REPORT OF THE COMMISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS, QUARTER ENDED JUNE 30, 1905.

Offices of Commissioner of Public Works, Borough of Manhattan,

Hon. JOHN F. AHEARN, President, Borough of Manhattan:

Dear Sir—In accordance with section 1544 of the Greater New York Charter, I make the following report of the business of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ended June 30, 1905:

The following contracts were entered into:

Twenty-three for paving and repaving, estimated cost, \$355,756.53; three for regulating and grading, estimated cost, \$6,460.90; eight for sewers, estimated cost, \$50,827.90; three for flagging, estimated cost, \$25,074.34; one for fencing, estimated cost, \$135.73; and twelve for miscellaneous works, estimated cost, \$116,553.50, making a total of fifty contracts entered into during the quarter, at an aggregate estimated cost of \$554,808.90.

Contracts were completed as follows:

Thirty-two for paving and repaving, cost, \$231,273.95; four for regulating, grading, etc., cost, \$29,752.71; twelve for sewers, cost, \$150,038.33; nine for special works, cost, \$2,167.50, and one miscellaneous contract, cost, \$23,656, making 58 contracts completed at a total cost of \$436,888.49.

The principal items of work done under the regulating and grading contracts are: 39,089 cubic yards of earth excavated; 30,617 cubic yards of rock excavated; 85,985 cubic yards of filling furnished; 8,968 linear feet of curbstone set; 78,559 square feet of flagging laid; 2,467 square feet of flagging relaid; 5,344 square feet of bridgestone laid; 14,452 cubic yards of rubble masonry placed; 11,610 cubic yards of concrete used, and 49,573 cubic feet of hammer dressed granite furnished.

During the quarter new pavements were laid as follows:

Sheet asphalt, 3.25 miles; wood blocks, .17 of a mile; asphalt blocks, .16 of a mile; granite blocks, .15 of a mile, making a total of 3.73 miles. The linear mileage of paved streets in the Borough of Manhattan June 30, as per report by the Superintendent of Highways, amounts to 417.70 miles.

The Repair Force took up and relaid about 80,787 square yards of stone block pavement, and examinations were made of a great number of complaints.

During the quarter permits were issued as follows:

To construct vaults, 86; to repair vaults, 38; to place guy posts, 12; to place banner poles, 3; to place tar kettles, 138; to place boilers, 285, and to repair pavements at the expense of applicants, 14, making a total of 576 permits issued.

The receipts for vault permits amounted to \$162,893.67.

Eighty-nine thousand two hundred and seventy-two linear feet of electric main conduits, 3,566 linear feet of gas mains and 8,950 linear feet of water mains were laid, and 55,769 linear feet of gas mains and 385 linear feet of salt water mains were overhauled; 6,123 linear feet of electric services, over 100 feet each, were laid.

Openings were made in the streets as follows:

Three hundred and eighty to lay and overhaul electric mains; 71 to lay and overhaul gas mains; 1 to lay and overhaul steam mains; 24 for other purposes; 2,085 to lay and repair electric services; 3,054 to lay and repair gas services, and 161 to lay and repair steam services. In addition to these 705 openings were made to lay and overhaul water mains by City Departments, while 376 openings were made by plumbers to lay and repair water services, and 238 to lay and repair sewer services; 1,824 openings were also made to construct and repair railways, making a total of 8,919.

The accompanying report of the Division of Streets and Roads shows the work done in keeping the unpaved streets and macadamized roads in order.

Eleven thousand eight hundred and eighty-one linear feet of sewers were laid and 35 receiving-basins were set, making the length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan 509.89 miles, with 6,147 receiving-basins; 4 sewer contracts, covering 1,466 linear feet, were completed; 420 permits for new sewers, and 248 permits for repairs to sewers have been issued.

The report by the Superintendent of Public Buildings and Offices shows in detail the work done in the various public buildings and offices, and the supplies furnished thereto.

The Bureau of Incumbrances received and attended to 930 complaints of obstructions, made 198 seizures and removals of obstructions, issued 1,815 permits to place building material on streets, 390 permits to cross sidewalks with horses and carts, and 299 permits to erect temporary sheds over sidewalks; also removed 245 loads of dirt, 62 fallen trees, stumps and posts, and served 12 notices to repair defective vault covers.

