The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent. per ton (Custom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons.

All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner of Public Works

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., TC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to mother person or persons.

All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expenses, and shull present all unsate of mater.

The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons, railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot be persented.

The acts of other vehicles or horses, cannot be permitted in the street or on the sidewalf, except upon a license or permitted in the street or on the sidewalf, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits make annually renowed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be kept in good order and the water not allowed to drip or wasteby overruning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by treeting in and about such troughs or fixtures to the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter from the street of the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter from the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter from the street of the sidewalk or ralley attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste from such hydrant freezes and becomes dangerous in winter, the supply will be shut off in addition to the penalty of five dollars imposed.

Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urnual for each offense, which will be strictly enforced. Foundaries or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-prohibited.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas.

Fountains or jets in hores, solvens, confectioreries or other buildings are streamy reportables.

The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this department may understand that the permission is not for the use of the control of the permits of the permits of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates.
