## COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a Meeting Held in the Aldermanic Chamber, City Hall, at 11 o'Clock A. M., on Thursday, April 19, 1917.

Present at Roll Call—Frank L. Dowling, President, Board of Aldermen; Edmund D. Fisher, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Milo R. Malbie, Chamberlain; Francis P. Kenney, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

His Honor the Mayor arrived later—See note.

The minutes of the meeting held April 9, 1917, were approved as printed.

### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront in the Vicinity of Dyckman St., North River.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks transmitting for approval a new plan for the improvement of the waterfront in the vicinity of Dyckman st., North River, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law, April 10, 1917.

A public hearing being necessary the following resolution was offered for adoption.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby fix 11 o'clock in the forenoon, on Thursday, May 17, 1917, in Room 16, City Hall, Borough of Manhattan, as the time and place for a public hearing in the matter of the new plan for improvement of the waterfront in the vicinity of Dyckman Street, North River, Borough of Manhattan, made and adopted by the Commissioner of Docks in accordance with law April 10, 1917, and transmitted to this Board for approval.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

### Dock Department—Amendment to Resolution Recommending Rescindment of \$2,810.20 of Corporate Stock Authorized for the Purposes of Removal of Coenties Reef, East River.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

March 28, 1917.

#### To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On March 15, 1917, a resolution was passed recommending to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the rescinding of \$2,810.20 of the issue of corporate stock of The City of New York, authorized for the purpose of removing Coenties Reef, in the East River, for a depth of five feet, to a plane which will provide a depth of forty feet at mean low water. The resolution states that the balance remaining in the fund is \$233,189.86.

While this resolution was pending, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon your recommendation, rescinded \$99,967.84 from the above authorization. The balance remaining in the fund should therefore be \$123,221.96.

The attached resolution is offered to correct the figures. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the resolution adopted by said Board on February 4, 1916, as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 180 of the Greater New York Charter, and the recommendation of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by resolution adopted January 24, 1916, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby authorizes the Comptroller to issue corporate stock of The City of New York in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding two hundred and forty thousand dollars (\$240,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied by the Department of Docks and Ferries for the purpose of removing Coenties Reef, in the East River, for a depth of five feet, to a plane which will provide a depth of forty feet at mean low water; provided, however, that no obligation shall be incurred by contract or otherwise against this appropriation, except in accordance with law.

—be and the same is hereby amended to provide that the amount of corporate stock authorized shall read “two hundred and twenty-six thousand dollars (\$226,000)”; the amendment herein having the effect of rescinding \$14,000 of the corporate stock authorization for the fund “C.D.—43, Removing Coenties Reef.”

—be further amended to provide that the amount of corporate stock authorized shall be one hundred and twenty-six thousand and thirty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$126,032.16), instead of two hundred and twenty-six thousand dollars (\$226,000), thereby rescinding ninety-nine thousand nine hundred and sixty-seven dollars and eighty-four cents (\$99,967.84) of the authorization.

—be further amended to provide that the amount of corporate stock authorized shall be one hundred and twenty-three thousand two hundred and twenty-one dollars and ninety-six cents (\$123,221.96), instead of one hundred and twenty-six thousand and thirty-two dollars and sixteen cents (\$126,032.16), thereby rescinding two thousand eight hundred and ten dollars and twenty cents (\$2,810.20) of the authorization.

Which resolution was adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

**Street Cleaning Department—Lease for, of Premises at 426 Columbus Ave., Manhattan.**

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

April 16, 1917.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—The Acting Commissioner of the Department of Street Cleaning, in a communication to your Board under date of April 9, 1917, requests a lease of the store at 426 Columbus ave., Borough of Manhattan, for a period of three years from May 1, 1917, at an annual rental of \$1,200.

The premises in question consist of a store 95 feet deep, 10 feet wide in front and 22 feet in the rear, and is for use as a section station to take the place of the present station at 219, 221 and 223 W. 77th st., Manhattan, the lease of which expires on May 1, 1917, and is not to be renewed. The latter premises have also been used as a stable, and it is intended to transfer the horses and equipment located theret to other department stables.

The rental of the 77th Street stable is \$10,500 a year, and the proposed change will effect a saving in rent of \$9,300 a year.

The store at 426 Columbus Avenue has been leased for \$1,300 a year. For comparison, the southerly store, 10 feet by 60 feet deep, in the same building, is now rented at \$1,200 a year.