Hon. MATTHEW F. DONOHUE, Superintendent of Sewers:

Dear Sir—In compliance with your instructions, I herewith hand you a report of the work done and in course of construction under my supervision, for the quarter ending June 30, 1905, with a statement of work done by mechanics and laborers:

The present total length of the sewerage system in the Borough of Manhattan is 2,692,230 feet, or 509.89 miles, with 6,147 receiving basins, making the amount done and accepted during the quarter, 11,881 linear feet of sewer and 35 receiving basins. Four repair contracts, amounting to 1,466 feet, were completed.

The following is a list of all the works completed:

Sewer in East Eighty-third street from East End avenue to the East river.
Sewer in St. Nicholas avenue west side between One Hundred and Eighty-third and One Hundred and Eighty-fourth streets.

Sewer in Audubon avenue between One Hundred and Seventy-fifth street and Fort George avenue.

Sewer in Broadway, east and west sides, between Dyckman street and summit north of Hawthorne street.

Outlet sewer and overflow foot of Twenty-first street East river, and sewers in marginal street, west side, between Eighteenth and Twenty-third street, and alteration and improvement to sewer in Twenty-second street, between marginal street and Avenue A.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Twenty-first street, between Pleasant avenue and First avenue, and in First avenue, between One Hundred and Twentieth and One Hundred and Twenty-first streets.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Norfolk street, between Hester and Grand streets.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Sixtieth street, between Madison and Fifth avenues, and in Fifth avenue, east side, between Sixtieth and Sixty-first streets.

Repairs to sewer in Allen street, between Hester and Grand streets.

Repairs to sewer in Greenwich street, between Cortlandt and Liberty streets.

Repairs to sewer in Washington street, between Morris and Rector streets.

Repairs and rebuilding sewer in Third avenue, east side, between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets.

Receiving basin on the southwest corner of One Hundred and Thirtieth street and Park avenue.

Receiving basin on the southeast corner of Fifth street and Avenue D.

Receiving basin on the southeast corner of Sixth street and Avenue D.

There are now in active progress eleven (11) contracts payable out of Street Improvement Fund, involving an expenditure of about \$182,388.

There are four (4) repair contracts, involving an expenditure of about \$53,241.90, still in course of construction, most of which are nearing completion. A detailed statement of all of the above works appears in schedule annexed.

Surveys have been authorized by the President on petition of property-owners and plans are being prepared so that the contracts may be advertised and let as soon as possible for the following:

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventieth and One Hundred and Seventy-first streets, between Broadway and Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Sixteenth street, between Broadway and Harlem river.

Sewers in Two Hundred and Fourteenth and Two Hundred and Fifteenth streets, between Ninth and Tenth avenues.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Fourteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Sewer in One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street, between Broadway and St. Nicholas avenue.

Sewer in Two Hundred and Thirteenth street, between Tenth avenue and Harlem river.

Sewer in St. Nicholas avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Eighty-first and One Hundred and Eighty-third streets.

Sewer in Columbus avenue, east and west sides, between One Hundred and Sixth and One Hundred and Seventh streets.

Sewer in Eleventh avenue, between Thirty-fourth and Thirty-sixth streets, and in Thirty-fifth street, between Tenth and Eleventh avenues.

Sewer in Grand street, between Jackson and Columbia streets, and in Henry street, between Grand and Gouverneur streets.

Sewer in Grand street, between Lewis and Columbia streets, and in Henry street, from Jackson to Gouverneur street.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Thirty-ninth street, between Eleventh avenue and Hudson river.

Extension of sewer in West Seventy-fourth street to 60 feet of west house line of Central Park, West.

Rebuilding of sewer in Twenty-sixth street, between Fifth and Sixth avenues.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, from Greenwich to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, from Broadway to West street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Liberty street, between Nassau street and Maiden lane.

Rebuilding of sewer in Frankfort street, west to Cliff, and Cliff to Hague street.

Rebuilding of sewer in John street, from Broadway to Pearl street.

Rebuilding of sewer in Cedar street, between Broadway and Nassau street.

The following works have been advertised and will be constructed at once:

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-first street, between Seventh avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fiftieth street, between Seventh avenue and Macomb's Dam road.

