Fifty-one thousand one hundred and twenty-six dollars (\$51,126) were expended by the parties in interest in securing and repairing the foregoing buildings, under the orders of the Department.

In consequence of the neglect or refusal of the proper parties to comply with the orders of the Department within the time prescribed, it has been necessary to order and hold surveys under the provisions of section 37 of the Law, in three (3) cases.

Six hundred and forty-four (644) notices of unsafe buildings, consisting of "cautionary or first notices," "second notices," "notices and summonses," etc., were issued and served during the last three months. The location and disposition of the unsafe buildings reported may be seen by reference to Exhibit "H," appended.

BUREAU OF FIRE ESCAPES AND IRON WORK.

W. W. ADAMS, Esq., Superintendent of Buildings:

SIR—I herewith respectfully submit a report of the operations of this bureau for the three months ending June 30, 1877.

CHAS. K. HYDE, Chief of Bureau.

The number of buildings reported as requiring additional means of egress in case of fire was four hundred and eleven (411). Of these two hundred and fifty-four (254) were made to conform to the law upon notice, and one hundred and fifty-seven (157) are now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to April 1, 1877, and since removed, is two hundred and eleven (211).

The number of buildings reported as requiring trap-doors and railings to hoistway openings was twenty-three (23) and the number reported as requiring iron shutters on window openings was five (5). Of these fifteen (15) were made to conform to the law relating to hoistways, and two (2) buildings have been provided with iron shutters, leaving eleven (11) of this class now under process.

The number of cases of this class reported prior to April 1, 1877, and since removed, is four (4). During the quarter twenty-seven (27) cases were sent to the Attorney, all of which were for additional means of egress in case of fire.

There were also one thousand one hundred and eleven (1,111) notices issued. The excess of notices served over the number of cases reported may be accounted for by the fact that the agent or lessee have to be notified in addition to the owner, and where the proper parties are not found or are non-residents, notices are mailed to their address, if known, and copies posted on the building.

By referring to Exhibit "I" it will be noticed that there are three hundred and eighty-eight (388) cases still in progress of removal. Most of these are cases for which contracts are out and fire escapes are being made, and also cases which require painting and repairing. Of the cases in progress of removal one hundred and fifty (150) are in the hands of the attorney for prosecution.

During the quarter five thousand three hundred and forty buildings have been examined by the Inspectors of this Bureau, and, except those reported, have been found to be provided with fire escapes or not requiring any additional means of escape in case of fire.

BOARD OF EDUCATION.

THURSDAY, July 5, 1877.

The Board of Education held a stated session on Thursday, July 5, (Wednesday being a holiday), at the Hall of the Board, corner of Grand and Elm streets, at 4 o'clock P. M.

Present—Wm. Wood, Esq., President, and Commissioners Baker, Beardslee, Bell, Dowd, Goulding, Halsted, Hazeltine, Jelliffe, Place, Walker, Watson, West, Wetmore, Wheeler, and Wickham—16.

Absent—Commissioners Cohen, Kelly, Traud, Vermilye, and Wilkins—5.

The minutes of the preceding session of June 20, were approved.

The President submitted a communication relative to the receipt of \$5,878.88, being the amount received from the executors of the late Ephraim Holbrook, for the use of the Board. Ordered that said communication be entered in full in the minutes.

Communications from the Boards of Trustees of the several wards were received as follows:

From the Seventh, Ninth, Tenth, Eleventh, Thirteenth, Fifteenth, Sixteenth, Seventeenth, Eighteenth, Nineteenth, and Twentieth Wards, making awards of contracts for repairs, etc. Referred to the Finance Committee.

From the Eighth, Ninth, and Twenty-fourth Wards, nominating teachers for Evening Schools, etc. Referred to the Committee on Evening Schools.

From the Ninth Ward, relative to a strip of land of eight inches, occupied by Primary School Building No. 13, in Downing street. Referred to the Committee on Sites and New Schools.

