The minutes of the meeting of November 17 were read and approved.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President lail before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, NEW YORK, November 19, 1886.

The Honorable the Board of Aldermen .

It is with a deep regret that I announce to you for appropriate action the death of our esteemed fellow-citizen, Chester A. Arthur, ex-President of the United States.

Mr. Arthur was for many years honorably identified with the political history of our City and State, until called to the high office of Vice-President by the suffrages of his fellow-citizens. Under peculiarly trying circumstances, it fell to him to assume control of our Government, and he confrived so to discharge the duties of that office as to win for himself the respect of his political enemies and the admiration of all those representatives of foreign countries with whom the extended commercial relations of the United States brought him into contact. He succeeded in giving to the country an administration which will occupy an honorable place in the history of the Republic; and it is but fitting that you take steps to pay to him such last tributes of respect as are due not only to an ex-President of the United States, but to a distinguished citizen of this municipality and of the great State of which it forms a part. Alderman Van Rensselaer offered the following:

Alderman Van Rensselaer offered the following:

Whereas, This Board, in common with the people of this nation, has heard, with profound regret and sorrow, the announcement of the death of Chester A. Arthur, ex-President of the United States, which occurred in this City on the morning of the 18th day of November, 1886; and,

Whereas, It is fit and proper that this Common Council, as the representatives of the City of New York, should give expression to the general sorrow on the loss sustained by this City and by the Nation at large; and,

Whereas, Ex-President Arthur, by his unassuming dignity and manly propriety in the delicate and difficult position in which he was placed by the untimely death of James A. Garfield, showed those fine qualities of head and heart, which earned for him, and commanded not only the respect, but the admiration and sincere affection of his fellow countrymen throughout his entire administration, and now make the whole Nation his mourners; and,

Whereas, This City was the chosen residence and field of active effort of the illustrious deceased in the various responsibilities of individual and public position prior to his elevation as the Chief Executive of our country, and thereby, the people of New York, in an especial manner, are called to mourn one whom they well knew and highly honored; now therefore be it

Resolved, That this Board does hereby place on record the expression of its profound sorrow and regret at the death of ex-President Chester A. Arthur.

Resolved, That the people of our city are hereby requested likewise to give expression to their sentiments of mourning in appropriate funeral decorations on the day of the funeral; and that the public offices of this City, except those required by law to be kept open, be closed on Monday, the 22d instant, being the day of the funeral; that the flags on all public buildings be displayed at half-staff up to and including that day; that the owners and masters of all shipping in the harbor be and hereby are requested to display their f

Resolved, That this Common Council and the Chiefs of the City Departments attend the funeral in a body, if agreeable to the feelings of the family of the deceased.

Resolved, That the heartfelt condolence of this Board is hereby tendered to the family of the distinguished dead; and that we bow with them in submission to the will of Him "who doeth all things well."

Resolved, That a committee of five be appointed by the President of this Board to make the necessary arrangements in connection with the funeral, and that the foregoing preamble and resolutions be spread at large upon the minutes, and a copy thereof, suitably engrossed, be presented to

the family of the deceased; and further

Resolved, That immediately after the passage of the foregoing preamble and resolutions, this
Board, as a further mark of respect for the memory of the deceased, do adjourn.

Alderman Van Rensselaer addressed the Board on the adoption of the preamble and resolutions and paid a fitting tribute of respect to the life, character and public services of the deceased.

Vice-President Divver was called to the chair.) The President, in seconding the adoption of the resolutions, also adverted to the loss sustained

by the City, the State and the country by the death of ex-President Arthur,
And moved to amend by inserting in the first resolution the following:
"That the City Hall and the Chamber of the Board of Aldermen be draped in mourning for a
period of thirty days."

Which was accepted by Alderman Van Rensselaer.

Alderman Morgan, also, on seconding the adoption of the preamble and resolutions, alluded feelingly to the loss sustained by the bereaved family of the deceased ex-President, and eulogized the public and private life of the deceased.

The Vice-President then put the question whether the Board would agree to adopt the preamble and all but the last resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative, unanimously, by a standing vote, all the members present (twenty-two) voting in favor thereof.