Sewer in One Hundred and Fifty-sixth street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Riverside drive.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in One Hundred and Fourth street, between Second and Third avenues.

Alteration and improvement to sewer in Columbus avenue, east side, between Seventy-fourth and Seventy-fifth streets.

Rebuilding and repairs to sewer in One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, between Harlem river and Lenox avenue, and in Lenox avenue, between One Hundred and Forty-sixth and One Hundred and Forty-seventh streets.

Repairs to sewer in Twenty-fourth street, between Avenue A and First avenue.

Repairs to sewer in Morris street, between West and Greenwich streets.

The work of constructing new sewers, which is mostly located in the upper end of the island, has been alluded to on a number of occasions in various reports, as being delayed on account of unopened streets, is now in a fair way to being accomplished. Right of way has been obtained to sewers in Two Hundred and Eleventh and Two Hundred and Sixteenth streets, from Broadway to Harlem river, where outlet sewer is being built. Resolutions authorizing work in other streets have been passed, and, while the construction of these outlet sewers above alluded to, in Two Hundred and Eleventh and Two Hundred and Sixteenth streets, has not yet been authorized by the Board of Apportionment, yet this Bureau is now engaged in the preliminary work of making the working drawings, so that as soon as such resolutions are passed there will be no delay in letting the contract.

A large amount of work is now being required of this Bureau in the matter of repairing and rebuilding sewers of the older system which have failed to accomplish the work required of them. The old pipe system, laid some thirty or forty years ago, is now showing signs of failure, and causing considerable trouble in keeping same repaired, and it is a matter of necessity to rebuild many miles of this class of work.

Sewer Permits.

Four hundred and twenty permits for new sewers and 248 permits for repairs to sewers have been issued.

Engineers' Fees.

Amount of engineers' fees assessed on property benefited and charged to Street Improvement Fund is \$8,626.50.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF PUBLIC BUILDINGS AND OFFICES.

President of the Borough of Manhattan,
Offices of the Commissioner of Public Works,
Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices,
New York, September 10, 1905.

Hon. WILLIAM DALTON, Commissioner of Public Works:

Dear Sir—In accordance with your instructions I have the honor to submit the following report of the transactions of this Bureau for the quarter ending June 30, 1905:

Criminal Court Building.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. About 1,000 lamps and 8 carbons were furnished for I. T. E. circuit breaker, also 4 dozen iron-bound ash cans, 2 boxes of toilet paper. The plumbing, gas and steam fittings were thoroughly examined, and necessary repairs made to same. Three chandeliers and 2 side brackets were remodeled in bronze and reset, new shades being furnished for same as directed. About 28 electric fans were repaired and put in working order. Labor and material were furnished to make repairs to grates, put in bars, etc.; also repairs to boiler as directed. Necessary labor, scaffolding, material, etc., were furnished to make repairs to the mason work, cement work, etc., as directed. Bridge walls, arches, etc., were also repaired in boiler No. 2. The walls and ceilings in the First District Magistrates' Court were cleaned off, prepared and painted; also the woodwork was cleaned off and varnished. The walls and ceilings and woodwork were also cleaned off and painted in the District Attorney's office, as directed. About 47 awnings were furnished and erected in the same office. One special solid mahogany leather upholstered chair was furnished for use in Recorder Goff's room; also 1 lounge as selected, and 1 wardrobe furnished for use in Judge Foster's room. One flat-top desk was furnished for use in the Clerk's office of the Court of Special Sessions. One hair mat, made to order, was furnished for use of the Civil Service Commission; also 1 oak flat-top desk.

County Court-house.

The usual janitor's and engineer's supplies were furnished. Orders were also issued for the necessary supply of steam during the quarter. One 28-file suspension cabinet, with extra drawers and rolling blind, was furnished; also 2 roll-top desks and 4 revolving chairs, as selected; also 1 No. 91 desk, in Parts II. and III., Special Term, and for Clerk of the Appellate Term. Two 6-foot filing cases were furnished and installed in Part II. of the Supreme Court. Nine telephone booth racks were furnished and distributed among the various Justices of the Supreme Court; also about 18 chairs made to order, with leather seats and backs. Labor and material were furnished to do all the wiring required for the installation of 94 2-light reflectors in the above building; 400 mantels were furnished and installed on the lights in above building, with about 175 chimneys and 125 globes. Repairs were also made to lights where necessary. Labor and material were furnished to do the necessary mason work to allow the plumber to make repairs to leaders, etc. Sidewalk elevator was installed on the easterly side of building, and iron doors and railings erected to protect opening as directed. One new hand rope was installed in the south elevator.

