

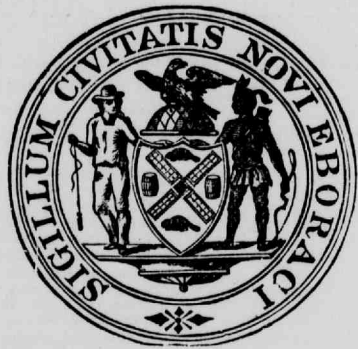

MASON'S WORK AND GRANITE WORK.

PROPOSALS, IN SEALED ENVELOPES, WILL be received at the office of the Department of Public Parks, No. 36 Union Square, New York City, until Wednesday, the 23d day of October, 1878, at the hour of half-past nine o'clock A. M., when they will be publicly opened and read—

For the Mason's Work and the Granite Work required in the construction of eight parks in Fourth avenue, situated between Sixty-seventh street and Seventy-first street, and between Ninetieth street and Ninety-fourth street, in the City of New York, in accordance with the plans and specifications of the said Department.

The work to be completed within four months from the date of the contract to be entered into and in figures, a gross sum for the whole work.

No proposal will be considered unless accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two responsible householders or freeholders of the City of New York, their respective places of business or residence being named, to the effect that they will become bound as sureties in the sum of seven thousand dollars for the faithful performance of the contract, should it be awarded upon that proposal.