I therefore respectfully recommend, the rent being reasonable and just, that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution authorizing a lease of the northerly store premises at No. 426 Columbus ave., Borough of Manhattan, for use of the Department of Street Cleaning, for a period of three years from May 1, 1917, at an annual rental of \$1,200, payable quarterly at the end of each quarter; the lessors to put the plumbing in good condition, widen the front door of the demised premises, pay taxes, furnish heat and make outside repairs; the lessee to furnish light and lighting fixtures, pay for water used in the demised premises, make such inside repairs as it may deem necessary during occupancy, and keep the sidewalk in front of said premises clean and remove snow and ice therefrom. Lessors, John H. Feldscher and August Etzen, 461 Fort Washington ave., Manhattan. Respectfully,

**Report Showing the Condition of the Sinking Funds Maintained by the City of New York on Dec. 31, 1916.**

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following:

Department of Finance, The City of New York, April 2, 1917.

**To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, The City of New York:**  
Gentlemen—Under date of December 22, 1915, I submitted to your Board, for the first time, a detailed report showing the condition of the sinking funds maintained by The City of New York at December 31, 1914. A second report is now submitted for your information which shows the condition of said funds at December 31, 1916. It is the intention that similar reports shall hereafter be rendered annually.

The investigation of the sinking funds which developed the information above referred to was conducted in the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics of the Department of Finance for the purpose of determining the adequacy of the provisions made for the redemption of bonds payable from the sinking funds. It extended over a period of several years and resulted in establishing the fact that the sinking funds had been provided for so liberally that large surpluses in excess of all possible requirements had been accumulated. Portions of the surpluses were found to be applicable to meet current requirements of the sinking funds and were so applied in determining the amounts of instalments necessary for the years 1914 to 1917, inclusive. As a result the appropriations required for this purpose in the tax budgets of those years were materially reduced. Similar reductions will be possible in future years.

As a further result of the investigation referred to a permanent register, of the assets, liabilities and actuarial reserves required in connection with each sinking fund, has been installed in such form as to provide for its continuance from year to year. Therefore it will always be possible to ascertain the exact condition of the sinking funds with respect to the sufficiency of the assets to meet the reserves required and to determine the actual amount of the amortization instalments to be included in the annual tax budgets.

The future revenues to be received by the sinking funds have also been developed, in so far as the bonds now outstanding are concerned, and this information furnishes an efficient guide for the future investment of sinking fund assets, so that, at all times, the amount of cash needed for the redemption of maturing bonds may be known and proper provision made therefor in advance.

For the purpose of verifying the correctness of the figures herein presented, Mr. William H. Gould, actuary, has checked the intricate actuarial and other calculations involved, and his conclusions are stated in the following communication:

W. H. Gould, Actuary, 25 Church Street, New York, March 13, 1917.

**Hon. Wm. A. PREndercast, Comptroller, City of New York:**

Dear Sir—Several years ago following your request I came in in a consulting capacity to verify the calculations of the Sinking Fund requirements and holdings of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York. These calculations were carried on in connection with the Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics under Mr. Robert B. McIntyre, Supervising Statistician, and directly in connection with Mr. Wm. G. Lord the Statistician in his department assigned to this work.

I have reported to you from time to time as to the progress of these calculations and as to my verification in each year of the installment necessary to be inserted in the Budget for Sinking Fund purposes. Under your suggestion there was prepared in your department and submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund under date of December 22, 1915, a report showing the condition of the Sinking Funds as of December 31, 1914, and analyzing to their ultimate maturity the bonds then outstanding as obligations of The City of New York.

In a communication addressed to you at that time I verified these calculations. This statement has now been completed down to December 31, 1916, a further period of two years. I have again verified all the calculations involved in this report, and beg to state that I have found them to be correct, and that the same sound principles are followed as I previously reported. Schedule C—The outstanding bonds, redeemable from the sinking funds, the assets held and reserves required (including accrued interest), and the surplus of assets over reserves required December 31, 1916.

Schedule D—The amount of bonds maturing each year from 1917 to 1966, inclusive, which are payable from the sinking funds, as well as the amounts held by the public and the sinking funds, respectively; the total bonds outstanding December 31, 1916; the liquid assets held January 1, 1917; the cash to be received by each sinking fund for interest, amortization instalments and matured investments and the total cash to be received by all sinking funds, for each year, which will be available for the redemption of bonds held by the public.

Schedule E—The amount of cash which will flow into the sinking funds during the years 1917 to 1966, inclusive; the amount of bonds maturing each year to be redeemed from public holders, together with the excess of cash which will be available for financing the City's operations.

Schedule F—Bonds of the cities, towns, villages, counties, etc., consolidated into The City of New York, issued prior to January 1, 1898, and outstanding December 31, 1916, payable directly from taxation, showing the amounts held by the public and the sinking funds, respectively, arranged in chronological order of maturity.

Schedule G—Serial bonds (all of which are held by the public) issued subsequent to January 1, 1915, payable directly from taxation, arranged in chronological order of maturity.

Schedule H—Bonds outstanding December 31, 1916, payable from assessments, showing the amounts held by the public and the sinking funds, respectively, arranged in chronological order of maturity.

