

SIR—Your communication, dated February 2, 1899, is received.
You state that you transmitted to me, under date of December 21, 1898, a communication you had received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, dated December 19, 1898, and requesting my advice thereon.

my advice thereon.

The communication related to the hiring or leasing, by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, of offices, buildings, etc., as specified in section 541 of the Charter.

You acknowledge the receipt of my opinion of February I, 1899, in answer to yours of December 21, 1898, and refer to the following portions of that opinion:

"The leases above referred to should be executed by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, after having obtained the consent and approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners."

"Section 217 of the Charter formulates a general rule for the authorization of leases and the approval of applications to lease by the Sinking Fund Commissioners, but does not formulate any rule for the execution of the leases."

You then call my attention to that portion of section 149 of the Charter which is as follows:

"The comptroller shall enter into, upon behalf of The City of New York, any lease authorized by the commissioners of the sinking fund of property leased to the city."

You then state that as it appears that I may have overlooked this provision does not relate to leases authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for the use of the Department of Street Cleaning. Street Cleaning.

Section 541 of the Charter provides as follows:

"The said commissioner (of street cleaning) is hereby authorized, with the consent and approval of the board of sinking fund commissioners, to hire or lease suitable and sufficient offices for the transaction of the business under his charge, and also such stables and other buildings or

"for the transaction of the business under his energe, and also such states and other bankings of the parts of buildings or plots of ground as may, from time to time, be necessary."

Leases entered into under the provisions of this section of the Charter are not authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but are authorized by the Legislature.

This provision of the Charter is the same as was contained in section 705 of the Consolidation

Act, as amended by the Laws of 1894.

Act, as amended by the Laws of 1894.

The portion of section 149 of the Charter quoted by you is similar to the following portion of section 123 of the Consolidation Act:

"The comptroller shall enter into, on behalf of the mayor, aldermen and commonalty of the city, any lease authorized by the commissioners of the sinking fund of property leased to the "city." "city."
The distinction is that the leases authorized by section 54t of the Charter are not leases

The distinction is that the leases authorized by section 54t of the Charter are not leases authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

I am of the opinion that the leases authorized by section 54t of the Charter should be executed by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning after having obtained the consent and approval of the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners.

SIR-In reply to the action taken by the Board of Public Improvements on the 14th day of December, 1898, referring to me, for report, copy of a communication from Church E. Gates & Co. and six (6) others, in relation to the widening of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at the approach to the Madison Avenue Bridge, Borough of The Bronx, and calling attention to the very steep grade of the present approach between Gerard avenue and the Harlem river, and asking for a reduction of the gradient from 4½ feet per centum to a maximum grade of 3 per centum or less; and communication from the Buena Vista Realty Company, protesting against it. I report as follows: against it, I report as follows:

The stéadily increasing travel in East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, and the apparent inadequacy of the present Madison Avenue Bridge, are evidence that more space should be provided, and that the approach leading to the bridge should have a lighter grade and, as recommended by the petitioners, the changes should be established now to guide future building opera-

tions.

I have prepared and submit herewith a map or plan showing the widening of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, from Mott avenue to the Harlem river; the change of grades between the New York and Harlem Railroad and the Harlem river, and the discontinuing of a part of Exterior street, south of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street.

The widening of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street is proposed on the south side for the reason that it makes East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street a more continuous line from Third avenue, and because the owners on both sides are reported to be in favor of it.

Exterior street was reduced in width from 100 feet to 80 feet, because it is the continuation of East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, which is only 80 feet wide, and because the space between the present Exterior street and the bulkhead-line of the Harlem river is too narrow for commercial purposes. The open space which was laid out, where East One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street and Exterior street extend to the Harlem river, was taken off the map, because, after widening East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, which is only about 800 feet therefrom, sufficient access to the river is given.

The grade of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at Mott avenue, was lowered from 15 feet above high water to 12 feet, reducing thereby the ascent of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, between the change of grade under the New York and Harlem Railroad tracks to Mott avenue, from 5.65 feet per centum to 3.45 per 100 feet. The raising of the grade of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, at Exterior street, formerly Gerard avenue, diminishes the gradient up to the bridge from 4.61 feet per centum to 2.84 feet per 100 feet. The benefits derived from these changes of grades need no comment.

The recommendation is made under authority of section 436 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, which says that the Board of Public Improvements is authorized and empowered, without the concurrence of the Municipal Assembly, but with the approval of the Mayor, to change the grades of bridges, tunnels and approaches to bridges and tunnels and the location of approaches

to bridges and tunnels.

