To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen, City of New York:

Gentlemen—I beg leave to acknowledge receipt of copy of the following ordinance, passed by your honorable body on the 6th inst.:

"Resolved, That the Justices of Special Sessions and the City Magistrates of The City of New York, be and they are hereby requested to notify the Secretary of State of any violation of the speed regulations of The City of New York, according to the provisions of the so-called Callan Law; and be it further

"Resolved, That the aforesaid Board keep, or cause to be kept, such records against offenders as will make it possible to identify the number and nature of the offense, and that some system be worked out between the City Magistrates and the Police Commissioner in order that identification of offenders may be positive and certain in all respects."

In reply thereto I have to say that the same will be presented to the Board of City Magistrates at their next meeting.

In the meantime we are preparing the machinery for finger-printing certain classes of offenders who come before these courts, and over whom on conviction we have summary jurisdiction.

I will recommend to the Board, when this new ordinance goes into effect that chauffeurs be added to the list of defendants who on conviction shall be finger-printed, and this for the purpose of identification in the case of those convicted of more than one offense against the provision of the ordinance; and also that the other recommendation as to notifying the Secretary of State be complied with. Dear Sir—I have the honor to transmit herewith a certified copy of a report and resolution adopted by the Board of Education at a meeting held on January 8, 1913, relative to an issue of special revenue bonds to the amount of \$11,000 for the purpose of making up the deficit in the fund "Compensation of Janitors," 1912.

A. E. PALMER, Secretary, Board of Education.

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that this Board requested, in the Departmental Estimate for 1912, the sum of \$1,576,972.60 for Compensation of Janitors. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen allowed but \$1,513,576.92, a cut of \$63,395.68. Some part of this deficit has been recouped by reason of the fact that special activities in the evening and during the vacation period were not organized to the extent contemplated in the Budget for 1912, there having been insufficient funds allowed for teachers' salaries, also by reason of the fact that there were some slight delays in the opening of new school buildings. Notwithstanding the most rigid economy, the fund is now exhausted, and there are claims awaiting payment aggregating \$19,396.67. It is anticipated a few other claims will be presented so that the total deficit will probably reach \$11,000.

Your Committee therefore urges prompt action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen in the matter, and offers for adoption the following resolution:

During the last three years, nearly a half a million of people have attended such a series of concerts, and many thousands were turned away.

The City makes provision for the summer months, but not one cent for the long winter months. Remember, too, that the City possesses about twenty large, handsome auditoriums, all located in the home centres of the five boroughs of Greater New York. They are now mostly dark and empty at nights.

Unfortunately there is no such thing as good music outside of Carnegie Hall, Aeolian Hall, and the Metropolitan Opera House. Suppose there were only three great libraries, all in one locality. You can see therefore that this is a movement wholly for the people. It seems almost criminal to allow this year to go by without such a series of concerts, and I appeal to you in behalf of the great music lovers. Will you not support President McAneny in his effort to bring this wholesome enjoyment and educational influence into the lives of thousands upon thousands of our worthy citizens?

Hon. JOHN PURROY MITCHEL, President, Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—For the coming year it is anticipated that the expense of replacing damaged parts of the pumping machinery and keeping same in proper repair will be \$30,000. Each previous year the department had obtained the authority and consent of the Board of Aldermen to purchase such repair parts as are required, and to also incur such other expense as may be necessary to repair the engines, boilers and other appurtenances in the pumping stations without the formality of advertising for competitive bids for this labor and material.

As stated in previous letters, the department does not know when an accident may occur to the pumping engines or what parts may be damaged. It is imperative, therefore, that the department be in such a position that the engines may be repaired and put in proper working condition with the least possible delay. In the high elevations of the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and entirely throughout the other Boroughs, all the water is pumped, so that interruption in the supply, which would naturally follow any serious break in the pumping machinery, would result in great inconvenience to the people. There would also be great danger should a large fire occur.

I would, therefore, respectfully ask that the Board of Aldermen authorize the expenditure by this department during the year 1913 of the sum of \$30,000, without public letting, to be apportioned among the Boroughs as follows:

Gentlemen—I would ask for the earliest possible action upon the issue of corporate stock to the amount of \$4,650 for engineering work in connection with grade crossing elimination in this Borough.

One extensive piece of work is drawing to a close, but will require four or five months' attention.

Another even more important construction is to be begun at once. That you may have full information upon the subject, the following report has been prepared by our Engineering Bureau:

"The amount of money available for salaries of an Engineer and Assistants, in connection with the elimination of grade crossings in this borough, on January 1, 1913, is \$1,620.75. We need for the year 1913 \$6,250, as follows:

"There is, therefore, a probable deficiency of \$4,629.25, and I would ask that additional corporate stock be issued, so that this work may be carried on during the coming year.

