

Resolved, That the following regulations governing the Tuberculin Testing of Cows producing Grade A Raw Milk, be and the same are hereby adopted, to take effect immediately:

1. Only such animals shall be admitted

the herd as are in good physical condition as s'nown by a thorough physical examination, accompanied by a test with a diagnostic injection of tuberculin, within a period of one (1) month previous to such admission. The test is to be carried out as prescribed in these regulations. A chart recording the result of the official test must be in the possession of this Department before the admission of any animal to the herd

2. Tuberculin tests shall be made as follows: In the case of any herd which is found, when tested in accordance with these regulations, to be free from tuberculosis, the next general test of the herd shall be made within twelve (12) months. Any herd in which one or more reactors shall have been found, shall be retested with tuberculin within six (6) months, and every reacting animal shall be excluded from herd. Tests shall be conducted as follows: During the ten (10) hours before injection, four (4) pre-injection temperatures shall be taken at intervals of three (3) hours. The first post-injection temperature shall be taken at later than six (6) hours of the injection.

not later than six (6) hours after injection: thereafter, temperature shall be taken at intervals of two (2) hours, continuing until not less than twenty-four (24) hours after injection.

3. If more than ten per cent. (10%) of the herd react to the tuberculin test, the entire herd shall be retested with tuberculin upon the state of the tuberculin test, the entire herd shall be retested with tuberculin upon the state of the tuberculin test, the entire herd (20%) days and each animal.

expiration of ninety (90) days and each animal so retested shall receive a double dose of tuber-

culin at this test.

4. A rise of 2° over the highest pre-injection temperature shall be considered a reaction, provided such rise of temperature cannot be shown to be due to some other cause. A rise of 11/2 Fahr. in which there are consecutive temperatures above the normal extending over three (3) or more intervals, shall be considered a suspicious reaction, and an animal having so reacted shall be removed from the herd. The in-terpretation of the "temperature curve" shall be left to the discretion of the veterinarian making the test subject to the approval of the Department of Health, provided, however, that such veterinarian shall be a legally licensed veterinarian whose tests are acceptable to the Department of Agriculture of the State of New York. A full report of the test shall be made on a chart approved by the Department of Health, which chart shall state the kind and quantity of tuberculin used in each test, the dates and hours at which temperatures were taken, a description of the animals tested, and the numbers of the tags attached to the same, and said report shall be duly signed by the veterinarian, submitted to the Department of Health, and by the Department of Health placed on file for inspection and

If the grantees and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the grantees shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested free-holders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the grantees; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquries and investigations, with out the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the grantees and their officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual compensation shall, in any event, be less than that required for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual compensation shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the annual compensation theretofore prevailing shall continue until the new rate shal be determined, and the grantees shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual compensation then determined over the previous annual compensation. Fifth—The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of any of the grantees, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corpora-tions or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the con-trary thereof in any wise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any

subsequent consent or consents.

Sirth—Should the grantees at any time fail to supply the service herein required as payment. for the privilege herein granted in an efficient manner satisfactory to the Board of Water Sup-ply, then the right herein granted shall cease and determine, and all sums paid or deposited with the City shall be and become the property of the

City.

Seventh—It is understood by the parties hereto any use of the aqueduct lands outside of the present limits of the City or by any and every condition upon which such lands were purchased or ac-quired. It is understood also that no rights of any kind whatsoever are herein granted to or in any of the aqueduct lands lying within the

present limits of the City.

Eighth—The transmission line hereby authorized shall be used only for the transmission of electrical current to and within the Counties of Westchester and Putnam of the State of New York and shall not be used as a portion of or in connection with a transmission line extending into any portion of the State of New York nor into any portion of any other state; provided that the Board may by resolution authorize the use of such transmission line for the transmission of electrical current from, to and within districts outside of said Counties of Westchester and Putnam, but the Board may, upon the adop-tion of such resolution, require such compensation for the additional right and prescribe such terms and conditions to govern the same as in its discretion it may deem proper.

Eleventh—The grantees shall comply with all laws, ordinances or rules of the local authorities having jurisdiction over the construction, maintenance or operation of the transmission line herein authorized.

Twelfth—The position of said transmission line upon said aqueduct lands shall be such as shall coincide with that designated and fixed by the Board of Water Supply. Before any work of construction or installation herein authorized shall be commenced, the grantees shall submit to the Board of Water Supply plans and specifi-cations which shall show and specify in detail the character of the structure or structures proposed by the grantees and the location of the same upon City land. Said plans and specifications must be approved by the Board of Water Supply before such work shall be commenced. The work of construction and installation shall e under the supervision of the Board of Water Supply and any rules or directions given by said Board shall be complied with by the grantees. If in the opinion of the Board of Water Supply it shall become necessary to change at any time during the term of this contract the location or the character of the construction or installation of said transmission line for the protection of life or property or if in the opinion of said Board it shall become necessary for the City to use during said term any part or all of the lands upon which the structures herein authorized shall be situated for any of the purposes for which said lands were acquired, then the grantees shall make at their own expense such changes in the character of the construction or installation or changes in the position of such

structures on said Aqueduct Lands as directed by the Board of Water Supply.

Thirteenth—All structures and appurtenances erected hereunder shall be kept in good and safe repair and in accordance with the instructions given by the Board of Water Supply.

Fourteenth-In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the grantees, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a pro-vision to the effect that the ducts, conduits, poles, towers, wires, cables, conductors, fixtures and all structures, constructed or in use by and all structures, constructed of in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Fifteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the grantees, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the grantees of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board, or the Board of Water Supply, acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the furnishing of service herein required for the privilege hereby granted, and the maintenance of the property in good and safe condition throughout the whole term of this contract; and in case of default in the performance by the greatest of such terms and formance by the grantees of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the mathat the right herein granted is subject to any terials to be furnished for the performance and every limitation imposed by law upon the thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board or Board of Water Supply, acting hereunder, the grantees shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation. If the grantees fail to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appear in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the grantees shall, upon ten (10) days' notice in writing, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at

TERMS AND CONDITIONS UNDER WHICH BUILDINGS. ETC., WILL BE SOLD FOR REMOVAL FROM CITY PROPERTY.

THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES THE BUILDINGS AND APPURTENANCES thereto will be sold to the highest bidder, who must pay cash or certified check, drawn to the order of the Comptroller of The City of New York, and must also give a certified check or cash in half the amount of the purchase price as security for the faithful performance of the terms and conditions of the sale. Where the amount of the purchase price does not equal or exceed the sum of \$50, the sum of \$50 shall be the amount of the security to be deposited. This security may at any time after the expiration of the contract period be applied by the City to the cost of completing any of the work required under the contract, but unfinished at the expira-

tion of the contract period.

The purchaser shall not lease, occupy, cause or permit the building or buildings, etc., pur-chased by him to be used or occupied for any purpose other than that of their speedy removal, nor shall he collect any rental or other revenue for the use of either the land or the buildings, etc., situated thereon. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the con-tract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof.
