week consists of the following pieces, viz.: 223 promenade floor-beams erected, and 74 put in place for erection; 122 intermediate prom-enade floor-beams erected, and 227 put in place for erection; 125 braces at bottom of posts, and 120 braces under promenade floor-beams erected ; 105 truss diagonals and 35 posts have been erected ; 22 posts and 16 top chords have been put in place for erection ; 16 over-floor stays have been connected at top of the tower ; 30 bridging trusses and 2 under floor diagonals have been trusses and 2 under-floor diagonals have been erected.

Much work has been done in adjusting the bridge floor-beams to the proper grade. The paving on the New York approach has been carried over on one side of the Franklin Square 50 bridge, and about one-half of the Whole of the paving on that approach has been done. The work on the foundations of the station buildings, on both the New York and Brooklyn approaches, has been going on satisfactorily. There has been received from Edge Moor during the week 252,965 lbs. of steel. 00