"In explanation of the above request, will say that the present contract work of elimination at Huguenot crossing will probably be completed in about four months; an inspector must be in constant attendance, representing this Department, as we have to certify to one-fourth of the cost.

"The Crooks crossing elimination is to commence and we will need an Inspector there at once; that work will be carried on throughout the year. As much of the work is being done by the Staten Island Railway Company, through its own force, it is necessary for us to check up their time account, and all materials delivered and charged, and in many cases we have to separate these items from their own work, which is going on in that vicinity. For the month of October, as an example: These items included 9,000 hours of labor at 13 different prices.

"The Engineer in charge of this work, representing this Department, is unable, without assistance, to compute and check all of the many items of expenditure entering into this work; and there is also some necessary checking of field work to be done by him, for which he needs the occasional services of a field party. This has all been considered carefully and kept down to a minimum expenditure in the schedule outlined above."

The building is practically completed and can be made ready for occupancy in a short time if changes are made in the plans for the approach and in the retaining wall at the side and rear of the building. It is estimated that these changes will cost about \$7,000. A balance of \$756.83 remains in the fund, so a transfer of \$6,250 will be sufficient.

The Public Service Commission's contracts provide for work of this character, viz., the replacing of water mains and appurtenances, and on some of the items the Commission has taken bids for such work. The subsurface Engineer of the Commission states, however, that the contractor's offers as received by the Department of Water Supply are apparently more favorable to the City than would be the figures obtained by computing the unit prices bid plus extra work as provided for under the subway contract. The Commission's Engineer states further that the acceptance by the City of the propositions made to the Department of Water Supply for the contemplated work will afford no relief to the contractors from work already bid upon, no relief from ultimate responsibility and no duplication of payments to contractors as between the two accounts.

In view of the facts that the work proposed, if done now, will eliminate the necessity for opening the streets again for the work, and that there is a visible saving to the City of nearly \$13,000 by providing for the work at this time. The one designated as in the vicinity of Union avenue and East 155th street was located at Kelly street, Leggett avenue and Avenue St. John, and was purchased for the sum of \$75,000, instead of \$120,000, as estimated. It appears, therefore, that there is an available balance of \$116,000 in the original appropriation which it is proposed to apply to the acquisition of the aforesaid sites in Brooklyn and Queens.

A request for funds for the acquisition of a site and the construction thereon of a new high school for the East New York section was included in the estimated requirements of the Department of Education for the year 1912, aggregating \$17,485, submitted last June. This item was given first place in the list of new high school buildings. The strip of land in Hollis, adjoining Public School 35, which it is proposed to purchase, lies between the site of the school and Parkview avenue. The site is required to prevent possible building to the east and the consequent cutting off of light from the school, to make proper sewer connections, to escape the expense of grading, and to make room for an addition to the present building which is becoming more and more necessary.

Laborer: This person has been employed for several years at this institution and was in our request for 1913. His services are needed. The position was cut out without consulting this department and should be restored.

Gardener: The present incumbent has held this position for twelve years and has rendered good and faithful service. The position was continued in our estimate for 1913, but owing to a misunderstanding it was requested that the position be transferred from Randall's Island to City Hospital. The Budget Committee did not allow it at City Hospital, and cut it off at Randall's Island. If we had continued the position at Randall's Island it would have been allowed. His services are valuable and should be continued.

Drivers: These men have been employed at the City Home, Brooklyn, driving transfer wagon and the Municipal hearse in that Borough. The committee appointed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to inquire into the Departments of Health, Public Charities and Bellevue and Allied Hospitals recommended that these positions at the same salaries be transferred from the City Home, Brooklyn, to the Central Office, Brooklyn, but the persons responsible for the preparation of the budget took them off the City Home, Brooklyn, and by an oversight failed to include them among the Central Office, Brooklyn. This request is to correct said error.

Matrons: Minnie McNamara, New York City Training School for Nurses, B. I., appointed December 1, 1899. Theresa M. O'Brien, Metropolitan Training School for Nurses, B. I., appointed December 7, 1900. Gertrude Murray, New York City Farm Colony, S. I., appointed December 18, 1890. They all have rendered good and efficient service. They were in our request for 1913, and I do not feel that they should have been dropped without giving the head of the department an opportunity to be heard in the matter. In addition the Fire Commissioner filed with the Committee the annexed detailed statement which reduces the amount asked for the item of 2½-inch hose by 26,750 feet, and thus brings down the total sum to \$202,370, a reduction of \$32,100. The Committee believes with the Commissioner that this should be a budgetary charge, and that no such demand should be thrust upon the limited revenue bond account. It feels that hose must be furnished, but does not believe that it is good policy to grant the whole sum asked for. It, therefore, recommends that the accompanying resolution be adopted.

Gentlemen—This Department stands greatly in need of funds for use in purchasing an additional supply of fire hose to maintain at a proper standard of efficiency the equipment of existing companies in this regard and to provide for the estimated requirements for thirty-one new engine companies proposed to be organized during the coming year.

