Work Done by Office Force.

Making the necessary calculations for and plotting of the above field work. This includes the calculation of traverses, balancing of same and computation of co-ordinates.

Reduction of elevations from heights of instruments and rod readings and adjustment of level traverses.

Plotting a topographical map at a scale of 80 feet to 1 inch, making a reduced copy of same at a scale of 200 feet to 1 inch, and tracings of the latter from which blue prints were made for the purpose of making a map showing a street system and grades of that portion of the Fourth Ward, south of Liberty avenue, lying westerly of Ocean avenue, and of the portion of the Second Ward for which no grade map has yet been filed.

Sir—In accordance with section 1554 of the Greater New York Charter, I submit the following report of the transactions of this Department for the quarter ending September 30, 1905:

Water Supply.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX, QUEENS AND RICHMOND.

Attached hereto and marked "Document I.," is the report of Chief Engineer I. M. de Varona, in which is shown in detail the condition of the water supply, the work done along the aqueducts, repairs and extension of the distribution system, tables giving consumption, supply and storage, and the expenditures provided for by the Budget and bond issues for the quarter ending September 30, 1905, for the above-named boroughs.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The report of Acting Chief Engineer I. M. de Varona, marked "Document II.," and attached hereto, deals with the operation and maintenance of the Brooklyn distribution. The condition of the water supply, the repairs and extensions to the distribution system, with tables showing consumption, supply and storage, and the expenditures for the quarter ending September 30, 1905, are given in detail.

The work done along the line of the Aqueduct during the quarter ending September 30, 1905, has consisted of the regular maintenance and repairs in and around the Croton water sheds, along the lines of the old and new aqueducts, Bronx river pipe lines and distributing reservoirs.

The work performed in the watershed has consisted of repairs to the highway bridges at Middle Branch reservoir, and earth work, paving and dry stone work at Carmel; collecting samples of water from the lakes, reservoirs and streams for the Laboratory, patrolling the streams and reservoirs; building, repairing and painting fences and cutting the grass on the embankments of the dams around reservoirs and along the highways.

The work along the Bronx pipe lines has consisted of cleaning the banks of Wampus and Byram rivers, Beargutter Channel and Rye Pond reservoir, and along the pipe line and the highways between Kensico and Byram reservoirs.

The work of the electrozone plant at Brewsters has been continued during the quarter.

The work at Brewsters has consisted of continuing the improvement of the East Branch reservoir under the contract with Clinton-Beckwith.

The work at Titicus reservoir has consisted of repairing highway bridges at Salem Centre, and building, repairing and painting fences.

The work at Amawalk (Muscoot) reservoir has consisted of building and painting fences and in painting the Keeper's house, collecting samples of water for laboratories at Brooklyn and Mount Kisco, and maintaining a sanitary patrol.

The work along the aqueducts and around the reservoirs has consisted of caring for the Croton dam gate houses and machinery, cleaning the shores of the lake, cutting the grass, building, repairing and painting fences, making and setting fence gates and telephone poles, rebuilding dry stone walls, relaying bluestone flagging, resetting coping, painting coping and masonry, keeping the surface of the water in reservoirs clean, and patrolling the reservoir and pipe lines.

The above figures show that a larger number of analyses have been made during the quarter than usual, and also that the waters supplied throughout the quarter to the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx have been in good condition.

Pollution on Watershed.

On July 14 a communication was addressed by the Chief Engineer to the Trustees of the Montefiore Home complaining that no action had yet been taken to install permanent works for the protection of the supply from sewage from the Montefiore Home and urging immediate action.

This communication was acknowledged on July 15 by Dr. Alfred Meyer, stating that a meeting had been immediately held by the Executive Committee of the Montefiore Home and Messrs. M. W. Platzek, Isaac Blumenthal, Isaac Brandon and Dr. Meyer had been appointed to meet the Chief Engineer and finally arrange the details of the permanent work to be done, so that the latter could be completed. The temporary treatment by chloride of lime had been continued with satisfactory results.

After several interviews, the Chief Engineer, on July 26, addressed a communication to Mr. Isaac Blumenthal, giving full details as to the permanent plans to be established for the prevention of pollution from sewage and specified the chemical treatment to be applied to the sewage.

In regard to the pollution at Mount Kisco, the Chief Engineer, on August 22, forwarded to Hon. Daniel Lewis, M. D., Commissioner of Health, State Department of Health, Albany, tracing and blue print copies of proposed plan for sewage disposal for the Village of Mount Kisco, to be installed by this Department. In these plans the Chief Engineer embodied all the suggestions made by Professor Olin H. Landreth, Consulting Engineer of the Department of Health, in his report to the Commissioner of Health on March 15, 1904, on the plans previously prepared by this Department, so that in their present form those plans would be found free from all the objections pointed out in Professor Landreth's report and would also be effective in removing all danger of pollution from the Kisco river.

Under the sewage plans four districts are to be established, as follows:

District A—This is by far the most important district, comprising, as it does, approximately about three-quarters of the village, and the point of delivery of the sewage is at Lexington avenue and Branch brook, where our septic tanks and pumping station will be built.

District B—This is a very small district, on which not more than six or eight houses, widely scattered, will be found. It lies about a mile south of the village. It is not proposed by the Village of Mount Kisco to build sewers there at present. The plan presented provides simply for possible future needs. When the sewers are built, however, the sewage can be delivered on filter beds which will be built on lands to be acquired by the City at Lexington avenue and Kisco river.

District C—Under the original sewage plans this is a small district, comprising the lowland north of the main street of the village. No sewers will be built there, however, because this Department has decided to condemn all the property in this district which is too low to drain into District A. Should buildings be erected hereafter in high portions of the land lying to the north of the main street of the village they can be readily drained into District A.

District D—As in the case of District C, this is a small district, lying to the west of the village, and as yet little developed. We understand that the sewers are not to be built at present in that district, and that it is intended to cut a road connecting Main street with South street through the low notch in the ridge, which, when the sewers are built in that district, will provide an outlet for the sewage so that it will drain through District A into our Lexington avenue station.

As will be seen, the sewage plant under the above arrangement will not only take care of all the sewage for which provision is to be made, but also for the prospective increase through Districts B and D, and by the elimination of the lowlands in District C obviates the difficulty previously met, owing to the desire of the Mount Kisco Village authorities to have a second pumping station.

On August 23 I forwarded to Mr. I. J. Beaudrias, who has charge of the condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of land by this Department, and to Mr. Isaac Turner, President of the Village of Mount Kisco, copy of letter and sewage plans submitted to the Commissioner of Health and above referred to.

Break at Centre Market Place.

Owing to the very deep excavations which were being made at the time for the building to be erected for the Police Department, there was a break in our 6-inch water main at Centre Market place on August 2, 1905, which flooded the cellar and

excavation then being made. The attention of the Police Department had been called, in a communication from the Chief Engineer dated April 4, to these excavations, and they had been requested to protect our hydrants in their positions from all injury and settlement or damage during the whole time the excavation would be open. George Murray, Assistant Foreman of our repair gangs on duty at that time, first reported on the leak in the afternoon as a slight one, but at about 7 p. m. there was a further notice from the police in regard to the leak, which increased in intensity shortly after that time, and, as already stated, resulted in a serious flood to the cellar and excavation. The broken main, on examination, indicated that the accident was due, as already stated, to a settlement of the street, caused by the excavations. The ends of the broken pipe were capped at about 3 a. m. on August 3, and the water turned on at once.

Break in 48-Inch Main on Park Avenue.

On July 28 the Chief Engineer acknowledged receipt of communication addressed to the Commissioner of the Department by the Corporation Counsel on June 13, in which the latter requests full details in regard to the break in the 48-inch main on Park avenue, near Forty-first street, which took place on June 11, so that such preparations as might be required may be made, in view of possible claims arising from said break, and forwarded copies of the report of the Assistant Engineer in charge of repairs to distribution and depositions of the Transitman who was on the ground and of the Caulkers, Laborers and other employees of the Department who in any way are concerned in the matter, the originals of these depositions, duly signed, being placed on file. These papers give a full record of the facts in the case, to which little need be added. In this communication the Chief Engineer states as follows:

"I may add that from all the facts of the case, as far as gathered, it is my opinion that whatever may be said in regard to the delay in shutting off the water, the Rapid Transit Commission or their agents are responsible for the break, and should make the necessary repairs.

"It is pertinent to state that in spite of the communications addressed by me to the Chief Engineer of the Rapid Transit Commission, nothing has been done to date to open the pipe so as to ascertain its condition and make the necessary repairs. I recommend that such measures be taken as you may deem advisable to have this matter attended to and disposed of finally. It is obvious that the street and the main should not remain in the condition in which they were left by the break any longer than absolutely necessary."

On September 1 the Deputy Commissioner forwarded to the Chief Engineer several communications which had been addressed to his Honor the Mayor, complaining of the condition of the street in Park avenue from Forty-first to Forty-second street, resulting from the break in the water main on June 11, and in answer thereto the Chief Engineer submitted a full statement of the facts in the case from the time the 48-inch main was cut off to the date of the break, appending thereto copies of the various communications (marked from 1 to 16) on file in this office, which had passed between the Engineer's Bureau and the Rapid Transit Commission or their representatives. In this statement both the damage originally done to the pipe through the work of the Rapid Transit Commission and steps subsequently taken in attempting to repair it were clearly stated, as well as the respective views of the Engineers of the Rapid Transit Commission and those of the Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Chief Engineer's communication terminated as follows:

"This report might well end here, but as I find among the communications transmitted by the Secretary of his Honor the Mayor, one signed by Mr. G. L. Rives, Counsel to the Rapid Transit Commission, discussing the legal aspects of the question and the power of the Rapid Transit Commission to compel the contractor to repair water mains damaged during the prosecution of his work, it may be well to refer to another opinion from Mr. Rives, dated May 19, 1904, and addressed also to the President of the Rapid Transit Commission (see Appendix No. 16), in which, after reviewing some cases of damage to pipes submitted to Mr. Rives for his opinion as to the responsibility for the damage, Mr. Rives calls attention to the agreement of the contractor under his contract, under which 'any inefficient or imperfect work which may be discovered before the final acceptance of the work, shall be corrected immediately on the requirement of the Engineer, notwithstanding that it may have been overlooked by the proper Inspector; and that all work which shall become damaged before final acceptance, shall be broken up and removed and be replaced by good and sound work.' Mr. Rives writes:

"We are inclined to the opinion that the phrase 'Final acceptance of the work' is intended to mean the final acceptance of the entire railroad as completed, which acceptance would probably be effected by the certificate of the Board, making the final payment on account of construction. But, even if a different construction is placed upon the phrase referred to, we think that the act of final acceptance would have to be shown in some definite manner, as, for example, by a certificate from the Chief Engineer."

"Mr. Rives adds that if the above views are correct, it follows that the contractor may be called upon to make good any imperfect or improper work which may be discovered at any time before the entire railroad is completed, or at least before he obtains a certificate from the Chief Engineer accepting such work, and he concludes by detailing the steps to be taken in case the contractor should disclaim any liability in the cases submitted to Mr. Rives' consideration.

"Whether the expense of the necessary repairs of the break is to be defrayed by the Rapid Transit Commissioners or their agents or representatives, the contractors, is a question, however, which does not concern us; but it seems clear, from the facts, that this Department has no responsibility whatever for the break.

"In view of the constantly recurring cases of damage to our water pipes along the line of the subway—of which some idea may be formed by stating that I have before me reports (by no means complete) of 108 breaks, large and small, along these lines—I would respectfully recommend that the Corporation Counsel be requested to render an opinion as to the length of time during which the Rapid Transit Commission or their contractors are responsible for repairs necessary to our mains along the routes of the subway and due to the construction or operation of the latter."

On September 27 the Law Department acknowledged receipt of communication from the Commissioner of this Department, dated August 4, 1905, in which, in response to the request of the Corporation Counsel of June 13, already referred to, full reports from the office of the Chief Engineer giving the details of the break in the 48-inch main on Park avenue, near Forty-first street, which occurred on June 11, 1905, were given. The Corporation Counsel reviewed the various reports and communications submitted by this Department and by the Chief Engineer and representatives of the Rapid Transit Commission, and, answering the question of the Commissioner as to what course to pursue, stated:

"In my opinion you should forthwith notify the Rapid Transit Commission to repair and put in proper condition the said 48-inch main in Park avenue, between Fortieth and Forty-second streets, and also properly connect the same with the 30-inch main in Forty-second street if the same has not been done, so that the circulation of the water should be restored to the same condition that existed prior to the disturbance of said main by work on the subway by the Rapid Transit Commission or its contractors. In the same letter you should also notify said Commission that if within two days it does not begin such repairs the same will be undertaken by your Department and that the expense thereof added to the proper charges of restoring the street will be claimed as damages by the City from the said Rapid Transit Commission and its contractors. * * *

"You should also at once arrange your force to begin this work should the Rapid Transit Commission fail to do so. In doing such work it is absolutely necessary that in the first instance the cause of said break should be ascertained by your corps of experts. Indeed this should be done also, even if the work is undertaken by the Rapid Transit Commission. Every proper scientific observation and test should be applied to ascertain the exact cause of said break. * * *

"When such examination has been made, as pointed out herein, I request you to send me notice of its results and full reports thereof, so that the same may be placed on the files of this Department for future reference in the interests of the City."

On September 28 the Commissioner, in accordance with the above directions of the Corporation Counsel, officially notified the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners to make the necessary repairs in and connections to the above mentioned main, and added that if within two days the Rapid Transit Commission did not begin such repairs, the same would be undertaken by this Department and the expense thereof, added to the proper charges of restoring the street, would be claimed as damages by the City from the Rapid Transit Commission and its contractors. The Commissioner

begged to be advised when the work of uncovering the main was to begin, so that we might detail an Inspector on the work, and eventually make the necessary arrangements for the preliminary tests of the same before it was finally recovered. The Commissioner also forwarded to the Corporation Counsel copy of his communication to the Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners above referred to.

