A report dated April 23 was presented from the Chief Clerk relative to the service ratings of employees of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures for the periods ending August 31 and December 31, 1917. The service ratings were referred to Commissioner Drennan.

A memorandum dated April 4 was presented from Burns Gillam, Examiner, submitting names of expert examiners for practical tests for positions in the Labor Class. The matter was referred to the President.

A communication dated May 2 was presented from the Commissioner of Public Markets requesting approval of the employment of C. A. Mewborn as Expert Buyer of Produce, under Rule XII, clause 8. The Secretary was instructed to request a representative of the Department of Public Markets to appear before the Commission on Wednesday, May 8, 1918.

After consideration of a request dated April 18 from the Commissioner of Accounts the Secretary was instructed to advertise a public hearing for Wednesday, May 8, 1918, on the proposed amendment of the classification by including in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Commissioner of Accounts," the following: 2 Stenographers to the Commissioner.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of clause 6-a of Rule XII of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, Jonathan Waterbury, of 741 97th st., Woodhaven, Borough of Queens, be and he is hereby excepted from examination for employment in the Department of Taxes and Assessments to furnish information as to conveyances, auction sales, etc., in the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx; provided, however, that his total compensation shall not exceed \$750 in any one year.

A communication dated April 17 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities stating that, pending the adoption of the new non-competitive classification, no action had been taken on the increased salary rates for the position of Deckhand, which appeared in the classification at \$720 per annum, with maintenance, and requesting that these employees be paid at the rate of \$900 per annum, taking advantage of the allowance, under the Civil Service Rules, of \$180 per annum to non-competitive class employees in lieu of maintenance. The request was granted.

After consideration of a communication dated April 20 from the Commissioner of Public Charities, the Commission reconsidered its action in disapproving the provisional employment of George B. Schmidt as Assistant Pathologist at \$1,740 per annum and of Mildred Fish as Pathologist at \$1,440 per annum in the Department of Public Charities, and authorized such appointments under Rule XII, clause 3. The Secretary was instructed to request the Acting Chief Examiner to submit a report as to the necessity of a medical degree in the open competitive examination for Pathologist, and, on motion, it was

A letter dated April 20 was presented from the Commissioner of Public Charities stating, in connection with the action of the Commission in disapproving the appointment of Henry S. Rubin as Assistant Physician at the rate of \$900 per annum, that under a law just passed it was not required that physicians employed in the City's hospitals should have a license to practice medicine in the State of New York. The Secretary was instructed to certify the payroll of Dr. Rubin under the special certificate, pending the receipt of an opinion from the Corporation Counsel.

A communication dated April 16 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities explaining that the employment of Sadie Dermody as Stenographer and Typewriter from April 4 to April 30 had been made necessary by the fact that it was impossible to obtain a Stenographer and Typewriter from the eligible list and that her services from March 1 to April 4 had not been continuous. The Secretary was instructed to certify the payroll under a special certificate.

A communication dated April 16 was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Public Charities stating that the notification of the resignation of Ralph Renwood from the position of Fireman at the Metropolitan Hospital on Jan. 8 was an error, as this employee had been unable to report for duty and had furnished a doctor's certificate to that effect. After consideration of a communication dated April 17 from the Secretary to the Mayor notifying the Commission of the disapproval by the Mayor of the increase in

the salary of Lawrence V. Meehan, Superintendent of Construction, Repairs and Supplies in the Armory Board, the request for such increase in salary was disapproved.

A communication dated April 19 was presented from the General Medical Superintendent of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals stating that by action of the Board of Trustees the appointment of George Hohman on Nov. 1, 1918, had been made retroactive from April 1, 1917, and the appointment of Joseph Martoccio on Nov. 1, 1917, had been made retroactive from Oct. 1, 1917, for the reason that both had been assigned to service and actually performed work since those dates. The request that the supplemental payrolls covering the intervening periods be certified was denied.

### Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held on Thursday, July 18, 1918, at 2 p. m.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President in the chair; Messrs. O'Keeffe, Sachs, Stern, Wright and Farley, Trustees. Excused: Mr. Paulding, Trustee; and Mr. Coler, Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities, ex-officio.