In the detailed statement given below, submitted to me by the Clerk in charge of the Bureau of Repairs and Supplies, the needs of this Department in the matter of a hose supply for the existing and prospective companies are shown to be:

Of this amount, \$86,100 is for 2½-inch hose, for the new companies to be organized in 1913. The balance is to replace hose no longer fit for service and to cover the shortage of existing companies.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, December 20, 1912.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Sirs—The Collector of Assessments and Arrears has sent to me lists of the tax liens held by The City of New York affecting premises in the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn and The Bronx, respectively. These lists contain over 300 of these liens, and the amount of taxes which the City will collect (exclusive of interest) will be in excess of \$1,000,000. In each case it will be necessary for the City to commence an action to foreclose the lien. As a preliminary step in each action, it is necessary that a search of title be made so that we may know whom to make parties defendant.

The inquiry and investigation for parties defendant in an action to foreclose a tax lien is more comprehensive than that of an action to foreclose a mortgage. In an action to foreclose a mortgage the plaintiff seeks to ascertain those who are subsequent to himself in interest in sequence of time, but a party seeking to foreclose a tax lien, which is a paramount and primary lien, must look further than sequence of time and must ascertain all liens and interests which are subordinate in law. In an action to foreclose a mortgage a mere search should suffice, whereas in an action to foreclose a tax lien, the title to the premises affected by the lien must be examined in order to ascertain all subordinate interests, whether prior or subsequent in time to the tax lien.

A new "Division of Real Estate" has recently been established in this Department for the purpose of examining title to lands ceded to the City in street opening proceedings, but the force of that division is barely sufficient to keep abreast with its own work, and could not possibly handle these hundreds of foreclosure cases. It is, therefore, necessary to have these searches made by the various title companies.

In these foreclosure actions the City will not only collect the arrears of taxes which are due, but in its bills of costs it will be able to tax as a disbursement the greater part of the amounts paid out for the searches made by the title companies pursuant to the provisions of section 3256 of the Code of Civil Procedure, which reads as follows:

"Searches affecting property situate in any county in which the office of County Clerk or Register is a salaried one, when made and certified to by title insurance, abstract or searching companies, organized and doing business under the laws of this State, may be used in all actions or special proceedings in which official searches may be used in place of and with the same legal effect as such official searches, and the expenses of searches so made by said companies shall be taxable at rates not exceeding the cost of similar official searches."

A considerable part of the amount paid out for searches will, therefore, be returned to the City Treasury, and it is probable that by an arrangement with the Finance Department such cost of the searches may be refunded to the special revenue bond fund from which it is paid. Each of these searches will probably cost between \$75 and \$100, but for the 300 actions which we are about to commence \$25,000 will probably be a sufficient allowance; as costs are collected and refunded, a sufficient balance will be left in the fund to pay for similar disbursements in other actions to be commenced in the future. In other words, the fund should be self-replenishing.

I therefore ask that your honorable Board request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds amounting to \$25,000 to defray the necessary expenses of searches in actions to foreclose tax liens. SPECIAL ORDERS.

The hour of 2.30 o'clock having arrived, the Vice-Chairman announced that the business before the Board was consideration of Special Orders 136, 154 and 155, relating to filling vacancies in the membership of the Board. Pending discussion on the matter, Alderman Dowling introduced the following opinion from the Corporation Counsel:

No. 2607.

City of New York, Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York, October 8, 1912.

Hon. FRANK L. DOWLING, Aldermanic Chambers, City Hall.

Sir—I am in receipt of your communication under date of September 18, 1912, which reads as follows:

"On July 9, 1912, John W. Hagenmiller, Alderman from the 37th District, resigned. He was elected in November, 1911, as a fusion candidate. Section 18 of the Greater New York Charter provides that 'Any vacancy which may occur among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen shall be filled by election by a majority of all the members elected thereto, of a person who must be of the same political party as the member whose place has become vacant.'

"I have made a careful examination of the records of enrolled voters from 1907 to 1911 inclusive, as to the record of Mr. Hagenmiller, with the following result:

"Year, 1907; election district, 8; assembly district, 33; party, Democrat.
"Year, 1908; election district, 25; assembly district, 32; party, Democrat.
"Year, 1909; election district, 24; assembly district, 33; party, Democrat.
"Year, 1910; election district, 23; assembly district, 33; party, Republican.
"Year, 1911; election district, 31; assembly district, 33; party, Democrat.

"In view of the foregoing I believe that I am justified in stating that former Alderman Hagenmiller is a Democrat. My object in writing to you is to ask your opinion as to the legal status of a candidate for this vacancy, so far as his political connections are concerned, under charter provisions.

"As the Board meets again on September 24, I shall appreciate an early reply.

