The Clerk proceeded to read the minutes.

Alderman Parsons moved that the minutes be corrected and amended by inserting the following letters on pages 326 and 332, respectively, of the minutes of February 4, 1902:

No. 33A.

Department of Street Cleaning,
January 27, 1902.

Hon. HERBERT PARSONS, No. 111 Broadway, New York City:

Sir—In reply to your communication of January 24, I would say that 300 horses are an immediate necessity. We should have 500 instead of 300, as 150 head of horses which are now in service in the Department should be surveyed, condemned and sold. The number of horses at work and owned by the Department on January 20, 1902, was 620. The number of horses hired was 245. It will be possible to obtain these horses within thirty days after the letting of the contract, taking them in bunches of twenty-five to fifty.

Your third point, the need of sacks, is that it is impossible to separate the street sweepings from the ashes and make any disposal of these sweepings to any railway or other corporation unless they be sacked. It is also necessary to sack all sweepings in order that they may not blow about the streets when swept into piles. In order to carry on any business or make this a source of saving or revenue to the city at all it is necessary to sack these sweepings.

The necessity for a covered dump, which is your fourth point, is the need of a safe, sanitary final disposition. The blowing of the ashes from these dumps is not only a cause of great complaint and annoyance to the inhabitants living within many blocks of them, but also a distinctly unsanitary procedure, as these particles of dust carry infection with them, particularly that of tuberculosis, in their admixture with dried street sweepings or rubbish and detritus of all sorts of factory products. The necessity for covering these dumps is not only that the inhabitants in the immediate neighborhood may be protected, but that the sanitary conditions of the city should be decently respected. All the dumps should be covered, and the necessity for such covering will ultimately be firmly impressed upon the city. It is in the attempt at a scientific and accurate prevention of the spread of disease, particularly among the poorer inhabitants who live in the neighborhood, and for the increase of commercial facilities also, which these covered dumps would give. The blowing of ashes and dust from one of these dumps has caused a depreciation of property and the removal of business from a certain portion of the city. This has been a great loss in its shrinkage of realty values, which would build all the dumps in the city.

The necessity for the incinerator I placed very strongly before you. I again tell you my answer. This is from a financial point of view. It is one that would rapidly pay for itself in the course of a very few months in the amount of yardage that it would decrease and render unnecessary for removal. Also, from a sanitary point of view, it is absolutely necessary for the destruction of these articles which are continually carrying away from the dumps disease and infection, particularly those of scarlet fever, measles, whooping cough, diphtheria and tuberculosis, which render the destruction of such material an absolute sanitary necessity which instantly should be put in practice.

You desire an unequivocal statement that I propose that the money from the proceeds of these bonds shall be used entirely in contracts to be let at public letting. I have so made a verbal statement. I give it to you now in writing. The articles which are mentioned in the list furnished by me to your committee shall all be advertised for and purchased from the lowest bidder.

HERBERT PARSONS, Esq., Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—In reply to your letter of February 1 relative to the resolution before your Committee asking the Board of Aldermen to permit the Department of Health to make a contract without public letting for the erection of an emergency hospital and disinfecting station in the Borough of Richmond at a cost not to exceed five thousand dollars, I beg to answer your question seriatim, as follows:

1. The Board of Estimate made this appropriation on January 21, 1902, under chapter 535 of the Laws of 1893, and section 170 of the Charter.
2. There are at present the following emergency hospitals and disinfecting plants in the boroughs of the city other than Richmond: Reception and Willard

Parker Hospitals in the Borough of Manhattan at the foot of East Sixteenth street; Riverside Hospital on North Brother Island in the Borough of the Bronx; the Kingston Avenue Hospital at Kingston Avenue and Fennimore Street, Borough of Brooklyn.

3. The need of the proposed emergency hospital in Richmond has existed potentially there since the greater city was formed, on January 1, 1898. At that time, however, and for two years subsequently, this Department had arranged to have scarlet fever and diphtheria cases cared for at the S. R. Smith Infirmary, New Brighton, Staten Island, and there was no great number of smallpox cases prior to last year. The actual need of such a plant, therefore, was not acute until last winter, when the smallpox cases became very numerous.