City Hall.

The usual orders were issued for janitor's and engineer's supplies, ice, mineral water, clean towels, steam, etc. Two photographs were taken of the City Hall and sent to Copenhagen as requested. The necessary services were furnished to appraise the properties located in Carmine street and Rutgers place. About 77 awnings were furnished and erected as directed. Labor and material were furnished to clean down and paint walls and ceilings as directed. The present location of the gas meter in tunnel was changed, and hardwood box installed for the meter, with necessary hardware, etc.

Five chandeliers in the City Clerk's office were remodeled and rebronzed; also key sockets, shades, porcelain candles, etc., furnished, together with one combination portable lamp for desk. Two sets of electric light and power mains were removed, and 2 others installed as directed and inclosed in iron conduit and lead-covered wire. The present wiring in the Mayor's office was continued; also batteries, push buttons, bells and annunciators from basement as required and ordered. About ten hopper heads were put over the leaders as directed; the leaders were also connected, and necessary repairs made as directed. The worn and irregular portions of the old floor were taken up in the President of the Board of Aldermen's room, and an inlaid flooring was laid to replace the same. In the basement of the City Hall a segmental arch of a thickness of 3½ inches, composed of three layers of tile and cement work, was laid so as to provide sufficient space to make repairs to the steam system in the above building. This has been a long-felt want in the building, and will be productive of large economies in the item of repairs to this building.

One table, 1 desk chair, 2 arm chairs, 4 side chairs, 1 drop leaf table, 1 flat-top desk 5 feet long, 1 rug, 3 hat and coat trees and 1 consol table were furnished for the Mayor's office. Two hand-made document files of special design were furnished for the Bureau of Weights and Measures. Three rugs, 3 feet by 6 feet; 1 Trow directory; 2 office chairs, were furnished for use of the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough; also 1 sectional bookcase and 1 filing case for use of the President of the Borough. Three rubber mats were furnished for the City Clerk's office.

Brownstone Building.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished.

West Fifty-fourth Street Court-house.

The usual Janitor's and Engineer's supplies were furnished. One 3-gallon porcelain lined wood jacketed water cooler and stand were also furnished and 32 yards of rubber threading, one dozen No. 22 chairs, and 10 awnings, made of the best fancy duplex awning cloth, were made and put up as directed. The necessary labor and material were furnished to set 1 siphon jet water-closet complete, also to make necessary repairs to ash hoist, and repack elevator as directed. One new damper regulator was furnished and installed as directed.

Harlem Court-house.

The operating rope was renewed and speed blocks secured and adjusted on the elevator as directed. Broken pipes in toilet rooms were repaired, basins repaired, etc., as directed; the steam apparatus thoroughly examined, and repairs made to leaks, piping, etc., as required and ordered.

East Fifty-seventh Street Court-house.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished. The awning frames on about 19 windows were recovered and new ones furnished where necessary.

Children's Court.

Two rugs were furnished and laid in the Justice's chambers, and about 90 yards of carpet furnished and laid in the Janitor's apartments as directed.

Fifth District Municipal Court.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished. Labor and material were furnished to put up 4 awnings as directed. The walls and ceilings were prepared and painted as directed; the woodwork in the Judge's private room was varnished. The valley on roof was relined, and leaders extended as directed. About 125 yards of linoleum and about 40 yards of brussels carpet were laid in the court-room and on the Judge's bench, about 35 yards of linoleum were also laid on two flights of stairs, fitted with rubber treads and brass nosings.

Thirteenth District Municipal Court.

The usual Janitor's supplies were furnished, and also the usual monthly orders issued for cleaning all the glass in windows and doors. One No. 17 desk was furnished and one steel letter file.

Jefferson Market Court-house.

One barrel of disinfectant was furnished, also one and a half dozen No. 453 chairs.

Second District Magistrates' Court.

One barrel of disinfectant was furnished.

