

"6. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately on the grounds of Willard Parker Hospital a laundry building satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, completely furnished with laundry machinery together with such additional boilers as may be necessary to operate the same, all of sufficient capacity to take care of the patients and staff of the Willard Parker Hospital, at a maximum cost of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000); or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay forthwith to The City of New York the said sum of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

"7. The Government shall make such internal changes in the Minturn Hospital immediately as will fit it for its new uses, at a cost not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000), or if such changes are not made by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

"8. That The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, shall turn over to the United States Government the boats known as the Franklyn Edson, the Pelham and the Duchess, to be used under the same terms and conditions as the buildings upon North Brother Island.

"9. All such equipment as may be needed by The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, to provide for the proper care of City patients usually sent to North Brother Island shall be removed from the Island to such other buildings as may be determined upon by the City, acting by its Board of Health; all remaining equipment shall be turned over to the Government as per inventory; all stores and supplies, except coal, shall be returned to the City, or paid for by the Government; all coal on the Island, when it is turned over, shall be taken by the Government, at the market price.

"10. So far as possible, the Government shall take over the light, heat and power employees, the clerks, laboring force and boat crews."

And Whereas, The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund having in mind the necessity of co-operating with the Federal authorities in every way possible in order to bring about a successful and speedy termination of the war, and that it appears that the United States Government is in imperave need of the property, and that the well being of The City of New York will be greatly promoted thereby; it is

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby assign to the Federal Government for its use, during the period of the war and for eighteen

months thereafter, North Brother Island and the buildings and appurtenances thereon now under the jurisdiction and control of the Department of Health, used for the isolation, care and treatment of persons affected with infectious diseases, together with the boats Franklyn Edson, Pelham and Duchess, used for the transportation of such persons to and from North Brother Island, upon the following conditions:

1. That North Brother Island and all of its buildings shall be given over to the National Government for the period of the war and for a period not to exceed eighteen (18) months thereafter.

2. That at the expiration of the governmental use of North Brother Island the buildings and equipment shall be returned to The City of New York in as good condition as when received; that any new buildings erected on North Brother Island shall be situated and erected where and in a manner satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, and all such new buildings shall be the property of The City of New York.

3. That the Government of the United States shall immediately erect at Otisville a building, blueprints of which are already prepared and which is known as the Infirmary Building, in the manner originally planned and satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health. This building is to be erected on the foundation already laid and to be finished, complete in plumbing and fixtures, at a maximum cost of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

4. That the grounds of the institution known as the Louisa Minturn Hospital, or at the option of the City, Pavilion No. 3 at Kingston avenue, to be used for the forced-in venereal patients, shall be enclosed immediately by a fence, granite base and iron superstructure, of sufficient height to restrain the inmates, at a maximum cost of six thousand dollars (\$6,000), or if such a fence, granite base and iron superstructure is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

5. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately a wooden or temporary fence, cutting off the tuberculosis service of the buildings now located on the grounds of Kingston Avenue Hospital, and shall install a new floor in the building at Kingston avenue, called the 'Old Diet Kitchen,' these two items to cost not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000), or if such repairs are not made by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith said sum of one thousand dollars (\$1,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

6. That the Government of the United States shall erect immediately on the grounds of Willard Parker Hospital a laundry building satisfactory to The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, completely furnished with laundry machinery together with such additional boilers as may be necessary to operate the same, all of sufficient capacity to take care of the patients and staff of the Willard Parker Hospital, at a maximum cost of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000), or if such building is not erected by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of one hundred and seventy thousand dollars (\$170,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

7. The Government shall make such internal changes in the Minturn Hospital immediately as will fit it for its new uses, at a cost not to exceed six thousand dollars (\$6,000), or if such changes are not made by the United States Government, it shall pay to The City of New York forthwith the said sum of six thousand dollars (\$6,000) in cash and procure the necessary priority and other orders for construction.

8. That The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, shall turn over to the United States Government the boats known as the Franklyn Edson, the Pelham and the Duchess, to be used under the same terms and conditions as the buildings upon North Brother Island.