The shortage of employees continues to be a very serious matter at all the hos-

pitals, particularly at Bellevue. I present, herewith, separately, a copy of a letter from Miss Hilliard, in which she urges that some action be taken in increasing the pay from the various grades, in order to obtain and retain employees.

Plans for the portable wards of Fordham Hospital, submitted to the Medical Board, have been returned approved, and are now waiting the sanction of the Board of Estimate for the expenditure of the money.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken

upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The subject of the shortage of employees and the need of providing increased pay for such employees in the budget for 1918 was referred to the Budget Committee, Mr. O'Keeffe and Mr. Sachs. At the same time the General Medical Superintendent was authorized to transfer funds from accruals to provide for increases in the pay of employees, such increases to be consistent with the rules of the Civil Service Commission and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

#### COMMITTEE REPORTS.

The President referred to the feasibility of acquiring the triangular piece of property at the foot of E. 26th st., between 25th and 26th sts., now occupied by the firm of Candee, Smith & Holland, regarding which the Trustees have made inquiries for a number of years. He called attention to the necessity of the need of this plot, which is essential for the future development of the Training School for Nurses and also to the fire hazard to the Nurses' residence, due to the wooden sheds on the plot. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to ask the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries for his co-operation to obtain this property at the expiration of the present period of the license, which is May 1, 1919, and to make a formal request to the Sinking Fund Commission for the land before that time.

Dr. Brannan presented a letter from the Public Health Committee of the New York Academy of Medicine reporting that the Rockefeller Foundation has appropriated the sum of \$10,000 to them for the purpose of making a study and formulating plans for immediate application and for the future development of dispensaries and out patient departments in the City of New York, and inquiring whether the out patient departments at Bellevue and its allied hospitals should be included in the study. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve this request.

Dr. Brannan referred to a copy of a letter sent to Surgeon General Gorgas by Dr. Goldwater, under date of July 11, regarding the training of Nurses' Aids for war-time service, and suggested that consideration be given to the subject of providing such a course of training at Bellevue, as suggested in the letter. After discussion, it was resolved to establish a six months course for the training of Nurses' Aids to meet the needs of the army hospitals at home and in France, and in view of the urgency of the situation, it was requested that Dr. Brannan confer with Surgeon General Gorgas before taking up the subject formally with the Bellevue Training School for Nurses.

Dr. Brannan referred to the desirability of having the old morgue building at the foot of E. 26th st. removed. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to refer the subject to the President with power.

Consideration was given to a report, dated July 17, from the purchasing agent to the General Medical Superintendent calling attention to the probability of a serious coal situation for the year 1918. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to authorize the General Medical Superintendent to store as much coal as possible in available plots at Bellevue or at the allied hospitals, and also to authorize the purchase of the necessary coal handling equipment, provided the cost is within a reasonable amount.

A report was presented from the Chief Clerk and Auditor to the General Medical Superintendent under date of July 18, in regard to the deficits in the budget codes of the department. After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to request the Board of Estimate to authorize the transfer of \$10,800 from Code No. 3048, City Fund Salaries and Wages Accruals, to the appropriations of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals as follows: Code 2032, Bellevue Hospital, \$3,000; Code 2033, Gouverneur Hospital, \$3,000; Code 2034, Harlem Hospital, \$4,500; Code 2036, Neponsit Beach Hospital, \$300; total, \$10,800.

This request is made as the reduction of \$20,000 was made from the funds by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at the time of making the budget, 1918, as was anticipated that the accruals from Salaries, Regular Employees, would amount to this sum. Request was also made for the transfer of \$1,277.50 to Code No. 2064, Wages Temporary Employees, Gouverneur Hospital, which funds are necessary to pay for the wages of a Fireman and also for vacations for Engineers and Firemen at Gouverneur. Request was further made for the transfer of \$500 from Code No. 2073 for fuel supplies to Code No. 2078, Motor Vehicle Supplies, in which immediate funds are required.

Reference was made to the sudden death of Major John Purroy Mitchel, recently Mayor of The City of New York. In his death in the military service of his country, the nation and city have lost a faithful, public-spirited citizen, who has given unspiringly of his time and intellect to the duties of his office. As a public servant he typified what is best in American manhood.

The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals has learned with profound sorrow and regret of the untimely death of Major John Purroy Mitchel, recently Mayor of The City of New York. In his death in the military service of his country, the nation and city have lost a faithful, public-spirited citizen, who has given unspiringly of his time and intellect to the duties of his office. As a public servant he typified what is best in American manhood.

