HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,
NEW YORK, June 7, 1881.

The Board met this day.

Reports.

From the Sanitary Superintendent: On operations of the Sanitary Bureau; on contagious diseases; on slaughter-houses; on work performed by the Sanitary Company of Police; on work performed by the Milk Inspectors; weekly report from Riverside Hospital; weekly report on applications for permits; on street sewers, etc.; on restaurant at southeast corner West and Barclay streets; on destruction of infected beddings at No. 61 Thompson street; on azotine factory, 645 Water street and 322 Front street; on applications for relief from certain orders.

Resolved, That a copy of the report of Sanitary Inspector Goldschmidt upon the restaurant at southeast corner West and Barclay streets, be forwarded to the Bureau of Incumbrances for the necessary action.

Resolved, That Jones and Heinz, owners of azotine factory at 645 Water street and 322 Front street, be summoned to appear at the next meeting of this Board to show cause why the business should not be discontinued.

Resolved, That the application for relief from orders on premises Nos. 246 East Broadway and 235 Division street, be and are hereby denied, and the Sanitary Superintendent directed to enforce the same.

Resolved, That the application for relief from Order No. 9,385 on premises No. 252 Pearl street, be and is hereby referred to the Sanitary Superintendent for re-inspection.

Resolved, That leave of absence of two weeks from June 28, on account of sickness, be and is hereby granted to William L. Craig, in addition to the regular summer vacation.

Resolved, That leave of absence be and is hereby granted to William J. Purcell, on account of sickness, from April 21 to May 27.

Resolved, That for the prevention of dangers from contagious and infectious diseases which are found to exist in the City of New York, and for the care of persons sick therewith and exposed to danger therefrom, an appropriation of thirty thousand dollars, in excess of the annual appropriation for the year, is necessary for use in the next six months for the appointment of special inspectors, physicians and nurses, and for supplies and contingencies during the existence of such dangers, which this Board declares to exist.

Resolved, That in consequence of the aforesaid necessity and of the foregoing resolution, the Board of Health, under and pursuant to chapter two hundred and forty-six of the Laws of eighteen hundred and eighty-one, respectfully asks the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to make an appropriation for the aforesaid purpose for the next six months of the sum of thirty thousand dollars in excess of the annual appropriation for this Department, and further requests the Comptroller to provide the said money for the aforesaid use.

Action of the Board on Tenement-house Plans.

The following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses were approved upon the conditions specified in the several permits granted:

Plan No. 1071-2 for seven four-story tenements, each 28 feet 7 inches by 65 feet, with an extension 20 feet by 20 feet, on lots 28 feet 7 inches by 100 feet 5 inches, on the north side of Sixty-ninth street, beginning 250 feet east of First avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1076-2 for two four-story tenements, each 30 feet by 68 feet, with an extension 22 feet by 18 feet, on lots 30 feet by 100 feet 5 inches, on the south side of Sixty-first street, beginning 190 feet west of Ninth avenue, each to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1084 for seven four-story tenements, four on Eighth avenue, beginning on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, each 57 feet 6 inches deep, with an extension 5 feet by 14 feet 6 inches wide, on lots each 75 feet deep; and three on the north side of One Hundred and Twenty-eighth street, beginning 75 feet east of Eighth avenue, each 64 feet deep, with an extension 14 feet 6 inches by 6 feet; each of said houses to be occupied by eight families.

Plan No. 1090 for one five-story tenement 27 feet by 100 feet, on a lot 27 feet by 100 feet, on the southeast corner of Madison avenue and Fifty-third street, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1091 for three four-story tenements, each 16 feet 8 inches, with an extension 12 feet by 15 feet, on lots 16 feet 8 inches by 100 feet 11 inches, on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, beginning 175 feet east of Eighth avenue, to be occupied by four families.