9. All such equipment as may be needed by The City of New York, acting by its Board of Health, to provide for the proper care of City patients usually sent to North Brother Island shall be removed from the Island to such other buildings as may be determined upon by the City, acting by its Board of Health; all remaining equipment shall be turned over to the Government as per inventory; all stores and supplies, except coal, shall be returned to the City, or paid for by the Government; all coal on the Island, when it is turned over, shall be taken by the Government, at the market price.

10. So far as possible, the Government shall take over the light, heat and power employees, the clerks, laboring force and boat crews.

Which resolution was unanimously adopted.



## PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION, FIRST DISTRICT.

September 19, 1918.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York:

The Public Service Commission for the First District, in pursuance of a resolution of the Commission adopted on September 19, 1918, transmits to you herewith, and as a part hereof, a requisition in the sum of one million, seven hundred and twenty-four thousand, five hundred and eighty-six dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,724,586.48), which is the estimated amount requisite and necessary to enable the said Public Service Commission for the First District to do and perform, or cause to be done and performed, the duties in the said laws prescribed, and to provide for the expenses and compensation of the employees of the said Commission for the year ending December 31, 1919.

Our expenditures this year to September 15, 1918, total one million, five hundred and ninety-five thousand, nine hundred and thirty-two dollars and eighty-six cents (\$1,595,932.86), and our total expenditures from city funds for the current year will be approximately two million, one hundred and thirty thousand dollars (\$2,130,000), as compared with three million and forty-one thousand dollars (\$3,041,000) appropriated for the year 1917. The estimated reduction in our expenditures from city funds for the next year as compared with this year is four hundred and five thousand, four hundred and thirteen dollars and fifty-two cents (\$405,413.52), and, as compared with the year 1917, one million, three hundred and sixteen thousand, four hundred and thirteen dollars and fifty-two cents (\$1,316,413.52).

The matter of our requirements for the year beginning January 1, 1919, has been the subject of intensive study and conference with representatives of your Board, and as a result of such study a distribution of such sum of one million, seven hundred and twenty-four thousand, five hundred and eighty-six dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,724,586.48) has been arrived at as follows:

In connection with the request for the appropriation of one hundred and forty-three thousand, seven hundred and thirty dollars (\$143,730) for General Administration; of one hundred and seventeen thousand, two hundred and seventy-eight dollars (\$117,278) for the Bureau of Rapid Transit Operation, and of thirty-thousand dollars (\$33,000) for the Law Department, there are attached hereto schedules prepared along the same lines as those used for General Administration and the Bureau of Audit and Control during the current year. In this connection it is desired to change the designation of the Bureau of Audit and Control to that of the Bureau of Rapid Transit Operations.

In connection with the request for the appropriation of one million, one hundred and eighteen thousand, seven hundred and fifty-eight dollars (\$1,118,758) for personal service in the Engineering Department and of one hundred and nineteen thousand, eight hundred and fifty-one dollars (\$119,851) for personal service in the Bureau of Electrical Equipment and Inspection, there is submitted for your approval, as best calculated to insure the satisfactory handling of this matter, having in mind the extraordinary conditions existing relative to changes in our engineering staff, a group schedule prepared along the same plan as that used during the present year, as follows:

The schedules hereinabove referred to are based on the continuance of the arrangement made for the present year, i. e., that within the groups outlined above, promotions and other changes will continue to be made by this Commission in connection with its existing rules and procedure without further action by your Board, the total amount set opposite each group not to be exceeded for the year and it being further understood that there will be submitted to your Board monthly a statement covering all promotions and changes in salary made by the Commission. The manner in which such total sum of one million, seven hundred and twenty-four thousand, five hundred and eighty-six dollars and forty-eight cents (\$1,724,586.48) shall be appropriated, whether in bulk or installments, is submitted for the determination of your board with the suggestion that this can feasibly be done in four installments, the amount of each such installment to be worked out, as the year progresses, with your Board or its representatives, and to include such lump sum appropriation for the payment of salaries to men absent on military duty as may be necessary.

