urjor J. Kharivala, P. E., of the Bureau of Engineering, Design and Construction (BEDC), is retiring after dedicating nearly 50 years of his life to the design of City Water Tunnel No. 3, its deep rock control chambers, and distribution shafts. In his honor, the gateway between Hillview Reservoir and City Water Tunnel No. 3 will hereinafter be named The Burjor J. Kharivala Control Chamber. A plaque will be placed at the gateway,

dedicated on the date of Burjor's retirement, April 28, 2017.

Burjor began his career with the City of New York Department of Public Works designing wastewater treatment tanks for the original Newtown Creek Wastewater Treatment Plant in 1963. After a short period as an engineering consultant, Burjor rejoined the Board of Water Supply in 1968 when work was beginning on City Water

Special Guest Commissioner's Corner



Pamela Elardo, DEP's Deputy Commissioner for Wastewater Treatment, is a guest commentator this week.

Last Wednesday, I had the pleasure of joining with Acting Commissioner Vincent Sapienza as we kicked off the 30th annual Operations Challenge at the Jamaica Wastewater Treatment Plant. This competition is the Olympics of our industry and is approached with high levels of pride and team spirit. The event, co-sponsored by DEP and New York Water Environment Association Metro, featured four teams of Bureau of Wastewater Treatment (BWT) plant operators showcasing the expertise and skills required to operate and maintain New York City's 14 wastewater treatment plants and 96 pump stations. This included teams from the Bowery Bay, Jamaica, Hunts Point and North River plants. Moreover, we are very pleased that, in a competition first, a team representing the Bureau of Water Supply (BWS) upstate watershed treatment plants participated to test their mettle against their downstate colleagues.

All teams competed in three timed and judged events, including:

- Collections: Teams respond to a leaking pipe and repair it while it remains in service.
- Worker Safety: Teams compete in a timed, confined space rescue of a fellow employee and perform CPR while checking air quality. They must also change a defective check valve.
- Maintenance: Teams compete to respond to a severe weather condition that results in a pumping outage. They must restore the

main pumps to service, and program them for emergency use.

In addition, this year's competition included two events which the teams completed earlier in the week:

- Laboratory: Teams perform tests on water samples to determine if it meets discharge standards.
- Wastewater Treatment Process: Teams are tested on their knowledge of the wastewater treatment process.

After intense, and sometimes furious, moments in the competition. the two teams coming out on top represented the Jamaica and Bowery Bay plants. They will move on to compete in the regional competition in New Jersey next month and then the state competition in June in Rochester, NY. In addition, our upstate team will also be advancing to the next level. The winners of the statewide contest will participate in the national competition to be held in Chicago in September. A team from DEP has advanced to the national competition in 29 out of the last 30 years, and we are hoping for another great showing this year.

This competition reflects the high level of expertise, skill and knowledge of our crews. In addition, it demonstrates the high level of pride the men and women in BWT and BWS take in protecting public health and the environment. I'd like to thank everyone involved with the Operations Challenge for all of their work, especially like to thank Howard Robinson and William Grandner. Tunnel No. 3. Burjor began designing components that would support this massive project and, from that point forward, spent the majority of his career designing the systems that comprise City Water Tunnel No. 3, with its 34 mile-long deeprock tunnel and its 31 shafts. He also worked on projects at Hillview and Kensico Reservoirs, and the Delaware and Catskill Aqueducts.

Burjor rose through the ranks to become Chief Tunnel Engineer for BEDC. Under his direction, the Van Cortlandt Valve Chamber—a 680 foot long, 50 foot wide, and 60 foot high structure—was blasted out of solid bedrock 280 feet below the ground. Burjor has enthusiastically shared his 50-plus years of engineering and geotechnical expertise with BEDC's In-House Design staff in developing the next generation of in-house tunnel design engineers who, in turn, continue to deliver critical infrastructure projects for the city and who proudly carry forward his legacy. Air Quality in NYC

The City's Health Department last week released the latest New York City Community Air Survey (NYCCAS) results, which found improvements in air quality between 2008 and 2015 and highlighted continued progress toward Mayor de Blasio's OneNYC goal of achieving the cleanest air of any large U.S. city by 2030. Between 2008 and 2015, levels of fine particulate matter, nitrogen dioxide, nitric oxide and black carbon have declined by 18 percent, 23 percent, 28 percent and 18 percent, respectively. The reduction in air pollution is most directly related to the phase out of No. 6 heating oil, an effort that was spearheaded by the DEP. Last February, DEP and Mayor de Blasio announced that all 5,300 buildings that were registered as burning Number 6 heating oil in 2011 had converted to a cleaner fuel. Working closely with environmental groups and the real estate industry, in 2011 DEP promulgated new rules which phased out the use of No. 6 heating oil by 2015. Since then, DEP enforcement staff have conducted nearly 4,000 inspections, issued more than 2,000 Notices of Violation and 162 Cease and Desist Orders to ensure buildings were making the required conversion.
