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ART COMMISSION.

CATALOGUE OF WORKS OF ART BELONGING TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The following tentative list has been compiled from the records of the various City departments, supplemented by a thorough canvass of the Borough of Brooklyn. It is not expected that the list is free from errors and omissions, for in many instances the data secured were not only incomplete but very vague and uncertain. Even the works of art themselves do not in all instances bear the names of the artists or dates of completion. In a number of instances, owing to the changes and alterations that have been made, the name of the artist has partially or wholly been obliterated, and the authorship is consequently open to question. The list is, however, as complete as the material at hand at present will permit, and if those into whose hands it may come shall be able to supply the deficiencies and correct such errors as may unavoidably have crept in, it will be appreciated not only by the Commission but by those who are constantly applying at this office for information regarding the City's art works.

In determining whether a painting, sculpture or structure is a work of art the definition used in the Charter in defining the powers of the Art Commission has liberally been construed. Section 637 provides: "The term 'work of art,' as used in this title, shall apply to and include all paintings, mural decorations, stained glass, statues, bas-reliefs or other sculptures, monuments, fountains, arches or other structures of a permanent character intended for ornament or commemoration."

All inscriptions have been copied verbatim, without attempting to correct the errors, if any, contained therein. Where it has been possible to decipher the signature of the artist, this has been included by the use of quotation marks. Where the artist's name is not inclosed in quotation marks, it is to be understood, therefore, either that there is no signature or that the signature is in doubt. The asterisk (*) is used to indicate the fact of official approval by the Art Commission, before acquisition by the City. The items are classified geographically to facilitate easy reference.

To provide a correct record of the location of all works of art, maps of the entire City have been prepared, mounted and placed in the office of the Commission. The location of every work of art listed in the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, and of structures approved by the Commission, has been plotted. A system of notation has also been adopted which shows at a glance whether the designs and location of a work of art or of a public structure have been approved in whole or in part, or have not been passed upon by the Commission. A number has been assigned to each structure, and a card catalogue which enables one to find in a moment all of the data in the records of the Commission or its files relating to it. The system is capable of indefinite expansion, and as matters are acted upon by the Commission, the records will be extended so that the catalogue and index will be kept up to date from month to month.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, at a meeting held January 12, 1906, adopted the following resolution:

“Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the establishment of the position of Cashier in the Bureau of Sewers under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, and recommends to the Board of Aldermen, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, that the salary of said position be fixed at the rate of fifteen hundred dollars (\$1,500) per annum.”

 Appeal 19 of 1906, New Building 233 of 1906, premises No. 110 West Fourteenth street, Manhattan; Henry Andersen, appellant.

Appeal laid over at last meeting.

Mr. Andersen appeared before the Board and filed diagram requested.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 20 of 1906, New Building 317 of 1906, northwest corner of Seventy-fifth street and Central Park West, Manhattan; Townsend, Steinle & Haskell, architects and appellants.

"No. 4. Building exceeds twelve stories in height and should conform to the provisions of section 105 of the Code, relating to fireproofing of buildings of that height."

The Superintendent of Buildings of the Borough of Manhattan having rejected and refused to approve the construction and materials proposed to be followed or used in the erection of said building.

1. Erect and maintain a pent house story on top of main roof of proposed twelve-story fireproof apartment house, said pent house shall be constructed of angle and tee framing filled in with terra cotta blocks 4 inches thick.

2. Entire floor shall be of cement concrete.
 3. Wire glass shall be used throughout said pent house.

4. Skylights will be provided of copper bars glazed with wire glass.

5. All window frames, sash, doors, trim and base to be kalomeine metal-covered wood throughout entire pent house.

6. The highest point in pent house roof beams to be 151 feet 6 inches from curb level in front of main entrance door.

7. No woodwork whatever to be used in construction of pent house with exception of above-mentioned kalomeine metal-covered wood.

8. Entire construction of pent house will be strictly fireproof.

9. A standpipe of size approved by Fire Department, with 2½-inch quick opening valve and first quality linen hose on approved hose rack will be provided in main halls where shown on plans.

10. Pent house shall not cover more than 16 per cent. of main roof area. The above pent house shall not be considered as an entire story, as it does not cover more than 16 per cent. of the roof area, inclusive of elevator shafts, stair bulkheads, etc.

Also that the entire pent house will be built strictly in accordance with section 105 of the Code, relative to fireproof buildings. For that reason it is respectfully requested that the above application be approved so as to permit of twelve-story building being constructed of ordinary fireproof construction throughout.

Mr. Wm. C. Haskell appeared before the Board.

On motion, approved.

Appeal 21 of 1906, New Building 1,281 of 1905, premises, north side of One Hundred and Thirty-second street, about 325 feet from the northeast corner of St. Ann's avenue, The Bronx; Albert E. Davis, architect and appellant.

"No. 3. Bottom plate of cellar column will be overloaded in tension and ribs of same will be weak in shear."

That approval of the manner or mode of construction has been refused by the Superintendent.

That an equally good or more desirable form of construction than that approved can be employed.

The right to use the columns as they are as being of stronger and better construction than the form approved, and of ample strength for the purpose.

That the columns are good sound castings, well and strongly made and of more than sufficient capacity; that this is conceded, the sole objection being to the lugs and plate.

That to perforate a 9-inch cast-iron column with thirty-two 7/8-inch holes at the base, the point at which the greatest stability is essential, would weaken rather than strengthen them, and would tend to impair the integrity of the column for the sake of a minor attachment which is not specifically demanded by the Code.

That the two-story building was already approved and erected before the approval of the three added stories was applied for, and that as there are fifteen columns which support the interior of the building there are practical difficulties in the way of carrying out the requirement demanded, and that the spirit of the law will be subserved, public safety secured, and substantial justice done, by granting this appeal.

Messrs. A. E. Davis, W. M. Farrar and C. Bullesbach appeared before the Board. On motion, approved, Mr. Marshall recorded as voting in the negative.

Appeal 22 of 1906, Fireproof Shutter Case 2 of 1906, premises No. 117 Hester street, Manhattan; Louis J. Marx, appellant.

The story in question is occupied as a synagogue or place for religious services.

On motion, referred to Chief Croker for examination and report, with recommendation.

Resolved, That section 178 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 178. Spitting upon the sidewalk of any public street, avenue, park, public square or place in the City of New York, or upon the floor of any hall in any tenement house which is used in common by the tenants thereof, or upon the floor of any hall or office in any hotel or lodging house which is used in common by the guests thereof, or upon the floor of any theatre, store, factory, or of any building which is used in common by the public, or upon the floor of any ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, or upon the floor of any ferry house, depot or station, or upon the station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, or into the street from the cars, stairs or platforms of the elevated railroads, is hereby forbidden.

"The corporations or persons owning or having the management or control of any such building, store, factory, ferry boat, railroad car or other public conveyance, ferry house, depot or station, station platform or stairs of any elevated railroad or other common carrier, are hereby required to keep permanently posted in each of said places a sufficient number of notices forbidding spitting upon the floors and calling attention to the provisions of this section.

"It is hereby made the duty of every corporation or person engaged in the manufacture of cigars, cigarettes or tobacco, or conducting the business of printing in the City of New York, where ten or more persons are employed on the premises, to provide proper receptacles for expectoration. Such receptacles are to be in proportion of one for every two persons so employed, and they are to be cleansed and disinfected at least once in every twenty-four hours.

"A copy of the preceding paragraph must be kept posted in a conspicuous place in every factory or printing office mentioned therein."