Schedule I—Bonds (all of which are held by the public) outstanding December 31, 1916, payable from water revenues, arranged in chronological order of maturity.

It will be noted by reference to the analysis of the \$153,820,226.01 of bonds shown

in section 3 of Schedule A, that, on December 31, 1916, each sinking fund, except that of Long Island City for fire bonds, held bonds payable from itself and also bonds payable from other sinking funds. From time to time a sinking fund may require additional cash for redemption of maturing bonds, necessitating the sale of some of its holdings to another sinking fund, but at all times there can be retained in the sinking funds sufficient amounts of liquid assets to provide for all purposes of redemption. From the information recently compiled and now available, a definite program may be prepared to afford a ready means of regulating the selection of bonds to be sold by one sinking fund to another, so that, in so far as possible, the bonds payable from a particular sinking fund will finally lodge among the assets of that fund.

The \$186,202,255.41 of assets, which includes accrued interest, held by the sinking funds at December 31, 1916, as shown in Schedule C, are classified as (1) liquid assets consisting of cash, corporate stock notes and special revenue bonds, all of which will be available in cash in the year 1917, (2) semi-liquid assets, consisting of bonds payable from direct taxation and assessment bonds, all of which will be redeemed in cash, the former at maturity (see Schedule F), and the latter at any time it may be deemed necessary, and (3) sinking fund bonds which will be cancelled at maturity and require no cash for redemption.

The \$153,820,226.01 of bonds shown in section 3 of Schedule A, subdivided according to the sinking funds from which they are redeemable, also appear in section 3 of Schedule B, subdivided according to the sinking funds by which they are held as assets.

The comparison of assets and reserves required shows that each sinking fund holds a surplus of assets over the reserves required, the total surplus amounting to \$11,266,987.64 at December 31, 1916. The Sinking Fund of The City of New York and the Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York, which may be considered as continuing or permanent sinking funds, are now practically on an even basis, the surpluses therein being negligible in amount. The surpluses existing in the remaining funds will be disposed of on the expiration of the funds or possibly at earlier dates.

The amounts of bonds outstanding December 31, 1916, payable from the sinking funds, is shown in Schedule D, with the amounts maturing each year from 1917 to 1966, inclusive, classified as to the amounts held by the public and by the sinking funds. The amounts of liquid assets held December 31, 1916, are also shown, together with the cash to be received by each sinking fund from interest, amortization installments and matured investments, as well as the total cash receipts of all sinking funds for each year, which will be available for the redemption of bonds held by the public.

Attention is here directed to the fact, shown in Schedule D, that of the sinking funds maintained by the City, only two, namely, the Sinking Fund of The City of New York and the Water Sinking Fund of The City of New York, will hereafter be charged with the redemption of further issues of bonds, as the others will expire by limitation when the bonds to the redemption of which they are now pledged are all matured and redeemed, the longest-lived being the Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn, which expires in the year 1938.

Schedule E, developed from Schedule D, shows by years, for the period from 1917 to 1966, inclusive, the cash to be received by the combined sinking funds, the amounts of bonds to be redeemed from the public, the difference between the cash receipts and redemptions, and the amounts of cash accumulations available for investment.

In this schedule the entire financial situation of the sinking funds is epitomized. It will be noted that the cash receipts exceed the cash requirements for redemption each year from 1917 to 1954 with but two exceptions, in 1929 and 1940, in which years the redemptions exceed the receipts by comparatively small amounts. This naturally results in a large accumulation of moneys available for investment, which reaches its maximum in the year 1953, when it amounts to \$509,421,721.10, but thereafter it is rapidly reduced until in 1966 the moneys are exhausted and the sinking funds ter-

minated. This, for the purposes of the computation, is based on the assumption that no further sinking fund bonds will be issued. We know that more such bonds will be issued. In that case the life of the funds would be extended to include the bonds maturing after the year 1966. The cash receipts included herein consist of the liquid assets (\$13,120,051.59), held at December 31, 1916, which will become cash in 1917, together with the annual amortization installments and the 3 per cent. annual interest required to be earned on the accumulations of the funds; these items represent cash which must be paid into the funds.

In reviewing the situation of the sinking funds, as developed by the accompanying schedules, we may dismiss from further consideration any question regarding the redemption of the bonds payable from and held by the sinking funds, amounting to \$153,820,226.01 on December 31, 1916, inasmuch as they constitute both assets and liabilities of the funds and, therefore, at maturity will simply call for cancellation in both relations.

The sinking fund accumulations will provide, in increasing measure, for financing the current transactions of the city by investment in revenue bonds, special revenue bonds, assessment bonds or corporate stock notes. Such a method of financing would always retain as liquid assets the full amount needed for redemption in any year, as the information contained in statement E will enable the financial officers of the city to keep in close touch with the sinking fund situation and fully advised of the requirements for cash to be used for redemption purposes.

