BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

LOCAL BOARD, STATEN ISLAND DISTRICT.

Meeting January 30, 1906, 10.30 a. m.

Present—Aldermen Collins, Rendt and Cole and President Cromwell.
 The minutes of the meeting of January 16 were approved.

Petition 612.

To lay a sanitary sewer in Hopping avenue, Ward 5. First hearing.

Alderman Cole presented a protest signed by residents on Hopping avenue, which was read and ordered to be filed. C. M. Robinson addressed the Board in opposition to the petition, and read a protest on behalf of three-fourths of the owners and more than three-fourths of the assessable property, as being already provided with sewer connection by private enterprise, and as ready to help the rest to effect connection; which was ordered to be filed.

Referred to the Commissioner of Public Works to report.

Petition 520, Resolution 1.

To extend Broadway, Ward 3, from its present terminus to Mersereau avenue. Fourth hearing.

The following resolution was moved by Alderman Cole and was adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of Richmond; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of the Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore it is Resolved, by the Local Board of the Staten Island District, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

To open the extension of Broadway from its present terminus, south of Elizabeth street, southwardly in a straight line to Mersereau avenue, joining said avenue at an angle of about eighty-five degrees (85 degrees), in the Third Ward of the Borough of Richmond, as shown on the map or plan of The City of New York, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment January 12, 1906; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

Affirmative—Alderman Collins, Alderman Rendt, Alderman Cole and President Cromwell.

Negative—None.

Street Layouts.

Holland Hook District, lines, grades, extensions and closings suggested, bounded approximately by Jewett avenue, Washington avenue, Arthur Kill and Kill von Kull, Ward 3. Fourth hearing.

Counsel for property owners and representatives of large industrial and manufacturing interests on the Kill von Kull westward of Franklin avenue (Mariner's Harbor), objected that streets indicated would so cut up the properties referred to as to cause serious injury and prevent developments planned. Commissioner Tribus stated that the sketched lines, except those showing important connecting thoroughfares, could be eliminated from the tentative map in such cases, leaving large factory areas undisturbed, and President Cromwell invited the interests concerned to file with him sketches and suggestions to aid in the preparation of the final map. Owners and residents eastward of Franklin avenue (Port Richmond) objected to lines not intended for immediate street openings being laid out on the map, on the ground that they might interfere with titles and values, and arguments were presented in contradiction to this, the objection specified being to the suggested extension of Hatfield avenue eastward by way of Grace Church place to meet the extension of Castleton avenue westward.

Referred to the Commissioner of Public Works.

Extension of James street, viaduct and new streets proposed, bounded by York avenue, Fifth street, Westervelt avenue and Richmond terrace, Ward 1. Second hearing.

Extension of James street to connect York and Westervelt avenues, supported by petitioners, but viaduct opposed on account of expense, of position as a driveway, and of grades of viaduct and approaches, and protests filed. Proposed new street from north to south, approximately along lowest drainage level of valley, generally approved, but lines shown opposed as destroying manufacturing and business properties.

President Cromwell invited the interests concerned to file with him sketches and suggestions to aid in the preparation of the final map.

Trolley Service.

Alderman Collins moved the following resolution, and it was adopted:

Whereas, Frequent and almost constant complaints are being made by the residents and taxpayers of this borough as to the failure of the different electric companies to run cars connecting with boats on their arrival at the St. George Ferry terminal between the hours of 1 and 5 a. m.; also as to the failure of the Midland Railroad Company to provide a suitable waiting room and shelter for its patrons at the transfer station at Castleton Corners; also as to the wretched condition of the roadbed and the failure of the electric railroad to provide suitable and safe transit facilities on the Brighton Heights division; it is hereby

Recommended, That the Secretary of this Board communicate with said electric railroad companies and request them to run their cars so as to connect with each and every boat on its arrival at the St. George Ferry between the hours of 1 a. m. and 5 a. m.

Also, that the Midland Railroad Company be requested to provide and maintain a suitable and proper transfer station at Castleton Corners for the comfort and well being of its patrons.

Also, that the electric railroad company now operating the Brighton Heights division be requested to at once double track its road so as to prevent the constant delays of fifteen to twenty minutes on its turnouts, to run more frequently and otherwise provide much greater comfort for those who have occasion to use its road.