On September 29 the Commissioner quoted the following from the report of the Chief Engineer:

"In view of the constantly recurring cases of damage to our water pipe along the line of the subway—of which some idea may be formed by stating that I have before me reports (by no means complete) of 108 breaks, large and small, along these lines—I would respectfully recommend that the Corporation Counsel be requested to render an opinion as to the length of time during which the Rapid Transit Commission or their contractors are responsible for repairs necessary to our mains along the routes of the subway and due to the construction or operation of the latter."

—and requested to be advised in regard to the length of time during which the Rapid Transit Commission or their contractors are responsible for repairs to our mains which may be required on account of damage caused by the construction or operation of the subway.

On September 29 a claim for alleged damages, amounting to \$16,433.49, and arising from the break in the 48-inch main on Park avenue, was presented by the Interborough Rapid Transit Company.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Work Done in the Borough of Queens During the Quarter.

During the quarter repair gangs have been steadily employed in making necessary repairs, in lowering mains and in some instances laying new mains where such work could be done by the force at our disposal.

We expect to make a general examination of all gates and hydrants in this system in about six weeks time, or just previous to the beginning of cold weather, when all permits for the use of hydrants will be revoked, and at that time to place the service in as good condition as possible.

The work of lowering water mains and connections in Lockwood street is nearing completion.

The demands made upon this Department for the extension of water mains is very urgent, but owing to the limited appropriation at our command we propose to lay water mains only in streets which are properly graded and sewerred, or where necessities of the system demand the same. In the Third Ward of this borough are found several instances where it is very necessary to connect our mains in order to make proper connection between adjacent villages, and the same are included in the plans being prepared.

In the First Ward, or Long Island City, owing to the erection of several large manufacturing establishments near the water front, we have received requests for mains to supply such factories, and we shall include the same in plans now being prepared.

The work of laying 20-inch main from Flushing station to Flushing stand pipe is not progressing as rapidly as we could wish for. There is now laid about 1,700 feet of main, and we have pipe enough on the ground to lay about 800 feet more. The work of excavation on this contract was commenced about two weeks ago with a force of about 25 men. The pipe necessary for this contract is being shipped very slowly, and we have urged greater efforts on the part of Contractors Messrs. Norton & Dalton. We have also requested them to ship, as soon as possible, the 12-inch pipe necessary for their work in Long Island City, and advised them to proceed with this portion of their contract as soon as possible.

The corporation yards in the borough are in good condition, and are supplied with necessary pipe and fittings for repairs.

Worthington for two high duty pumping engines of 10,000,000 gallons daily capacity each, with boilers and all appurtenances complete, was completed, and the capacity and duty trials were made on September 18 and 19, and on September 26 and 27, respectively, and the following results were obtained:

These tests were conducted after the engines had been in regular service since about March 26, and tests show that each engine exceeded the requirements for capacity and duty.

The general arrangement of this station is such that there is but a single line of steam piping supplying steam from the three boilers in boiler-room to the two engines through one line of continuous pipe. Should a break or bad leak occur in this line, or should repairs be required in any part of same, it would necessitate the shutting down of the station. Provision should therefore be made for a double steam line in this station, thereby removing all danger of shutting down, due to breakdowns in the main steam line.

One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street and High Bridge Pumping Stations.

During the quarter extensive repairs were made to the pumping engines and other machinery in these stations. Before completion, these repairs were temporarily stopped. The old scales, which were worn out, were removed and were replaced by new large scales.

New slate stalls and closets were placed in the basement of the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Station, thereby adding to the comfort of the station attendants and improving the sanitary condition of the station.

Repairs were made to the coal conveyor and to the furnaces of the boilers in the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Station.

The roof of the High Bridge Station was also repaired.

Preparations are being made to lay the 20-inch auxiliary force main from the tower service pumps in the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station to Amsterdam avenue, and also to lay a large main connecting the upper high service of Manhattan to the upper high service of The Bronx.

It is also contemplated to increase the height of the standpipe tower and chimney of the One Hundred and Seventy-ninth Street Pumping Station.

Ninety-eighth Street Pumping Station.

During the quarter extensive repairs were made to pumping engine No. 3 and other machinery in this station. Before completion these repairs were temporarily stopped.

The old scales, which were worn out, were removed and were replaced by new large scales.

Repairs were made to the roof of the station.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

Tottenville Pumping Station.

The inside pipe of well No. 5 was drawn, the well was flushed and the new foot valve was placed in position. Wells Nos. 6, 7 and 8 have been cleaned and flushed. New heavy sucker rods have been placed in well pumps Nos. 6 and 8.

Necessary repairs were made to all the well houses.

There has been placed in the main steam line from the boilers to the well pumps a pressure reducing valve and a 3-inch expansion joint. Separators, properly trapped, have been placed in the steam line to well pumps Nos. 2, 3, 5, 6, 7 and 8.

The new coal house has been completed.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

First Ward—Pumping Station No. 1.

During the quarter the work of installing the surface condensers, air pumps, etc., in Station No. 1, under contract with Frank McSwegan & Sons, was completed, and the condensers are now in service.

The defective joint in the suction of No. 2 pump was repaired, and the valve rods, links and nuts of same were renewed.

First Ward—Pumping Station No. 3.

The cross head on pumping engine No. 1, which was broken, has been replaced. Leaky piping on the feed water purifier and heater was renewed and new plungers were put in feed pump. Minor repairs were made to No. 2 pumping engine and to its air pump. New turbine tube cleaners were received and gave satisfactory service.

Third Ward—Flushing Pumping Station.

The improvements being made at this station, under the contract with James A. Stevenson, are now progressing and are well advanced.

The air lift system, furnished and installed by the Hudson Engineering and Contracting Company, was officially tested on September 7 and 8.

The main steam piping in this station was thoroughly overhauled by the Department.

The repairs to engine No. 1, by the Reilly Engineering Company, were completed and the engine is now ready for regular service.

The valve rod link on the compressor, which broke during the quarter, was renewed and replaced.

The work of installing the condenser, etc., on engine No. 1, under contract with Frank McSwegan & Sons, has been completed. Boiler feed pump was completely repaired. A new floor was laid in the compressor room by the Department carpenter.

Preparations are being made to increase the supply of water from this station, the driving of additional wells and the extension of the pumping station itself is contemplated.

Third Ward—Bayside Pumping Station.

A 12-inch drain was laid from the boiler room in the pumping station to the adjoining creek.

New slate stall toilets are being installed in the boiler room.

The dwelling house attached to the pumping station has been repaired and painted. The outer walls of the old engine house were also painted.

Minor repairs were made to the Blake pumping engine.

Third Ward—Whitestone Pumping Station.

The new store house was painted by the Department. Necessary repairs were made to the plumbing, etc.

The station was run under full time during the quarter.

College Point Standpipe.

The work of scraping and painting the interior of the College Point standpipe has been completed, and the temporary shed has been placed over the pressure regulator.

It will be seen that the expenditure for salaries for the maintenance of the supply was less than that allowed in the Budget for the first two quarters, but was slightly greater than the allowed amount for the third quarter; the expenditures for salaries for distribution of repairs, on the other hand, exceeded the amount allowed, which was less than that asked for by the Department. The expenditure for supplies during the first and second quarter was comparatively small, owing to bills for expenses in the early part of the year in most cases not being rendered so as to be chargeable for the first quarter, but mainly owing to the fact that the expenditures for coal for the first quarter and for the larger portion of the second quarter were paid out of the appropriation for 1904; the coal contracts running up to May 1 of each year, and this year being continued for some time thereafter owing to the delay in advertising and awarding the coal contract.

Since our contracts for supplies are certified for 20 per cent. over the estimated amounts as given in the contracts, it is likely that our Budget will be exceeded before the end of the year, but the apparent deficit can be met and made up by reducing the over certification on those contracts where supplies beyond the amounts called for in the contract will not be required.

The appropriation made for salaries by the Tax Levy Budget was \$7,300, although the amount asked for was \$8,330, as it was impossible to carry on the work with less force than that employed at the Laboratory, the pay of five of the laborers was taken from the Water Revenue Fund during the first and second quarter, while during the third quarter the salaries of these men were charged against the Tax Levy Budget, together with the salaries of two Laboratory Assistants.

The records at the Municipal Building and at Hempstead Reservoir show a great difference in the rainfall within the Borough limits and the rainfall on our watershed, and this difference has had a marked effect on our supply. Several of the storms which gave heavy precipitation within the Borough limits were not felt on the watershed, and as a rainfall of less than one-half an inch in the summer time is practically all absorbed by the dry surface and lost through evaporation, it is only the heavy rainfalls which are of value to augment the supply. The total amount of rainfall at Hempstead during the past quarter was only 56 per cent. of the rainfall for the corresponding period of last year. It was, however, only a fraction of an inch less than the average rainfall during the corresponding month for the last seventy-eight years, this average being 11.66 inches. The total rainfall at Hempstead Reservoir for the first nine months amounted to 28.29 inches, while for the corresponding nine months during last year it amounted to 40.93 inches, and the average for the first nine months during the past seventy-eight years amounted to 32.94 inches. As any rainfall above the average finds its way mainly to the streams and the saturated sands, it can readily be seen that a large reduction in the available supply would be and was experienced in 1905 as compared with 1904.

Condition of the Supply.

At the commencement of the quarter the amount of water obtained from the various sources of supply, with all the driven wells and other stations running at their maximum, was inadequate to meet the demands and the water stored in our distributing reservoirs and our Hempstead Reservoir was being rapidly drawn upon. In fact, the supply from the various sources had been inadequate, without drawing on our storage, to meet the demands of the consumers since May 22, 1905. The total amount in storage on that date was 984,214,300 gallons. This had been reduced on July 1 to 675,110,100 gallons, the average rate of reduction being 7,726,605 gallons. The loss in the stored water, especially in the Ridgewood Reservoirs, continued so rapidly that by the middle of July it was not deemed safe to allow the distributing reservoirs to be drawn lower and steps were taken to reduce the pressure. The contents in the reservoirs had dropped on July 16 to 490,974,400 gallons, or at the rate of 12,275,713 gallons, while for the seven days preceding July 16 the contents of the reservoirs had dropped from 620,966,000 gallons to the figures previously given, the reduction for these seven days being at the rate of 18,570,228 gallons. On the morning of July 16 the depth of water in the distributing basins, together with their contents, was as follows:

The total contents in the distributing reservoirs had dropped during the week preceding from 196,450,000 to the figures above given. This reduction had been experienced in spite of our pumping the maximum amount that could be delivered at the Ridgewood Reservoir from the various sources of supply, including the Hempstead Storage Reservoir, and had the consumption been allowed to go on unchecked it would have only been a matter of two or three weeks before the Ridgewood basins would have been entirely emptied and there would have been absolutely no supply to meet an emergency caused by a large fire or by a break in any of the pumping stations or conduits.

Under these conditions the citizens of this Borough were notified through the public press that it would be necessary to reduce the pressure, and experiments were carried on during Sunday, July 16, to determine the effect of closing various gates throughout the City. About twenty observers were stationed at different points within the limits of the distribution system, and these observers recorded the pressures on a gauge attached to a hydrant and sent the records in hourly to the repair yard, where the results were tabulated and compared. It was found that, owing to the extensive cross-connections made recently between the various trunk mains, the pressure in one section of the City would form practically an accurate basis to determine the relative pressures in any other section of the City. About six gates were closed in the distribution system, mainly with the intent to help maintain the necessary supply for the Mount Prospect Pumping Station. It was found later, however, that the closing of these gates was not absolutely necessary and they were practically all opened during the month of August. The reduction in pressure was controlled by the operation of the head gate at the Ridgewood Reservoir, and the effect of reduced pressure was felt mainly in the higher sections of the Borough supplied by the Ridgewood Reservoir system, especially in the third and fourth floors of apartment houses in these sections. To provide for the high sections adjoining the boundaries of the Mount Prospect and New Lots Reservoir systems, these boundaries were extended so as to give adequate pressure, and in the latter part of September a large area, bounded approximately by Fulton street, Rockaway avenue, McDougal street, Granite street and Bushwick avenue, was added to the Mount Prospect Reservoir system, and provision has been made to add another large area during the coming quarter, the area being bounded approximately by Atlantic avenue, Rockaway avenue, East New York avenue, Eastern Parkway and Utica avenue. This will include the district known popularly as the Ocean Hill district and will relieve a section where the pressure has been inadequate for some years. The major portion of the Borough was not inconvenienced by the reduction in pressure, and in no case was the water supply cut off where it was used for manufacturing purposes. The reduced pressure was continued from July 16 up to August 14, when the comparatively heavy rains made it possible to resume practically full pressure. This was continued for about a week, when it was again found necessary to reduce the pressure, owing to the rapid reduction in the stored water, but the heavy rains in the early part of September again augmented the supply to such an extent that normal pressure was resumed in the day time and has been continued ever since. There has been, however, reduced pressure carried between the hours of 10 p. m. and 6 a. m., as a reduction in pressure between these hours would be felt by comparatively few citizens and the water saved by this reduction would enable the Department to carry full pressure in the day time for a period beyond what would have been possible were the rainfall low during the fall and were full pressure given both day and night.

By having gangs on duty at the Ridgewood Reservoir at all hours of the day and night, and by the installation of an additional telephone, it has been possible to avoid any interference with the supply for fire purposes, as the Fire Department was notified to send word to the Ridgewood Reservoir in case there was an alarm of fire requiring more water, and the full pressure would be given within a very short time. The efficiency of this plan has been fully proven by the results obtained when fires have occurred.

