Report of the Warden of Prisons.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner, Department of Correction:

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of improvements and other work done at District Prisons for the three months ending March 31, 1911:

At Jefferson Market Prison a number of repairs to boiler and fireplace were done by staff; the material thereto, such as firebricks, fireclay and other parts necessary to make these repairs, were furnished by the Department.

At Essex Market Prison a new supply of stove repair material was adjusted to stoves in office and dining room. With the elimination of receiving female prisoners at that prison, all that side formerly used for female prisoners is now used for male prisoners; all female prisoners committed at the temporary Essex Market Court are sent to Jefferson Market for final disposition; a new van service to transfer these prisoners has been established.

At Yorkville Prison the work of installing of the new electric lighting system is now practically completed, with the exception of the keepers' quarters, which is nearing completion; all material thereto has been furnished by the Department; the work was done by prison labor under supervision of the Department Electrician. All gas lines and fixtures formerly used have been removed and placed in other parts of the prison. New windows were put in cells on first tier of male prison and locks were repaired. The brick work, which has been opened owing to the installation of the iron pipes for the electric appliances, has been restored to its normal condition and all material thereto has been supplied by the Department and work done by staff.

At Harlem Prison the leader in yard and leaks on copper roof were repaired. The "Rider Ericsson" pump in basement has been constantly kept in good order; new connections to Boynton Richardson range and hot water boiler were installed.

At the West Side Prison overhauling of the entire plumbing system. Overhauling and placing in first-class serviceable condition the locks on main gate and cells in male and female prison.

The female prisoners transferred from the workhouse to serve their sentence as help are employed in cleaning, scrubbing and doing the laundry work.

The male prisoners transferred here from the workhouse to serve their sentence as help are employed in cleaning, painting cooking, plumbing and general utility work.

Attached herewith you will find a statement showing disposition of prisoners received for the three months ending March 31, 1911; also the amount of money collected from fines and telephone charges from prisoners committed by the City Magistrates and paid over to the City Chamberlain and Department of Health Pension Fund.

QUARTERLY REPORT OF THE BRANCH WORKHOUSE, RIKERS ISLAND.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor, the following work was accomplished: 350 cubic yards of earth was removed from the bank; filled in behind the sea wall, making one-eighth of an acre of ground; large gangs of men have been employed during the quarter hauling stone from the face of the bank and the lawn down to the east end of the island, where the work of building the sea wall was resumed during the latter part of this quarter, in which time 25 feet of this wall was made; top soil has been spread over one acre of ground, and this will be used as an addition to the present farm during the coming season.

The roads have been cleaned, cared for and repaired wherever necessary; both the launches "Mochican" and "Sweep" have received such repairs as were possible to be done here. The men have been constantly employed during the quarter, and their health has been excellent.

Carpenters—Dormitory No. 1: Repaired lock and knob on door, two toilet seats, and two chairs. Dormitory No. 2: Rehung door to building, using two butts and 16 screws. Head Keeper's House: Repaired doors and locks, using 12 feet ½ by 9 boards; half pound 6d. nails; 1 dozen 1-inch screws. Miscellaneous: Put new cross piece in dirt cart, using 3 feet 6 inches of 4-inch hardwood, 2 days' time; repaired body of cart, using 10 feet 9-inch lumber; put new boom in truck, using 12 feet 4 by 4 oak, 2 days' time; made cover for coffee kettle, 16 feet 8-inch boards; repaired toilet on starboard side of steamer "Rikers Island," using 18 feet 3 by 3 yellow pine, 10 feet 2 by 4 yellow pine, 3 9-inch boards 16 feet long, 10 feet 1½-inch oak 6 inches wide; made clothes closet for crew, and desk for cabin, using 5 ¾-inch boards 16 feet long, 1 pound 8d. nails, 2 dozen ½-inch screws, 2 lock knobs, 1 4 by 4 lock, 2 small butts, total 11 days' time; repaired large gangplank, using 36 feet 1 by 1½-inch strip; made 2 gangplanks, using 1 16-foot plank 2 by 12 inches, 4 ¾-inch boards 16 feet long, 5 pounds 8d. nails; repaired coaming and put new guard rail on launch "Sweep," using 30 feet 2-inch yellow pine, 5 pounds 10d. galvanized nails, 3 days' time.