County Fair.

Secretary E. P. Doyle, of the Richmond County Agricultural Society, asked that the Local Board consider the following resolution and, on motion of Alderman Rendt, it was adopted:

Resolved, That the Local Board of the Staten Island District does hereby recommend and request that the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York take such action as may be necessary to obtain an appropriation of \$5,000 for the following purposes:

First—The sum of \$2,500 to be expended by the Board of Education of The City of New York for the purpose of erecting a building on the grounds of the Richmond County Agricultural Society at Dongan Hills, Staten Island, for the accommodation and safe custody of the City's educational exhibits at the annual County Fairs of such society.

Second—The sum of \$2,500 to be expended under the direction and supervision of the President of the Borough of Richmond for the purpose of making a proper exhibit of the work of such of the departments under his control as he may deem proper.

And it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Board of Aldermen. On motion, the Board adjourned.

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that buildings are in a dilapidated condition; premises are not sewer connected, nor supplied with water from a public source; flooring is broken and defective; there is no milk-house and absolutely no means for cooling the milk before offering for sale; the building is small, poorly ventilated and not over-clean, and is totally unfit to be used as a place for the production and sale of milk.

Whereas, The premises One Hundred and Eighty-sixth street, about 200 feet east of Amsterdam avenue, Borough of Manhattan, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth, and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that buildings are in a dilapidated condition; the premises are not sewer connected, nor supplied with water from a public source; the floor is defective and the ground space beneath is saturated; the shed is not of sufficient size, nor adequately ventilated; no milk-house nor any means for properly cooling the milk and washing the utensils are provided; the general surroundings are very untidy and filthy.

Whereas, The premises Lincoln avenue, near Glen street, Borough of Brooklyn, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that all cows be removed from the premises forthwith.

Whereas, The premises east side of Western avenue, about one-fourth mile north of Johnson avenue, Maspeth, Borough of Queens, in the City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the reports of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the cesspool be emptied; that the manure box be emptied; that the ground space about the stable and manure boxes be cleaned and disinfected, and all saturated earth removed.

Whereas, The premises north side of Flushing avenue, second stable from Woodward avenue, East Williamsburg, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the manure box be emptied; that the ground space about the manure box be cleaned of all offensive matter and the saturated earth removed; that the valley drains and the floor of the stable be so repaired as to discharge all liquids into a cesspool-connected drain; that the ground space beneath the stable be cleaned, disinfected and the saturated earth removed; that the keeping of cows without a permit be discontinued.

Whereas, The premises corner of Water and Third streets, Woodhaven, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the defective wooden floors of the cow stalls and valley drain and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected and that the floor of the cow stalls be made water tight and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water tight, properly trapped cesspool-connected valley drain; that the walls and ceiling of the stable and milk house be cleaned and whitewashed; that the milk house thereat be made dust proof and floor of said house be properly repaired, made water tight and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into the cesspool thereat by and through an earthen or iron pipe, properly trapped; that the cesspool thereat be disinfected, emptied and cleaned by a licensed scavenger.

Whereas, The premises Furnam avenue, near railroad crossing, Metropolitan, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the walls and ceiling of the stable and milk house thereat be thoroughly cleaned and whitewashed; that the defective cement floor of the milk house be properly repaired and made water tight; that the practice of discharging the contents of the cesspools thereat into the street be discontinued forthwith.

Whereas, The premises Mount Olivet avenue, opposite Collins avenue, Maspeth, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the walls and ceiling of the stable and milk house thereat be cleaned and whitewashed; that the defective wooden floors of the cow stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and that the floors of the cow stalls be made water tight and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water tight, cesspool-connected valley drain by and through an iron or earthenware pipe; that the yard thereat be thoroughly cleaned of all manure and disinfected; that the milk house thereat be made dust proof and floor of same be properly drained to the cesspool thereat by and through an iron or earthen pipe; that the window opening from the kitchen into the milk house be sealed air tight; that the practice of emptying the cesspool thereat into the street be discontinued forthwith.