By extending the Mount Prospect high service district over the areas where the pressure previously was slightly under thirty pounds, it has left a very small area of the City where the pressure is low enough to cause any difficulty in obtaining an adequate supply for fire purposes, unless the fire required a third or fourth alarm. From the time it takes to operate the gates the full increase in pressure could be obtained within about twenty minutes, and within five minutes a substantial increase could be given.

The result of the reduced pressure was shown by the drop in the consumption, the consumption from the Ridgewood supply for the quarter being as follows:

It will be seen that had the consumption continued during the summer months at the same rate as it was from July 1 to July 16, we would have required about 530,000,000 gallons more than was used, or considerably more than the total amount in storage on the 1st of October.

An increased supply, however, of about 7,000,000 gallons per day would have been adequate to supply the full demands of the consumers had the works which had been planned several years ago been carried out, and there would have been no shortage in the supply. The construction of the infiltration gallery at Wantagh was depended upon to prevent a shortage in the supply, but the construction of this gallery had been delayed owing to the extraordinary length of time spent by the Law Department in acquiring the land. The map showing the land required was forwarded on April 2, 1903, approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on July 14, 1903, and signed by the Mayor on the following day. The Assistant in the Corporation Counsel's office who was placed in charge of the matter of obtaining the land, for some unexplained reason, did absolutely nothing for practically a whole year towards acquiring the parcels, although he gave frequent and definite assurances to this Bureau, as well as to the contractors, that the various forms required by the Charter had been complied with and that we would have the land early in the spring of 1904. Absolutely no action was taken toward acquiring the land until in June, 1904, the matter was placed in the hands of another Assistant. From that time on no delay was experienced, and consent was obtained from the owners of the parcel adjoining the City's land to the east to enter upon the land on July 21, 1904, and on September 20 of the same year application was made before Judge Maddox for the appointment of Commissioners, who were appointed on September 23 and filed their oath of office on September 28, 1904, upon which date the City acquired title.

The contractors refused to continue the work when the land was obtained owing to the long delay, and it was not until after an opinion had been rendered by the Corporation Counsel that they consented to take up again this work, which, under the terms of the contract made with the New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company in July, 1903, should have been completed in February, 1904.

On account of the heavy rainfall during 1904 the infiltration gallery was not needed, and up to May of 1905 the amount of water derived from the surface streams on the new watershed was practically equal to the available capacity of the conduits leading to and from Millburn Station.

The Wantagh Infiltration Gallery pumps were started on May 22, 1905, and had the gallery been completed at that time, we could have obtained an additional supply of about 10,000,000 gallons daily from that date. This would have given us 100,000,000 gallons during the month of May, 300,000,000 gallons during the month of June, and 160,000,000 gallons up to and including July 16, or a total of 560,000,000 gallons. This, added to the 490,000,000 gallons which were in storage at that date, would have made our total storage 1,050,000,000 gallons. There would have been from July 16 to July 31, on the basis of 10,000,000 gallons additional per day, an additional supply of 150,000,000 gallons. During August this would have amounted to 310,000,000 gallons, and during September 300,000,000 gallons. If from this we deduct 509,000,000 gallons, which would have been utilized had no attempt been made to reduce the consumption, we would still have had 250,000,000 gallons, which could have been added to the stored water had our reservoirs been of sufficient capacity to hold this amount.

As the total capacity of our Hempstead Storage Reservoir, together with the distributing reservoirs, may be taken in round figures as 1,200,000,000 gallons, and as the total storage would have been 1,050,000,000 gallons, plus 250,000,000, or a total of 1,300,000,000, we would have had 100,000,000 gallons of water available beyond the amount which could have been stored, and it is thus apparent that had the Wantagh Infiltration Gallery been available this summer, we could, under the meteorological conditions which existed, have supplied all the demands of the consumers without reducing the pressure, and at the present time had our reservoirs full, instead of practically empty, as they now are.

In addition to the Wantagh Gallery, the necessary maps for acquiring the land needed for the Massapequa gallery were forwarded on June 26, 1903, and although the map was approved on December 1, 1903, no action was taken until September 7, 1904, when it was signed by Mayor McClellan, ex-Mayor Low having failed to approve the map previous to the expiration of his term of office. The land was not acquired until in January, 1905, and upon the acquirement of the land the contract was prepared and bids received, so that the contractor is now at work on this gallery, which should yield from 18,000,000 to 27,000,000 gallons per day and give a net increase to the supply of say from 12,000,000 to 18,000,000 gallons.

In pursuance of the plan adopted for the utmost development of the underground supply throughout our watershed, requests have been made for an appropriation necessary to construct additional galleries at Watts Pond and Springfield, and infiltration gallery or driven well station at Shetucket. Further provision for an additional supply will be made from a driven well station within the borough limits, to be located probably in the vicinity of Canarsie.

Additional appropriations will be requested for infiltration galleries located near Merrick, Millburn and Smith's Pond. On completion of these infiltration galleries and the infiltration galleries and driven well stations already mentioned, if no legal obstacles interfere, the sources of our existing watershed will be developed to the utmost and the supply will be increased by that from the proposed extension and development of the New Lots, Spring Creek and Jameco Pumping Stations. It is not safe, however, to assume that the ultimate safe minimum supply from the watershed after it is thus fully developed will suffice for the supply of Brooklyn beyond 1908, although with a rainfall fully equal to or above the average the supply might last longer. This will be made evident by referring to the tables embodied in the official statement made by me to the Consulting Engineers of the Board of Water Supply on September 20, and which gave the consumption for the last ten years and prospective consumption until 1915, as well as the present and estimated future sources of supply from the present watershed, which are as follows:

The Gravesend and New Utrecht systems were acquired by the City in the latter part of 1895. The complete records date, however, from January 1, 1896.

The New Lots system was acquired by the City on April 9, 1900. The records, however, date from May 1, 1900.

The average daily consumption for 1905 is based on the first six months of the year. The decrease in consumption between 1899 and 1900 was due to reduced pressure, caused by inadequate supply. The annual rate of increase from 1895 to 1899, both inclusive, was 4.1 per cent.; the rate from 1900 to 1905, both inclusive, was 4.6 per cent.; the rate from 1895 to 1905, both inclusive, was 4.1 per cent.

It is evident, from the above figures, that even assuming a per capita consumption much below that which obtains in our other large American cities, we should not prudently rely on our watershed for a supply adequate for more than three or four years, and should lose no time in determining whether or not we can utilize the underground waters now running to waste in Suffolk County. If these waters are available we should immediately begin works for utilizing them. If they are not we should lose no time in investigating other sources, since Brooklyn can by no means, if restricted to its present watershed, await the supply for Greater New York to be furnished from up the State.

The water now running to waste in Suffolk County has always been the most natural source for an additional supply, and I have recommended in many special reports, as well as the regular quarterly and annual reports, that this supply should be utilized, and that therefore definite action should be taken to determine whether the present laws prohibit the use of the water. So far, no legal determination of the constitutionality of the law which apparently prevents the use of Suffolk County water has been made. An appropriation should be granted for a station to be located within the limits of Suffolk County, and then an action could be commenced and thus determine judicially the rights of the City to extend its works into Suffolk County.

The appropriations made have, almost without exception, been less than those asked for, and the work of this Bureau has thus been hampered and we have been compelled to adopt a hand-to-mouth policy for so many years that it has almost come to be considered as the only system under which the water supply for Brooklyn should

be handled. The appropriation made for the year 1904 was less than 50 per cent. of that requested and the appropriation granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the year 1905 was a little over 60 per cent. of the aggregate requested, and so far we have not received notice that even this amount was available. If the constitutional amendment which is to be voted upon this fall is passed appropriations should be granted sufficient to cover all the work that this Bureau can do during the coming year towards carrying out the general plans previously outlined, and such an appropriation should be supplemented by additional ones until all work which should reasonably be done in connection with the supply at present or in the near future has been completed. An adequate water supply is essential to the comfort and health of our citizens and more than any other public service affects the interests and the growth and development of this borough, the growth of which has no doubt been checked in the past and should not be checked in the future by an inadequate water supply.

The system of the supply and distribution of water should be as complete and efficient as is possible, and the investment necessary would be returned many fold to the citizens by reducing the rates of fire insurance and by increase in property values. In the last three to four years a great deal of work has been done to bring the Brooklyn system up to the standard rightly demanded at present by fire insurance and other interests, and this Bureau has outlined in the past the necessary plans to accomplish the remodeling of the system, but has been compelled, from lack of funds, to do only a portion of the work required. The remodeling of the system will necessitate either the cleaning or replacing of all the smaller mains laid previous to about 1860, the greater portion of which must be replaced. It is also necessary to remodel our main pumping station and consolidate the small stations along the line, providing for naturally or artificially filtering all sources of supply and probably covering our distributing reservoirs.

If experience proves, as claimed by its advocates, that a separate system for fire protection is absolutely essential to prevent the possibility of extensive conflagrations and to reduce fire losses, the extension of the independent fire service system should be vigorously carried on, so that our citizens may secure the reduction in rates and immunity from excessive loss which apparently can be obtained by the installation of the separate system. The vast works outlined cannot be completed in one or two years, but if adequate appropriations be obtained they can be finished within four or five years, and the Borough of Brooklyn will then have a water supply system against which no valid criticism can be directed and to which our citizens can point with just pride.

Care must be taken that the efficiency of the maintenance of the system is not impaired by continuing in the City's employ men who are not suited for the work to which they are assigned, and this is especially true in the gangs employed on repairing and inspecting the distribution system, as the beneficial results justly to be expected from the execution of the proposed improvements cannot certainly be obtained with careless or inefficient employees.

I desire to call attention to the advisability of providing connections between the different boroughs, so that a deficiency in the supply in one borough can be made up, at all events in part, by the surplus which may be obtained from another borough. The benefits of such cross-connections would be felt mainly by the boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, as the supply for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx is so much greater than that of the other boroughs that a small percentage of this supply would be sufficient to greatly increase the supply of any of the other boroughs. It is, however, possible, should we be able to utilize the underground sources in Suffolk County, that the quick development of these sources beyond the immediate needs of Brooklyn might be advisable as a temporary auxiliary for the Borough of Manhattan during the period that will probably elapse before the new supply from up the State is available.

Studies are now being made for the best form of cross-connection, and an appropriation will be asked for the money necessary to make the cross-connection between the boroughs of Manhattan, Queens and Brooklyn, while the connection between Brooklyn and Richmond will depend, to a great extent, on the action taken on the contract now under consideration to supply the Borough of Richmond by a New Jersey corporation.

The Department has been frequently criticized by citizens on account of reducing the pressure and yet taking no effective means of reducing the amount of water which is allowed in many cases to run to waste by many property owners who have defective plumbing fixtures and who will not remedy these defects unless compelled legally to do so. There are only two methods recognized as being effective to prevent this waste. One is the employment of a large corps of Inspectors who make a house-to-house inspection, reporting any defective fixtures, and the second is by the installation of meters.

I have in previous reports recorded my opinion that the second method is the only one that will create permanent results, but at least one of the methods should be adopted and be intelligently carried out immediately. While this work is not now under the Engineer's Bureau, if it were to be carried out along comprehensive lines, it would be well to make it a part of the Engineer's work. It would be necessary to organize a separate corps for this class of work, especially if a house-to-house inspection should be adopted. By selecting the sections in which the waste was probably greatest and giving attention primarily to these sections, the quickest results would be obtained, and leaving those sections in which, from the character of the building and the tenants, the willful waste of water would be less, to be examined after the other sections had been thoroughly inspected.

While new works have been planned and studies made, the work of improving the existing sources of supply has not been neglected. A new type of well has been adopted for the development of the driven well stations, the well being formed by sinking a large casing and placing within the casing a perforated earthenware pipe surrounded by gravel. These wells have been sunk at the Oconee and Spring Creek stations with the result of increasing the yield from the Oconee station from 3,100,000 gallons on July 1 to 3,320,000 gallons on October 1, while the yield from the Spring Creek station has been increased from 2,959,800 gallons on July 1 to 5,962,000 gallons on October 1.

The deep wells driven at the New Lots station were connected with the suction mains, but under present conditions the increased supply, as will be detailed hereafter, is very small.

It has been necessary to draw from the Hempstead storage reservoir for the greater part of the entire quarter, the days on which no supply was drawn being as follows: July 31, August 1, 8, 10, 14 to 22, both inclusive, and August 26, September 4 to 24, both inclusive.

There was no water wasted from any of the ponds on the new watershed, nor, except to a very slight amount, on the old watershed, so that practically all the supply available was utilized.

New Conduit.

Previous reports have called attention to the necessity of an additional conduit and an appropriation was requested for a conduit to extend from Wantagh, or possibly from Massapequa, to the Ridgewood reservoir. Surveys were originally made for a line through the public highways, which would reduce the cost of construction and might afford certain advantages with regard to the development of the underground supply. An opinion of the Corporation Counsel on this point was, however, practically adverse to our using the public highways, and surveys are now being made for a right of way running generally along the south side of the Long Island Railroad from property owned by the City south of Newbridge Pond westerly to a point near the Spring Creek pumping station. The strip of land to be bought would vary from 100 to 200 feet in width, the exact width being determined by the local conditions, and would be utilized both for a new pipe line and for infiltration galleries, ample provision being made for the necessary land to lay additional pipe lines if it be found that the waters of Suffolk County can be utilized. The appropriation granted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will only be sufficient to cover the construction of the line from the Ridgewood station to a point in the vicinity of the Forest Stream station, and the contract will be drawn so as to cover the maximum length of line possible. The additional appropriation should be granted without delay, so that the remainder of the line may be completed during the early part of 1907. The work should be started not later than the summer of 1906. The completion of the first part of the line will enable us to pump through the new line all the water obtained from the new stations, which will be located west of Forest Stream, and the water can be pumped either to the Ridgewood station or directly into the distribution system, as may be found advisable. It will probably be necessary to utilize the line for pumping directly to the Ridgewood engine house, rather than to the distribution system at first, as the pumps necessary to work against the comparatively high head to deliver

water into the distribution system would require some time to complete and an additional appropriation would be necessary before the contract for them could be let. A branch line would be run from the new line up to the Ridgewood reservoir, so that the engines would work under practically a constant head.