Painters—Dormitory No. 1: Painted bathroom between No. 1 and No. 2, using 100 pounds white lead, 4 gallons turpentine, 1 gallon oil, 1 gallon dryer, 2 pounds putty. Hospital Building: Painted 2 radiators, using ¾ gallon banana oil, 2 pounds aluminum. Dormitory No. 1: Washed ceiling and side walls, also ceiling and side walls of prison office. Miscellaneous: Painted toilet and window sash on starboard side steamer "Rikers Island," 10 pounds white lead, 1 gallon turpentine, ½ gallon oil, ½ gallon dryer, 2 pounds putty; painted cabin and roof of launch "Sweep," two coats, painted hull and deck one coat, using 50 pounds white lead, 1½ gallons turpentine, ¾ gallon oil, ½ gallon dryer, 3 gallons black asphaltum; put glass in the following buildings: Dormitory No. 1, 3 lights; Dormitory No. 2, 9 lights; mess hall, 2 lights; Keepers' quarters, 3 lights; launch "Mochican," 7 lights; steamer "Rikers Island," 9 lights.

Dormitory No. 4: Made and put up new leader, using 32 feet of 24 by 84 galvanized iron, 4 pounds solder, ½ pound tinned rivets, ½ pound metallic paint, 1 bag charcoal, 4 days' time. Head Keeper's House: Made and put up 4-inch leader, using 2 sheets 24 by 84 galvanized iron, ¼ pound tinned rivets, 1 pail charcoal, ½ pound metallic paint, time 2 days; repaired hot water boiler, using 2 pounds solder, 3 hours' time. Keepers' Quarters: Made and put up 212-inch joints of pipe for furnace in cellar, using 1 sheet 24 by 84 galvanized iron, 12 feet strap iron, 1 dozen stove bolts, 1 pound No. 14 tinned rivets, 1 pound metallic paint, 2 days' time; removed old basin and put up new bathroom, using enameled basin and back, 1 stand, 2 basin cocks, 2 feet ½-inch lead pipe, 5 pounds solder, 3½ days' time; painted smoke-stack on roof, using 5 pounds metallic paint, ½ day's time. Blacksmith—Shod 16 horses, using 48 horseshoes and 15 pounds horseshoe nails, 2 barrels blacksmith's coal; sharpened 52 picks, 15 chisels, 28 bars, 14 axes, repaired 12 chains, 3 wheelbarrows, straightened out guard rail and replaced same on launch "Sweep."

During the quarter there was on an average 90 male prisoners, and they were employed as follows: Stablenmen and Drivers, 9; Carpenters, 1; Tinsmith and Plumbers, 2; Firemen, 3; kitchen and utility, 14; cleaning buildings, 7; out-door labor, 54; total, 90.

CITY PRISON, BROOKLYN.

Hon. PATRICK A. WHITNEY, Commissioner of Correction:

Dear Sir—I most respectfully submit a report of the City Prison, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending March 31, 1911.

The cement sidewalk around the Prison has been completed. An iron railing has been erected in front of the Prison on the Raymond street side. An iron grill door has been put in between the passage to the Female Prison and Administration Hall. An iron grill gate has been erected at main entrance to Prison. The storehouse building has been faced up with granite. Rubber tiling has been laid in the Doctor's and Warden's offices. Metal lath ceilings have been put up in Head Keeper's office and Administration Hall. The new boiler room is in use and the old one is being demolished. A new prison van has been built and is now in use. The new Female Prison is still in course of construction.

The female prisoners under sentence here, are employed in cleaning and scrubbing in and around the Female Prison and Administration Building.

The male prisoners under sentence here are employed in cleaning around the Male Prison, kitchen and stable and repairing and painting about the institution.

Appended herewith please find a statement showing the number of prisoners at commencement of quarter, the number received, transferred and discharged; the amount of fines received from Special Sessions and ten City Magistrates' Courts, which have been paid over to the City Chamberlain, as section 1550 of the Greater New York Charter requires. Health of Inmates—The general health of the inmates has been good, and no serious case of acute disease has occurred in the last three months. The following are the number of cases treated: Colds, tonsillitis and influenza, 40; rheumatism, 2; cardiac disease, 2; blepharitis, 2; inflammation of the gums, 3; mental disease, 1; hysteria, 1; epilepsy, 1; skin diseases, 3; gonorrhoea, 5; syphilis, 2; anæmia, 1; sprains, contusions and abscesses, 10. A large number of treatments were given at the morning clinic for epilepsy, venereal diseases, enuresis, skin rashes, oral conditions, colds and many minor conditions.

Spiritual Welfare—The spiritual welfare has been carefully cared for by the chaplains of the Department of Correction, and attendance at religious service has been usually large, though not compulsory.

