

BOARD OF ARMORY COMMISSIONERS.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL, NEW YORK, April 24, 1891.

A meeting of the Armory Board was held this day, at 2.30 o'clock P. M., at the office of his Honor the Mayor. Present—The Mayor, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, the Commissioner of the Public Works Department and Brigadier-General Fitzgerald.

The minutes of the meeting of April 7 were read and approved. The application of Christopher Nally for his final payment and percentage retained on the steam-heating and ventilating work for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, which had been pre-sented at a previous meeting, was then considered.

Commissioner Coleman reported that no escape pipes had been placed on the safety valves, and several items of minor importance which the contractor promised to supply promptly.

Commissioner Coleman offered the following : Resolved, That the Comptroller be directed to pay to Christopher Nally the sum of three hundred and twenty-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$325.55) as well as the percentage retained, amounting to Fifteen hundred and fifty-six dollars and twenty-five cents (\$1,556.25) for the com-pletion of his contract for steam-heating and ventilating for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory Building Building.

This resolution was adopted by the following vote: The Mayor, aye; the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments, aye; the Commissioner of the Public Works Department, aye, and Brigadier-General Fitzgerald, aye.

A communication was received from Christopher Nally, contracter for plumbing and gas-fitting for the Twenty-second Regiment Armory, which was read and replied to verbally by the Archi-tect, Mr. Leo.

The matter was referred to Commissioners Coleman and Gilroy, as a committee, for investiga-tion and report, and a copy of the letter was directed to be sent to Mr. Leo. An application from Captain Louis Wendel, of the First Battery, was forwarded, through the Commissioner of Public Works, to this Board. It was ordered on file.

Y., it is hereby certified (as provided by the Military Code) that the work, hereinafter stated, and the articles enumerated are necessary for the transaction of the business of this Battery for the year 1891.

A supply of fuel and such repairs and alterations to the Armory as may be required and are not provided for in the lease.


