Carpenter's Report.

Repairs—27 benches, 2 gates, 3 hammer handles, 1 barrel cover, 1 ice cooler stand, 1 wooden stand, 19 chairs, 18 doors, 6 tables, 1 barrel stand, 1 electric fan stand, 10 water-closet seats, 3 wooden boxes, 7 shelves, 27 windows, 6 window frames, 1 dumb waiter, 4 lockers, 7 desks, 11 locks, 1 pew, 1 altar, 1 sideboard, 2 clothes racks, 2 ward-ropes, 4 clothes closets, 3 towel racks, 2 laundry horses, 4 window screens.

Dear Sir—I desire to report that during the three months ending September 30, 1905, the sum of five thousand one hundred and twenty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$5,129.50) was collected from fines imposed upon prisoners committed to the District prisons by the different City Magistrates, of which amount the sum of five thousand and eighty dollars and fifty cents (\$5,080.50) was paid over to the City Chamberlain, and forty-nine dollars (\$49) to the Health Department's Pension Fund.

Dear Sir—I respectfully transmit herewith a quarterly report of work done by paid and unpaid labor, together with a statement showing the disposition of prisoners for the quarter ending September 30, 1905, to wit:

Carpenter's Work.

At Third District Prison—Glazing, 4 panes of glass, 12 inches by 15 inches, put in office windows; overhauled and put in good condition 5 benches, 2 tables, 3 chairs; repaired 4 wooden seats in toilet.

At Fourth District Prison—Glazing, windows of prison kitchen, 5 panes of glass, 13 inches by 15 inches; 4 new windows put in cells of male prison, size 9 inches by 27 inches; 8 hinges and 4 dozen screws; new sash cord supplied to office windows; 1 pane of glass, 13 inches by 15 inches; new sash cord supplied to 2 windows in hall of male prison.

At Fifth District Prison—New wire sash tape supplied to 8 windows in male prison; glazing, 4 panes of glass, 14 inches by 15 inches, put in windows of male prison; 1 pound of putty; repaired lock of office desk; put on four new mouthpieces for speaking tubes.

Plumbing and Tinsmithing.

At Second District Prison (by paid labor)—Installing 2 new steam boilers, 1 hot water tank on loft with all the necessary fittings, put in cells on male prison, 5 new flush tanks; time of labor, two months and twenty-nine days.

At Third District Prison (by paid labor)—Repairing leaks at washtubs, sink and hot water boiler, and repaired faucets in water-closets in cells Nos. 7, 12, 16, 17, 18, male side of prison, and cell No. 50, female side of prison; material used, 1 gasket for water-closet, 4 feet of 3/4-inch galvanized pipe, 2 3/4-inch galvanized fittings, 12 pounds of lead pipe, 7 pounds solder, fuel, and 2 pounds of putty; time of labor, two days; overhauling and putting in good service 2 Mott's "Star" furnaces.

At Fourth District Prison (by paid labor)—Repaired leak in hot water boiler; material used, 1 3/4-inch galvanized ell; time of labor, three hours. By unpaid labor: 1 5/8-inch brass faucet put on sink in kitchen, 5 1/2-inch brass faucets put in cells of male prison.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Installing of new flush tank to toilet in ten-day house; material used, 1 galvanized copper-lined fine oak tank complete, 1 1/2-inch galvanized socket, 1 1/2-inch close nipples, 1/2 pound of nails; time of labor, five and one-half hours; clearing obstruction from wastepipe in cell No. 14, male prison, and cell No. 5, female prison; time of labor, one-half day; put on 3 new gas brackets and 1 short elbow cock in male prison; material used, 3 heavy gas brackets, cups and burners; 1 3/8-inch heavy elbow burner cock, 3 new burners, 3 3/8-inch gas caps, red lead, red cement; time of labor, three-quarters of a day, gasfitter.

At Seventh District Prison (by paid labor)—Setting new iron gate and hanging new fireproof door, 2 feet 8 inches by 6 feet 8 inches, by cutting opening to brick wall leading to roof; the iron gate was constructed of 3/4-inch round steel bars with 2 1/2-inch frame containing four cross bars; door furnished with 1 Yale-Towne prison lock; all work was painted and openings faced up with plaster; installing 2 new flush tanks in ten-day house, resetting closet bowl in female bath room, put on 3 wooden closet seats in male prison, 2 wooden closet seats in female prison and 1 closet seat in laundry.

Miscellaneous Work.

At Fifth District Prison (by paid labor)—Repaired van No. 4, fastening clip and axle washers; recutting king bolt and 1 new nut; repaired 2 bridles, 2 new forebands, 2 new russets and collar chambered.

