The minutes of October 10, 1900, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were submitted for approval as follows:

Plan 1020, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow north wall to be built of thickness as shown on plans; wall was calculated under section 37 for curtain walls, viz.: 12 inches thick for uppermost, 60 feet of height and increased 4 inches for each additional 60 feet, as stated in petition; northwest corner of Bowery and Grand street. Petitioners, York & Sawyer. Denied.

Plan 1051, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow walls in first story and walls to highest point of roof beams to be built 12 inches thick to a height of 54 feet 9 inches; walls in foundation and first story to be built with cement, as stated in petition; No. 313 West Twenty-second street. Plan 2184, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow a 60 feet by 70 feet four-story and basement fireproof extension to be constructed and connected with existing four-story and basement non-fireproof school, with fireproof doors, as stated in petition; Third avenue, east side, 200 feet north of One Hundred and Sixty-ninth street. Plan 2160, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow bridges to be constructed of wrought-iron and steel, sides to be filled in with 4-inch terra-cotta blocks between sash to connect buildings, No. 87 Beaver street and No. 69 Wall street, as stated in petition; No. 87 Beaver street and No. 69 Wall street. Petitioners, Bannister & Schell. Referred to President, with power.

Plan 2135, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow two side and rear walls of 12-inch brick to be built 38 feet instead of 50 feet; also to allow front cross wall of extension to be constructed of 3-inch fireproof blocks, secured in steel angle frame, all as stated in petition; No. 339 West Fifty-seventh street. Petitioners, Farnachon, Lawrence & Donnell. Approved.

Plan 2007, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow non-fireproof building, together with present structure to cover an area 12,250 square feet; also to allow runway in the rear of present structure to be used for the extension, all as stated in petition; Nos. 12-14 Minetta Lane.