"Subdivision 8 of section 3 of the Election Law defines the term 'party,' as used therein, as follows:

"8. The term 'party' means any political organization which at the last preceding election for Governor polled at least ten thousand votes for any candidate for any office nominated by it, to be voted for by all of the electors of the State." Section 7 of the Election Law provides for the declaration by the voter in the enrollment blank, as follows:

"I,, who have placed a mark underneath the party emblem hereunder of my choice, do solemnly declare that I have this day registered as a voter for the next ensuing election (or, if the voter was duly registered otherwise than personally, that I have this day voted in the above election district), and that I am a qualified voter of the election district in which I have so registered (or voted), and that my residence address is as stated by me at the time I so registered (or, if registration was not personal, a statement of the voter's present address); that I am in general sympathy with the principles of the party which I have designated by my mark hereunder; that it is my intention to support generally at the next general election, State or national, the nominees of such party for State or national offices, and that I have not enrolled with or participated in any primary election or convention of any other party since the first day of last January. The word 'party' as used herein means a political organization which at the last preceding election of a Governor, polled at least ten thousand votes for Governor."

It will be perceived from these quotations from the Election Law that the party status of a voter is dependent upon his sympathy with the principles of the party (viz.: a political organization which at the last preceding election for a governor polled at least ten thousand votes for governor) and that the only declaration he must make with respect to his intention as to voting is "to support generally at the next general election, State or national, the nominees of such party for State or national offices, * * *."

Nowhere in the Election Law is it prescribed that the party status or allegiance of a voter is to be ascertained by his attitude or intention in other than State or national elections.

It will be observed that in section 7 the declaration to be made by the voter enrolling with a particular party is to support generally at the next general election, state or national, the nominees of the party with which he enrolls, and therefore his party status is to be judged not by his political predilections, as evidenced by enrollments, antecedent to his last enrollment, but by his intention to support at the general election next succeeding his last enrollment the state or national nominees for state or national offices of the party with which he enrolls.

This makes it clear in the case under consideration that the enrollment of Mr. Hagenmiller, in the year 1910, as a Republican, can have no probative force in deciding his party status in July, 1912, when he resigned his office as Alderman, in view of the fact that in 1911 he enrolled as a Democrat.

In Matter of Duffy, 125 App. Div. 406, aff'd, 192 N. Y. 582, Mr. Justice Scott, writing for the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court, First Department, enters into a general discussion of the purposes of the provisions of the Primary Election Law relating to the enrollment of voters, and in the course of his opinion says, at page 409:

"The Primary Election Law recognizes in the fullest way, as does also the General Election Law (Laws of 1896, chapter 909, as amended) the existence of parties as political organizations with enrolled electorates, and officers and committees chosen by and from the electors. They are not to be close corporations selecting their own members, but any elector is entitled to become an enrolled member of any party, and to participate in its government providing he complies with the statutory tests, which consists only of his own declaration as to his political sympathies and intentions. It is clearly to the advantage of the Commonwealth that the electors generally should interest themselves in and participate in the management of the political parties to which they severally adhere, and if an elector's own opinion change, or the party to which he has adhered deserts or departs from the political principles by which he was attracted to it, it is not the policy of the law to place obstacles in the way of a change of adherence to a party with which he finds himself in sympathy. The Primary Election Law provides for an annual enrollment, and that a person having enrolled in one party for any year, may not during that same year become enrolled in another party. This, while forbidding a double enrollment of the same person, clearly contemplates that the list of enrolled members may change from year to year. By this means, while a reasonable opportunity is given to an elector to change his political adherence, yet an obstacle is erected in the way of any attempt on the part of the members of one party to assume control of the management of the other."

See also section 19 of the Election Law.

Mr. Justice Scott holds that a voter maintains his party status during the calendar year following his enrollment. Even if the enrollment of Mr. Hagenmiller in 1910 as a Republican had any evidentiary value as to his party status, his enrollment in 1911 as a Democrat completely nullifies it.

We come now to a consideration of the provisions of section 15 of the Charter, which reads as follows:

"Any vacancy which may occur among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen shall be filled by election by a majority of all the members elected thereto, of a person who must be of the same political party as the member whose place has become vacant."

As under the opinion of Mr. Justice Scott in Matter of Duffy, supra, Mr. Hagenmiller, at the time of his resignation in July, 1912, was a member of the Democratic Party, I am of your opinion, upon the state of the facts detailed in your communication, that the member to be elected to fill the vacancy caused thereby must be a person (to quote the statute) "of the same political party."

I might add that I have considered the fact stated by you that Mr. Hagenmiller was elected in November, 1911, as a fusion candidate, but in the present state of the law this circumstance can have no weight in the decision of the question propounded by you. Respectfully yours, G. L. STERLING, Acting Corporation Counsel.

