Hon. GEORGE B. McCLELLAN, Mayor of The City of New York:

SIR—Section 1095 of the Revised Charter provides as follows:

"* * The Board of Education shall also, between the 1st day of January and the 15th day of February in each year, make and transmit to the Mayor of The City of New York another report bearing date the 31st day of December next preceding, stating the total amount of money expended for the purposes of public education in said City during the year ending on said 31st day of December * * * "

In accordance with the provision quoted, the Board of Education has the honor to present the accompanying report in regard to the money expended for the purposes of public education in this City during the year ending on the 31st day of December, 1904.

In this connection there have been added certain statistics in relation to attendance, number of part-time classes, number of class-rooms and the approximate dates of the erection of school buildings. The statistics of attendance, etc., however, do not cover the same period as the financial report, and are inserted merely to indicate, in some measure, the scope of the school system.
