A meeting of the Board of Revision of Assessments was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, on Thursday, June 11, 1908, at 11:40 o'clock a. m.

Present at Roll Call—N. Taylor Phillips, Deputy and Acting Comptroller, and George L. Sterling, Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the minutes of meeting of June 4, 1908, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD.

### BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Regulating, Grading, etc., East Two Hundred and Eighth Street.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, curbing, flagging, laying cross-walks, building approaches and placing fences in East Two Hundred and Eighth street, from Reservoir Oval West, to Jerome avenue,

and objections of the Ericson Realty Company, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

Regulating, Grading, etc., Townsend Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing, flagging, laying cross-walks, building approaches and placing fences in Townsend avenue, from East One Hundred and Seventieth street to East One Hundred and Seventy-sixth street; and objections of Morris B. Schwick, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, and of J. Romaine Brown, in person, received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

Regulating, Grading, etc., East Eighth Street.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and laying cement sidewalks on East Eighth street, between Avenue C and Avenue E, with objections of Charles Nimmo, and of E. P. Mosher in person, and communication of the President of the Borough, dated May 23, 1908, transmitting a report of the Chief Engineer relative thereto, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

No one appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

Grading, Curbing, etc., Jamaica Avenue.

The assessment list for grading, curbing and flagging Jamaica avenue, from the Boulevard to Steinway avenue, and objections of Mrs. Abby A. Potter, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

On motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### Regulating, Grading, etc., the Crescent.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for regulating, grading, curbing and flagging the Crescent, from Grand avenue to Broadway, First Ward, and objections of Stuard Hirschman, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney, and estate of Lucretia L. Heckscher and Julia C. Stevens, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of June 5, 1908.

A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, appeared by representative.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

At 11:45 o'clock a. m., Lawson Purdy, President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, entered the meeting and took his seat in the Board.

### Sewer in Third Avenue.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the assessment list for sewer in Third avenue, from Jackson avenue to a point about 340 feet north of Washington avenue, with objections of Mary Gardner, et al., filed by Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys, and of Lillian M. Seyffert in person; and testimony taken in said matter and also copy of report from the Engineer in charge of the Bureau of Sewers, also affidavit of the Inspector on the work, received from the Board of Assessors, under date of June 5, 1908.

The Board of Assessors reported that they had reduced the assessment by 20 per cent, pro rata, as determined by them at meeting held May 19, 1908.

Mr. Albert W. Linton, of Moore, Ashley & Linton, attorneys, was heard in opposition to the assessment.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### Sewer in Flushing Avenue.

The assessment list for sewer in Flushing avenue, from Van Alst avenue to Cabinet street, with objections, as follows, viz:

John Anderson Leach, attorney for owners of property, Lot No. 93, Block 100; Lot No. 46, Block 83; Lot No. 46, Block 100; Lot No. 108, Block 167; Lots Nos. 53 to 71; Brodsky & Sovak, filed by A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys; Stuard Hirschman, filed by Joseph A. Flannery, attorney; M. C. Bulcken and Abraham Totten and others, filed by Hugo Hirsh, attorney, and of Edward E. Scheurer, Max C. Burger, and of John Hohorst and others; also abstract of testimony taken in said matter were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

The following were heard in opposition to the assessment: John R. McMullen, attorney; A. C. & F. W. Hottenroth, attorneys, by representative; Hugo Hirsh, attorney, by representative; Edward E. Scheurer in person, and Father Walsh, Rector of the Church of the Lady of Mount Carmel.

The assessors reported that after consideration of the evidence submitted by the Engineer in charge of the work, the Board had reduced the assessment for the cost of the work on Flushing avenue from a point about half way between Titus and Luyster streets, easterly to Cabinet street, the sum of \$2,500, and placed this amount as non-assessable at the end of the assessment list—the above mentioned amount representing what the Engineer stated will be the estimated cost of a pumping station proposed to be constructed, so as to give an outlet for the section of the sewer above stated, and for which a local assessment is to be levied.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the Assistant and Acting Corporation Counsel, the assessment list was referred back to the Board of Assessors with instructions to reduce the amount of the present assessment by 10 per cent, and to confirm the same as so reduced, all the members voting in the affirmative.

### Grading, Flagging, etc., Taylor Street.

The assessment list for grading, flagging and curbing Taylor street, from Van Alst avenue to Hopkins avenue, with applications for awards for damages, and objections of James H. Murphy and others, filed by John R. McMullen, attorney, and abstract of testimony taken in said matter, represented by Mr. McMullen and Ridgway & Desser, attorneys, were presented by the Deputy and Acting Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors under date of June 5, 1908.

Mr. John R. McMullen, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment.

No others appearing in opposition after notice, on motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the objections filed against the assessment were overruled and the assessment list was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.

Mr. Thomas W. Burke, attorney, was heard in opposition to the assessment.

On motion of the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the decision of the Board was reserved, and the assessment list was laid over, all the members voting in the affirmative.

## Grading Lot, Underhill Avenue, East Side.

Amending subdivision 1 of section 66 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education by striking out in the schedule headed "Elementary School Licenses—Day Schools" the line reading "Teacher's license for promotion."

Amending subdivision 4 of section 67 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

"4. Men Teachers promoted to Schedule VII. and women Teachers promoted to Schedule V. to become Teachers of a graduating class (of the grade 8B) must hold a license as Teacher of a graduating class. This provision, however, shall not in any manner affect or impair the rights now existing of any person eligible at the time of the passage of this by-law (May 27, 1908) to teach a graduating class.

"A license as Teacher of a graduating class shall qualify the holder to act as Assistant Teacher in an evening high school.

"Persons holding the license heretofore known as a promotion license shall continue to enjoy all rights and privileges conferred by said license."

Amending section 72 of the By-Laws of the Board of Education so as to read as follows:

"Sec. 72. To be eligible for license as Teacher of a graduating class applicants must have the following qualifications:

(a) The holding of a permanent license No. 1 or a higher license.

(b) Successful experience in teaching, equivalent to five years' experience in the public schools of The City of New York, two of which shall have been in one or more of the grades of the last three years of the elementary course."

Selecting and determining as a site for school purposes the lands and premises on Macdougal and Sullivan streets, between Bleeker and West Houston streets, in Local School Board District No. 9, Borough of Manhattan, the assessed valuation of which, as shown by the books of record on file in the Department of Taxes and Assessments, is \$143,500, and requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to take such action as may be necessary and proper for the acquisition of the lands and premises above described.

Approving the recommendation of the Board of Superintendents that provision be made for the organization and maintenance of four classes for the instruction of blind children in the elementary schools.

Granting the request of the Board of Superintendents for permission to withdraw the resolution recommending the establishment of a kindergarten class for crippled children in Public School 116, Manhattan, in September next, and rescinding the action taken by the Board of Education in connection therewith.


