The number of reports thereon received from the inspectors was 820.

During the past week 88 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the sanitary and assistant sanitary inspectors for investigation

and assistant sanitary inspectors for investigation and report.

The disinfecting corps have visited 85 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 68 houses, 68 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

8 cases of small-pox were removed to the hospital and 1 dead body to the Morgue by the ambulance corps.

Permits were granted to consignees of 96 vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the health officer of this Port.

194 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy faults.

The following number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending May 30, 1874: Scarlet fever, 53; measles, 52; diptheria, 52; small-pox, 16; and cerebro spinal meningitis, 3.

653 loads of night soil were removed by the scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

During the week ending May 30, 1874, there were issued from this Bureau 483 burial permits for city deaths, 17 for bodies in transitu, and 41 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 483 deaths, 179 marriages, 385 births, 41 still-births, 17 applications for transit permits, and 48 returns from Coroners. There were 23 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 1 of marriage and 25 of death were issued from this Bureau. 3 cases of deaths were referred to coroners. referred to coroners.

Assistant Sanitary Superintendent Janes submitted a report on the condition of the life-saving apparatus along the water-side. After describing the present condition of the apparatus at the several piers, the report thus concludes: It will be seen that the apparatus in its necessarily exposed condition, has yielded not a little to the ordinary wear and tear resulting from time and use, besides sustaining a considerable amount of absolute loss; and here I will briefly amount of absolute loss; and neer I will offerly recapitulate the imperfect pieces. W. 24th street, ladder out of repair; W. 42d street, rope belonging to ladder missing; Pier 8, E. R., ladder broken; Pier 12, one hook broken from grappling pole; Pier 22, ladder slightly out of repair; E. 9th street, pole broken; E. 23d street, one hook broken from pole; E. 130th street,

The losses are as follows: Christopher street, grappling pole destroyed by fire at the burning of the ferry house and pier; Barclay street, heaving line lost, probably stolen; Pier I, E. R., ladder and heaving line lost with removal of the barge office; Pier 8, E. R., heaving line lost; Pike street, grappling pole and ladder lost. Of these last three pieces no account was obtained. Clinton street, heaving line lost by falling of the

bulkhead. From this it appears that one pole, one ladder, and two heaving lines have either been stolen or lost in the water, in some manner

unknown.

In absence of written memoranda, it is quite difficult to arrive at any positive information concerning the extent to which this apparatus has been employed during the year; but from the accounts received as based on the memory of watchmen, and others who are constantly employed at the several piers, we are able to arrive at a sufficient approximation to the truth, to show that it has on several occasions been the means employed in saving human life; and that its usefulness far outweighs the trouble and expense of keeping it in order. It also appears that most of the accidents which call it into use happen after nightfall, when the piers are comunknown. that most of the accidents which call it into use happen after nightfall, when the piers are comparatively deserted; for during the daytime, in the event of such an accident, the boatmen at many of the piers resort immediately, both from choice and convenience, to their own ropes and boat-hooks which they are more accustomed to handling, while the ferries are generally provided with some apparatus for the rescue of persons from the water.

It is not without some reason that a few per-

It is not without some reason that a few persons object to the use of the heaving line. The principal objections to its use are, that the float is too small to be readily seized by a person in the water; and that while throwing it there is some danger of stunning, should it, in the excitement of the moment, be so directed as to strike the head of the person to whom it is thrown. The life preservers provided by some of the ferry companies are regarded with more favor by many, as it is claimed that they may be thrown with less danger, are more readily seized by persons in the water, and are more buoyant than the wooden ball at the end of the heaving line. Be this as it may, all the rescues of which I could obtain any account were made by aid either of the pole or ladder, or both, and in no instance could I learn that the line had been used, though in previous years it has done good service; and yet it appears to me that it would be indispensable were the drowning person at any considerable distance from the pier or beyond reach of the grappling pole. The following is a brief recapitulation of the number of persons assisted from the water by its use during the year, according to the meagre accounts obtained at the several piers: W. Houston, two or three; Christopher, one man; W. 34th, several; W. 42d, several; Pier 2, E. R., one; Pier 8, several; Pier 22, one; Pier 24, two; Grand, one; E. 23d, one little girl; E. 26th, several, including two children; E. 130th, one man.