Sanitary Conditions.

During the summer typhoid has been somewhat prevalent in this borough, and considerable attention has been given to the question of the sanitary condition of the supply. The articles published in the daily papers have unquestionably created in the minds of our citizens a decided suspicion as to the healthiness of the Brooklyn supply. This feeling is entirely unwarranted, as it is a fact that the water to-day is better than it was a year ago, and better a year ago than it was the preceding year. The improvement of the supply has been occasioned by the increase in the amount of filtered water either naturally or artificially filtered. During this summer the supply has been divided as follows:

In the above table the total amount of water delivered has been reduced by 4 per cent. from the amount shown by the pumping, as the slip of the pumps has been greater than the records indicate.

I have frequently in the past recommended the filtration of the supply, and a decade ago, in my report for the year 1896, gave the following views on the question of filtration:

"In recommending filtration the writer is fully conscious of the adverse criticism it may provoke, mainly from sentimental although natural reasons. The idea of filtered water conveys to many of our people suggestions which are not pleasant to speculate upon. Yet it is the only sure and scientific mode of treatment, and it is fair to say that within a few years it will reach in this country the same development that it has already reached in Europe. In fact, were it not for our straitened financial conditions, it would be advisable even today to adopt this means for effectually and quickly preserving for all time our water supply from threatened impurities from whatever source and from any objectionable taste, odor or color. The writer willingly risks the attacks emanating from the opposition that the recommendation of this plan may meet with, if the statement herein made should facilitate hereafter the path of whoever may be called upon to apply the ultimate remedy."

The general plan hitherto followed and still pursued by this Department is to develop the underground supply which furnished Brooklyn with water naturally filtered and of exceptionally good quality, and in regard to the surface waters, to protect the supply from pollution by the purchase of sufficient lands where the cost and conditions of the latter render this method practicable, and where this is not feasible, to filter the water. By this means the quantity of water either naturally or artificially filtered gradually increases, so that ultimately no unfiltered surface water will be furnished to our citizens. At present the amount of unfiltered water has already been reduced to about 36 per cent. of the supply, and this proportion will continually decrease.

While in designing plans for the filtration of the water efficiency is the main consideration, due regard should always be given to economy, and no money should be wasted to unnecessarily duplicate plans and re-filter water already filtered and not exposed to subsequent contamination.

The slow sand filters already contracted for at a low cost by this Bureau have shown results of equal efficiency to those constructed for any other waterworks system, and this type of filter should be the one adopted for any future filtration which may be required on our watershed. There is no other watershed so systematically watched and policed as the Brooklyn shed, and with its natural sand filter, there is no reason to anticipate any danger of pollution, especially during the months when the ground is not frozen and the water permeates quickly through the sand into the underground stored bed.

It has been proposed from time to time by those who are not thoroughly familiar with the Brooklyn Water Supply System, and who, therefore, are not well qualified to judge of the best method of handling the supply, that the naturally filtered water and the surface water should be allowed to mingle and be filtered at one central filtering plant. It is obvious that such a plan would not only be wasteful, but dangerous, inasmuch as the mingling of the two waters would contaminate the sterile water obtained from the underground sources and the re-filtering of this water, if not perfectly carried out, would give a water unsatisfactory for use from a sanitary standpoint. By previously filtering the surface water the danger from mixing it with the supply of naturally filtered water is greatly reduced, if not practically eliminated.

Owing to the difficulty of obtaining adequate appropriations even for the most pressing needs of the supply, and also hoping that under certain conditions the covering of our distributing reservoirs might be safely postponed for some time, I have hitherto deferred my recommendations on this subject, but I do not deem it advisable to retard the work of covering our distributing reservoirs in order to maintain that purity of supply which public opinion rightly demands at the present time.

An open reservoir is exposed to contamination from the action of evil disposed persons, who easily evade detection and punishment, and in certain exposed localities, as at Mount Prospect, receives the dust and other floating residue blown from the streets. As soon as the supply, or the great bulk of it, is filtered, it will be advisable to cover the reservoirs, and an appropriation will be asked for that purpose. In the meantime, with the by-pass systems that we have both at Ridgewood and Mount Prospect, which enable us to pump the greater portion of the water into the distribution system without passing through the reservoirs, the latter can be and are often used simply as equalizing basins to make up the hourly fluctuations in the consumption.

Distribution System.

Previous to the death of Mr. Henry Hawkes, Superintendent of Repairs to Distribution and Complaints, the work of maintaining the distribution system had not come under the Engineer's Bureau, and the disadvantages of having this work under a separate Bureau are so evident that it is not necessary to enumerate them here. It is impossible to entirely separate the supply from the distribution, and the proper solutions of the problem relative to the latter require an engineering supervision of the highest degree. Unfortunately, our distribution system has been allowed to deteriorate without having those repairs and improvements made which were necessary in order to maintain its efficiency, and there is, therefore, a great deal of work to be done before the system can be brought to a standard of efficiency which is now set for large cities.

As has been previously reported, the work to be done consists in the removal and replacing of small tuberculated mains, except in residential sections, where the existing mains may be cleaned if the system be reinforced by 12-inch to 20-inch cross mains, and the placing of a greater number of hydrants on the existing mains, together with the replacing of the many antiquated and wornout hydrants now connected with the service mains. While this work is to be done by contract, it will be necessary to organize gangs of men, so that all hydrants and gates shall be systematically inspected and any repairs made that may be required, or new gates or hydrants set where the existing ones are imperfect or inadequate. Until an additional appropriation is obtained it will be impossible to increase the force employed on the distribution system sufficiently to properly carry out this work, but in the Budget for the coming year provision will be made for the necessary gangs, while the reorganization of the work will be carried on as far as possible with the men at present available. The Department has efficient men among the skilled labor classes, but the number of efficient able-bodied unskilled laborers is entirely inadequate for the needs of the system, and our existing laws and regulations make it extremely difficult to obtain the class of labor required.

To provide for emergencies arising between 5 p. m. and 8 a. m., repair gangs have been organized, so that there is always on duty at each repair yard a pipe caulker with enough assistants to enable him to immediately take up any work which may require prompt action. Emergencies will arise which cannot be taken care of by men of the

grade of pipe caulked, and in order to make adequate provision for these emergencies I have planned to install telephones in the residences of the Assistant Engineers located in the Borough of Brooklyn and also in the residences of the Foremen and Assistant Foremen of the Repair Yards. As soon as these telephones are installed a schedule will be made out and posted in Repair Yards and the main Pumping Stations, so that in cases of a serious break in any large main or other emergency the man on duty will know what Assistant Engineer or Foreman can be immediately reached by telephone, and at all times during the day or night some one of the Assistant Engineers or Foremen will be on reserve duty at his residence, so that he can be immediately reached in case his services are required. This system will enable us to utilize the special knowledge which our Engineers and Foremen have without dispensing with their services for the regular work on which they are needed, although it will be necessary that the Assistant Engineers and Foremen shall reserve one night a week for the Department work without any additional compensation.

To obviate the difficulties previously experienced by hydrants being out of order and frozen during the winter months, request will be made for a corps of not less than thirty-five Inspectors, whose duties it will be to inspect all hydrants coming within the district assigned to each Inspector.

In the more important districts every hydrant will be inspected at least three times per week and the hydrants which are likely to give trouble will be inspected daily, if it is found necessary. The Inspector will report daily to the Foreman any hydrant out of order, which will be immediately pumped out or thawed out, as may be required. Under this system the number of hydrants which will not be in condition to be ready to be used by the Firemen will be reduced to a minimum. Unfortunately, in previous years practically no inspection was made of the hydrants during the winter months other than that made by the Fire Department, and this Department was not equipped with the necessary portable boilers to thaw out hydrants when they were frozen. Orders have been given for a boiler of a type which will unquestionably prove practical, and additional orders will be given later, so that two boilers will be used by the Western District Yard and one boiler by each of the other three Yards for thawing out any hydrant that may be frozen during the winter. Too much stress cannot be laid upon this work, as unfortunately, in the past fires have frequently obtained considerable headway, due to the firemen being compelled to thaw out the hydrant before it could be used. The amount of money lost to our citizens through increased fire rates on account of inefficient care of the hydrants is large and far in excess of the cost necessary to properly look after the hydrant.

The work done by the gangs employed on the repairs to distribution was as follows:

Extension to Distribution.

During the quarter the work of extension to distribution in the outlying districts has been carried on under the contract with Daniel Douglass, dated January 9, 1905, and under the contract of Isaac Harris, assignee for Murphy Brothers, dated February 24, 1905.

The laying of pipe under the contract with Mr. Harris was completed on July 27, 1905, and Mr. Douglass has completed the greater part of the work to be done under his contract. Bids were received on September 6 for a second general contract covering the extension of mains in the outlying districts and the contract has been awarded to Mr. Isaac Harris, the lowest bidder.

This form of general contract has proven a very satisfactory method of enabling the Department to lay mains within a reasonable time after property owners have petitioned for the mains to be installed, and by the end of the fall water mains will have been laid in practically all streets for which petitions have been received and reported on favorably and on which buildings have been commenced.

During the quarter petitions for water mains in forty-five different streets have been received and reported on. Favorable reports were made covering twenty-nine of these streets, the total amount of pipe to be laid in the streets being a little over 22,000 feet.

The laying of the 20-inch main from Eighty-sixth street and Twenty-fourth avenue through Harway avenue to Coney Island has been completed and the main tested where it crosses Coney Island creek. The contractor experienced some difficulty in getting a perfectly tight line across the creek, but the final test showed that the line was perfectly tight under 100 pounds pressure, this pressure being about double the normal pressure. The completion of this line made it possible to shut down the 12-inch line supplying Coney Island and remove a broken gate which had for some time reduced considerably the pressure at the island. The laying of the 20-inch main and 30-inch low pressure connecting supply mains for the high pressure fire service stations was commenced by Contractor John J. Cashman on September 25, and this work should be completed this year.

Bids were received for replacing mains in the vicinity of the river front from Flushing avenue to Bushwick creek, and the contract was awarded to Mr. T. O'C. Sloane, the lowest bidder. The work on this contract cannot, however, be started until next spring.

The laying of the 20-inch mains in Metropolitan, Maspeth avenues, etc., was commenced by the contractor, Mr. Isaac Harris, but only a few feet of 20-inch main was laid across Manhattan avenue at the approach to the new bridge. This contract should be completed, however, during the coming quarter. The laying of the mains under the contract will greatly improve the water supply for fire purposes in outlying sections of Greenpoint.

The work of removing and relaying mains under the contract with Mr. M. J. Dady, dated January 22, 1904, has been entirely completed, the last pipe being laid on July 8, 1905.

The work done in laying mains during the quarter was as follows:

The contract for setting new hydrants on the old 20-inch and 30-inch mains has not been awarded, and this work is to be readvertised. It is unfortunate that the work could not have been done this year, as the need of these hydrants has been urgently felt in the past. The appropriations made are insufficient to allow more than a very small sum for the removing and relaying of mains. This is to be regretted, as the need of actively prosecuting the work of replacing the distribution mains, which are practically useless on account of clogging from tuberculation, is evident, and the longer this work is delayed the greater will be its cost, as in many cases cobble and other low price pavements are being replaced with asphalt pavement, this greatly adding to the cost of the work of replacing the mains. For small size mains the cost of the asphalt pavement is practically equal to the cost of the mains.

Early in July a test was made of a pipe-cleaning device operated by the Hudson Contracting Company. This device consists of a revolving brush and cutters which is drawn through the pipe and the dirt and rust are washed out by the water being allowed to slowly flow through the main. The test of this device showed that the pipes could be practically cleaned and the original diameter of the main restored. It would seem probable that this device could be economically applied to clean the mains in those sections where the demand for water was for residences only, but where there are manufacturing or business houses new mains should be laid in place of the tuberculated mains, as the old mains, even when cleaned, are not of sufficient capacity to carry the supply of water needed for adequate fire protection.

Contracts are being prepared for new trunk mains to provide an adequate supply for the Bay Ridge, Fort Hamilton, Sunset Park and other sections, although the appropriations will not allow sufficient funds to lay all the trunk mains that should now be laid to give an adequate distribution of water.

In case it becomes necessary to shut down the 48-inch main laid through East New York avenue, the reduction in pressure would be seriously felt in some of the higher sections in Bay Ridge and Fort Hamilton districts, and an additional large main paralleling the East New York avenue and Fort Hamilton avenue main should be laid, as the section fed by this main is growing so rapidly that it should not be dependent upon any one main for its supply.

This parallel main could start at Albany avenue and East New York avenue and thus obtain a supply either from the Albany avenue main or the East New York avenue main and do away with the necessity of immediately extending the main to the Ridgewood Engine House, or Ridgewood Reservoir.

Driven Wells.

During the quarter the work of placing the new vitrified wells surrounded by gravel has been prosecuted, and the yield of these wells has been high and there appears to be no reason to doubt their permanency. Owing to the lack of sufficient slotted vitrified pipe for the strainers, a number of wells have been sunk, using a brass strainer in place of the slotted vitrified pipe. When the wells are pumped separately they yield from a quarter of a million to a million gallons daily, the rate of yield depending upon the character of the sand. Orders have been placed for the necessary material to construct 8-inch vitrified point wells surrounded by a gravel cylinder, 18 inches in diameter, but as yet none of these wells have been sunk.