From the Seventeenth Ward, nominating Miss Annie L. Whyte for Vice-Principal of Grammar School No. 19. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Tenth and Nineteenth Wards, to excuse absence of teachers. Referred to the Committee on Teachers, with power.

From the Nineteenth Ward, relative to pay of a teacher. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Also, to have O. B. Hall & Co.'s "Oral Annunciator" placed in Grammar School Building No. 70. Referred to the Committee on Buildings.

From the Twenty-second Ward, making award of contract for heating apparatus, Grammar School No. 28. Referred to the Finance Committee.

The President laid before the Board the monthly report of the City Superintendent for June. Entered in the minutes.

Also, transmitting a complaint against the Principal of Female Department, Grammar School No. 69. Referred to the Committee on Teachers.

From the Superintendent of Truancy—A report for the month of June. Entered in the minutes.

The President laid before the Board the following communications:

From the Clerk of the Board, acknowledging the receipt of \$1 from "Conscience." On file, and amount added to the fund for the incidental expenses of the office.

From Colonel Emmons Clark, Secretary of Board of Health, relative to sanitary inspection of school buildings. Entered in minutes.

Protest of National School Furniture Co., against infringement of patents. Referred to Joint Committee on School Furniture and Buildings.

Protest from James P. Isaacs, against award of contract by Trustees of the Tenth Ward.

From George Maxwell and Charles J. McCarthy, for appointment as assistants in the Depository. Referred to the Committee on Supplies.

From J. R. Haskell, relative to Horne's Gas Regulator. Referred to the Auditing Committee.

Commissioner Dowd offered a resolution relative to a deduction of three and one-half per cent. from salaries. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

Commissioner Baker offered a resolution relative to an amendment of the By-laws concerning book agents, etc., and Principals of two years' standing. Referred to the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications.

Reports of Standing Committees were presented as follows:

Commissioner West presented the report of the Committee on By-laws, Elections, and Qualifications, relative to closing the schools of the Nineteenth Ward on Carnival Day, censuring the action of Trustees Hopkins, Donnelly, and Alston; and directing the payment of the teachers. Adopted. Also, to deduct three and a half per cent. from salaries for the month of August. Adopted.

Commissioner Halsted presented a report from the Committee on Teachers, exonerating Miss Bridget E. Cowan, Grammar School No. 29, from certain charges for irregularities in her action as a teacher. Adopted.

Commissioner Baker presented two reports from the Auditing Committee, recommending payment of sundry bills for printing, postage, repairs, painting, etc., for the Hall of the Board. Adopted.

Commissioner Dowd presented reports from the Finance Committee, as follows:

To appropriate \$216,000 for salaries, etc., for the month of August. Adopted.

To appropriate \$25,085.08 for repairs to buildings. Adopted.

To authorize the Trustees of the Twenty-third Ward to readvertise for proposals for furniture for Grammar School No. 62. Adopted.

To appropriate \$2,097 for furniture for Grammar School No. 15, in the Eleventh Ward. Adopted.

To pay bill amounting to \$144.11 for the year 1875. Adopted.

Commissioner West presented a report from the Committee on By-laws, etc., to be discharged from consideration of the claim of Professor J. Morvillier, for certain services in 1872. Adopted.

A resolution to amend a by-law relative to closing schools by Trustees, offered by Commissioner Walker, was referred to the Committee on By-laws, etc.

A resolution referring the salary question to the Committee on Salaries and Economy, offered by Commissioner Dowd, was adopted.

The Board adjourned.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 7, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,506, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 617 tenement-houses, 176 private dwellings, 51 other dwellings, 11 manufactories and workshops, 11 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 60 slaughter-houses, 3 milk inspections, 1 public sewer, 1 roadway, 1 dangerous building, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 58 yards, courts, and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 116 waste-pipes and drains, 187 privies and water-closets, 53 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 2 cesspools, 1 dangerous chimney, 2 piggeries, 12 other nuisances, 29 violations of the Code, together with 5 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 663.
During the past week 127 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 69 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