The Vice-President appointed as such Committee:
Aldermen Van Rensselaer, Farrell, Morgan, Ferrigan, and President Nooney.
The Vice-President put the question whether the Board would agree with the last resolution.
Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the Vice-President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Tuesday, November 23, at II o'clock A. M. FRANCIS J. TWOMEY, Clerk.

DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS - OFFICE OF THE ENGINEER IN CHIEF, PIER "A," FOOT OF BATTERY PLACE, NEW YORK, November 5, 1886.

To the Board of Docks:

GENTLEMEN-I have the honor to submit the following report of the work under my supervision for the quarter ending 31st October, 1886.

Laight Street Section-Resolutions of the Board, July 30 and November 3, 1880.

Portions of the old timber work and decking of the old bulkhead platform were removed to make room for earth filling between Piers, new 27 and new 28, North river, and 1,692 loads of filling were received by tickets and were deposited.

The material of the old bulkhead platform shed which was taken down by the Pennsylvania

Railroad Co., was sold by the Department at public auction on the 26th July, and was removed by the purchaser.

West Twenty-third Street Section - South End - Resolution of the Board, 5th November, 1880.

PIER, NEW 54, NORTH RIVER.

The plank approach to the pier was repaired.

Undriven piles that had got loose were secured.

The joints in the granite were pointed.

REMOVING OLD WORK.

About 46 linear feet of the outer end of the old pier near the foot of West Thirty-second street, North river, were removed to make room for the extension northerly of the bulkhead wall. West Fifty-seventh Street Yard.

Blacksmiths made and repaired iron work for different sections and for floating property. 500 barrels of Portland cement were received, tested and stored for Department uses. Four samples of cement were tested for private parties by order of the Board.

East Seventeenth Street Yard.

The yard has been maintained, and the property there has been taken care of.

Floating Property.

The list of the floating property of the Department is as follows: 100-ton derrick "City of New York."

10-ton derrick. Tug "Manhattan." 2 dredges, Nos. 3 and 4.

10 pile drivers, Nos. 1, 2, 3, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11.

9 deck scows, "B," "C," "D," "E," "F," "Jim," "Joe," "May" and "Willie."

Boring machine "Woodcock." ' scow "G." Divers Small divers' scow. 7 yawls. 2 bateaux. 3 skiffs.

3 sounding boats.

The derrick "City of New York" has had various repairs made to its engine and machinery, as required to keep them in good working order, and small repairs have been made to the scow. During the quarter it has placed the coal scow "F" in the water from the deck of the West Fifty-seventh street pier, and has taken Pile Driver No. 3 out of the water and placed it on the deck of the West Fifty-seventh street pier.

West Filty-seventh street pier.

The 10-ton derrick was painted, its deck was covered with crude turpentine, its blocks and become were overhauled and its machinery and boiler cleaned.

Dredge No. 3 remains in the possession of the Union Dredging Company, and Dredge No. 4 was towed from the foot of One Hundred and Twenty-minth street, at Second avenue, Harlem river, on the 31st August, and turned over to the Union Dredging Company, at West Twenty-ninth street, North river. On the 15th October it was taken from the Union Dredging Company and towed over to the northerly side of the bulkhead along East Ninetieth street, East river, where it now remains remains

The tug "Manhattan" was put in commission on 28th September, 1886, and since that date has done all the towing required by the Department. The engine and machinery have been repaired, a steam heater has been put up in the pilot-house, the deck has been calked and the deck and hull

painted and two new flag-staffs have been put up.

The ten pile drivers have been kept in order as follows, with the exceptions specified:

Pile Driver No. 1.—Nothing required. Pile Driver No. 2.—The boiler has been condemned and removed, and John W. Sullivan is making a new boiler under Treasurer's Order No. 12016. A new smoke stack and bonnet has been

Pile Driver No. 3.—Placed on deck of the West Fifty-seventh street Pier on 8th October. The scow, house and hatches have been thoroughly repaired, and the sides, ends and bottom of the scow have been calked.

Pile Driver No. 5.—(Fitted up as a pile cutter.) Nothing required.

Pile Driver No. 5.—(Fitted up as a pile cutter.) Nothing required.

Pile Driver No. 6.—The engine and boiler have been cleaned, and the house, ways, hatches and cleats have been repaired and the house has been painted. The Police Department inspected the boiler on the 11th September.