The detailed work done by the Driven Well Gang is as follows:

New Lots Station.

At this station the five deep wells were put in service on July 1, but well No. 4 was disconnected on August 29, as its suction pipe came within the lines of the new station.

Spring Creek Station.

Twelve wells have been constructed at a depth of from 54 feet to 65 feet 6 inches, eight of these wells consisting of 4-inch slotted vitrified pipe strainers and 6-inch vitrified pipe casing, the strainers being surrounded by a cylinder of gravel 12 inches in diameter. Three of the wells have four 1/2-inch brass strainers, while one well has a 4-inch brass strainer; the yield of these wells when pumped separately varied from 300 to 600 gallons per minute, and when connected up, the new well strainers increased the yield from an average of 2,468,800 gallons for the month of June to 5,602,400 gallons for the month of September.

Oconee Station.

Two new wells were placed on the west suction line, one having 10 feet of 4-inch brass strainer surrounded by a 12-inch cylinder of gravel; this well yielding from 100 to 150 gallons per minute. The second well has 24 feet of 6-inch strainer surrounded by 12 inches of gravel, and this well yielded from 300 to 375 gallons per minute.

Jameco Station.

The Driven Well Gang has been working on the deep wells. These wells have been washed to such an extent that there is evidently a large cavity below the clay bed, and as it is impossible to obtain satisfactory results from these wells, it will probably be necessary to drive new wells in place of the existing deep wells.

Wantagh Station.

Five new drop suction were placed during the latter part of July.

Test Wells.

Eleven test wells were driven in the vicinity of Seaford and twenty wells were driven in the vicinity of Massapaqua; these test wells are 2-inch wells, driven for the purpose of observing the fluctuations of the ground water level.

A 6-inch test well is being driven at Ninety-second street and Manhattan Beach Railroad to determine the stratification at this point; it being desired to locate a driven well station if the conditions are favorable. The well has been sunk to a depth of 75 feet and the indications are that a good shallow well station can be placed there.

PUMPING STATIONS.

Mt. Prospect Station.

During the quarter the amount pumped into the reservoir from this station has been very small, as the Davidson pumps of the Ridgewood Station have taken care of this portion of the service. No. 1 Beam engine is being overhauled by the builder, Mr. J. R. Wright, and this engine can be used on the tower after the overhauling is complete.

On account of the reduced pressure it has been necessary at times to run the tower engines by by-passing the water from the Mt. Prospect Reservoir.

The area supplied by the Mt. Prospect Reservoir has been greatly extended so as to minimize the inconvenience caused by the reduced pressure in the City, and a main is now being laid so that a large area in what is known as the Ocean Hill district can be placed on the Mt. Prospect service, the pressure in this section having been unsatisfactory for some time.

A new 5-inch steam main has been put in by William Horne & Co. on requisition; this main replacing the 8-inch main, which was leaking so badly that it had to be taken down, and as the main was too large for the station, it was decided to replace it with this 5-inch main. The new steam turbine pump has been working satisfactorily, except for the noise of the gears. The contractors promise to furnish new gears to try and overcome this difficulty.

Gravesend Station.

This station has pumped about 3,000,000 gallons daily. The contract for the new building of this station was awarded to Ryan & McFerran, and the contractors have started work on the excavation.

Bids have been received for new pumps, boilers and steamfitting, although the notice of award of contract has not been received. A locomotive boiler owned by the City has been placed adjoining the old plant so as to serve as a reserve unit. This work has been done by our men.

New Utrecht Station.

This station has been operated as usual, although the engines are in very bad condition. It is expected to abandon the station on the completion of the remodeling of the Gravesend station.

New Lots Station.

As already stated, with the view of utilizing to the utmost all available supply, the deep wells of this station were connected to the suction line in June. Owing to the inadequate capacity of the pumping engines, and existing conditions, the increase in the supply obtained was, however, as anticipated, very small. Measurements taken with Pitot tubes, although not entirely satisfactory, showed this increase to be only about 300,000 gallons per day. This increase was apparently due simply to less leakage and air in the pumps than when working on the shallow well lines.

The contract for the new engine and boiler house at this station was let to Mr. James McArthur, and the work has made good progress. The contract for boilers has been awarded to B. Franklin Hart, Jr., & Co., and detailed plans of the boilers have been approved. No notice has been received of the award of the contract for the engines and steamfitting, although the bids have been received. Plans for a new concrete steel coal shed have been prepared and the contract and specifications are in the hands of the printer.

Ridgewood Station, North Side.

Owing to inadequate force and also inadequate capacity, it has not been possible to do all the repairs that were desirable on the engines, and the repairs made have covered the overhauling of the three triple engines and minor repairs on the Davidson and Beam engines.

The work of remodeling the Morris boilers has been carried on by B. Franklin Hart, Jr., & Co., the contractors, and the E. Rutzler Company, contractors for repairing the Davidson boilers, also prosecuted their work during the early part of the quarter. During the latter part of the quarter, however, no work was done on the Davidson boilers, as they were required to run the four Davidson engines.

Ridgewood Station, South Side.

The engines on the south side have given considerable trouble, and, as has frequently been stated, they should be replaced.

To avoid as much as possible a breakdown at the station which would seriously cripple the supply, a requisition was given to Henry R. Worthington to overhaul engine No. 49. This work was commenced about the first of August. A contract has been made with the Borough Construction Company for a 20,000,000 centrifugal engine to be installed in place of No. 49, but under existing conditions it seemed advisable to spend the money necessary to repair this engine, even though it was not used, as its being in condition to be used might possibly avoid a serious interference in the supply.

Bids have been received, but no notice of award of contract, for four water tube boilers and for two new chimneys; these water tube boilers are to take the place of the existing Bigelow boilers, which are inadequate. Repairs have been made on the engines and boilers as required.

Line Stations.

General repairs have been made to the engines and boilers at the line stations, and at the Millburn station Mr. M. T. Davidson has commenced work on his contract for repairing the five Davidson engines.

A contract for new stacks for the Merrick and Massapequa stations has been prepared and bids are about to be received.

Ponds, Conduits and Reservoirs.

On August 16 Mr. Girdell V. Brower was appointed Superintendent from the competitive list, he having previously held the position of Foreman in charge of laborers. The work on the conduit line has been under his charge and the following schedules gives a summary of the work done on cleaning closets and cesspools to prevent pollution of the surface supplies:

The cost of this work during the quarter was \$1,048.90.

Provision has been made for panning the closets along the Baiseleys stream and thus doing away with some exceedingly dangerous and objectionable sources of pollution.

Protection From Pollution.

The usual work of patrolling the streams and ponds and making a regular inspection of the watershed has been carried on, and as already stated, provision has been made for panning the closets along the Baiseleys stream, which will reduce the danger of pollution from this source.

The map of lands to be taken on Pines stream and East Meadow stream to preserve the supply from pollution, and for other purposes, has been approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the title should be acquired within a short time.

There is practically no appropriation available or likely to be available in the near future for additional purchase of land, and while the plans of the Department provide for either artificially or naturally filtering all the supply, it would, nevertheless, be desirable to obtain control of the land immediately adjoining the streams and ponds so as to prevent nuisances, which are offensive to the eye and naturally distasteful, even though the water be filtered.

Were it possible to obtain effective enforcement of the rules and regulations of the State Board of Health, it would not be as necessary to purchase land, but under the present rules and regulations the co-operation of the State Board of Health is practically useless on account of the length of time involved before any definite action can be obtained.

Filter Plants.

At Forest Stream and Hempstead the reduced flow of the streams has correspondingly decreased the output, has reduced the cost of filtering, the water being clear, and the expense of cleaning the filters has been thereby lessened. The cost of filtering the water at the Springfield Mechanical Filter Plant has, however, been almost doubled on account of the reduced output. At the Baiseleys Mechanical Plant various algae growth have interfered with the operation of the filters to some extent, and in

the latter part of September it was necessary to shut down the plant for a short time. The treatment of the Baiseleys Plant by copper sulphate did not seem to give effective results, but the cooler weather should probably reduce the growth, so as to allow the plant to be operated to its full capacity.

The Forest Stream bed has only been cleaned once during the quarter, as has also been the case at the Hempstead beds. In cleaning the Hempstead beds the system of flushing the dirt from the surface of the bed has been continued and planks have been placed in each bed so as to increase the velocity of flow when cleaning.

The total amount of water filtered by the four plants during the quarter has been 807,000,000 gallons, and the total cost of operating the plants \$5,072, making the cost per million gallons filtered, \$6.28.

Water Analyses.

During the quarter there have been 1,651 samples of the water supply from Brooklyn analyzed, while the total number of analyses made at the Mt. Prospect and the Jameco Laboratories amounted to 2,135.

The chlorine is still very low, as the heavy draft on the well system has not as yet caused any appreciable inflow of salt water.

The water has been in practically the same condition as that shown for the corresponding quarter last year, and the supply has been a safe one for domestic consumption.

There has been considerable criticism in some of the daily papers of the character of the water, the main criticism being directed towards the water supply in the Bath Beach, Fort Hamilton and Bay Ridge sections.

Owing to these sections being supplied during part of the year from the New Utrecht and Gravesend stations, and during the late spring, summer and early fall months from the Ridgewood system, there is considerable sediment stirred up by the change in direction of the flow of the water in these mains, and which makes the water exceedingly unpleasant in appearance and taste. As this difficulty is, to a great extent, due to the high velocity of the water passing through the mains, it should be remedied almost entirely by the new trunk mains to be laid in the early spring to supply this district. Investigations made by this Department show that the condition of the supply was not the cause of the typhoid fever which was reported to be epidemic during the summer months.

Contracts.

HIGH PRESSURE FIRE SERVICE SYSTEM.

Coney Island System.

This system has been practically completed, the work of laying the mains and appurtenances being finished by August 1. The plant has been ready to respond to fire calls and our men have been trained in the handling of the machinery. It is expected to make a test of the system, with the co-operation of the Fire Department, early in the coming quarter.

Considerable difficulty has been experienced with sand entering the pump well and interfering with the efficient operation of the pump. To obviate this the intake will be extended so as to insure an ample depth of water below the bottom of the intake.

Main System.

As has already been stated, bids have been received for the motors and pumps and for the buildings and appurtenances, but no action has yet been taken on these bids.

On June 27, 1905, a contract was made with the A. P. Smith Manufacturing Company for the hydrants.

The contract for laying mains and appurtenances has been prosecuted by Mr. John J. Cashman, but some delay has been experienced owing to the difficulty in obtaining and testing the necessary steel castings. These castings are tested to a pressure of 700 pounds at the foundry, and it requires a very heavy press to stand the test. The mains so far laid have shown exceedingly satisfactory results under the prescribed test of 450 pounds per square inch, the only difficulty experienced being a slight leakage at the flanged joints, which has been readily corrected by tightening up the bolts. The tests made, together with the results obtained, are as follows:

As the difficulty with the steel casting has been practically overcome, it is expected that comparatively rapid progress will be made in laying the mains during the coming quarter.

The preparation of a contract for street flushing hydrants has been taken up, but, owing to the pressure of other work, has not been completed. As these hydrants will not be used until after the high pressure fire station is completed, the contract can readily be advertised and the work done before the mains are ready to be used in connection with the street sprinkling hydrants.

Wantagh Infiltration Gallery.

The work of laying this gallery has been continued during the quarter by the New York Continental Jewell Filtration Company, and on the west leg they have laid 930 feet of 33-inch pipe and 597 feet of 30-inch pipe. On the east leg 111 feet of 36-inch vitrified pipe and 1,205 feet of 30-inch cast iron flanged pipe have been laid. The contractors have been urged to increase the rate of progress on this work, but they have not complied with our directions, and the many and serious legal difficulties surrounding this contract have made it almost impossible for the Department to compel a more rapid rate of progress.

Massapequa Infiltration Gallery.

The contract for this work was signed with Mr. M. J. Dady on August 16, 1905, although he actually commenced the work on August 7, 1905. The work so far done has consisted largely of grading, building the road and bridge abutments, commencing sinking the central well and excavating at the west end of the gallery.

New Work.

In my last quarterly report I called attention to the reduction made by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the amount asked for works to improve and extend the water supply system, and so far no notice has been received that even the reduced amount has been made available by the action of the Board of Aldermen. I venture to again express the hope that the proposed amendment to the Constitution separating the water debt from the general debt, as previously referred to, will be passed, and thus allow adequate provisions to be made for the needs of the borough.

Law Suits.

As the law suits under the existing rulings of the Court offer comparatively little opportunity for engineering testimony, it has only been necessary to supply the maps to the Law Department, as required in the cases that have been brought to trial.

Office Room and Force.

The continual increased amount of work to be done by this Bureau has made it necessary to ask for additional men, and I greatly regret that in some cases the

recommendations have not been acted upon. The result has been that work is delayed and a good deal of routine and record work has to be neglected. Furthermore, the lack of space renders it impossible to obtain thoroughly satisfactory work, and the work that can be done by the men is reduced on account of their interfering with one another in the prosecution of their duties. Owing to the lack of clerical force many details which would naturally and more efficiently be handled by Clerks has to be taken up by the engineering corps, and it is impossible to assign Engineers permanently to work which might better be done by a Clerk, as they are not willing to perform such duties for any extended time. I would again renew my previous recommendations that active steps be taken towards securing additional help, so that our work can be more efficiently and speedily carried out.

Dear Sir—In accordance with the requirements of section 1542 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897 (City Charter), I herewith submit a report of the transactions of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas for the three months ending September 30, 1905.

Exhibit "A" is a statement showing the amounts expended and incurred during the third quarter of the year 1905 for the lighting of Public and Department Buildings, the fitting up, lighting and maintenance, etc., of public lamps and the necessary expenditures of the Bureau of Lamps and Gas.