Painting and Kalsomining.

At Third District Prison—Painting and renovating all the necessary parts of prison, to wit: Painted 9 cell doors on male side of prison, painted 9 toilets, second tier, male prison; painted 9 cells, varnished with asphaltum toilets thereat; painted prison kitchen and dado, 8 feet high; painted borders around prison, painted iron stairs and platform on male and female side of prison, painted railing and banisters. Whitewashing: The prison cellar and north side of prison yard were given a coat of whitewash; the 4 chimneys connected with the prison were thoroughly cleansed and put in good service; material used, 100 pounds of white lead, 5 gallons of raw oil, 5 gallons of turpentine, 4 gallons of asphaltum varnish, 10 pounds of chrome green, 3 gallons of dryers, 1/2 barrel of finishing lime, 3 pounds of ultra marine blue, 2 flat wall brushes, 2 sash tools and 1 varnish brush.

At Fourth District Prison—Whitewashing ceilings of 29 cells, painted roof of vegetable house, painted kitchen, resetting three flags in prison kitchen; material used, 150 pounds of white lead, 5 gallons of raw oil, 1/2 gallon of dryers, 5 gallons of turpentine, 2 pounds of chrome green, 1 flat wall brush, 1 sash tool, 1 barrel of finishing lime and 5 pounds of ultra marine blue.

At Fifth District Prison—Painting and renovating the interior of prison; office, Matron's room, dormitory, ten-day house, kitchen and corridors; material used, 150 pounds of white lead, 5 gallons of raw oil, 5 gallons of turpentine, 1 gallon of dryers, 5 pounds of prussian blue, 5 pounds of indian red, 2 pounds of burnt umber, 5 pounds of yellow ochre, 25 pounds of finishing lime, 2 flat wall brushes and 2 sash tools.

The prisons were cleansed of roaches, waterbugs, etc., by the services rendered by the P. M. Frank Disinfectant Company.

The usual amount of cleaning, laundrying, cooking and other general work done in all prisons by unpaid prison help.

Tin Shop.

Mess Hall—Made 100 vinegar cups, 346 water cups, 400 coffee cups, 350 mess pans, 50 jelly pans, 25 bake pans, 1 50-gallon iron tub, 2 large strainers, 1 large pan, 12 coffee cans, 12 6-gallon tin water cans, 2 large tin dippers, 6 6-gallon pails.

Paint Shop—Made 90 fire pails.

Miscellaneous—New gang plank, 12 by 2 by 6 inches; table, 12 feet by 3 feet by 3 feet; box for shipping dynamo, 19 benches for fire buckets, 3 runs for coal gang, screw clamps for shop use, large scrub brush with handles, tally board, 15 inches by 20 inches.

Ice House—New lining, 8 new runs, 2 new platforms, new hoist, hatchway, 2 wooden horses, 12 pike pole handles.

Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Commissioner of Correction:

Sir—I most respectfully forward herewith the quarterly report, statistical tables, etc., of the above institutions for the months of July, August and September, 1905, covering the work performed by prisoners without regard to that executed under contracts completed or in course of fulfillment. I would say, however, that in the execution of the last-named work, in the way of preparation, hauling material, etc., the prisoners have assisted as far as possible.

For a considerable time during the past quarter a force has been employed in keeping in proper order the different roads and paths, which are all now in good condition for the approach of winter.

A substantial stone wall has been built around the coal yard adjacent to the engine and boiler rooms.

In view of the expected removal of the female prisoners to quarters on the "hill," the building formerly used for school-room purposes and the barracks adjoining, have been rendered adaptable, the former for a dining-room, with matron's quarters attached, and the latter as a living and sleeping room for the female inmates. The work in the renovation, refitting, repainting, etc., of these buildings has all been performed by prisoners.

Considerable work has also been done in making new bath and toilet-room connections and in the general refitting of the apartments adjoining the Roman Catholic Church occupied by the priests during their stay on the island.

About 2,700 cubic yards of stone has been broken by the prisoners employed in the stone shed.

The past three months being the busiest season of the year for farm labor, much work has been performed by both men and boys in hoeing, weeding, harvesting, etc.

In the City Cemetery the usual work of burying, disinterments, etc., has gone on as usual, beside which four new trenches have been dug for future burials, and the filled trenches, with the grounds adjoining, weeded and kept in order.

The male prisoners have also been occupied in unloading barges laden with ice, coal and building materials, and have done the usual work incident to the general requirements of the island.

The female prisoners have been engaged in the laundry work for families and employees, beside the weekly cleaning out of the principal buildings.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