Your petitioner, Ralph Folks, respectfully shows:

I. I am a citizen of The City of New York, and an elected member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

II. At the General Election held in November, 1911, there was elected as a member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York one, Bryant Willard, from the 21st Aldermanic District in the City of New York, the term of office of said Bryant Willard being from the 1st of January, 1912, to the 1st of January, 1914.

III. Said Bryant Willard was, for many years prior to his election in November, 1911, a member of the Republican Party, and was enrolled as such for many years prior to the general election held in November, 1911, and prior to said general election held in November, 1911, was nominated for said office of member of the Board of Aldermen by the Republican Party in the 21st Aldermanic District in the City of New York, and at the election held in November, 1911, was the candidate of the Republican Party for said office.

IV. That subsequently said Bryant Willard duly qualified and acted as such elected member of the Board of Aldermen, representing the 21st Aldermanic District of The City of New York, from the 1st day of January, 1912, until on or about the 31st day of December, 1912, when said Bryant Willard died.

V. That since the death of said Bryant Willard on the 31st day of December, 1912, there has existed a vacancy among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, in and for the 21st Aldermanic District of The City of New York by and on account of the death of said Bryant Willard.

VI. At a regular meeting of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, held on the 6th day of January, 1913, your petitioner, as one of the elected members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, and as a Republican member, offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, That Oscar Igstaedter, of 174 W. 136th st., in the Borough of Manhattan, be and he is hereby elected a member of the Board of Aldermen, for the years 1912 and 1913, for the 21st Aldermanic District, in the place and stead of Bryant Willard, deceased."

VII. The said Oscar Igstaedter is an old member of the Republican Party, and is a member of the same political party as Bryant Willard, whose place became vacant by his death on December 31, 1912, as hereinbefore set forth.

VIII. Upon said resolution being placed to a vote, thirty-four of the elected members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, all of whom had been elected as candidates of the Republican Party at the general election held in November, 1911, voted in favor of said resolution. There were present at said meeting sixty-six elected members of the Board of Aldermen out of a total membership, at this time, of seventy elected members. Of the sixty-six elected members present, thirty were Democratic, elected as such members of the Board of Aldermen; two others, Messrs. Devine and Shipley, were elected as candidates of the Republican Party, but did not vote on the resolution. The thirty Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen refused to vote on the resolution for the sole reason that the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen had refused, theretofore, to admit or concede that one Hagenmiller, formerly a member of the Board of Aldermen from the 37th Aldermanic District, was a Democrat, so that the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen might fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of said Hagenmiller in the year 1912, by the election of a Democrat. The said Hagenmiller above referred to was elected a member of the Board of Aldermen at the election held in November, 1911, as a candidate of the Republican Party, endorsed by the Independence League Party, and among the other contestants for the place of Alderman for the 37th Aldermanic District at said election there was a candidate of the Democratic Party. At the time of the election of the said Hagenmiller he was an enrolled member of the Republican Party, having been enrolled as such on one of the registration days of 1910, which enrollment was for the year 1911. It appears that on one of the days of registration in the year 1911, the said Hagenmiller enrolled for the year 1912 as a Democrat; he subsequently claimed, however, that this enrollment by him was a mistake, and that he had intended to enroll as a Republican. The fact is, however, that at the time of his nomination by the Republican Party in the year 1911, he was an enrolled member of the party for that year, and was elected as a candidate of the Republican Party, and not as a Democrat. Upon the organization of the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of January, 1912, the said Hagenmiller announced that he was opposed to the Democratic Party, generally known as Tammany Hall, had been elected as an anti-Tammany candidate, and is against Tammany Hall and the Democratic Party. The Republican members of the Board of Aldermen have, therefore, insisted since the vacancy created by reason of the resignation of said Hagenmiller in June, 1912, that that vacancy should be filled by the election of a Republican.

IX. The Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen have at no time questioned the fact that Bryant Willard, deceased, was a Republican, and that the vacancy caused by his death, in the representation for the 21st Aldermanic District, must be filled by a member of the Republican Party, and have not questioned the fact that Oscar Igstaedter is a Republican, but the sole reason for the refusal of the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen to vote for said Igstaedter to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Bryant Willard, was as above set forth, because the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen have up to this time refused to concede that the vacancy caused by the resignation of said Hagenmiller, as above referred to, should be filled by a Democrat.

X. Your petitioner further alleges and states that until the vacancy caused by the death of Bryant Willard shall be filled, pursuant to the provisions of section 18 of the Charter, the people resident in the 21st Aldermanic District in the City of New York will be without representation in the Board of Aldermen, in violation of the provisions of section 18 of the Charter, which provides that "Any vacancy which may occur among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen shall be filled by election by a majority of all the members elected thereto, of a person who must be of the same political party as the member whose place has become vacant."

