

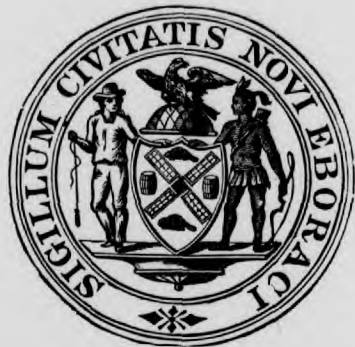

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 26, 1887:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,545.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 442.

During the past week 245 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels, to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 43 permits.

There were issued to consignees, to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 8 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 23 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported, 143 visits were made, and 206 disinfections and 80 fumigations were performed; 1 yard was disinfected.

The number of cases of contagious diseases removed to Riverside Hospital was 26.

The number of vaccinations performed was 3,599, of which 214 were primary, and 3,385 revaccinations.

There were seized and condemned, 15,858 pounds of meat, and 9,850 pounds of fish.

The number of analyses of milk was 3.

The certificates of 643 births, 51 still-births, 256 marriages, and 679 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 26, 1887. This shows a decrease of 18 births and 63 deaths, and an increase of 6 still-births and 32 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 38 births, 1 still-birth and 56 marriages, and a decrease of 18 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from small-pox decreased 4; measles, 32; diphtheria, 12; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 7; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 4; diarrhoeal diseases, 10; inanition, 5; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 27; bronchitis, 9; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 6; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 1; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; surgical operations, 1; while the deaths from scarlatina increased 6; croup, 1; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 7; cancer, 4; pneumonia, 4; heart diseases, 11; convulsions, 5; apoplexy, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 5; premature and preterm births, 1. The number of deaths from Bright's disease and nephritis, suicide and drowning, was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 152 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 209 under two years, 281 under five years, and 45 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 40 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 41.38 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 129 were in institutions, 390 in tenement houses, 141 in houses containing three families or less, 10 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 124 on the first, 179 on the second, 114 on the third, 86 on the fourth, 31 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 656 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 23 non-residents; 97 were stated to be single, 163 married, 87 widowed, and the condition of 327 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 679; still-births, 51; bodies in transit, 9; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 72 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 643 births, 256 marriages, 51 still-births, 679 deaths; 9 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 147 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 12 transcripts of the birth record, 11 of marriage, and 91 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending February 26, 1887, was 31.9 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 30.095; the mean humidity was 69, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,437, and the total amount of rain-fall was 2.58 inches depth of water, as reported by D. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

No ice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