Pile Driver No. 7.—The boiler has been cleaned, the machinery has been cleaned and repaired, the house and hatches have been repaired, and the house has been painted.

Pile Driver No. 8.—The machinery, house, ways and hatches have been repaired, and the

house has been painted.

Pile Driver No. 9.—The machinery, house, ways and hatches have been repaired, and a new

smoke stack has been made. The boiler condemned by the Police Department on the 11th September has been removed. John W. Sullivan is making a new boiler, under Treasurer's Order

Pile Driver No. 10. -At work at West Thirty-second street section. The machinery has been kept in repair. Pile Driver No. 11.—The machinery and deck have been repaired, and the deck has been

calked. Deck scow "B."-Had deck repaired, calked and covered with ferne line. The sides and ends

were calked and the scow was painted.

Deck scow "C."—Had additional supports put under deck beams, the deck was calked and

covered with crude turpentine, the sides and ends were calked and the scow was painted.

Deck scow "D."—Had its deck covered with crude turpentine, the sides calked, the scow

painted and the hold cleaned.

Deck scow "E."—Had deck repaired, calked and covered with crude turpentine, the sides

calked and the scow was painted.

Deck scow "F."—The thorough repairs begun during the previous quarter were complete the scow was painted and put into the water on the 10th September. A. J. Murray furnished necessary yellow pine and knees for these repairs under Treasurer's Order No. 11953.

Deck scow "Willie."—Had deck repaired and calked and corner bands and iron work re-

fastened.

Deck scow "Jim," Diver's scow "G" and small diver's scow are laid up at West Fiftyseventh street in good order and condition.

Deck scow "Joe" and "May" are both in too bad order and condition to justify further re-

pairs Boring Machine "Woodcock" is laid up at West Fifty-seventh street in good order and con-

Two new 15-feet yawls have been built and one new 15-feet yawl is under construction, and old yawls have been laid up as worthless and are not included in the list of floating property. A. J. Murray delivered white oak, white cedar and oak knees for the new yawls under Treasurer's Orders

Nos. 11923 and 11971.

Various other small pieces of work have been done on account of floating property, machinery of the Department, office fittings, automatic gauges, etc. McNab & Harlin Manufacturing Company delivered galvanized pipe and flange under Treasurer's Order No. 11974, and John Marry & Co., galvanized additional iron work under Treasurer's Order No. 11973, all for the new Automatic Tide Gauge at Pier "A," North River.

Surveying Party.

The surveying party has given all the lines and levels required for the various work of the Department.

Thirteen surveys have been made on the North river water-front, four on that of the East river, and seven on the Harlem river; seven of which on the North river, four on the East river, and five on the Harlem river, were in connection with the supervision of work being done by private parties under permit from the Board, and plots of the same have been made for the records of the Department; and the necessary lines have been determined and given for work under permit.

In addition to the above, a new continuous survey of the North river water-front from the Battery to Barclay street has been begun.

29,734 disc soundings have been taken by the surveying and sounding parties in 175 slips and
375 rod soundings in 10 slips; of which 15,910 disc soundings in 76 slips and 82 rod soundings in 4
slips were on the North river, and 14,544 disc soundings in 99 slips and 293 rod soundings in 6, slips were on the East and Harlem rivers

The greater part of these soundings have been recorded and the remainder are nearly ready for

The Automatic Tide Gauges have been attended to.

SIR—There were 680 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 6, 1886, which is an increase of 13, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 176 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending October 30, 1886, was 665, which is 73.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 23.80 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,453,246.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for

to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

Notice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.

Beginning at a point on the easterly line of Tenth avenue, which point is distant northerly 1997 feet from the northerly line of One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street, and running thence (1) south \$1^{2}\$ 40 [45] "cast 1387 feet; thence (2) north  $47^{2}$  48 [42" cast 35.8% feet; thence (3) north  $38^{3}$  19' 15" east 75 feet; thence (4) north  $51^{2}$  40' 45" west 144 feet to the aforesaid easterly line of Tenth avenue; thence (5) along said easterly line south  $38^{3}$  19' 15" west 110 feet to the place of beginning, containing 15.738 square feet, and including Parcels Nos. 78, 79 and 80. All of which parcels of land are to be taken in fee simple.