XI. That unless a writ of mandamus issue herein, directing the elected members of the Board of Aldermen to proceed forthwith to fill the vacancy caused by the death of said Bryant Willard as member of the Board of Aldermen for the 21st Aldermanic District, it will be impossible to fill such vacancy in accordance with the Statute. The total membership of the Board of Aldermen is seventy-three, of which a majority is thirty-seven. There are at present three vacancies, but it is held by the Board of Aldermen that to fill a vacancy it is necessary to have a majority of the total membership. Including Messrs. Devine and Shipley, who were elected as candidates of the Republican Party, the Republican Party has in all at this time, only thirty-six elected members of the Board of Aldermen, one less than a majority of the total membership of the Board of Aldermen. Alderman Devine was also a candidate of the Independence League Party, and has recently refused to co-operate with the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen, and has affiliated himself with the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen, so that excluding Devine, the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen including Shipley, have only thirty-five, which would in any event be one less than a majority of even the present membership of the Board of Aldermen, if it be held that only thirty-six were necessary to constitute a majority

At the time of the election of the said Hagenmiller he was an enrolled member of the Republican Party, having been enrolled as such on one of the registration days of 1910, which enrollment was for the year of 1911. It appears that on one of the days of registration in the year 1911, the said Hagenmiller enrolled for the year 1912 as a Democrat; he subsequently claimed, however, that this enrollment by him was a mistake, and that he had intended to enroll as a Republican. The fact is, however, that at the time of his nomination by the Republican Party in the year 1911, he was an enrolled member of that party for that year, and was elected as a candidate of the Republican Party, and not as a Democrat. Upon the organization of the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of January, 1912, the said Hagenmiller announced that he was opposed to the Democratic Party, generally known as Tammany Hall, had been elected as an anti-Tammany candidate, and is against Tammany Hall and the Democratic Party. The Republican members of the Board of Aldermen have, therefore, insisted since the vacancy created by reason of the resignation of said Hagenmiller in June, 1912, that that vacancy should be filled by the election of a Republican.

IX. The Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen have at no time questioned the fact that Percy L. Davis, resigned, was a Republican, and that the vacancy caused by his resignation, in the representation of the 31st Aldermanic District, must be filled by a member of the Republican Party, and have not questioned the fact that Jacob F. Keyser is a Republican, but the sole reason for the refusal of the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen to vote for said Keyser to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Percy L. Davis was, as above set forth, because the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen have up to this time refused to concede that the vacancy caused by the resignation of said Hagenmiller, as above referred to, should be filled by a Democrat.

X. Your petition further alleges and states that until the vacancy caused by the resignation of Percy L. Davis shall be filled, pursuant to the provisions of section 18 of the Charter, the people resident in the 31st Aldermanic District in the City of New York will be without representation in the Board of Aldermen, in violation of the provisions of section 18 of the Charter, which provides that "Any vacancy which may occur among the members elected to the Board of Aldermen shall be filled by election by a majority of all the members elected thereto, of a person who must be of the same political party as the member whose place has become vacant."

XI. That unless a writ of mandamus issue herein, directing the elected members of the Board of Aldermen to proceed forthwith to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of said Percy L. Davis as member of the Board of Aldermen for the 31st Aldermanic District, it will be impossible to fill such vacancy in accordance with the Statute. The total membership of the Board of Aldermen is seventy-three, of which a majority is thirty-seven. There are at present three vacancies, but it is held by the Board of Aldermen that to fill a vacancy it is necessary to have a majority of the total membership. Including Messrs. Devine and Shipley, who were elected as candidates of the Republican Party, the Republican Party has in all at this time, only thirty-six elected members of the Board of Aldermen, one less than a majority of the total membership of the Board of Aldermen. Alderman Devine was also a candidate of the Independence League Party, and has recently refused to co-operate with the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen, and has affiliated himself with the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen, so that excluding Devine, the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen, including Shipley, have only thirty-five, which would in any event be one less than a majority of even the present membership of the Board of Aldermen, if it be held that only thirty-six were necessary to constitute a majority of the membership as at present existing, for the purpose of filling a vacancy. The balance of the membership is made up of Aldermen representing the Democratic Party, and if the Democratic Aldermen be permitted to assert the position that they will not vote upon the question until the Republican members of the Board of Aldermen agree with them to do an illegal act, namely, the election of a Democrat to fill the vacancy of Hagenmiller, from the 37th Aldermanic District, the vacancy existing because of the resignation of Percy L. Davis will never be filled, and the People of the 31st Aldermanic District will be without representation.

XII. That no previous or other application has been made for the annexed order.

XIII. That an order to show cause is prayed for herein, because it is of the utmost importance that the questions involved in this proceeding be disposed of at the earliest possible date. The next meeting of the Board of Aldermen will be held on Tuesday, January 14, 1913, and the meeting following that will not be held for another week. It is important that the questions involved herein be disposed of before another week has elapsed.