Exhibit "B" is a summary of the Lamp Account, showing the number of new lamps lighted, old lamps relighted and lamps discontinued by each gas and electric company during the quarter; a total of 275 new gas lamps, 26 new naphtha lamps, 151 new electric lamps, and 162 new Welsbach naphtha lamps have been lighted, 285 old gas lamps have been relighted, 396 gas lamps, 44 naphtha, 2 electric and 1 Welsbach naphtha lamp have been discontinued. The appeal of Philip Sternfeld, No. 153 Suffolk street, for a physical re-examination for the position of Cleaner, Board of Education, was denied for lack of power.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That hereafter in cases where candidates for promotion to Junior Clerk in the various City Departments are under eighteen years of age (the minimum age prescribed by the Regulations of the Commission for that position), unless that they have served for a period of two years in their respective positions at the time of the examination, they shall be considered ineligible to compete.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed to proceed with open competitive examinations for the following positions:

Topographical Draughtsman.

Interpreter (Russian and Yiddish).

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. James F. Barry, of No. 323 Hoyt avenue, Long Island City, be and he hereby is dismissed from the position of Monitor in the office of the Civil Service Commission, he having failed to resign as requested on September 5, 1906, and it being the opinion of the Commission that his further performance of the duties of Monitor is not desirable, in view of the nature of the private business in which he is engaged.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner dated October 19, recommending, upon the report of Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, that the application of Michael F. O'Keefe for Process Server, be received. The recommendation was adopted.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner dated October 15, recommending, upon the report of Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, that the application of Wallace A. Manheimer, candidate for Process Server, be received. The recommendation was adopted.

The action of the Chief Examiner in rejecting the applications of the following-named persons, under the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 14, was sustained:

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner dated October 15, recommending, on the report of Mr. Rafferty, Examiner, that the application of Andrew M. Robinson, candidate for Examiner of Charitable Institutions, be rejected. The recommendation was adopted.

Reports were presented from Mr. James A. Rafferty, Examiner, dated October 6 and 8, respectively, stating that Mr. John F. Reilly, of No. 215 Van Sicklen street, Brooklyn, candidate for Patrolman, and Mr. William J. Riordan, of No. 416 East Sixteenth street, candidate for the position of Examiner of Charitable Institutions, whose applications had been under investigation by him, had both failed to appear in answer to his request. The applications were rejected.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That, with the approval of the Mayor and the State Civil Service Commission, the provision of paragraph 2 of Rule VIII., of the Municipal Civil Service Rules, to the effect that if the previous occupation or employment of an applicant has been wholly or in part outside The City of New York, not more than two of his vouchers may be persons resident or engaged in business elsewhere, be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for Stenographer and Typewriter for employment outside The City of New York.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission dated October 15, stating that at a meeting of that Board held on October 12, the following resolution of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York had been approved:

1. Suspending the limitation of compensation in the cases of Messrs. Kurth, Wyeth & Fox, experts, employed by the Jamaica Bay Improvement Commission.

2. Increasing the limit of compensation of Hospital Helpers in the non-competitive class from \$600, with maintenance, to \$720, with maintenance.

3. Adding to Part II. of the labor class the title "Brass Finisher," Fire Department. Striking from the exempt class, Finance Department, "Seven Stock and Bond Clerks." The letter stated further that the Board had adopted a resolution approving Municipal Civil Service Rule XIV. (transfers), as amended, providing the Municipal Commission changed the last clause of section 1 by striking out the word "or" in the third line from the end of the section and inserting in lieu thereof the word "and," and inserting in the same line after the word "provided" the word "further," so that such clause would read as follows:

— "and provided, further, that if such person entered the service without competitive examination he shall have served with fidelity for at least three years in the position held by him, or in a similar position."

And also stated that the resolution of the Municipal Commission amending paragraphs 6, 7 and 8 of Rule XV. had been approved as to paragraph 6, and that the resolution, so far as it related to paragraph 7 and 8, had been referred to Commissioner Brown for consideration and report. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with the State Commission and request it to make the change suggested in Rule XIV., and return the same with its approval, and the papers were ordered filed.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed to conduct a non-competitive examination of Master James Hodgins, of No. 189 Concord street, Brooklyn, and Master John C. Laffin, of No. 153 East Fiftieth street, Manhattan, to qualify them for provisional appointment to the position of Office Boy in the office of the Commission, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 3.

A communication was presented from the Acting Chief Examiner, dated September 26, submitting, for the consideration of the Commission, affidavits of Mrs. Nellie Stewart and Miss Annie T. Herbert, of No. 529 West One Hundred and Twenty-fifth street, with reference to their examination for Attendant. It appeared from the communication of Acting Chief Examiner Conway that the candidates had been disqualified for the reason that when their papers were examined it was found that they were almost alike; so much so that it was perfectly apparent that one had copied from the other; that Miss Annie T. Herbert sat directly in front of her sister, Mrs. Stewart, and that their positions would indicate that the latter must have done the copying; that there were internal evidences in the papers themselves that bore out that assumption. As Miss Herbert stated in her affidavit that she did not do the copying, and the evidence tending to show that she did not, the Acting Chief Examiner was directed to complete the rating of her papers and place her name upon the eligible list in the order determined by her percentage, and the appeal of Mrs. Stewart that her papers be rated was denied.

A communication was presented from the Coroners of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 16, requesting approval of the emergency appointment of Dr. M. F. Reynolds and Dr. H. E. Turner as Coroners' Physicians in their office for the following periods, during which time they substituted for the regular Physicians, who were on vacation:

The appointments were approved.

It appearing that there was no merit in the complaint, the communication was ordered filed.

The Secretary stated that Mr. Ryan was transferred from the position of Sewer Inspector in the office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to that position in the office of the President of the Borough of Manhattan on March 1, and that on March 22 his transfer had been rescinded for the reason that there was a preferred list of persons who had been laid off from the latter department for lack of work; that Mr. Ryan had performed the duties of the position in said department for the period mentioned, but that he had never received his salary for same. After a consideration of the matter the Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Ryan that if President Ahearn would forward a payroll covering such period to the office of the Commission it would be approved.

The request of Joseph Kurzmann, No. 656 Broadway, New York City, that his name be restored to the list for Process Server, was granted upon his statement that he did not decline the position offered him in the Law Department on account of salary, but because he was informed that there was little or no work to be done in that line at the present time, and his prospect of steady employment was therefore uncertain.

A communication was presented from George F. Spencer, No. 920 East One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, candidate for Stenographer and Typewriter, stating that he was unable to produce his father's naturalization papers, as requested by the Commission, and asking that the requirement of citizenship be waived in his case. The request was denied.

A communication was presented from Richard O'Connor, "an employee of the Police Department of The City of New York," asking that in future the Commission give more weight to recognized acts of bravery in its examinations, for the reason that "the present Police Commissioner requires a greater display of bravery than did any of his predecessors in granting commendations or medals." The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from one J. F. Macon, of New York City, alleging "a constant evasion of the Civil Service Regulations in the Topographical Bureau, Borough of Brooklyn." The Secretary was directed to request the President of the Borough of Brooklyn to investigate the numerous complaints that had been received regarding the violation of the Civil Service Law in his department, and report thereon to the Commission at the earliest possible date.

A communication was presented from Messrs. David Citron, Louis S. Furchtenicht and Fred W. Vollweiler, employees of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 16, calling attention to the fact that appointments to the position of Topographical Draughtsman in the Bureau of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, had been made in violation of the Civil Service Law, in that the appointees were selected from the competitive eligible list for Topographical Draughtsman, rather than through promotion. The communication was ordered filed.

A communication was presented from William A. Buell, dated October 16, protesting against his suspension from the position of Temporary Clerk in the office of the Receiver of Taxes on October 9. The communication was ordered filed.

The request of A. T. Looz, Branford, Conn., that his name be restored to the list for Assistant Engineer, Board of Water Supply, was granted, the notice sent him on October 15, 1906, having failed to reach him.

The request of Thomas J. White, No. 171 Baitic street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list for Clerk was granted, upon his statement that he did not fail to report, as alleged by the Department of Taxes and Assessments, but, on the contrary, that he reported and declined the position offered him on the score of insufficiency of compensation (\$750).

The request of Miss Marie T. Kane, Junior Clerk in the office of the Commission, that she be permitted to qualify in an examination for promotion to Second Grade Clerk, was granted, and the Chief Examiner was instructed to hold an examination for promotion from Junior Clerk, Grade D, to Second Grade Clerk, in the office of the Commission in the month of November.

The requests of Julius Hallheimer, No. 218 East Seventy-sixth street, and Benjamin Goldblatt, No. 15 East One Hundred and Eighth street, that their names be restored to the list of Junior Clerk, were granted, they having declined the appointment previously offered them because of illness.

A communication was presented from Floyd F. McDowell, No. 266 West One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, dated October 12, requesting that his name be placed

on the list for promotion to Transitman in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx. The Secretary stated that the candidate passed the examination, but his name was not placed upon the list for the reason that he had not served six months in his grade, as required by the rules; that the list had since become exhausted, and, furthermore, that Mr. McDowell was employed as a Topographical Draughtsman, which position was included in Grade 4 with the position of Transitman, to which he sought promotion. The request was denied.

An affidavit was presented from Miss Flora E. Kenyon, an employee of the Manhattan State Hospital, dated October 12, to the effect that she did not fail to report regarding an appointment as Stenographer and Typewriter in the Law Department on October 31, 1905, as stated, but, on the contrary, she reported and saw the Corporation Counsel personally, without, however, securing the appointment. The Secretary was directed to restore her name to the eligible list.

The request of Thomas J. Denver, No. 767 Union street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Financial Clerk was granted, it appearing that the notice sent him regarding an appointment to the Department of Docks and Ferries had been misdirected by a Clerk in the office of the Commission, and consequently failed to reach him within the time prescribed by the rules for replying.

A communication was presented from Edward J. Nugent, No. 26 Rush street, dated October 10, protesting against the method of conducting the physical examination for Attendant. The matter was referred to Dr. Houghton for a report.

The request of Michael O'Sullivan, No. 263 Gold street, Brooklyn, that his name be restored to the list of Senior Clerk was denied for laches.

The request of Theodore Bagley, No. 795 East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, that his name be restored to the list of Automobile Engineman was granted, he having declined appointment in the Borough of The Bronx on May 7, 1906, for the reason that he was under contract for the summer months.

The request of Edward J. Buchanan, No. 600 East One Hundred and Forty-second street, that his name be restored to the list of Chainman and Rodman was granted upon his statement that he declined the appointment offered him on September 27, 1906, under a misapprehension of the rules, thinking that he could decline an appointment one hundred miles from New York on the score of location and still retain his place on the eligible list until an appointment nearer the City limits was offered him.

The request of Morris Brown, No. 733 East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, that his name be restored to the list of Topographical Draughtsman, was granted, upon his statement that he was unable to accept the appointment offered him by the President of the Borough of Richmond on August 15, 1906, for the reason that his employer was in Europe and he could not leave him at that time.

The request of William E. King, No. 795 St. Nicholas avenue, that he be restored to eligibility for appointment as Topographical Draughtsman at a salary of \$1,500 per annum, was granted, he having declined appointment at that salary on May 29, 1906, under a misapprehension of the rules.

The request of Miss M. L. Charlotte Mechlin, Typewriting Copyist in the Law Department, that her name be changed on the roster of the Commission from Maria C. Mechlin, was granted.

The request of Herman Finkelstein, No. 81 Canal street, that his name be restored to the list of Temporary Clerk was granted, he having declined the appointment offered him in the Finance Department because of illness.

The request of James Sweeney, Prince Bay, N. Y., that his name be restored to the list of Junior Clerk was granted, upon his statement that he did not fail to report in answer to the notice sent him by the Board of Water Supply, but, on the contrary, he declined the position offered him for the reason that the duties were to be performed outside the City of New York.

The request of Miss Julia A. Pennoyer, No. 251 Carlton avenue, Brooklyn, that her name be restored to the list of Typewriting Copyist was granted, she having been obliged to decline the position offered her in the Tenement House Department on October 15, 1905, on account of illness.

A communication was presented from Mr. Owen A. McCabe, Poughkeepsie, N. Y., dated October 18, making application for entrance to the examination of Stenographers and Typewriters, for employment outside The City of New York, and requesting that the necessary blank be forwarded him on which to secure the signatures of the four vouchers required by the rules. Cannon, dated October 19, to the effect that he was employed as a Fireman on the New York Central Railroad; that his duties as such caused him to leave New York on the morning of October 7, 1906, arriving in Albany at about 7 o'clock in the evening; that, from Albany that evening he mailed an application for the position of Fireman to the Civil Service Commission, at No. 299 Broadway; that, on October 12, he received a notice from the Postmaster at Albany to the effect that the letter mailed by him to the Civil Service Commission was being held because of insufficient postage; and requesting, for that reason, that his application for Fireman be accepted by the Commission, notwithstanding the fact that the time for receiving such applications had expired. The Secretary was directed to inform Mr. Cannon that if he would produce the envelope in which he mailed his application in Albany on the evening of October 7, it would be received as of that date.

The application of Christopher F. Sinnott, of No. 309 Euclid avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for the position of Fireman, was accepted.

A communication was presented from Miss May E. Shevlin, No. 514 Twelfth street, Brooklyn, dated October 22, requesting that her application for Stenographer and Typewriter be accepted. It appearing that the application was not filed until October 22, and that the time for receiving such applications had expired on October 18, the request was denied.