Third District Magistrates' Court.

Six No. 22 chairs were furnished, also one barrel of disinfectant.

Fourth District Municipal Court.

One No. 253½ and one No. 255½ chair were furnished.

New York County Jail.

Necessary Janitor's and Cleaners' supplies were furnished, and all the glass in the windows and doors cleaned during the quarter. Also 75 feet of rubber hose and a double acting eccentric shaking grate was installed in the boilers.

Office of Commissioner of Public Works.

Two sets of window ventilators were furnished.

Bureau of Highways—One pigeon-hole case was furnished and adjusted to desk in room No. 1611.

Bureau of Buildings—Fifteen chairs were furnished, and about 29 awnings, made of fancy duplex awning cloth, were furnished and erected, and repairs made to clock.

Sheriff's Office.

The office of the Sheriff was moved from the Stewart Building to their new quarters in the Barclay Building. The work was performed so as not to interfere with the regular business of the office. The doors in the various rooms were lettered as directed. All the carpentering necessary to construct platforms and to make and erect desks and repair old furniture was performed. All of the new carpentering work, furniture, etc., that was repaired was prepared and painted. A complete electric system of annunciation connecting the various desks with the office of the Sheriff, was furnished and installed. Over 500 yards of linoleum were laid and cemented to the office floors. Four metal document files, containing 38 drawers, with combination lock; 104 chairs, 16 roll top desks, 18 wardrobes, 1 table, 3 dozen waste paper baskets, 2 coat and hat trees, 18 telephone holders, 17 telephone directories, 1 selected roll top desk, 4 selected desks from State Prison and 1 table were furnished. Repairs were made to the steel document cases, the same oiled after being taken apart, and were properly reset in the new office. About 75 feet of wire mesh railing with wood hand rail, swing gate, etc., was erected. About 533 yards of the best body brussels carpet were furnished, laid and lined, and fastened to the marble floor with pins and sockets.

Department of Finance.

City Paymaster's Office—One special fireproof safe, about 32 by 54 by 21, built to order, and the interior arranged to suit the requirements of the Paymaster was furnished. One bookcase, 2 clocks, 2 thermometers, 16 chairs, 6 tables and a complete annunciator and electric lighting system was installed, and about 65 yards of linoleum was furnished and laid. This work was necessary to equip the new offices of the Paymaster on the second floor of their present quarters. These offices were prepared and cleaned, and the necessary Janitor's supplies were furnished.

Real Estate Bureau—One steel document filing cabinet, containing 85 documents, 5 by 11 by 14; also 18 roller shelves, 41 by 2½ by 31, and 2 roller curtains, 41 and 25, made as per sketch, were furnished. Four desks were furnished to room No. 178. One oak filing cabinet, made as directed, furnished to room No. 81. Fifteen electric fans were furnished to the various rooms of the Department. One roll top desk and one office chair furnished to room No. 181. One chair was furnished to Charitable Institutions Division; 1 steel cabinet was furnished to room No. 4. Two steel filing cases, having 66 drawers each, 10 inches wide, 6 inches high and 15 inches deep, with plain sunken panels and double wall construction, solid brass egg and dart moulding was furnished and erected in the Division of Law and Adjustment. Two 24-inch electrical exhaust fans, together with all the necessary wiring, etc., and all the necessary grill work, with all the uprights, etc., were furnished and erected in Auditor's office. One special fireproof safe, 66 by 63 by 30, built to suit the requirements of the Receiver of Taxes, was furnished. The woodwork, where alterations were made in the Receiver of Taxes' office, was varnished and the walls and ceilings prepared and painted where damaged. One 6-foot bookkeeper's desk with high rotary chair and 6 small chairs were furnished to the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and Arrears. About 150 yards of the best quality of linoleum were furnished and laid, and 1 umbrella stand, 2 quartered oak hall trees, 1 roll top desk, quartered oak; 1 revolving chair, 2 hall settees, 2 flat top desks, 2 tables and 1 typewriter desk, 2 office chairs, 1 wardrobe, 1 table, 222 tin map tubes, 3 L. B. bookcases, section library, 1 map section, 2 closet sections, 1,050 legal folders and 400 correspondence folders were furnished for the Bureau of Franchises.