I also transmit a technical description to be used for a public hearing, which is recommended

to be given in this matter.

of the completion of the Grant Memorial, plans were prepared for a better approach to the structure than by the way of the existing streets—One Hundred and Tenth street and One Hundred and

Twenty-second street. Two plans were submitted by the Commissioner of Public Works, one as to One Hundred and Twenty-third street, which street, by one plan, was to be made 80 feet in width by taking 20 feet from the blocks on the southerly side of the old street, from Amsterdam avenue to the Riverside Park, opposite the Grant Memorial. This plan was abandoned, as it was found that the grades on the proposed altered street, from the Boulevard to the Park, were too great to admit of its practical use.

The other plan submitted was as to One Hundred and Twentieth street, which the plan proposed to alter to a uniform width of 100 feet, and to be extended through the blocks between the Boulevard and Riverside drive. The grades of the cross streets were well suited to afford easy travel for the altered street and to make a connecting link between the Central Park and Riverside drive. This plan was adopted and maps were filed, and by resolution of the Board of Street Opening and Improvement of October 9, 1896, "the entire cost and expense of the opening was assessed upon the property deemed to be benefited thereby."

In the matter of the petition of Columbia College to the Board of Public Improvements, praying that it be relieved of any and all assessments for benefit in the opening of One Hundred and Twentieth street, should not be granted for the following reasons:

First—That the widening of One Hundred and Twentieth street, from 60 feet width to 100 feet, between the Boulevard and Amsterdam avenue, in front of their property, was done at the request and solicitation of the college at the time of the transfer of the title of the property to the college, about two years before the whole street was laid out and made 100 feet wide. The reason given at that time was that the structures to be built by the college would not look as imposing on a narrow street as on a wide one. After numerous hearings before the Mayor and the Corporation Counsel, it was agreed between the city and the Trustees of Columbia College to make carried out at that time.

The Trustees of Columbia College, under date of July 1, 1896, petitioned to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement that One Hundred and Twentieth street be widened and extended from Amsterdam avenue to the Riverside drive, and made 100 feet wide. The following

"The Teachers' College, situated on One Hundred and Twentieth street, east of the Boulevard, also united in the foregoing petition of Barnard College."

In consideration of the reasons set forth as above, and the public character and use of the street, I would respectfully recommend that a reconsideration of the resolution of the Board of Street Openings and Improvement, passed October 9, 1896, be made, and a resolution by the Board of Public Improvements rescinding the same be passed, and that a new resolution be made that not more than one-half of the cost and expense of said opening be assumed and paid by the city at large.

DEAR SIR—With letter of 23d ultimo, from the Secretary of your Board, was transmitted to me for investigation and report, a copy of a communication dated the 16th ultimo, from the President of the Borough of The Bronx, embodying a resolution of the Local Board of the Twenty-second District, calling upon the Commissioner of Water Supply to hasten the extension of the city's water service east of the Bronx river, and that in the distribution of the city's water supply no water be furnished to any private corporation engaged in the business of water supply.

In reply I have to repeat what I stated in previous communications, and report that the obstacles at the present time to the extension of the city's water service east of the Bronx river consist in the fact that the streets leading to the river, from the east and west, are not yet permanently graded to the established grades; that the bridges across the river are not capable of carrying the necessary water-mains, and that pumping machinery will be required at a new high service station at Jerome Park, with a 48-inch water-main; thence through the central and southerly section of the Borough of The Bronx to increase the present inadequate supply east of the Bronx river, and to afford the necessary supply in the event of extending the water service west of the

The ordinance to authorize the erection of the high service works at Jerome Park is now pending in the Municipal Assembly, and the recommendation and estimate for the 48-inch watermain will be placed before your Board at an early day.

GENTLEMEN—Under date of January 24 I transmitted to your Board a report addressed to me by the Comptroller in relation to proceedings for the improvement of certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, known as the Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Act. My communication and the Comptroller's report were published in the minutes of your Board on January 25 (See page 126, Minutes of January 25, 1899). In that report the Comptroller stated that one-fifth of the assessments for the grading and paving of certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward had been paid in as required by the Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Act before said improvements could be undertaken; that he realized the injustice to the property-owners growing out of the delay, and that he had addressed the Carpovarion Coursel required. GENTLEMEN-Under date of January 24 I transmitted to your Board a report addressed to be undertaken; that he realized the injustice to the property-owners growing out of the delay, and that he had addressed the Corporation Counsel requesting an opinion to determine what steps could be taken to enable The City of New York to undertake the work of improving said streets.