Plan No. 1092 for eight four-story tenements, each 21 feet 10 inches by 68 feet, on lots 21 feet 10 inches by 100 feet 11 inches, on the south side of One Hundred and Twenty-fourth street, beginning 175 feet east of Ninth avenue, each to be occupied by five families.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 4, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,354, as follows, viz.: 3 public buildings, 470 tenement-houses, 98 private dwellings, 87 other dwellings, 9 manufactories and workshops, 25 stores and warehouses, 46 stables, 28 slaughter-houses, 1 lard-rendering establishment, 1 dying establishment, 2 public sewers, 1 dangerous building, 12 sunken and vacant lots, 60 yards, courts, and areas, 111 cellars and basements, 155 waste-pipes and drains, 191 privies and water-closets, 13 streets, gutters and sidewalks, 12 dangerous stairways, 8 cesspools, 10 smoky chimneys, 11 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 557.

During the past week 238 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

127 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

236 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 158 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 135 houses, 135 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

36 persons sick with contagious diseases were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 422 births, 53 still-births, 148 marriages, and 660 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 4, 1881; this shows an increase of 98 births, 13 still-births, and 53 marriages, and an increase of 21 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 68 births and 52 marriages, and an increase of 21 still-births and 159 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; croup, 4; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 1; typhus fever, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 1; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; bronchitis, 8; pneumonia, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; apoplexy, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 13; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; while the deaths from small-pox increased 5; measles 6; diphtheria 10; typhoid fever, 3; puerperal diseases, 8; diarrhoeal diseases, 3; inanition, 3; rheumatism and gout, 4; heart diseases, 5; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 10; convulsions, 5; direct effect of solar heat, 1; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 14; premature and preterm births, 8. The number of deaths from malarial fevers, suicide and drowning was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 142 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 188 under two years, 271 under five years, and 30 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was 15 more than the number reported during last week, and represent 41.06 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 143 were in institutions, 349 in tenement-houses, 148 in houses containing three families or less, 6 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 4 were on the basement floor, 140 on the first, 151 on the second, 110 on the third, 77 on the fourth, 19 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 654 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 6 non-residents; 55 were stated to be single, 146 married, 62 widowed, and the condition of 397 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 660; still-births, 53; bodies in transit, 22. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 422 births, 148 marriages, 53 still-births, 660 deaths, 22 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated. 68 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 6 of marriage, and 42 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 4, 1881, was 67.8 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.727, the mean humidity was 74, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,095, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.68 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 609 deaths and still-births, or 85.41 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 258; City, pauper burial ground (undenominational), 85; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran, (undenominational), 93; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 18; Evergreen (undenominational), 39; Woodlawn (undenominational), 18; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 9; Union (Methodist Protestant), 2; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 11; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 5; Washington (undenominational), 14.

The distribution of deaths (actual mortality) for the week ending May 28, 1881, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 12; Second, 1; Third, 2; Fourth, 16; Fifth, 10; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 20; Eighth, 27; Ninth, 20; Tenth, 25; Eleventh, 36; Twelfth, 59; Thirteenth, 20; Fourteenth, 15; Fifteenth, 17; Sixteenth, 19; Seventeenth, 44; Eighteenth, 30; Nineteenth, 119; Twentieth, 55; Twenty-first, 49; Twenty-second, 55; Twenty-third, 10; Twenty-fourth, 3.

The actual mortality for the week ending May 28, 1881, was 673; this is 41 less than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1880, and 153.2 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 28.24 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,239,183.

The annual death-rate per 1,000 persons living, of the estimated or enumerated population, according to the most recent weekly returns of Philadelphia, was 19.77; Brooklyn, 18.14; Baltimore, 17.42; Boston, 18.65; Cincinnati, 15.08; New Orleans, 39.72; Cleveland, 16.23; Charleston, 47.84; Dayton, 12.00; Lowell, 18.36; Worcester, 24.97; Cambridge, 16.76; Fall River, 16.98; Lynn, 14.94; Springfield, 14.04; Augusta, Ga., 21.17. SIR—There were 660 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, June 4, 1881, which is an increase of 21, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 159 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1880. CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January, thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY
OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN
BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT.

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 321 OF THE LAWS
of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents, and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said Bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