A communication was presented from Leo O'Connell, No. 311 West Fifty-fourth street, dated October 11, requesting that his application for the position of Fireman be accepted. It appearing that the application was not presented until October 23 and that the receipt of applications closed on October 10, the request was denied.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Wednesday, October 31, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

Municipal Civil Service Commission,
No. 299 Broadway,
New York, October 31, 1906.

A meeting of the Civil Service Commission of The City of New York was held at the Commission's offices, No. 299 Broadway, on Wednesday, October 31, 1906, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon.

All the Commissioners were present.

A public hearing was held on the matter of amending the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, Part I, Group 11, by changing the lines, "Enginemen: (1) Supervisory Engineman, (2) Stationary Engineman, (3) Pile Driving Engineman," to read: "Engineers: (1) Supervisory Engineer, (2) Stationary Engineer, (3) Pile Driving Engineer."

Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, appeared before the Commission, and the President stated that at a previous meeting a committee of the International Union of Steam Engineers had appeared and requested that the change be made, giving its reasons for the same. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, in the Department of Docks and Ferries, by changing the line, "Assistant Superintendent of Ferries," to read: "3 Assistant Superintendents of Ferries."

Denis A. Judge, Esq., Deputy Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, addressed the Commission in behalf of the amendment, and Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq., Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, opposed the same. The hearing then closed.

A public hearing was held on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, in the Department of Street Cleaning, by changing the line "Deputy Commissioner," to read "three Deputy Commissioners."

Jerome Reilly, Esq., Private Secretary to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, addressed the Commission in behalf of the amendment, and Elliot H. Goodwin, Esq.,

Secretary of the Civil Service Reform Association, also appeared. There was no opposition and the hearing closed.

After the Commission had gone into regular session, the minutes of the meeting held October 24 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Competitive Class, Part I, Group 11, as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by changing the lines, "Enginemen: (1) Supervisory Engineman, (2) Stationary Engineman, (3) Pile Driving Engineman," to read: "Engineers: (1) Supervisory Engineer, (2) Stationary Engineer, (3) Pile Driving Engineer."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, under the heading "Department of Docks and Ferries," as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by changing the line "Assistant Superintendent of Ferries," to read "three Assistant Superintendents of Ferries."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the classification of positions in the Exempt Class, in the Department of Street Cleaning, as fixed by the rules, be and the same hereby is amended by striking therefrom the line "Deputy Commissioner" and inserting in place thereof the following: "three Deputy Commissioners."

The Committee on Transfers recommended that the following transfers be approved:

Frank D. Lakestream, Edward G. Schermerhorn and Ansel E. Parkhurst, from the position of Cashier in the Department of Finance to that of Financial Clerk, under the provisions of Rule XIV., paragraph 3.

Joseph G. Fogarty, from the position of Axeman in the Board of Water Supply to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

George J. Burchill, from the position of Axeman in the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission to a similar position in the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx.

Alexander Cramb, from the position of Gardener in the Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, to a similar position in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx.

John R. Lambert, from the position of Rodman in the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission to a similar position in the Department of Docks and Ferries.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the provisions of Civil Service Rule VII., paragraph 12, to the effect that "No person who has entered any examination for appointment to a competitive position and failed therein, or who has withdrawn therefrom, shall be admitted within nine months from the date of such examination to a new examination for the same position," be and the same hereby is waived so far as it applies to the coming examination for Topographical Draughtsman.

A communication was presented from the Chief Examiner, dated October 23, referring to the Commission for consideration a letter from Mrs. Mary Sullivan, candidate for Attendant. It appeared from the candidate's letter that she entered the mental examination on March 30, 1906, and succeeded in passing the same with a percentage of 81.80, and that she subsequently was rejected in her physical examination on the ground of insufficient stature. The letter went on to state that, although the candidate was a small woman, weighing but one hundred and thirteen pounds, she had for four years tended the furnace in a large office building, during which time she had never lost a day through illness, and referred the Commission to the vouchers on her application for verification of her statements.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the Chief Examiner be and he hereby is directed to summon Mrs. Mary Sullivan, No. 2590 Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, candidate for Attendant, for a physical re-examination, it appearing to the Commission that an error was made by the examining physician in rejecting said candidate.

The following communication was presented from the Assistant Chief Examiner:
"New York, October 29, 1906.

"To the Honorable Municipal Civil Service Commission:

"Gentlemen—As the change in the rules affecting promotions necessitates a change in the method of rating record and seniority, I beg to suggest a basis for the rating of the records in the recent examination for Captain of Police.

"Under the rule, as amended, a weight of 50 per cent. is given to the mental examination, and a similar weight to the record and seniority combined. Keeping in mind the competitive character of the examination, it is important that the best man should get the maximum mark and that the others should be graded down according to a fixed scale. It is equally important that a plan be devised which is simple and clear and capable of being understood by the candidates themselves; otherwise the Commission will be inundated with requests for explanations, and misunderstandings are likely to arise.

"With these objects in view it is best, first of all, to fix the weights to be attached to the three grades of rewards allowed by the Police Department, viz., honorable mention and medal, honorable mention and commendation. Under the old plan we had been giving them weights of 7, 5 and 3, respectively, but as these were calculated on the basis of 40 per cent., and were objected to as too high, while the new calculation will be made on the basis of 50 per cent., it is suggested that the weights in the present examination for these awards be 5, 3 and 2, respectively.

"When the Greater New York Charter was passed and the various cities and towns consolidated, the police forces of all the annexed territory were brought in under one head, subjected to the same rules and conditions, and permanent records of each individual kept, which had not been so in all cases prior to that time. The position of Detective Sergeant, theretofore a detail, was made a permanent grade at that time also. For these reasons it might be well to fix the time limit from which seniority will be counted as January 1, 1898. This will allow about eight and a half years, or eight years after the six months necessary for eligibility as deducted. It is also a fact that while the Sergeant who serves five years in the grade is entitled to receive a higher mark on his record because of the experience he has gained, the man who serves eight, nine or ten years is not entitled proportionately to the same consideration for the reason that a clever man is likely to learn pretty nearly all there is to be learned during the five years he is a Sergeant. For this reason it is recommended that the minimum rating of 80 per cent be allowed for six months in the grade with colorless record, with an additional 1 per cent. for each six months during the four years following eligibility, so that at the end of four years and six months' service as a Sergeant, a rating of 88 per cent. will be allowed for a colorless record. For the next four years, it is recommended that an addition of 1 per cent. a year be added until a maximum of 92 per cent. is reached.

"The following table will illustrate the plan:

"Colorless Record.

"Six months in grade.....	80
"Four years and six months in grade.....	88
"Eight years and six months in grade.....	92
"Honorable mention and medal.....	5
"Honorable mention.....	3
"Commendation.....	2

"There is still the question of penalties to be considered. I disapprove very much of the plan heretofore used which had as a basis the deduction of certain marks on account of fines and reprimands. As these depended very largely on the temperament of the trial commissioner and the degree of virtue in the department at the time of their infliction, there is wide divergence in the penalties inflicted at different times for similar offences. I would suggest that the Commission decide, first of all, whether we are to adhere to the old system or adopt the one I suggested a year ago, which had for its basis the consideration of the nature of the offense only, or whether a combination of both might not be wise before any plan of deductions is considered by the examining board.

"I might also call your attention to the fact that some of the Detective Sergeants, who were Detective Sergeants when the position was a detail, had been reduced prior to 1898 and were not promoted again until about 1901. Under our new rule we must give them credit for any medals, etc., for which they have never yet received credit, but it is doubtful if they are entitled to any credit beyond the time of their second appointment. Nearly all the Detective Sergeants who were reduced in 1901 were reinstated by the courts the following year. As to those, we have no option but to credit them with seniority for the time they had been reduced.

"There are also one or two cases where the Meyer medal was awarded on parade day for the same act for which the man had already received the regular department medal. We had not heretofore taken these parade day medals into account, and the question is, shall we do so in this examination?

"Respectfully submitted,

After careful consideration of the foregoing communication the following rulings were laid down by the Commission.

I.

In cases where the Meyer medal has been awarded on parade day, the same shall not be rated as part of the record in addition to the regular department medal awarded for the same act. The Commission has determined that only one—that is, the department medal—shall be recognized in rating the record.

II.

In the matter of rating seniority of Detective Sergeants and Sergeants, seniority shall commence from January 1, 1898, the date of consolidation of Greater New York. In the case of Detective Sergeants who were reduced prior to 1898 and not again promoted until some time subsequent, credit shall be given to them only from the date of their second appointment. As to those reduced in 1901 and reinstated by the courts in 1902, their records shall commence from the date of their appointment subsequent to 1898.

III.

A candidate who has been six months in the grade—the minimum time allowed for entrance to the examination—and who has a "colorless" record, shall receive a minimum rating of 80 per cent. For each six months during the following four years he shall receive an additional 1 per cent., so that at the end of four years and six months' service as a Sergeant a rating of 88 per cent. shall be allowed for a "colorless" record. For the following four years an addition of 1 per cent. for each year shall be added until a maximum of 92 per cent. is reached. (The following table illustrates the plan:)

Colorless record, six months in grade, per cent.....	80
Four years six months in grade, per cent.....	88
Eight years six months in grade, per cent.....	92
Honorable mention and medal.....	5
Honorable mention.....	3
Commendation.....	2

Under the new rule a weight of 50 per cent. is given to the medal examination and 50 per cent. to the record and seniority of a candidate combined.

The question of penalties was laid over for further consideration.

The Commission then considered a query of the Assistant Chief Examiner as to whether all the papers of candidate No. 108 for Inspector of Sewer Construction were to be rated. It appeared that the first sheet was found on his desk some time after the other sheets had been turned in, and was marked by the Chief Examiner "not to be rated;" that Mr. Collingwood, Examiner, reported that the average rating on the questions on the remaining sheets of the candidate's paper amounted to 88 per cent., while if the first three questions were counted the rating would amount to only 81 per cent. Such fact being good evidence, in the opinion of the Commission, that the paper was left out in the first instance by mistake, the Assistant Chief Examiner was directed to rate the same as part of the candidate's examination.

A communication was presented from the Labor Clerk, dated October 27, reporting on the complaint of Elia Rodde, of No. 520 West One Hundred and Thirty-first street, New York City, against his dismissal from the Bridge Department, and also forwarding a report from that department with reference to the same matter. The

Secretary was directed to forward both reports to the State Civil Service Commission, in accordance with its request of October 23.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the State Civil Service Commission, dated October 26, forwarding copies of a resolution of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, adopted September 19, 1906, and approved by the Mayor on October 3, 1906, amending Rule XIV., clauses 1 and 2, duly approved by the State Board. The papers were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated October 23, requesting approval of a leave of absence without pay, from October 23 to April 22, 1907, granted Charles S. Curtis, Chemist. It appearing from the doctor's certificate furnished that the leave of absence was granted because of illness, the same was approved.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Department of Health, dated October 29, requesting that before the holding of the open competitive examination for Chemist one of the Examiners of the Commission confer with Mr. James P. Atkinson, Chemist in charge of the Chemical Laboratory of the Department of Health, with reference to the character of the examination. The Chief Examiner was directed to comply with the department's request.

The emergency appointments of the following-named persons in the Department of Parks, Borough of The Bronx, were approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 4:

Fred V. Lehne, seven days, from October 24; seven days from October 30.

Bernard J. Walsh, seven days from October 24; seven days from October 30.

A communication was presented from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, dated October 25, with reference to the complaints filed with the Commission against an alleged violation of the Civil Service Law in the Topographical Bureau of his department. President Coler transmitted the following report from Mr. Charles Ward, Engineer in charge of the Topographical Bureau:

"1. There is employed as Chainman and Rodman in this Bureau Mr. William J. Seifert. For years he has been employed in the field performing duties indicated by his title. On account of his experience and of his familiarity with the field notes, he was brought into this office to index and to methodize the field notes so that those notes may be accessible not only to this office, but also the offices of the several City departments and to the public at large. This branch of the work having been unavoidably neglected in the past, it was, therefore, necessary to have the services of a man familiar with the field notes in order to co-ordinate and systematize this vast amount of useful information. In my judgment the work of indexing and methodizing field notes is as much the duties of a Chainman and Rodman as are his duties in the field.

"2. Mr. James Hill, the colored Laborer, has been employed in this office to move and arrange the book and the map cases, to put in order the instruments, tools, etc., etc., in the store room and to perform other laboring duties which arise daily. These duties, which are really those of a Laborer, can be more economically and satisfactorily performed by a Laborer than by any other employee."

President Coler stated, in addition to the foregoing report, that he had personally investigated the matter and could find no cause for the making of the complaints; that he believed they were the work of some dissatisfied and jealous employee of the Topographical Bureau, and called attention to the fact that the directory of The City of New York for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the year 1905 does not contain the name of either J. H. Hassett or J. F. Macon, the names signed to the communications received by the Commission, nor do they appear in the directory of the Borough of Brooklyn. The papers were ordered filed.

A communication was presented from the First Deputy Clerk of the Police Department, stating that Mr. Elbert O. Smith, who was retired from the rank of Inspector of Police on the 9th day of May, 1905, and again restored to duty as such Inspector on the 17th day of April, 1906, is a veteran of the Civil War, and forwarding pay roll for his salary from the 9th day of May, 1905, to the 1st day of April, 1906, with interest, for the approval of the Commission, in accordance with opinions of the Corporation Counsel, dated May 3 and May 9, 1906. The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the pay roll.

The Secretary called the attention of the Commission to the pay roll of Lawrence J. Donahue, Patrolman in the Police Department, for salary from September 1, 1905, upon which date he was suspended from duty, to September 21, 1906, upon which date he was restored to duty by the Police Commissioner. The Secretary was directed to attach the certificate of the Commission to the pay roll.

The emergency appointment of James Carroll as Engineman in the Department of Public Charities, for seven days from October 23, was approved under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 4.