Chamberlain's Office.

Extensive alterations were commenced during the quarter in this office. The lath and plaster partitions were removed and necessary plastering was performed. New toilet compartments furnished, consisting of Manhattan and Universal outlet connections. Cistern with nickel plated brass flush and supply pipe, Italian marble sides and backs, and 1½-inch thick counter sunk marble safe the entire size of floor of urinal compartment, also five porcelain oval basins with waste plugs and rubber stoppers, and nickel plate brass legs with flanges and sockets complete. A complete annunciator bell system was installed, outlets provided for fans, together with combination gas and electric fixtures, and all the necessary wiring in connection with this work was done. The work of fitting this office is still under way and a report thereon will be made in the next quarterly report.

West Washington Market.

Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished. The walls and ceilings damaged by fire in the stand occupied by the St. Louis Beef Company were cleaned off, prepared and painted. Defective tin over stands Nos. 52, 54, 56 and 58 Bloomfield street was cut out and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Washington Market.

Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished.

Fulton Market.

Necessary cleaning supplies were furnished. Defective tin cut out on roof and replaced with new tin of best quality, painted bottom and top.

Extensive repairs have been commenced on the roof of the West Washington Market under authority of resolution of the Board of Aldermen appropriating \$100,000 for repairs to the public markets. It is proposed to prosecute the work of repairs with as much despatch as possible, and the market buildings will be in a first-class and sanitary condition. The work consists of new roofing, plumbing, ironwork, carpentry and general repairs to the buildings.

Public Baths.

Rivington Street Bath—The necessary cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished during the quarter. The steam ventilating system was taken out and replaced with an electric system. Repairs were made to the grate bars as directed. The roof on this building was painted with the best quality of Prince's metallic paint as directed. A new ventilating pipe was placed in the Engineer's room.

West Forty-first Street Bath—The necessary cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished, together with two office clocks.

One Hundred and Ninth Street Bath—The usual cleaning and engineer's supplies were furnished. The boiler and two filters were covered as directed, also the cold-water pipes were covered with hair felt. Three window awnings were erected, and the pipes, ducts and tanks were covered as directed. All of the ash cans in the Engineer's department were lettered, also the doors of the bathroom compartments. Six benches, one clock and two perforated mats were furnished. The steam and gas system was thoroughly examined and repairs made to same. New parts were furnished where necessary for the completion of the equipment.

West Sixtieth Street Bath. East Eleventh street, East Seventy-sixth street and Allen street are still in the builder's hands, and we hope the same will be turned over at an early date.

Free Floating Baths—All the repairs necessary, including carpenter work, painting, ship carpentering, repairs to pontoons, new roofing, etc., were done to properly equip the baths for the summer season. The patronage has been large, and they are still at their respective berths on the North and East rivers. Orders were issued for mooring the same, and for one dozen chairs, 2,300 feet of 6-inch rope, 3,000 feet of 3-inch rope, brooms, hardware supplies, oil suits, etc. Necessary orders were issued for towing the baths from winter quarters in South Brooklyn to their respective berths on the North and East rivers. The structures are all in good condition.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The usual janitors' and engineers' supplies were furnished from the storeroom to the various public buildings as required. The order for the use of horse and wagon for the use of the Superintendent of the Bureau was issued as usual. The following supplies were distributed as needed: Coal and wood for heating, etc., ice, brooms, pails, soap, waste paper baskets, Sapolio, sponges, mop handles, feather dusters, scrubbing brushes, ash cans, etc., for use of the various public buildings, courts and offices in the care of this Bureau. Among the many items of repairs made to the various courts and offices not hereinbefore mentioned are plumbing, steam-fitting, carpentering, roofing, plastering, mason work, painting, electrical work, repairs to safes and furniture, etc., and for the use of the mechanics in the employ of this Bureau supplies of lumber, hardware, paints, varnish, etc., were furnished.

A copy of the petition of The City of New York, to be signed by the Mayor, Corporation Counsel and City Clerk of The City of New York, addressed to the State Water Supply Commission, requesting approval of its maps and profiles for a new and additional source or sources of water supply for The City of New York, as submitted by the Board of Water Supply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 27, 1905, was received from the Corporation Counsel and ordered placed on file.

