


## **Municipal Library Notes - June 2022 LGBTQ+ Pride Month**

### **Spotlight on: LGBTQ+ Pride Month**

During the month of June, we remember and celebrate the lives, sacrifices and triumphs of the LGBTQ+ community. The following are just some of the resources available on the **Government Publications Portal (GPP)**.

The recently published **2022 Lesbian**, **Gay**, **Bisexual**, **Transgender**, **Queer**, **and Gender Nonconforming Guide** is an important resource for the LGBTQ+ community. The guide, published by the NYC Comptroller Brad Lander's office, is a "comprehensive citywide directory of resources for LGBTQ+ communities." It lists programs and services over a wide range of subjects, including the arts, healthcare, housing, youth services, and many others.





#### **Municipal Reference Library Notes June 1922 Municipal Yearbooks**

Municipal Yearbooks were published by several municipalities to describe the organization of, and services provided by city governments to its citizens. They were considered an "essential service and important thing." The cities that published these yearbooks can be found in the Municipal Library Notes dated June 14, 1922, pictured below:



New York City published a Municipal Year Book starting in 1913 and discontinued it in 1916; similarly other cities ceased publication a few years later. The 1920 Report of Hon. John F. Hylan, Mayor of the City of New York, to the Board of Aldermen was considered an "adequate substitution" for the Year Book and can



The Office of the Mayor began publishing the Mayor's Management Report (MMR) in 1977. The **2021 MMR** can be found in the **Government Publications** Portal (GPP) that "provides the public with a permanent, searchable online repository of New York City government's publications."

The Society promotes and assists the Municipal Archives and Library in several important ways, by: enhancing the financial position of the Archives through fundraising; serving as the fiscal agent for special project grants; publicizing the existence of the Archives and its collections; and, promoting the Library and Archives within city government and among other cultural and academic

institutions.

As an entity entirely separate from city government, the Society can, and does, seek grant funds and donations from outside sources and channels it to the Archives for specific purposes such as purchasing special equipment, creating exhibitions, hiring consultants and the like.

One special program that the Society coordinates is "adopt a record." In this program, people "adopt" an important record in disrepair and make a contribution that covers the cost of repairing it. Notable successes include drawings for the Brooklyn Bridge and Central Park, a 1686 land patent, and volumes from the Board of Alderman collection. Learn more: https://bit.ly/AdoptNYCPast.