4. While the objections made by the patients and physicians to the transportation of Richmond Borough smallpox cases to North Brother Island constitute an argument in favor of the proposed plant, it is really necessary from a sanitary point of view. We are risking the lives of Richmond Borough citizens every day we have to carry smallpox patients in an ambulance for a distance of anywhere from one to fifteen miles in winter weather and over country roads; and then carry them ten miles or so further on a steamboat. Apart from this consideration, their transportation through Richmond Borough cannot be other than a source of danger to its inhabitants. As to the matter of disinfection, there are practically no facilities for that work in Richmond Borough to-day, and I have no hesitation in saying that they are absolutely necessary.

5. The additional expense for maintenance caused by the erection of these buildings can, without doubt, be met from a fund already in the hands of this Department. We have from the annual budget one thousand dollars per annum in Hospital Fund for Richmond Borough, and unless the smallpox outbreak continues for a much longer time than we have any reason to expect, it will not be necessary to exhaust this fund. It is not intended to keep the plant in operation longer than is absolutely necessary in each year.

6. The present attack of smallpox in the Borough of Richmond is more severe and widespread than it has been for some time. There were no cases this autumn and winter prior to January 1, but since that time there have been more cases than in all of last season, and a much larger per capita proportion of cases in Richmond Borough than in any other of the boroughs.

7. I have no reason to believe that the private letting of the contract will cost any more than a public letting would, for the reason that we already have obtained estimates from several contractors precisely as we would have done in a public letting. It will take at least three weeks, if not more, to complete the building for the reception of patients, and perhaps longer to install the disinfecting apparatus. If then we are subjected to additional delay in the letting of the contract, a good many smallpox patients will, no doubt, have to suffer everely thereby.

Hon. CHARLES V. FORNES, President Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—For a long time past there has been evident necessity of establishing an office in the Borough of The Bronx, where bills for water charges may be received and paid, and other business connected with the Water Registrar's office may be transacted, including permits for tapping water mains and for obtaining water for building purposes.

The necessity for the establishment of such branch office has been recognized in the case of the Department of Taxes and the Receiver of Taxes.

I believe that the people of the Borough of The Bronx should not be compelled to travel the long distance to the Central Office for the purposes of obtaining their water bills and paying them, or for necessary permits, and, therefore, respectfully request the authorization of your Board for the appointment of a Water Registrar in the Borough of The Bronx, and the assignment of proper and convenient office space for the transaction of the business of the office.

Gentlemen—In conformity with the request contained in the circular letter of the Comptroller, dated January 16, 1902, the Sloane Maternity Hospital respectfully submits herewith its estimate of the amount it should be pleased to receive from the City for the year 1902.
As the Legislature has provided that your Honorable Board shall determine as to the amount a charitable institution shall be allowed in any one year, we submit herewith a brief statement to show the claims of the Sloane Maternity Hospital for the allowance of \$12,000 as asked for in enclosed estimate.
For the year 1901 the city appropriated the sum of \$8,000 for the benefit of our institution, which amount was entirely used before the end of September in the care of emergency cases that were accepted by the Department of Charities. To provide for additional cases that were approved as public charges by the Department of Charities the city transferred a further sum for the benefit of the hospital, and has audited its bills to the extent of \$3,186.44, making a total for the year of \$11,186.44. From the present indications the work which we shall be called upon to perform during the current year will be in excess rather than under the amount we now apply for.

The Sloane Maternity Hospital has 120 beds absolutely free, and over two-thirds of them are occupied most of the year. During the year 1901 there were received in the hospital 1,525 patients, of which 592 were accepted as public charges by the Department of Charities.

For the year 1901 the entire cost of maintenance was \$44,923.31, of which we received from the city \$9,384.08, the balance having been contributed by friends of the institution.