On the 7th instant I received from the Comptroller a copy of an opinion rendered to him by On the 7th instant I received from the Comptroller a copy of an opinion rendered to him by the Corporation Counsel, in response to his request. A copy of this opinion is herewith inclosed. In it the Corporation Counsel states that proceedings instituted by the officials of the former City of Brooklyn for the improvement of streets under the provisions of the Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Act, can be carried out by The City of New York, and that, where one-fifth of the assessments on any specific improvement have been paid in, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment has the right to provide for the issue of bonds to pay for the improvements, and the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly may authorize the making of a contract.

Justice requires that these improvements be made as quickly as possible. Assessments on some of them were paid nearly two years ago and the unpaid assessments are a lien on the property, greatly reducing its marketable value. I understand that as the law has been construed assessments paid in are not now available for paying for the making of improvements, as in the case of improvements carried out under the terms of the charter of the former City of Brooklyn, but must first be applied to the redemption of bonds, so that new assessment bonds issued will simply take the place of other assessment bonds canceled as assessments are paid in by the property of the charter of the second of the property of the charter of the place of other assessment bonds canceled as assessments are paid in by the property of the charter of the place of the property of the property of the property of the property of the place of the place of the property of the place of the pl erty-owners.

It will be seen, therefore, that while bonds to the amount of \$172,786.63, according to the Comptroller's report, must be issued, in order that proceedings for these improvements may be continued, this amount is greater than that for which the city loans its credit, because \$50,426.98 has already paid in, and additional payments on assessments will doubtless be made as soon as the property-owners receive assurance that the work is to be commenced.

I accordingly inclose a resolution for your action, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue bonds to pay for the grading and paving of the streets above referred to, which are as follows:

Sir-I have received your communication of January 18, which reads as follows:
"Chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892 authorized the improvement of the streets and avenues in the Twenty-sixth Ward of the former City of Brooklyn, and the proper officials levied the assessments for the grading and paving of certain streets and avenues in accordance with the provisions of said act, to wit:

"The act under which these improvements were authorized provided that whenever one-fifth of the assessment had been collected, the Commissioner of City Works, with the preliminary assent of the Mayor, could authorize a contract for the work to be made.

"Upon examination of the records, it is found that on seven of the improvements heretofore mentioned more than the necessary one-fifth of the assessments has been collected, and that no work has been hearn execut the lowering of the contract of the contrac

work has been begun except the levying of the assessment.

"It is desirable that the improvements should be begun and completed at the earliest possible day, and as various questions arise in connection with these matters I would respectfully inquire:

"First, as to the method of procedure; whether the Commissioner of Highways in the matter of these improvements is the successor to the former Commissioner of City Works of the City of Brooklyn, and if so, whether said Commissioner of Highways may, with the consent of the Mayor,

authorize contracts for said improvements (section 7 chapter 310, Laws of 1892; section 527 of the Greater New York Charter), or whether said contracts must be first authorized by the Board of Public Improvements, or by the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly?

"Second, does chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, give authority to the City of New York to issue bonds for the completion of said improvements? If so, shou!d said bonds be issued pursuant o said law, or should the issue be of assessment bonds, when authorized, pursuant to the provisions of section 181 of the Greater New York Charter?

"Third, if no issue of bonds is permissible, from what funds should moneys be advanced for completion of said improvements, which must be completed under the provisions of chapter

the completion of said improvements, which must be completed under the provisions of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892. In reply thereto, I would say that the improvements in question were begun under the provisions of the so-called Twenty-sixth Ward Improvement Act (chapter 310, Laws of 1892). The scheme of procedure set forth in this act follows closely the provisions of the Charter of the City of Brooklyn in regard to like matter, but devolves upon certain officers of the city duties in relation thereto, which by the charter are cast upon other boards of officers.

