Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 27, 1885:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 6,395.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 781.

During the past week 503 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 87 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds) 15 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 19 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks, 278 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 42 visits were made, and 21 disinfections and 8 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 4.

The number of vaccinations performed was 2,505, of which 152 were primary and 2,353 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 7,741 pounds of meat, and 2,657 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 68; the number of analyses of same made was 6, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 20, and the number of arrests made was 1.

The certificates of 567 births, 64 still births, 187 marriages, and 678 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 27, 1885. This shows an increase of 117 births, 27 still-births and 16 deaths, and a decrease of 20 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1884, there was an increase of 15 births and 13 still-births, and a decrease of 13 marriages and 93 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; croup, 2; erysipelas, 6; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 1; alcoholism, 1; rheumatism and gout, 2; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 1; pneumonia, 19; aneurism, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; direct effect of solar heat, 3; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 3; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; premature and pre-matural births, 4; surgical operations, 3; drowning, 3; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 1; whooping cough, 6; typhoid fever, 2; diarrhoeal diseases, 48; inanition, 3; heart diseases, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; convulsions, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 12; Bright's disease and nephritis, 6; suicide, 1. The number of deaths from measles and meningitis and encephalitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 133 were in institutions, 379 in tenement-houses, 152 in houses containing three families or less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 122 on the first, 165 on the second, 140 on the third, 76 on the fourth, 26 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 678 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 0 non-residents; 54 were stated to be single, 130 married, 62 widowed, and the condition of 432 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 678; still-births, 64; bodies in transit, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births, 69 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 567 births, 187 marriages, 64 still-births, 678 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 106 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 6 transcripts of the birth record, 14 of marriage, and 64 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 27, 1885, was 72.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.937, the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,172, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.01 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 651 deaths and still-births, or 87.74 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 26; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 268; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 95; Greenwood (undenominational), 33; Lutheran (undenominational), 94; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 11; Evergreen (undenominational), 38; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 19; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 8; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 8; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 11; Washington (undenominational), 13.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending June 20, 1885, was in the following Wards, viz.: First, 7; Second, 1; Third, 3; Fourth, 7; Fifth, 5; Sixth, 15; Seventh, 24; Eighth, 20; Ninth, 23; Tenth, 23; Eleventh, 24; Twelfth, 92; Thirteenth, 19; Fourteenth, 22; Fifteenth, 7; Sixteenth, 15; Seventeenth, 36; Eighteenth, 42; Nineteenth, 125; Twentieth, 43; Twenty-first, 53; Twenty-second, 69; Twenty-third, 16; Twenty-fourth, 7.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 20, 1885, was 698; this is 12 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1884, and 53.8 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 25.99 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,396,286.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia was 23.03; Brooklyn, 24.93; Baltimore, 24.91; Boston, 24.30; New Orleans, 28.88; Charleston, 37.79; Erie, 4.23; Lowell, 27.65; Worcester, 17.25; Cambridge, 19.59; Fall River, 13.26; Lawrence, 11.17; Springfield, 19.11; Pittsburgh, 18.20. The Commissioner of Public Works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents. * * * * * Such rents shall be collected from the owners or occupants of all such buildings, respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water, said rents shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as provided by law.

It becomes my duty to state that on and after the first day of April, 1885, all extra charges, such as steam-engines, bakeries, barbers, bathing-tubs, boarding-houses, boarding-schools, building purposes, horses, horse-troughs, hotels, porter-houses, taverns, etc., printing offices, stone cutting or dressing, slaughter-houses, dyeing, water-closets and urinals, laundries, restaurants, soda fountains, extra families, oyster and coffee saloons, water by meter measurement, meters and meter setting, and all other purposes for which the use of Croton water is chargeable according to law, are liens, and unless paid on or before the 30th day of April next must be returned to the Clerk of Arrears, with the amount due on each lot.
