employees and DOE visitors. With NYC CERT volunteers falling under the juristiction of NYC Emergency Management they must also follow the same guidelines and therefore as part of this policy change, NYC CERT volunteers are also no longer required to be vaccinated.

As you know, since the original mandate was put in place, a number of NYC CERT volunteers had stepped away from the program for a number of reasons. At this time we are asking that if you know of any members that are interested in returning to an active member status following no more than two years of inactivity (as per NYC CERT SOPs), please ask them to contact NYC CERT program staff. If a former member has been inactive for more than two years, the must reapply.

Join Us As We Celebrate



Black History Month is an annual celebration of achievements by African Americans and a time for recognizing their central role in U.S. history. Also known as African American History Month, the event grew out of "Negro History Week," the brainchild of historian Carter G. Woodson and other prominent African Americans in the 1920s. Since 1976, every U.S. president has officially designated the month of February as Black History Month. Other countries around the world, including Canada and the United Kingdom, also devote a month to celebrating Black history.

Harvard-educated historian, Carter G. Woodson, who believed that reason would prevail over prejudice, founded the Association of the Study of Negro Life and History (ASNLH). The organization created Negro History Week in 1925. The event was first celebrated during a week in February 1926 that encompassed the birthdays of both Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass.

By the time of Carter G. Woodson's death in 1950, Negro History Week had become a central part of African American life and substantial progress had been made in bringing more Americans to appreciate the celebration. At mid–century, mayors of cities nationwide issued proclamations noting Negro History Week. The Black Awakening of the 1960s dramatically expanded the consciousness of African Americans about the importance of Black history, and the Civil Rights movement focused Americans of all colors on the contributions of African Americans to our history and culture.

Keeping Homes Fire Safe



Whether you're a tenant or property owner, make sure you're aware of these six safety rules:



Close the Door

When escaping a fire in your home, always close the door. All residential buildings with 3 or more apartments must have self-closing doors.



Help your family escape from fire, and help first responders quickly access your home, by keeping exits free and clear of clutter or storage on fire escapes, hallways, and entrance doors including roof doors.



Smoke & CO Alarms

Property owners must provide & install smoke detectors. Detectors should be maintained by the tenant, including testing and replacing batteries.



Kitchen Safety

Keep the area around your stove clear of towels, papers, and potholders. Stand by your pan and never leave cooking food unattended, and enforce a kid-free zone around your stove.



Fire Escape Plan

Property owners must post plans on the inside of every apartment door, common area, and distribute them to each unit, to new tenants & annually.



Heating Safety
When using an electric space heater, never use an extension cord. Give space heaters at least 3 feet of space from combustible material such as bedding

Contact the property owner of your building if your front door doesn't self-close, you don't have a functional smoke alarm, obstacles block your exits that aren't your own, or you don't have the stove knob covers you need. If the issue is not corrected, you can register a complaint with 311.



This presentation will detail how drones were used during spring flooding in Eastern Nebraska for 2 years as a tool to conduct reconnaissance of rivers identifying ice jams and potential high-risk areas. This information was used by FEMA and the Army Corps of Engineers to develop strategies for flood mitigation. The drones were also used to conduct damage assessment in areas that were difficult to reach safely on the ground and to map potential hazardous materials.