Wherefore, your petitioner prays that a writ of mandamus issue out of and under the seal of this Court, directing the defendants, as the elected members of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, to proceed forthwith to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Percy L. Davis, one of the members elected to the Board of Aldermen from the 31st Aldermanic District of The City of New York, a Republican, by election by a majority of all of the members elected to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York of a person who shall be of the same political party as the said Percy L. Davis, namely, the Republican Party, and for such other and further relief as may be just and proper.

Your petitioner, Ralph Folks, respectfully shows:

I. I am a citizen of The City of New York, and an elected member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York.

II. At the General Election held in November, 1911, one John W. Hagenmiller was a candidate of the Republican Party for the office of Member of the Board of Aldermen for the 37th Aldermanic District of The City of New York. He was also nominated by the Independence League Party. The Democratic Party also had a candidate for the office of Member of the Board of Aldermen for the 37th Aldermanic District at said election. At the time that the said John W. Hagenmiller was placed in nomination by the Republican Party as its candidate for the Member of the Board of Aldermen for the 37th Aldermanic District, and voted for at the General Election held in November, 1911, the said Hagenmiller was an enrolled member of the Republican Party. He was enrolled as such member of the Republican Party on one of the registration days prior to the election in the year 1910, the said enrollment being for the year 1911. The said John W. Hagenmiller was elected as such candidate at the general election held in November, 1911, and subsequently qualified and continued to act as a member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, subsequent to the 1st day of January, 1912, until the time of his resignation, as hereinafter set forth. Upon the organization of the Board of Aldermen on the first Monday of January, 1912, the said Hagenmiller announced that he had been elected in opposition to the candidate of the Democratic Party, and that he had been elected as an anti-Tammany Hall candidate, and would therefore cooperate and vote with the other Republican Members of the Board of Aldermen as a Republican, and did so act and vote until the time of his resignation, as hereinafter set forth. Subsequent to the 1st of January, 1912, it was found that the said Hagenmiller, on one of the registration days in the year 1911, immediately preceding the general election held in November, 1911, had enrolled as a member of the Democratic Party. When this was discovered, inquiry was made of said Hagenmiller, and the said Hagenmiller subsequently stated, as I am informed and verily believe, that his enrollment as a Democrat for the year 1912 was a mistake due to the change in the position of the emblem on the enrollment blank.

III. Subsequently, on or about the month of June, 1912, the said John W. Hagenmiller resigned as a Member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York for the 37th Aldermanic District, and since that time the position of Member of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, for the 37th Aldermanic District, has been vacant, and the people of that district have been without representation. Subsequently, and on a number of occasions, I have offered resolutions at regular

meetings of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, placing in nomination one Charles Rathfelder, of 441 East 156th street, of The City of New York, to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of said John W. Hagenmiller as member of the Board of Aldermen for the 37th Aldermanic District. The said Charles Rathfelder is an enrolled member of the Republican Party.

IV. The entire membership of the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York is seventy-three. Under the Charter it was necessary to have at least 37 votes to elect a successor to fill a vacancy caused by the resignation of Hagenmiller. The Republican Party has at no time had, since the resignation of said Hagenmiller, more than thirty-six members of the Board of Aldermen, excluding Aldermen Devine, who, although elected as a candidate of the Republican Party, has deserted the Republican Party and has allied himself and cooperated with the Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen. The Democratic members of the Board of Aldermen have on every occasion, when a resolution has been offered to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Hagenmiller by the election of Rathfelder, refused to vote for Rathfelder upon the sole ground that Rathfelder was a Republican, and that the vacancy caused by the resignation of the said Hagenmiller must be filled by a member of the Democratic Party, the claim being that the said Hagenmiller was a Democrat because of his enrollment on one of the registration days of 1911, which enrollment, under the Election Law, was for the year 1912. There has, therefore, been this sharp issue and conflict between the Democratic and Republican members of the Board of Aldermen since the resignation of the said Hagenmiller.

V. I allege and state that the said Hagenmiller was elected as a representative and a member of the Republican Party, and that the vacancy caused by his resignation must be filled by a member of the same political party, namely, a member of the Republican Party. The Board of Aldermen will meet on Tuesday, January 14, 1913, but will not meet for another week thereafter. And it is important that the questions involved in this matter should be disposed of before the meeting of the Board of Aldermen to be held on the 21st of January.

Wherefore, Your petitioner prays that a writ of mandamus issue herein directed to the Members elected to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, and directing them to forthwith fill, by election by a majority of all the Members elected to the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, the vacancy caused by the resignation of John W. Hagenmiller as Member of the Board of Aldermen from the 37th Aldermanic District, of a person who must be of the same political party as the said John W. Bellevue and Allied Hospitals.

Synopsis of Minutes of Meeting Held December 17, 1912.

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals was held December 17, 1912.