At each pier I obtained a promise that a written memorandum should be made of each instance in which any portion of the apparatus may be employed during the present year; but whether this promise will be observed or not remains to be seen.

In conclusion I would recommend that the imperfect pieces be collected and repaired; that those at Liberty, Barclay and W. 23d streets, be

remains to be seen.

In conclusion I would recommend that the imperfect pieces be collected and repaired; that those at Liberty, Barclay and W. 23d streets, be removed, and placed where they will be more useful than they are as at present located; that Pier I, E. R., be provided with a ladder and a heaving line; that the pier at the foot of E. 9th street be provided with a pole; and that the pier at the foot 11th street, pier of the Harlem boatbe provided with a ladder and heaving line.

I would also repeat here the recommendations which I made last year, that officers on duty at these several piers be instructed in the manipulations necessary for resuscitating drowning persons; and that cards of the proper size, containing printed directions for resuscitating, be distributed to the more frequented piers, and so posted as to be easily read; and that such cards be also distributed to ferry houses, and to such police stations as may be without them.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

To the Secretary of the Board of Health:

SIR: In the week ending on Saturday, May 30th, the number of deaths reported in this city amounts to 484, against 452 reported, and 459 actually occurring during the previous week. The last two weeks in May this year indicate as favorable a condition of public health as ever has been presented by the mortuary records at this period of the year. The third week in May was marked by the least mortality of any week in the past twelve months.

The deaths by diphtheria and scarlatina continue to be in excess of previous years at this season. In some dwellings there has been extreme fatality from diphtheria. In one family, on West 38th street, near Seventh avenue, four children died from that malady in four successive days last week. There were 44 deaths caused by these two maladies during the week.

The death-rate, the third week in May, was equal to 22-95 per 1,000 annually, and last week was at 24.20. The rate in London the second week in May, was equal to 20 per 1,000 annually.

The rate in London the second week in May, was equal to 20 per 1,000 annuweek in May, was equal to 20 per 1,000; in Glasgow, 29; in Dublin, 24; in Liverpool, 29; Manchester, 31; Paris, 22; and in Berlin, the first week ending May 9th, 28; in Munich, 37; and in Vienna, 29 per 1,000. Statistical returns from few American cities reach us in time for a weekly comparison of returns from can cities reach us in time for a weekly comparison, but the comparison of returns from several of them, for the last four weeks of April, reads as follows: In Washington, 16.40 per 1,000; Baltimore, 21.44; Buffalo, 17.55; Chicago, 15.18; Memphis, 35.60; Dayton, 21.26; Philadelphia, 20.23; Brooklyn, 23.89; Boston, 29.52; and in New York, for same period, 27.38 per 1,000 yearly.

AN ORDINANCE to provide for the killing of Dogs in the City of New York.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section I. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to Section 1. Hereafter it shall not be lawful to permit any dog to go abroad loose, or at large, in any of the streets, lanes, alleys, where not enclosed, highways, parks, piers or public places within the corporate limits of the City of New York, unless the head of every such dog shall be encased in a wire muzzle sufficiently large to cover the head entirely, but so constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to persent the state of the state of the constructed as to admit of the dog opening its mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to persent the state of t mouth to the fullest extent, and in no case to permit the nose of the dog to protrude; the muzzle to be securely fastened around the throat and behind the ears of every such dog, under a penalty of three dollars for each offence, to be recovered to the owner prosessor, or person who haragainst the owner, possessor, or person who har-bored such dog within three days previous to the time of such dog being so found going abroad

loose or at large.