Scholastic Education—Average daily attendance, 200. Class for old boys, 9 to 11.30 a. m.; class for young boys, 1 to 3.30 p. m.; calisthenic and military drill, older boys, 8 to 9 a. m.; calisthenic and military drill, younger boys, 3.30 to 4.30 p. m.; singing class for all, 6 to 6.30 p. m.; library and reading for all, 6.45 to 8 p. m. Arithmetic—Notation, addition, subtraction, multiplication and divisions of numbers, fractions, denominate numbers, decimals, partnership and mental exercises for rapid calculation. Reading—First, second, third and fourth readers; teaching of English to those who only speak Italian, German or Hebrew. Spelling—Words selected from the readers in use; definitions of spelling words; use of words in sentences. Geography—United States and New York City. History—United States. Penmanship—Exercises on blackboards, writing and addressing letters to relatives.

tical connections and running of wires to 3, 4 and 5-drop annunciators; instructed class in practical installation of electrical conduit; instructed class in practical system of running wood in 2 and 3-wire moulding and connections of cut-outs and switches to same; instructed class in practical system of laying out electrical work and method of balancing system; installed 2 light clusters in office of building No. 4; repaired broken line to light on road of building No. 4; made up 24 drop lights for building No. 4; took down old sockets and installed new ones at prison outlets in building No. 4; took down two 4-light chandeliers from Keepers' Bapp house on hill and reinstalled in Warden's house; repaired open circuit on S. W. circuit of 6 outlets in building No. 4; instructed in method of making wire and cable splices; repaired lights on east stairs on new Dormitory building; re-run ¾-inch feed pipe from controller to motor, rewired and connected same; overhauled the rheostat at east end of icehouse; completed diagram of switchboard for two 3-phase alternating-current generators, showing alternator and exciter connections; connected three temporary outlets of 4 lights each in new kitchen and room off kitchen; disconnected old feeder line to No. 4 building; pulled outline of 1¼-inch pipe running through new tailor shop, repaired lights in hospital and put up 2 new sockets in place of old ones burned out; built 10-foot step-ladder for use in electrical repairs; built stand for blackboard; charged battery for Rikers Island; put glass shades on all fixtures in new Dormitory building; put on full socket in Keeper's room in hospital; charged battery for Rikers Island; installed one light conduit outlet in front of new icebox; changed location of two fixtures in No. 1 building, centre wing west, taking same from column and re-installing to centre of ceilings of two dining-rooms; put light outside of west door of No. 1 building on same circuit of hall, with switch to control same; installed one light in west wing centre of building No. 1; rewired ice storehouse, installed 10 1-light conduit outlets in iron pipe; material used: 200 feet of ½-inch iron pipe, 200 feet No. 14 duplex wire, 1 round boset box and cover, 10 condulets, type J. MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

The minutes of the meeting held February 1 were approved.

Dunham, of 28a Pulaski street, Brooklyn, having failed to appear, as directed, to explain the circumstances of an arrest mentioned in his application for the position of Stenographer and Typewriter, the Secretary was directed to summon him before the Commission at the meeting to be held Wednesday, February 15, 1911, at 10 o'clock a. m., to show cause why his name should not be removed from the eligible list under the provisions of paragraph 14 of Rule VII.

The communication was ordered filed.

A report was presented from Thomas C. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated February 7, relative to the request of Clarence E. Murray, Assistant Chief Examiner in Charge of Promotions, dated February 7, 1911, transmitting a communication from the Fire Commissioner, under date of December 28, 1910, in which request was made that the position of Superintendent of Buildings, for which an open competitive examination had been ordered on December 7, 1910, be filled through a promotion examination open to Inspectors of Buildings in the Department; also reports of Examiners Ihlseng and Fuld in the matter, and recommending that the request be denied. The recommendation was adopted.

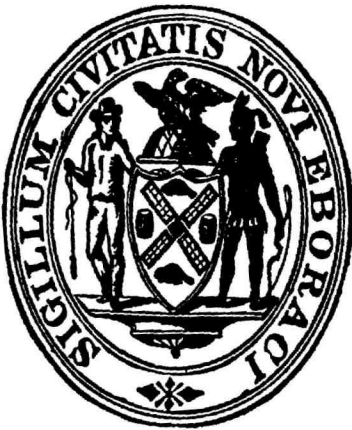

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws, this Board adopted a resolution on January 19, 1911, fixing the date for public hearing thereon as March 2, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in "The Sun" and "New York Commercial," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day; and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for, and proposed to be granted to the Richmond Light and Railroad Company, and the adequacy of the compensation proposed to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Richmond Light and Railroad Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Richmond Light and Railroad Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of the City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this _____ day of _____ 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Richmond Light and Railroad Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway, as an extension to its present railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying persons and property in the Borough of Richmond, in The City of New York upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing tracks of the Company in New York Avenue at or near its intersection with a private street known as Wadsworth avenue; thence by double