Present—Dr. Brannan, the President, in the chair, and Messrs. Farley, O'Keefe, Paulding, Sachs and Stern, Trustees. Excused: Messrs. Drummond and Robbins.

The Minutes of the meeting of December 3 were approved.

Bills, amounting to \$15,132.17, were presented for approval; it was

Resolved, That they, having been duly examined by the Finance Committee, be forwarded to the Comptroller for payment.

Doctor George, O'Hanlon, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

The daily average census during November was: Bellevue Hospital, 1,046; Gouverneur, 155; Harlem, 179; Fordham, 138.

Dr. Huddleston requests permission to remove about 5,000 bedside cards from the files of Gouverneur Hospital to his office for a few days to compile certain statistics therefrom. The granting of this request would not be in accordance with the rules governing the control of records in the hospitals of this Department, and similar requests have in previous instances been denied.

At the School for Midwives the following pupils have completed their course of training, and authority is asked for the granting of the usual diploma: Mary A. Carney, Margaret Batka and Greta De Wald.

Requests are being received from various departments of the hospital for greens, trees, etc., for the decoration of the wards during the Christmas season.

The question of having the coat of arms of The City of New York placed upon the ambulances of this department was raised. Consideration of this matter is requested.

A revision of the salary schedules is asked for, no additional funds being necessary.

On separate motion, carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows:

The request for permission to remove the bedside cards from the files of Gouverneur Hospital was denied, and the Secretary was directed to inform Dr. Huddleston that every facility will be afforded him at the hospital to examine these cards and to compile such statistics as he may desire; it was

Resolved, To grant diplomas to the Graduating Midwives; it was

Resolved, To authorize the General Medical Superintendent to buy the necessary Christmas trees and greens for the decoration of the hospitals of the department;

The General Medical Superintendent was authorized to have the coat of arms of The City of New York placed in some suitable place on all new ambulances for the department; it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to approve the revision of the salary schedules recommended by the General Medical Superintendent.

The General Medical Superintendent presented lists of changes in the help at Bellevue Hospital for the three weeks ending November 23, November 30, and December 7, and they were approved.

Reports of Committees.

The Harlem Hospital Conference Committee recommended the appointment of Dr. Henry H. Ritter and Dr. Charles R. Hancock as Assistant Surgeons to Out-Patients. This report was approved and Dr. Ritter and Dr. Hancock appointed accordingly.

The Finance Committee had investigated the statement submitted at last meeting in regard to the estimated deficit for the year 1912, and that they had requested the issue of special revenue bonds to an amount not exceeding \$51,760.61 as follows:

The action of the Finance Committee was approved. The President reported that he had attended a hearing held by the Finance Committee of the Board of Aldermen in regard to this request, and that the Chairman of that Committee had suggested that the Board ascertain if any of the other City departments have unencumbered balances which could be transferred to the credit of this department in order to reduce this deficit. On motion, carried, the Secretary was directed to communicate with all the City departments in order to learn whether there are any unencumbered balances in the appropriations for 1912 which could be used for this purpose.

The Special Committee appointed to investigate the School for Hospital Attendants submitted a report, and recommended that the school be continued for the present, under the management of a male Superintendent, to be selected by the Board of Managers of the Bellevue Training School, with the approval of the Board of Trustees; and that, when the enrollment of pupils has increased sufficiently to permit, these Attendants be assigned to the wards of pavilions A and B as well as to the surgical wards. These recommendations were approved, and the matter of the suggested change in the management of the school was continued in the hands of the Committee.

Communications.

A communication, dated December 13, from R. F. Almirall, in regard to inspectors of steel work and cement in connection with the roof ward at Fordham Hospital, in accordance with the terms of the specifications, which provide that such experts shall be selected by the Trustees; it was

Resolved, On the recommendation of the Building Committee, to recommend the appointment of Frederic deP. Hone and Company as inspectors of steel, and Dr. Charles F. McKenna as inspector of cement.

A communication, dated December 5, from R. F. Almirall, transmitting sets of prints of the proposed extension of the hospital building and helps' quarters at Fordham Hospital at one-eighth-inch scale. These were referred to the Building Committee.

A communication, dated December 4, was presented from A. L. Geilich, transmitting assignment by the Century Gas and Electric Fixture Company of \$1,250 to Dora Pine. Consent was granted to this assignment, without guarantee, as to amount, and expressly subject to any claim, set-off, or equity, which The City of New York now has against the moieties covered by said assignment.

The Minutes of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital, held on December 2 were presented. The nomination of Dr. A. C. Freeman was referred to the Conference Committee.

The Minutes of the Medical Board of Gouverneur Hospital held on December 2 were presented. The applications for the place of Consulting Laryngologist were referred to the Conference Committee, and reappointments for the year 1913 were approved.

A communication was received from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a resolution adopted on November 27 transferring \$3,310 within the appropriations for 1912.