Therefore, be it Resolved, That the Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals extend to the family of Major Mitchel their heartfelt sympathy in the loss they have suffered, and be it.

Further Resolved, That a copy of these resolutions be sent to them.

Consideration was given to the preparation of the departmental estimate for 1919, and the Budget Committee presented the following tentative estimates for supplies, etc.:

Equipment—Office, \$4,850; household, \$87,000; medical and surgical, \$45,000; motor vehicle, \$43,980; wearing apparel, \$75,000; general plant, \$30,000; total, \$1,457,410. Materials, \$25,000. Contract and Open Order Service—Repairs and replacements, \$75,000; motor vehicle repairs, \$12,000; shoeing and boarding horses, \$108; carriage, \$2,200; expressage and deliveries, \$35; telephone, \$9,500; telegraph, cable and messenger, \$500; general plant, \$3,500. Contingencies, \$1,125; total, \$129,968. Grand total, \$1,587,378.

The Committee further reported that the estimate for 1919 for salaries and wages would be as follows: General Administration, \$51,720; Bellevue Hospital, \$687,229.75; Gouverneur Hospital, \$112,235; Harlem Hospital, \$116,620; Fordham Hospital, \$99,772; Neponsit Beach Hospital, \$36,528; total, \$1,104,104.75.

The Budget Committee further reported that the total of the departmental estimate for 1919 would be \$2,691,422.75.

The Committee presented a detailed analysis showing the proposed increases in salaries which are made in general on a basis of 10 per cent. for those receiving maintenance and 20 per cent. for those without maintenance, with such adjustments and modifications as individual instances will merit. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To approve the report of the Budget Committee and refer the estimate to the President and Budget Committee with power for such minor amendments and revisions as may be deemed necessary.

#### COMMUNICATIONS.

Messrs. Jennings & John, contractors for the installation of screens at Forham Hospital, under date of July 8, presented a report for an extension of time to complete the contract, on account of freight delays. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, premised upon a report from the Acting Supervising Engineer, an extension of twenty-five days was granted to the contractor.

Charles J. Daly, contractor for the installation of the ash hoist at Harlem Hospital, under date of July 2, presented a request for an extension of sixty days' time on account of freight conditions and shortage of material and labor. On the recommendation of the architect, as set forth in a letter of July 3, and the Building Committee, this request was approved.

The John H. Parker Company having applied for the payment of the retained 2 per cent. on their contract for the construction of the new building for the Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital, an investigation was made by the Inspector of Construction and a report presented under date of July 12, and also one from McKim, Mead and White under date of July 16. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, premised upon these reports, the payment of the retained percentages was authorized.

A. W. King, contractor for the alteration work in connection with the reduction of fire hazards in the old building at Bellevue Hospital, under date of July 10, applied for payment of the retained 2 per cent., amounting to \$296.94, on his contract. On the recommendation of the Building Committee, premised upon a report from the architect under date of July 11, the payment was authorized.

A letter, dated July 15, was presented from J. J. McGrath, Chairman of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital, in regard to the plans for the portable wards, which were adopted by the Trustees and for which a request is pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to use as much of the funds appropriated for the roof wards as may be necessary.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.



### STATE INDUSTRIAL COMMISSION-DEPARTMENT OF LABOR.

#### Resolution Adopted.

Whereas, the Long Island Railroad, through its Federal Manager, Ralph Peters, has made application to this Commission for a variation from the provisions of section 8-a of the Labor Law, to permit the men employed by said railroad in its shops and engine houses at Long Island City and Morris Park, L. I., to work seven days per week; and

Whereas, investigation made by the Supervising Inspector in the district wherein said shops and engine houses are located shows that the work being done is not necessarily continuous; and

It appearing that the United States Railroad Administration, through its Counsel, John Barton Payne, has advised this Commission that the need of labor in the repair shops in connection with the operation of railroads is imperative, and has requested that such variation be granted; therefore be it

Resolved, by the State Industrial Commission, That the Long Island Railroad be granted a variation from the provisions of section 8-a of the Labor Law in so far as the same applies to the male adults employed by said railroad in its shops and engine houses at Long Island City and Morris Park, L.