track southwesterly in and upon said Wadsworth avenue to Tompkins avenue; thence across said Tompkins avenue to a private right-of-way; thence in a southerly direction along said private right-of-way to Sea avenue; thence across Sea avenue to a private right-of-way; thence southerly along said private right-of-way to Florida avenue; thence along Florida avenue to Richmond avenue; thence across Richmond avenue to Ocean avenue and there connecting with the existing tracks of the Company.

And to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled:

Map showing proposed alteration in the Richmond Light and Railroad Company, in the Borough of Richmond, to accompany petition dated January 6, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, City of New York, and signed by S. F. Hazelrigg, Vice-President, and Walter E. Pettigrew, Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until the privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of the original term of this contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate thereof prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted, the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) in cash within sixty (60) days after the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than four hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$475), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of four hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$475).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$875), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$875).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than nine hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$975), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of nine hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$975).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand and seventy-five dollars (\$1,075), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand and seventy-five dollars (\$1,075).

During the remaining term, expiring*

*Limit 25 years. To be made coterminous with grant for rights at St. George for which application is now pending.

an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,175), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand one hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,175).

As the Company is operating both railway and electric light and power properties, it is agreed that the gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the portion of the gross receipts from the railway property of the Company, as distinguished from the electric light and power property, as shall bear the same proportion to the whole gross receipts from such railway property as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that portion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

The sum of five hundred dollars (\$500) which is hereinbefore required to be paid to the City by the Company within sixty (60) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payment shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any charter or in the charter of such assignee or sublessee shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structures used in connection therewith, in streets and avenues and private property hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company, which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway so used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at such sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified.

The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company, pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed, pursuant to this contract, within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual.

If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original

condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to Section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway ought to be constructed and shall complete the construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order, otherwise this right shall cease and terminate, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within the control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board, either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and terminate.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power, substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Richmond, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires, for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two (2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride, from any point on its road or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control to any other point thereof, or any connecting branch thereof within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter, mail matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

The rate for the carrying of such property over the said railway upon the cars of the Company shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the control of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company and no greater sum shall be charged for such services than provided for by it.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel-guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on the said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of 1 o'clock a. m. and 5 o'clock a. m. each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing had thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made this day of 1911, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the New York and North Shore Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

Whereas, The City did by contract dated February 1, 1909, grant to the Company the right to construct, maintain and operate a street surface railway upon various streets and avenues in the Borough of Queens; and

Whereas, The Company has by a petition dated January 17, 1911, applied to the Board for a modification of said contract by eliminating therefrom a part of the route therein granted; now, therefore,

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents to such modification or amendment in and to said contract subject to the following conditions:

First—All the terms and conditions contained in the said contract dated February 1, 1909, shall remain unchanged except as follows:

Section 1, paragraph 2, is hereby amended so as to read:

"Beginning at a point where the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau intersects Broadway in the Borough of Queens; thence in and upon Broadway to Tenth street."

Second—The Company shall, within one year from the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, comply with the provisions of section 184 of the Railroad Law for the abandonment of that portion of the route granted by contract dated February 1, 1909, as described as follows: Beginning at the intersection of Broadway and 10th street; thence westerly along Broadway to its intersection with the easterly side of Bell avenue, in the former Village of Bayside.

If the Company shall fail to secure the approval of the Public Service Commission, or shall fail for any other reason to comply with the provisions of this subdivision within the time stipulated, this contract shall be void and of no effect and the original franchise contract of February 1, 1909, and the obligations and liability of the Company thereunder shall be unaffected by the provisions of this contract. Provided, however, that the Board may extend said period for a period or periods not exceeding in the aggregate six (6) months.

A certified copy of the certificate of abandonment shall be filed with the Board of Estimate and Apportionment within ten (10) days from the date on which the same is obtained by the Company.

Section 2. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms and conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

In witness whereof, the party of the first part, by its Mayor, thereto duly authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City, has caused the corporate name of said City to be hereunto signed and the corporate seal of said City to be hereunto affixed; and the party of the second part, by its officers thereto duly authorized, has caused its corporate name to be hereunto signed and its corporate seal to be hereunto affixed, the day and year first above written.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inscribing the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