It is requested that this requisition be acted upon at such time in the near future as will render available as of January 1, 1919, the funds necessary for the carrying on of the work of supervising the construction under outstanding construction contracts aggregating over seventy million dollars (\$70,000,000), the preparation of contract plans and detail plans on contracts under way and to be let, the legalization, if found advisable and necessary, of additional rapid transit routes, the supervision of the plans, contracts and operations of the two operating companies under the dual system, the expenses necessary in the acquisition of real estate and other rights necessary to rapid transit construction and the handling of such additional matters as may come up because of the war and other conditions. Resolved, That the Chairman and the Secretary of the Public Service Commission for the First District be, and they hereby are, authorized, in the name and in behalf of the said Commission, to make requisition on the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in the form now presented, for the sum of one million, seven hundred and twenty-four thousand, five hundred and eighty-six and forty-eight one-hundred dollars (\$1,724,586.48) on account for the year ending December 31, 1919, the amount of which is requisite and necessary to enable the Public Service Commission for the First District to do and perform, or cause to be done and performed, the duties for the said Commission prescribed, and to provide on account for the expenses and compensation of the employees of the said Commission for the year ending December 31, 1919, and to execute and sign such requisition for the said sum and the communication therewith presented as a part thereof, stating the purposes for which the said moneys are required.

HUNTER COLLEGE RETIREMENT SYSTEM.

September 26, 1918.

*Hon. JOSEPH HAAG, Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:*  
Dear Sir—In accordance with chapter 584 of the Laws of 1918, I send you in this letter a statement of the amounts required to be paid by The City of New York into the various funds of the Hunter College Retirement System to cover the requirements for the fiscal year 1919.

Up to the present time it has been impossible to make the actuarial valuations ordinarily required before the estimate is submitted, because the system has been in operation for a period of less than two months and the records have not been verified.

The following items are therefore requested without the submission of the detail figures in substantiation which will ordinarily be available:

Pension Reserve Fund No. 2.....	\$5,000 00
Contingent Reserve Fund.....	1,100 00
Expense Fund .....	2,000 00
Total .....	\$8,100 00

The request for the Pension Reserve Fund No. 2 covers the actual amounts which will be needed to pay the pensions of those teachers now in the service who will probably be on the retirement roll during the year 1919.

The amount requested for the Contingent Reserve Fund covers the mandatory contributions which the City will probably be called upon to make on account of the salaries of teachers appointed after August 1, 1918.

The amount requested for the Expense Fund carries with it the understanding that we will receive the courteous assistance from your staff which has been furnished during the year 1918, and that the time of the employees engaged in the Hunter College System will be charged against the \$2,000 requested.

Therefore the Hunter College respectfully requests that the following resolutions be adopted by the Board of Estimate in connection with the appropriations allowed for the Expense Fund.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to chapter 584 of the Laws of 1918, section 1, subdivision B4, hereby approves of the employment of permanent or temporary employees, under the jurisdiction of the Hunter College Retirement Board, to assist in the establishment and routine administration of the Hunter College Teachers' Retirement System, at a compensation not in excess of five dollars per diem; also of the purchase of such equipment, supplies and printing and the payment of such contingency expenses as shall be necessary; such amounts to be paid out of the Expense Fund created on this date by this Board, by an appropriation of two thousand dollars (\$2,000) in special revenue bonds;

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes its Secretary to arrange for the performance by the pension force of the Board, of the actuarial, clerical and accounting work of administering the Teachers' Retirement System of Hunter College, the appropriation funds of the Board to be reimbursed to the extent of the actual cost to it of the services of its employees so utilized, and of the requisite supplies, equipment, etc., devoted to this purpose by a bookkeeping transfer of the charge to the Expense Fund established to-day by resolution of this Board.

Trusting that the delay in forwarding this estimate which reports a new item for inclosure in the budget has not caused you any inconvenience, I remain,