The following plan or scheme to determine and provide for the payment of the proper compensation for any and all damages to persons or property, whether direct or indirect, which will result from the acquiring of lands and the execution of plans for a new and additional source or sources of water supply for The City of New York, as submitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held October 27, 1905, was approved.

BEFORE THE STATE WATER SUPPLY COMMISSION.

In the matter of

the application of The City of New York to the State Water Supply Commission for the approval of its maps and profiles of a new and additional source or sources of water supply for The City of New York.

Statement by the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York to Accompany the Petition Entitled as Above.

Chapter 723 of the Laws of 1905, establishing a State Water Commission, contains in section 3 the provisions governing applications to that Board.

A petition by The City of New York has already been executed by that City in compliance with those provisions. Maps and profiles have been prepared for submission and abstracts of official reports and other papers and documents. The same section provides that the petition shall be "accompanied by a plan or scheme to determine and provide for the payment of the proper compensation for any and all damages to persons or property, whether direct or indirect, which will result from the acquiring of said lands and the execution of said plans."

It seems proper that the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York should state what this plan or scheme is, in view of the fact that if the State Water Supply Commission shall approve the maps and profiles in this matter the responsibility for carrying them out in a legal, just and proper manner will depend largely on the Board of Water Supply of The City of New York.

The powers and duties of this Board are granted, defined and limited by the Act creating it, that is, by chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905, and it is, of course, also subject to the General Laws of the State of New York.

The same may also be said of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of The City of New York. These two Boards together constitute, so to speak, The City of New York, for the purpose of this project of securing a new or additional supply of water. The plan or scheme to determine and provide for the payment of the proper compensation for damages which will result from the acquiring of the lands and the carrying out of the project are thus largely a question of statute law of the State of

New York, which can only be modified or changed by the Legislature. These laws are the source of the power to acquire lands and make compensation, and neither the Board of Water Supply nor the Board of Estimate and Apportionment can add to or take from the same.

Under these Acts these Boards have, of course, wide powers of an executive and judicial nature, and as in the case of any public officers, they may perform their duties well or otherwise; but it is to be remembered that their acts and conduct are subject to review in the courts of the State in accordance with well settled and well understood principles of law.

The plan or scheme to determine and provide for the payment of proper compensation for damages is thus expressed mainly in the statutes themselves and particularly in chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905.

It is hoped that the following will be of assistance in showing that a full, adequate and complete plan or scheme has been provided by which payment of the proper compensation for any and all damages to persons or property, whether direct or indirect, which will result from the acquiring of the land and the execution of the plans.

The person who suffers damages has the whole financial responsibility of The City of New York to rely upon for payment. Ultimately, if it ever became necessary to go to that extreme, the courts would compel the levying of a tax upon all the property in The City of New York for the obtaining of the money with which to pay any damages that may be sustained.

It goes without saying that this is security of the very highest rank, hardly second to the security of the Government of the United States itself. The City of New York borrows money at very nearly as low a rate of interest as the United States Government, showing that its responsibility is considered nearly as good.

It is to be remembered that whether a person suffers damages or not, and the amount of damages, are questions to be determined by the Courts of the State of New York under chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905.

Let us see how, as a practical matter, a person who has suffered damages would secure payment therefor under the provisions of this Act.

It is provided in section 33 of the Act that the Comptroller of The City of New York is authorized and directed to raise, from time to time, by the issuance of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, such sums as shall be sufficient to pay "for any real estate or for the extinguishment of any right, title or interest therein acquired, and all damages appraised to persons interested therein, together with all expenses necessarily incurred in surveying, locating and acquiring title to said real estate or in extinguishing claims for damages thereto." * * *

That is to say, the Comptroller could be required by mandamus, if necessary, to raise the money for paying the damages.

It is further provided in section 17 of the Act that The City of New York shall within three months after the confirmation of the report of the Commissioners of Appraisal, that is, after the amount of damages shall have been ascertained by the courts, pay to the respective owners or persons damaged the money that has been adjudged to be due them for damages, with interest, and the section further provides as follows:

"And in case of neglect and default in the payment of the same within the time aforesaid, the respective person or persons * * * or their executors, administrators or successors * * * may sue for and recover the same with lawful interest as aforesaid, and the costs of suit in any proper form of action against The City of New York in any Court having cognizance thereof, and it shall be sufficient to declare generally for so much money due to the plaintiff or plaintiffs therein by virtue of this Act for real estate taken or affected for the purpose herein mentioned, and the report of said Commissioners with proof of the right and title of the plaintiff or plaintiffs to the sum or sums demanded shall be conclusive evidence in such suit or action."