A communication was presented from Mr. Edward B. Shallow, Associate City Superintendent, Department of Education, dated October 27, stating that he was greatly in need of the services of a competent man to supervise the clerical part of the work of the taking of the school census by the Police Department, of which he was in charge; that Mr. Frederick L. Jenkins, of No. 452 Hancock street, Brooklyn, who was Chief Clerk of the Police Department of the City of Brooklyn, possessed the requisite knowledge and experience, as he had charge of the school census that was taken in Brooklyn in the year 1897, and requesting the Commission to except Mr. Jenkins from examination to render expert service in the Department of Education for a period of three months, at a compensation of \$75 a month.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Mr. Frederick L. Jenkins, of No. 452 Hancock street, Brooklyn, be and he hereby is excepted from competitive examination under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 6, to render expert service in the Department of Education in connection with the taking of the school census, it appearing that Mr. Jenkins is a person engaged in private business, and that the services to be rendered are of a technical and expert nature; provided, however, that his compensation shall not exceed the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250.)

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated October 29, stating that owing to a shortage of appropriation for triangulation work it would be necessary to lay off the men employed upon that work about November 1, unless the Commission would allow the transfer of said men to another department that could utilize their services until January 1, at which time it was the desire of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to re-employ them, a new appropriation then becoming available. The Secretary stated that among these employees were several Heliotropers, who had not yet completed their probationary period. He was instructed to inform the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the Commission would allow the transfers, if made in bulk, upon the understanding that it was desired to keep the force intact so that it might resume work on the first of January, when the new appropriation would become available, without the difficulty and loss of time that would ensue in organizing an equally efficient force.

A communication was presented from the Commissioner of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, dated October 27, requesting that in the absence of an eligible list for Automobile Engineman, he be authorized to employ Mr. John Holsten in that capacity from week to week, under the provisions of Rule XII., paragraph 4, until such time as a permanent appointment could be made either through a competitive or non-competitive examination. The request was granted.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That the eligible list for promotion to the old seventh grade of Clerkship in the Department of Finance, be and the same hereby is changed to a list for promotion to the old eighth grade as of July 16, 1906, it appearing that the scope of the examination was sufficiently broad to qualify the candidates for promotion to the latter grade of salary.

The reports of the following Boards of Examiners for positions in the non-competitive class were approved upon the recommendation of the Chief Examiner:

Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School, October 25.

Department of Correction, October 24.

Department of Education, October 17.

Department of Docks and Ferries, October 9, 10.

Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, June 20; July 20, 25; August 31, 31, 31; October 1, 1, 1.

A communication was presented from the Secretary of the Rapid Transit Railroad Commission, dated October 27, stating that the sixty days for which the employment of William H. Bressler and Walter W. Miller, Rodmen, was authorized by the Commission, would expire on November 1, and requesting that said period be extended,

the Department having been unable to make satisfactory permanent appointments from the list certified, for the reason that the work to be performed was partly under compressed air in the East river tunnel. The Secretary was directed to inform the Department that the Commission would approve the pay rolls of the temporary employees until December 1.

The emergency appointments of the following-named persons as Interpreters in the Municipal Court, Borough of Brooklyn, Seventh District, were approved under the provisions of Civil Service Rule XII., paragraph 4:

Communications were presented from the Department of Docks and Ferries, dated October 19 and 29, stating that the names of Margaret Nerie and Stephen J. Fallon, Attendants, were, through error, included in the list of those dismissed from the service of the department for lack of work on September 28, and that their names should not have been included in that list, as they were to be continued in the employ of the Department. The Secretary was directed to inform the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries that the Commission had placed the names of these employees upon a preferred list with the other persons who were suspended at the same time, and that they should have to be re-employed from said list in the regular order of their standing.

Doyle, Esq., No. 725 Madison street, Brooklyn, protesting against the exemption of two additional Deputy Commissioners of Street Cleaning, and stating that, in his opinion, the position should be retained in the competitive class and filled through competitive examination. The Secretary was instructed to communicate with Mr. Doyle and call his attention to the provisions of section 12 of the Civil Service Law.

A communication was presented from Mrs. Mary K. Clark, The Ansonia, Broadway and Seventy-third street, New York City, dated October 10, requesting a rerating of the "Duties" paper in the examination for Examiner of Charitable Institutions, together with a report of Miss Upshaw and Mr. Gallagher, Examiners. The matter was laid over for further consideration.

The Commission then adjourned to meet Thursday, November 8, 1906, at 10 a. m.

In the matter of the application of the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and said Nassau Electric Railroad Company, for the construction of an electric railroad on portions of Atlantic avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

The petition of the undersigned respectfully shows:

First—By chapter 256 of the Laws of 1832, the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," between Brooklyn and Jamaica.

In addition to the general powers given by law, the corporation was authorized to prescribe the manner in which the railroad should be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Second—That thereafter it constructed a steam surface railroad upon a right of way which it acquired by purchase or condemnation proceed-

ings, portions of which line were included within the limits of what is now Atlantic avenue.

Third—By chapter 178 of the Laws of 1834 the Long Island Railroad Company was organized and empowered to construct a railroad from Greenport to a point on the waters adjacent to Brooklyn, "with such appendages as may be deemed necessary for the convenient use of the same," with power to prescribe the manner in which its road shall be used, and by what force the carriages to be used thereon may be propelled.

Fourth—By chapter 94 of the Laws of 1836 the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was authorized to lease its railroad from Brooklyn to Jamaica to the Long Island Railroad Company, and it was provided that the use of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad, under such lease, should be taken as a performance of the obligations on the part of the Long Island Railroad Company to construct its road from Greenport to Brooklyn.

Fifth—This lease was made of all the corporate rights and franchises of the said Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, and has been extended from time to time, and now has seventy (70) years to run. The Long Island Railroad Company under it and under its own charter has been for many years operating a double-track steam railroad over the right of way formerly of the Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company, situated in the centre of what is now Atlantic avenue, from the junction of Atlantic and Flatbush avenues, in the Borough of Brooklyn to Jamaica and points eastward thereof.

Sixth—The Brooklyn and Jamaica Railroad Company was foreclosed and its property conveyed to the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company or Brooklyn, and said Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn was, on or about January 26, 1899, merged with the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, and the Nassau Electric Railroad Company is now possessed of all its property and franchises.

Seventh—By chapter 499 of the Laws of 1897, for the improvement of Atlantic avenue and for the removal of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company from the surface, it was provided that the railroad of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, "now leased and operated by the Long Island Railroad Company," between Flatbush avenue and Atkins avenue, should be changed by said companies "by depressing the same from Flatbush avenue to near the easterly side of Bedford avenue, so as to leave the surface free from the steam railroad tracks, fences and gates of the steam railroad of the Long Island Railroad Company then existing thereon." From this point the right of way of the railroad should be operated in an open cut, to a point between Bedford and Nostrand avenues. From there running east the tracks should be raised and run on an elevated structure to the easterly side of Ralph avenue. From Ralph avenue the tracks were to descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, at a point between Ralph and Howard avenues. From there they were to be operated in an open cut to the west side of Cooper place. From there they were to be placed below the surface of the street to a point near the east side of Stone avenue. From there the right of way should be through an open cut to a point near the westerly side of Jardine place, where it should coincide with the grade of Atlantic avenue. From there eastward it should be operated on a surface grade to near the easterly side of Snediker avenue. At this point the tracks were to be elevated, passing over Williams avenue at a height of eight feet, and over Alabama avenue at a height of twelve feet, and from the easterly side of Alabama avenue the tracks should be operated over an elevated structure to a point near Linwood avenue. From there they should descend to the grade of Atlantic avenue, near Atkins avenue, and from that point eastward should be operated on the existing grade.

Eighth—Said act also provided that when completed the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Atlantic Avenue Railroad Company of Brooklyn, was authorized and directed to run its trains "over such improvement and the road of such railroad as constructed and authorized by law," and no cars of other companies, without permission of the said Long Island Railroad Company, shall be run thereon or thereunder.

Ninth—By chapter 497 of the Laws of 1899 it is provided that whenever any right of way, grade or tracks of any steam railroad in any street, in any city of the first class, are required by law to be changed or altered by elevating or depressing the same for the purpose of discontinuing the use of steam power upon the surface of said highway or street, such alteration or change of grade shall not be deemed to curtail or affect any right which such company, or its lessees or assigns, may have to maintain and operate a surface passenger railroad within the limits of the right of way so depressed or elevated, and over or under the railroad tracks so depressed or elevated, with all turnouts, sidings or tracks necessary to secure the continuous connection of portions of such surface railroad. In the event that any such turnouts, sidings or tracks shall extend beyond the lines of the right of way of such railroad corporation whose tracks have been so depressed or elevated in or upon any of the streets or highways aforesaid, such turnouts, sidings or tracks so extending beyond the lines of such right of way shall only be constructed upon condition that the consent of the owners of one-half in value of the property bounded, and the consent also of the local authorities having the control of that portion of such street or highway upon which it is proposed to construct such turnout, siding or tracks, shall be first obtained. No such railroad shall be operated by steam locomotives, and shall not be used except for passenger traffic.

Tenth—That the change of grade provided in and by the aforesaid acts for the improvement of Atlantic avenue has been duly made, such portions of the aforesaid track required by said act to be depressed below the surface of the street have been so depressed, and such portions as were required to be elevated have been elevated, that the connections between the same have been constructed, and the trains of the Long Island Railroad Company are now being operated thereon by electricity.

Eleventh—That the tracks for an electrical railroad have been laid upon the aforesaid right of way of the said railroad, over or under the said improvement, with the exception of the following portions thereof, viz.:

1. From the westerly side of Bedford avenue to a point midway between Nostrand avenue and New York avenue.

2. From a point opposite Columbus place to a point near Louis place.

3. From a point opposite Olive place to a point nearly opposite Alabama avenue, with the exception of the portion of the south side of Atlantic avenue, between Snediker and Georgia avenues, occupied by the tracks of the Brooklyn and Rockaway Beach Railroad Company, over which the Long Island Railroad Company has the right to operate.

At these points, where either the cuts are located (being the portions of said right of way by which the trains from the depressed subway reach the surface), or the inclined portion of the elevated structure extends from the grade of the avenue to a place where there is sufficient headroom for the cars to pass thereunder. At

these points the existence of these obstacles make it impossible to operate a continuous railroad upon the surface of said right of way.

Twelfth—That in order to secure a continuous connection and operation of said surface railroad, it is necessary that a turnout or siding, consisting of a single track on each side of said right of way, should be constructed in the various portions of Atlantic avenue lying between the points aforesaid, and also that the same should be connected with the tracks of the street surface railroads intersecting the same. That such sidings and connections have been duly located, and that the portions of the streets proposed to be occupied thereby are, and the general line of the improvement is designated on the blue print hereto annexed, marked "A." Drawing No. R-4. Maps showing each one of such sidings in detail are also hereto annexed, marked "B," "C," "D"; maps "E" and "F" show the location of the poles carrying the electric wires.

Thirteenth—That your petitioners are advised and believe that under the statutes aforesaid, and under the provisions of law relative to the subject, your petitioners are authorized to construct said turnouts and sidings and to operate an electric railroad over the same in connection with the line constructed upon the surface of the aforesaid right of way as aforesaid, upon obtaining the consent of the local authorities of The City of New York, and the consent of the majority of the owners of the property abutting on said sidings, or, in lieu of the latter, the consent of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Fourteenth—That your petitioners have used diligent efforts to obtain the consent of the majority of said abutting owners, but have been unable so to do, and are now about to apply to the Appellate Division for its consent in lieu thereof.

Fifteenth—That the portions of Atlantic avenue over which the petitioners desire to obtain the consent of the City to operate is only a very small portion of the entire route of the proposed railroad, the remainder being upon the property of your petitioners.

That this proposed railroad will be a trolley railroad of the most modern character, and its construction and operation will be a great public convenience, and will, as your petitioners are informed and believe, largely enhance the value of the property abutting on Atlantic avenue and of that in the vicinity. That your petitioners believe that a rental of one hundred dollars (\$100) a year for a franchise to operate each of four turnouts, or the aggregate annual rent of four hundred dollars (\$400) (which represents a capitalization of four per centum of \$10,000), would be a reasonable rent to pay for such privileges, and your petitioners hereby offer to pay the same to the City for its consent to such construction.

Wherefore, your petitioners respectfully pray that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment will grant to the Nassau Electric Railroad Company and the Long Island Railroad Company, as lessee of the Nassau Electric Railroad Company, the consent of The City of New York for the construction of a double track electrical railroad to be laid on the surface of Atlantic avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York, one track thereof to be laid on each side of said avenue in the portions thereof adjoining the places where the right of way of the Long Island Railroad Company above mentioned is obstructed by the elevated and depressed tracks, to wit:

1. Leaving the said right of way at a point forty (40) feet westerly from the westerly side of Bedford avenue, and thence running with a single track on each side of the line of the said right of way and the inner rail of said tracks to be about four (4) feet distant therefrom, to a point about one hundred and fifty (150) feet easterly from the easterly line of Nostrand avenue, and thence curving inward, intersecting the said right of way and connecting with the tracks thereon.

2. The said Stock and Bonds are issued in accordance with the provisions of Section 10 of Article 8 of the Constitution of the State of New York.

The principal of and interest on said Stock and Bonds are payable in gold coin of the United States of America, of the present standard of weight and fineness, pursuant to resolutions of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, adopted June 9, 1898, and April 18, 1904.

Under this provision the condition that the bidder will accept only the whole amount of Stock or Bonds bid for by him, and not any part thereof, cannot be inserted in any bids, except those for "all or none" offered by bidders who have also bid for "all or any part" of the Stock or Bonds offered for sale.

PROPOSALS FOR BIDS AND ESTIMATES FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