By section 527 of the Greater New York Charter, all the powers and duties conferred upon the corporation known as The City of Brooklyn or upon any Board of Officers thereof, in any way relating to the Improvement of Streets, are vested in The City of New York, as constituted by the Greater New York Charter, and as matter of administration devolved upon the Commissioner of Highways, and by him are to be executed pursuant to the provisions, directions and limitations of

Highways, and by him are to be executed pursuant to the provisions, directions and limitations of

Section 8 of the Laws of 1892, provides as follows:

"Section 8. Whenever one-fifth of any assessment hereinbefore authorized shall have been collected, the Commissioner of City Works, with the preliminary assent of the Mayor, may authorize a contract for the work to be made, provided, however, that no such contract shall be made unless the amount unappropriated of the Twenty-sixth Ward Street Improvement Fund shall be sufficient to pay the cost of the said work as fixed by such contract. Upon the making of such contract the Comptroller shall appropriate and set apart so much of the said Assessment Fund as shall be necessary to pay the cost of said improvement."

sary to pay the cost of said improvement."

In my opinion the only safe course will be to have the contracts authorized by the Board of Public Improvements and the Municipal Assembly.

In answer to your second question, I would say section 7, of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892,

In answer to your second question, I would say section 7, of chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, provides as follows:

"To meet the cost of improving the streets and avenues as provided for in this act, the mayor, comptroller and city clerk shall on the requisition of the commissioner of city works, and from time to time as required, prepare and issue certificates of indebtedness of the city of Brooklyn, to be called Twenty-sixth Ward improvement assessment certificates, payable not more than five years after their date, and bearing interest at a rate not to exceed 5 per centum per annum, and not more than \$500,000 of said certificates shall be issued * * * But the total sum authorized to be expended for the purposes of this act shall not in the aggregate exceed one million of dollars, and the certificates hereinbefore authorized to be issued, and the interest thereon, shall be paid out of the moneys collected from the assessments hereinbefore authorized."

Section 170 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"Whenever and to the extent to which it may be lawful for the municipal or public corporations or parts thereof, including the counties of Kings and Richmond, which by this act are made part of the corporation of the city of New York, to issue for public purposes bonds pursuant to laws enacted prior to January I, 1898, it shall be lawful for the city of New York, as hereby constituted, to issue corporate stock as herein provided for the same purposes; provided, however, that the amount so to be issued shall not in any one case exceed the balance remaining unissued of the amount limited to be issued pursuant to the authority of said laws. In similar instances assessment bonds and revenue bonds of the city of New York, as hereby constituted, may likewise be so issued, subject to the same limitation as to the amount thereof."

Section 181 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

Section 181 of the Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be lawful for the comptroller, when authorized by the board of estimate and apportionment to issue assessment bonds * * * to provide the means necessary to pay all expenses incurred or to be incurred on account of regulating and paving streets, building sewers and all other work ordered to be done by contract, by virtue of ordinances which may be hereafter passed by the municipal assembly of the city of New York, the expense whereof is to be collected by assessment from the property benefited by said work or works, or on account of any local improvement or other public work heretofore made or performed, or that shall hereafter be made or performed under and by virtue of the authority of any law in all cases in which the said expense is to be paid in whole or in part by assessment upon the property benefited."

In answer to your second question, I am of the opinion that The City of New York can issue assessment bonds to meet the cost of improving the streets and avenues as provided for in chapter 310 of the Laws of 1892, and that such bonds should be issued when authorized, pursuant to the provisions of section 181 of the Greater New York Charter.

Section 8 provides that no such contract shall be made, unless the amount unappropriated of

Section 8 provides that no such contract shall be made, unless the amount unappropriated of the said "Twenty-sixth Ward Street Improvement Fund" shall be sufficient to pay the cost of said work as fixed by such contract.

Section 7 of said act provides as follows:

"The said certificates shall not be sold for less than their par value, and the proceeds shall be paid into the City Treasury to the credit of a fund hereby created, to be known as the "Twenty-sixth Ward Street Improvement Fund," to be paid from time to time on proper vouchers, as may be required for the purposes of this act. All moneys collected upon any assessment hereinbefore authorized shall be paid into said fund, and they may from time to time be used for any of the purposes authorized by this act."

The certificates heretofore issued, if any, and the assessment bonds to be hereafter issued should not together exceed \$500,000. The total sum expended and to be expended under the provisions of the act should not exceed \$1,000,000.

Whereas, The fund derived from payments on assessments cannot now be applied to the making of the improvements, but must first be used for the redemption of assessment bonds which the Corporation Counsel has held can be legally issued by the Board of Estimate and Apportion-tionment; therefore, he it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is hereby requested to issue as early as practicable assessment bonds to such amount as the Comptroller may report is necessary to pay for the improvements above mentioned.

He concluded by urging the different members of the Board of Public Improvements to use their influence with the members of the local legislature to impress upon them the need of affairs.