That is to say, there could be no possible defense to the action, so that judgment would necessarily result, whereupon the holder of the judgment would have all the rights against The City of New York that a judgment creditor has in ordinary cases against a judgment debtor.

Execution, for instance, would issue to the Sheriff, and the Sheriff could levy on property of The City of New York and ultimately the courts would compel, if necessary, the levying of a tax upon all the persons and property in The City of New York in order to obtain the money to pay the judgment.

It is thus evident that there can be no possible doubt of the ability of any person damaged to collect by force if necessary the amount of damages that he can show he has suffered.

As a practical matter, as has been shown by experience, payment can be made rapidly and conveniently to the person damaged unless, indeed, he desires to defer payment in order to increase the interest charges and in effect loan money to The City of New York at a high rate of interest.

It should be added that various provisions have been inserted in the Act to secure prompt action by the Commissioners so that payments may be made with as little delay as possible. It is provided, for instance, in the fourteenth section of the Act that the report of the Commissioners shall be filed not more than one year after the date of the filing of the oaths, and that the time of filing the report cannot be extended, except upon application to the Supreme Court, and then for a period not exceeding eight months.

The Board of Water Supply desires to call attention particularly to the fact that they have power to agree with persons damaged. It is provided in section 24 of the Act that the Board of Water Supply, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, may agree with the owners and persons interested in any real estate laid down on the maps as to the amount of compensation to be paid to such owners or persons interested for the taking or using and occupying such real estate.

It is the intention of the Board of Water Supply to endeavor to agree with persons injured as to the amount of damages wherever that is possible, and in doing so to deal justly and fairly with all persons and to concede that there is due them such amount of damages as may seem to the Board of Water Supply just and right. It is hoped that persons claiming to be injured will meet the Board of Water Supply in a similar spirit, and that the result will be that in the great majority of cases settlements can be arrived at satisfactory to the property owners and to the Board of Water Supply and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which will render litigation unnecessary.

It may be well in this connection to state that in case no agreement can be reached and litigation is necessary, the law and procedure are very distinctly laid down in the Constitution and Laws of The State of New York, and with the amount of compensation the Board of Water Supply would have nothing to do.

It is provided in the Constitution of The State of New York that no person shall "be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor shall private property be taken for public use without just compensation." (Article 1, section 6.)

And further—

"When private property shall be taken for any public use the compensation to be made therefor when such compensation is not made by the State, shall be ascertained by a jury or by not less than three commissioners appointed by a Court of Record as shall be prescribed by law." (Article 1, section 7.)

It is thus necessary in an Act authorizing the acquisition of private property for public purposes that the compensation shall be determined either by a jury or by three commissioners appointed by a Court of Record.

It has been almost or quite the universal practice in this State to have the compensation determined by Commissioners, and hence it is that in acts like the present one provision is made for the appointment of Commissioners. The procedure under this act, briefly, would be as follows in case it were necessary to acquire the property by condemnation proceedings. Commissioners would be appointed by the Supreme Court in the judicial district in which the lands are situated. These Commissioners must be disinterested and competent freeholders, at least one of whom shall reside in the County of New York and at least one of whom shall reside in the county or one of the counties in which the real estate shall be situated. (Section 9.) Provision is made for the taking of testimony before these commissioners, who report to the Supreme Court, which report must be confirmed by a judge of the Supreme Court. Provision is also made for appeals, and an elaborate system of procedure is provided.

It is also to be noted that special provision is made in section 42 of this Act for the awarding of indirect or consequential damages. These damages may be agreed upon, or where that cannot be done they are to be determined by the court as in the case of land damages.

It seems unnecessary to go at greater length into this matter at the present time. There has been an immense amount of legislation and litigation in regard to these matters, and there are numberless questions that might be asked and conditions that might occur which can be better dealt with if it is thought necessary to consider them at the hearing before the State Water Supply Commission.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