Whereas, The premises Snediker avenue and Sixth street, Union Course, Borough of Queens, in The City of New York, and the business pursuit specified in this case, being in the opinion of the Board in a condition and in effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance, and the Board having taken and filed among its records the report of the Sanitary Superintendent and the Inspectors relating thereto, and what it regards as sufficient proof to authorize its declaration that the premises and business pursuit in this case are in condition and effect dangerous to life and health and a public nuisance—the Board hereby enters in its records the said premises as a nuisance, and declares the same to be a public nuisance, dangerous to life and health, and in respect thereto orders, viz.:

That the use of said premises as a stable in its present condition be discontinued; that the said premises be cleaned; that the filth-saturated soil be removed and replaced with fresh earth and the surface so graded that all surface water shall be freely discharged therefrom; that the keeping of cows thereat without a permit from this Department be discontinued forthwith; that the defective wooden floors of the cow stalls and stable and the saturated earth beneath same be removed, the site cleaned and disinfected, and that the entire stable floor be cemented and so graded as to discharge all liquid matter into a water tight cemented valley drain; said valley drain to be connected to a properly constructed tight-covered cesspool by and through an iron or earthen pipe, properly trapped; that a water tight, properly covered manure box, sufficiently large to hold the accumulation for not more than forty-eight hours be provided, and that all manure be removed from the premises daily and deposited at a point at least 300 feet from the stable or any dwelling; that a properly constructed milk house, having no connection with stable or dwelling, be provided thereat; said house to have a water tight cemented floor, properly graded and drained to cesspool, and that no milk be handled or stored except in the aforesaid milk house.

MINUTES OF LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, met at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx on December 30, 1905, at 11.15 a. m.

Present—President Haffen, Alderman Gass and Alderman Sheil.

No. 616.

Acquiring Title to East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, from Tremont Avenue to Bronx Park Avenue.

Petition of Domestic Realty Company, No. 8 West Twenty-second street, was read. Report stated that East One Hundred and Seventy-seventh Street, from Tremont avenue to Bronx Park avenue, runs partially through the Philip Lydig estate and is partially laid out on the map of the Neill estate; it is laid out by the City on the tentative plan of the street system adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment May 29, 1903, and the map showing dimensions and grades has not been filed as yet.

A map for adoption is in preparation of the district bounded by Tremont avenue on the south, on the west by the Bronx river and Bronx Park extension, on the north by Bear Swamp road, and on the east by West Farms road, for the purpose of instituting proceedings to acquire title to all the streets. The Chief Engineer recommends that no action be taken in this special case and that it be combined with the remainder of the other streets.

Acquiring Title to Ludlow Avenue, or Eastern Boulevard, from Tremont Avenue, Near Avenue A, to Bronx River.

Petition of Henry Ruhl, John C. Stubenrauch and others was read, as was also report of the Engineer.

No one appeared in opposition, and, on motion, the following preambles and resolution were adopted:

Whereas, A petition for a local improvement described below has been received by the President of the Borough of The Bronx; and

Whereas, He has appointed a time for a meeting of this Local Board not more than fifteen days after the receipt by him of the said petition, at which meeting the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Local Board, and he has caused a notice to be published in the CITY RECORD that said petition has been presented to him and is on file in his office for inspection, and of the time when and the place where there would be a meeting of this Local Board, at which the said petition would be submitted by him to the said Board, which time was not less than ten days after the publication of this notice; and

Whereas, The said petition was duly submitted thereafter to the said Local Board, which did duly consider the same and give a full hearing thereon; now therefore, it is

Resolved, by the Local Board of Morrisania, Twenty-fourth District, Borough of The Bronx, pursuant to titles 2 and 3 of chapter 10 of the Greater New York Charter, That the said petition be and the same hereby is granted; and it is hereby

Resolved, That this Board does hereby initiate proceedings for the said local improvement, to wit:

For acquiring title to the lands necessary for legal opening of Ludlow avenue, or Eastern Boulevard, from Tremont avenue, near Avenue A, to the Bronx river, in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York; and it is hereby

Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be transmitted forthwith to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval.

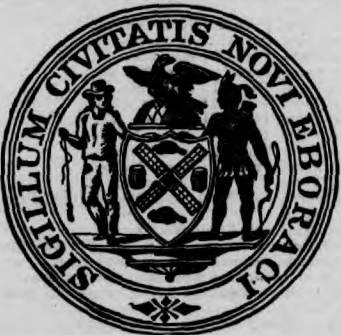

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