The city only approves and allows for emergency cases at the rate of \$18 per case.

The hospital is conducted on the most economical basis, is doing effective work in relieving the city's poor, and believes its request for an allowance of \$12,000 a reasonable one.

CHILDREN'S COURT.

Under section 1399 of the present Charter, the Board was required to open a separate part for the disposition of children's cases, and, to meet the service requirement thereof, the following detailed appropriation was requested:

We are unable to say what portion of this amount was allowed, but we assume that it was reduced \$2,000, as the total amount of the appropriation requested by us for the entire service was that much larger than the amount actually granted. We think that \$11,200 for this court will be ample, but, as it is a new tribunal, we are unable to specify the precise amount until the court shall be put in operation. We have been unable to do this because the building has not been put in readiness. We trust that \$11,200 will be allowed, and we give the assurance that no part thereof will be used unless necessary to speedily and correctly transact the business of the Court.

It will be observed that an increased appropriation of \$3,500 has been asked for the General Police Courts—\$2,000 for an extra Stenographer, and \$1,500 for an extra Interpreter. The reason therefor is as follows: These Courts are open on each of the seven days of every week; Sundays and holidays do not interfere with sessions; the Sunday session brings as many cases, and often times more, as week days; a stenographer and an interpreter ought to be present at each session. One day off duty in each seven days is not an unreasonable allowance for these officers, and that is, and has been, the practice for many years. When these officials are away the Court is without a Stenographer or an Interpreter, and the Presiding Magistrate is compelled to resort to all convenient and reasonable devices to supply the deficiency. The Supreme Court laid down the rule a few months since that if the evidence at the trials before the Magistrate was not taken in full and returned on writs and appeals, every person committed or sentenced by us would be discharged. Because of the absence of a Stenographer our judgments are liable to be upset. If we had an extra Stenographer and an extra Interpreter, they could go about from Court to Court to relieve the one permanently assigned, so that each Court would always have its complement of officers. The extra would likewise be available in case of sickness or disability. While we can get along with our present force, as we have been doing, we cannot give as good or as efficient service as if the Courts were at all times supplied with proper officials, and our commitments are liable to be upset at any time when a Stenographer is absent.

We cannot recommend any decrease in the salaries paid. Every official, from the Magistrate down to the attendant, must serve, or be ready for service, seven days in every week. Sickness and disability among each of the classifications compel the well and able-bodied to forego the usual day off whenever necessary, and not one can get a holiday during the summer without doing extra service. The salary of the Magistrates was cut down from \$8,000 to \$7,000 in 1895, and the first charter for the Greater New York proposed another reduction to \$6,000, but the revisers of the present charter, after very full and careful consideration, fixed the amount at \$7,000. The Police Clerks, who are bonded officers, suffered a reduction of \$500 in 1895, and their salaries now are less than the salaries in corresponding positions in other courts. Under such circumstances, it would be unjust and unreasonable to attempt to cut down the compensation of any of the officials in the Magistrates' Courts. An increase is not asked, though we might be justified in doing so.

Classification.

We can present none other than as shown in the schedules. We are always disposed to promote for meritorious service and for competency. We have done so in the past, and that is the best pledge for the future.

Contingent Expenses.

For the year 1902 we obtained an increase of \$250 for contingencies. This was to enable the Magistrates to carry out the provisions of the New State Probation Law, which went into effect September 1, 1901. The increase was intended to cover car fare and incidentals required to enforce that law properly, and from the present experience and standpoint of the Magistrates the system is working admirably for the municipal administration by increasing the revenue, reducing the expense and inducing more orderly citizenship. Gentlemen—In response to your circular under date of January 16, 1902, the Brooklyn Home for Consumptives begs to report to you their estimated expenditures for the year 1902, which are properly payable from the City Treasury, as follows:

The average number of consumptive patients committed to the care of the institution and that are being treated medically and otherwise cared for in the Home, has been, on an average, about 37 during the last six months. The Home is capable of caring for 45 of such patients, in addition to more than 50 which they are caring for, who have not been committed by the City to them. Assuming that the number may reach as many as 45 during the year now just entered upon, which are to be paid for at the rate of \$1 per day, under the resolution of the Board of Estimate, made in October, 1901, it would require \$45 per day for 365 days—say, \$16,425, and the Home requests an apportionment of that sum with the knowledge that they cannot receive pay for any larger number than those committed and cared for during the year; and they state that no patients are cared for or treated in any way in the Home except those suffering from consumption; and that they do not receive any pay patients, except such pay as is made by the City for patients committed to the Home, the work of the Home being entirely charitable, except as to those patients who are committed and paid for by The City of New York.

The work of the Society consists of the care of destitute women in childbirth in this city who cannot pay for medical attendance, and whose circumstances are such that if not cared for by the Society they would become a public charge. Every case treated by the Society is carefully investigated, and no cases are relieved unless absolutely destitute.

The Society is now occupying its magnificent new hospital building, with a capacity of one hundred and eighty-six (186) beds, the gift of a public-spirited citizen of this city. The hospital is centrally located and has every facility for the care and treatment of patients.

The Society of the Lying-In Hospital was founded in this city December, 1798, and is one of our oldest maternity hospitals. It earnestly desires to co-operate with the city authorities in every way in giving medical treatment to the deserving poor, under such rules and regulations as may be established by the Department of Charities.

No expense has been spared in the construction of the hospital building, and it is believed it can offer facilities to the city authorities for the treatment of maternity cases that it never had before.

The owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house or other building or vacant lot, fronting on any street or avenue that is flagged, shall keep the sidewalk and gutter free from snow, ice, dirt or other material, and in case of said snow, ice, dirt or other material being deposited upon said sidewalk or in said gutter, the same shall be removed within four (4) hours after the snow ceases to fall, or after the other materials are deposited thereupon or therein, the time between 9 p. m. and 7 a. m. not being included in above period of four hours.

In default of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of any house, or other building or vacant lots, fronting on any street or avenue, the sidewalk of which is flagged in front of said premises, complying with the above ordinance, it shall then be the duty of the President of the Borough, and he is hereby authorized, to cause said snow, ice, dirt or other material to be removed from the said sidewalk and gutter, the expense of said work to be charged to any available fund for the maintenance of cleaning of highways. He shall then certify to the Corporation Counsel the amount of the expense chargeable against each piece of property, with the description of said property as assessed on the last preceding assessment roll, and the name or names of the owner or owners, lessee or lessees, occupant or occupants of the property where possible to obtain the same. The Corporation Counsel is hereby directed and authorized to sue for and recover the amount of this expense, together with \$10 penalty for each offense, and when so recovered the amount of expense incurred by the President of the Borough shall be turned over to the City Chamberlain, to be deposited to the "Special Fund, Restoring and Repaving" and credited to the Borough of Richmond.

Present—Ernst J. Lederle, Ph. D., Commissioner of Health and President; Alvah H. Doty, M. D., Health Officer of the Port.

On motion, the following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, This Department requires one or more buildings for the installation of a suitable disinfecting plant in connection with a proper detention station in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, for the care of persons afflicted with contagious diseases, with as little delay as possible; and

Whereas, Section 419 of chapter 466 of the Laws of 1901 (Greater New York Charter) provides that the method of procuring supplies exceeding in aggregate cost the sum of one thousand dollars shall be by contract unless otherwise ordered by vote of three-fourths of the members of the Board of Aldermen; therefore, be it

Resolved, That the Honorable, the Board of Aldermen, be and are hereby respectfully requested to order, under the provisions of law above quoted, that one or more buildings required by this Department for the preservation of the public health in the installation of a disinfecting plant and detention station in the Borough of Richmond, City of New York, for persons suffering with contagious diseases, may be procured by the Department of Health in the open market and in such manner as the Commissioners may deem necessary and for the best interests of the public, at an expense not to exceed five thousand dollars.