119 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.
The Disinfecting Corps have visited 46 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 45 houses, 45 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Corps have disinfected 3,128 privies and water-closets, 231 yards, courts, and areas, 107 cellars, 183 garbage-boxes, and 131½ miles of street gutters.
5 persons sick with small-pox were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, July 7, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 673 burial permits for city deaths, 21 for bodies in transitu, and 47 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 673 deaths, 131 marriages, 410 births, 47 still-births, 21 applications for transit

permits, and 49 returns from coroners. There were 20 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 1 transcript of birth record, 1 of marriage, and 18 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—During the week ending Saturday, July 7, 1877, 673 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city, which is an increase of 104 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 185 less than were reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending June 30, was 581, which is 11 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.04 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,077,222.

The increase in the mortality for the past compared with the preceding week was from the following diseases, viz.: Typhoid fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 109; cancer, 4; disease of the heart, 4; aneurism, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 6; sun-stroke, 1; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 5; Bright's disease and nephritis, 10; premature and preterm births, 9; and a decrease of 3 deaths from scarlatina, 2 from measles, 5 from diphtheria, 1 from croup, 2 from whooping-cough, 1 erysipelas, 2 from malarial fevers, 3 from inanition, 1 from rheumatism and gout, 3 from phthisis pulmonalis, 2 from bronchitis, 5 from pneumonia, 11 from diseases of the brain and nervous system.

The continued high temperature has caused an increase in the mortality of infants. The maximum temperature was on Saturday, July 7, at 3 P. M., when it reached 87 degrees Fahr. The number of deaths from diarrhoeal diseases for the week ending June 16, was 27; for the week ending June 23, 60; for the week ending June 30, 167; and for the past week, 276; of which 260 were of children under 5 years. The mean temperature Fahr. for these weeks was, for June 16, 69.1, June 23, 70.1, June 30, 70.9, and July 7, 72.4, as reported by Director Draper at Central Park. There were 159 deaths of children under 5 years of age during the week ending June 2, 175 under 5 during the week ending June 9, 156 under 5 during the week ending June 16, 195 during the week ending June 23, 354 during the week ending June 30, and 449 during the week ending July 7; for the corresponding weeks the mortality in tenement-houses was 210, 217, 224, 208, 326, and 394 respectively. These figures show that the increase in the mortality is almost altogether among the children of the poor who dwell in tenement-houses, and whose means prevent them from being removed to the seaside or other cool retreat, and from procuring proper diet and timely medical attendance. During the prevalence of the hot weather the great value of the country sanatorium for children should not be overlooked.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 79 were in institutions, 394 in tenement-houses, 188 in houses containing 3 families and less, 5 in hotels and boarding-houses, 7 in rivers, boats, streets, etc., 9 were on the basement floor, 142 on the first, 218 on the second, 129 on the third, 64 on the fourth, 23 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth, and 1 on the top; 667 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 60 were stated as single, 98 married, 38 widowed, and the condition of 477 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 331 deaths were of children under 1 year, 406 under 2 years, 449 under 5 years, and 20 were of persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 654 deaths and still-births, or 91.39 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 18, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 287, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 65, Greenwood (undenominational) 38, Lutheran (undenominational) 125, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 34, Evergreen (undenominational) 41, Woodlawn (undenominational) 11, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 10, Union (Methodist Protestant) 5, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 3, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 11, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 3, Washington (undenominational) 3.

The mean temperature for the week ending July 7, was 72.4 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 77, saturation being 100, the mean pressure of the atmosphere was 29.804 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 835, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.01 inches, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending June 30, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 14; Second, 0; Third, 2; Fourth, 15; Fifth, 6; Sixth, 10; Seventh, 22; Eighth, 23; Ninth, 28; Tenth, 16; Eleventh, 35; Twelfth, 47; Thirteenth, 17; Fourteenth, 14; Fifteenth, 9; Sixteenth, 13; Seventeenth, 51; Eighteenth, 18; Nineteenth, 88; Twentieth, 50; Twenty-first, 26; Twenty-second, 66; Twenty-third, 3, and Twenty-fourth, 8.