Such dogs, when so captured and delivered as aforesaid, if not claimed by the owner thereof, or any other person, withby the owner thereof, or any other person, within a period of 48 hours thereafter shall, within six hours after the expiration of the time, be killed and destroyed in such manner as may be determined upon by the Mayor. The person authorized to pay for the capture of such dogs shall render under oath, semi-monthly, a statement of all dogs so captured and killed, and the amount paid therefor, to the Mayor of this city, who shall thereupon certify the same to the Comptroller, when a warrant for the amount shall be drawn in favor of the said. Mayor for the sum thus expended, which shall be paid, until otherwise ordered, from the appropriation for the City Contingencies."

All money paid for fines for violation of Section 1 of this Ordinance, and for redemption of dogs as provided in Section 2, shall be retained by the Mayor and applied to the payment of the expenses of enforcing the provisions of this ordinance, but a statement showing the aggregate amount thus received shall be submitted quarterly to the Comptroller of the City of New York.

Sec. 5. The provisions of this Ordinance shall apply only to dogs owned or claimed by resi-

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows: SECTION 1. 8 4. The board of aldermen now in office shall hold office until the first Monday in January, in the year eighteen h indred and seventy-five, the same being the term for which they were elected. There shall be twenty-two aldermen elected at the general State election which shall occur in the year eighteen hundred and seventy-four, three of whom shall be elected in each Senate district, except the eighth Senate district, and shall be residents of the district in which they are elected, but no voter shail vote for more than two of said aldermen. In the territory comprised within the eighth Senate district, and the twenty-third and twenty-fourth wards, there shall be elected four aldermen, and the aldermen to be elected in said district may reside either in said eighth Senate district or in the twenty-third and twenty-fourth wards, but no voter shall vote for more than three of said aldermen. There shall also be elected six aldermen at large to be voted for on a separate ballot, but no voter shall vote for more than four of the said aldermen at large, and the voters of the twenty-third and twenty-fourth wards of said city are hereby authorized and empowered to vote for aldermen at large. The members of the board of aldermen shall hold office for the space of one year, and shall take office on the first Monday in January, next succeeding their election, at noon. Annually thereafter, at the general State election, there shall be elected a full board of aldermen as hereinbefore provided. Any vacancy now existing or which may hereafter occur in either* the Board of Aldermen by reason of the death or resignation, or of any other cause, of a member of either of said boards shall be filled by election by the board in which such vacancy exists or shall arise by a vote of a majority of all the members elected to said board; and the person so elected to fill any such vacancy shall serve until the first day of January, at noon, next succeeding the first general election occurring not less than thirty days after the happening of such vacancy, but not beyond the expiration of the term in which the vacancy shall occur; and at such election a person shall be elected to serve the remainder, if any, of such unexpired term. From and after the termination of the term of office of the board of assistant aldermen as herein provided, the board of aldermen shall alone constitute the common council and shall exercise the entire legislative powers of the said city.

§ 4. This act shall take effect immediately.

That no lime, ashes, coal, dry sand, hair, feathers, or other substance that is in a similar manner liable to be blown by the wind, shall be sieved or agitated, or exposed, nor shall any mat, carpet, or cloth, be shaken or beaten, nor any cloth, yarn, garment, or material, or substance, be scoured, cleaned, or hung, nor any business be conducted over, or any rags, damaged merchandise, wet, broken, or leaking casks, barrels or boxes, or broken bales of merchandise or goods be placed, kept or exposed for sale in any street or public place, or where it, or particles therefrom, or set in motion thereby, will pass into any such street or public place, or into any occupied premises. That neither any usual nor any reasonable precaution shall be omitted by any person to prevent fragments or other substances from falling, to the peril of life, or dust and light material flying into any street, place or building, from any building or erection, while the same is being altered, repaired, or demolished, or otherwise.

Resolved, That section 112 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended to read as follows:

Section 112. That no pile or deposit of manure, offal, dirt or garbage, nor any accumulation of any offensive or nauseous substance, shall be made within the built-up portions of the City of New York, or upon any open grounds near or upon any vessel or scow other than those to be speedily, and according to the duty of any person, removed, lying at) any such pier, wharf, or builknead, except according to a resolution of this Board specially authorizing the same, and a permit obtained from this Department, and according to its regulations. And no person shall contribute to the making of any such accumulations. Nor shall any straw, hay, or other sub