Among the assets of the sinking funds at December 31, 1916, were included assessment bonds to the amount of \$14,256,319.37 (see Schedule B), which in these calculations have not been treated as liquid assets, although they might be made liquid at any time by their redemption from the assessment funds out of which they are redeemable. At present it would be necessary to sell an equivalent amount of assessment bonds to the public before the assessment funds would have enough cash to redeem the assessment bonds held by the sinking funds. In the year 1966, when, it is assumed, all of these sinking funds will expire, these bonds would necessarily have to be converted into cash to provide for the redemption of the bonds maturing in that year and remaining in the hands of public holders. The mortgages held by the Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn, as also shown in Schedule B, are herein treated in the same manner as the Assessment bonds.

At a meeting of the Sinking Fund Commission held on December 17, 1913, I submitted a report, dated December 10, 1913, in which was presented a detailed explanation of the condition of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt, commonly known as Sinking Fund No. 1. This report was supplemented by a resolution providing for the setting aside of \$79,999,066.26 out of the assets held by said sinking fund on December 31, 1912, which amount had been ascertained by actuarial examination to be the amount required, at that date, to provide for the redemption of the bonds then outstanding and payable from Sinking Fund No. 1. The resolutions were duly adopted and the sinking fund referred to has since been administered in accordance therewith.

The Sinking Fund of the City of Brooklyn is supported by amortization installments included in the annual tax budgets of the city, and the revenues derived from the investment thereof. Owing to the fact that, for many years, installments considerably larger in amount than were necessary, were paid into this fund, there existed on December 31, 1916, a surplus of assets over the amount required as a reserve for redemption, amounting to \$4,111,692.68. In the preceding calculations this surplus has been treated as continuing and accumulating during the future life of this fund and as being disposed of in the year 1938, when the last of its obligations will mature, by transfer to the Sinking Fund of The City of New York, as provided in section 206 of the Greater New York Charter.

## Sale of Lease of Premises Known as 58 Lawrence St., Manhattan.

(Not on the calendar—Brought up by unanimous consent.)

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

## To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—On March 1, 1917, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund author-

ized a sale at public auction of the lease of premises known as No. 58 Lawrence st., Borough of Manhattan, for a period of five years, from April 1, 1917, at an upset rental of \$720 per annum.

The sale of this lease was held on March 23, 1917, but no bids were received therefor. I am now in receipt of an offer for a lease of these premises for a period of five years from August 1, 1917, with the privilege of renewal for an additional period of five years.

I therefore respectfully recommend that the resolution above mentioned be rescinded, and that the attached resolution be adopted in place thereof. Respectfully,

**MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.**

**Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York, Held Wednesday, March 7, 1917, at 10.30 A. M.**

Present: Dr. Henry Moskowitz, President, Darwin R. James, Jr., and Alexander Keogh, Commissioners. The President presided.

A

Grade 2 shall be eligible for promotion to the next higher grade."

Burdette G. Lewis, Commissioner of Correction, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the Municipal Civil Service Classification, by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the following: "Mason (Sewer Repair)." Charles E. Gregory, Chief Engineer Bureau of Sewers, Manhattan, and William Klein, General Inspector Bureau of Sewers, Manhattan, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. Thomas C. Murray, Acting Chief Examiner, appeared in opposition. Edward F. Cadley, Chief Clerk, office of the President, Borough of Brooklyn, also addressed the Commission in the matter. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meetings held Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 were approved.

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Rule XV. (Promotion) of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is amended by changing Clauses 21 and 22 to read as follows:

"21. To provide a basis for rating previous service each department shall submit to the Commission every four months, on such dates as the Commission shall direct, a report regarding the comparative efficiency and conduct of every person regularly and permanently employed in such department, in a position in the competitive class (except persons employed in the uniformed forces of the Police and Fire Departments). Such reports shall be known as 'service records' and shall be made on forms prescribed by the Commission, and the entries thereon shall be made with reference to such factors and in such terms as the Commission may, by resolution duly recorded in its minutes, direct.

"22. Service records shall be based upon reports submitted by the superior officers most closely in touch with the work of the employee rated, and shall be prepared in each department by such superior officers or employees of the department and such committees or boards therein as may be designated by the appointing officer of such department for that purpose, subject to confirmation by the Commission, and pursuant to such general plan as the Commission may prescribe. A duly authorized representative of the Commission shall be a member without vote of every committee or board which may be established in any department for the purpose of preparing or reviewing service records. Upon submission of the service records of a department to the Commission, the Commission shall cause an examination to be made thereof and in the course of such examination shall have power to examine the original records of the department. The Commission shall have power to change or amend any service record submitted to it where it shall find that the statements or recommendations made therein are not warranted, or that the records do not contain a true and fair account of the comparative efficiency of the several employees whose names appear therein; but no record shall be changed or amended by the Commission unless due notice has been given to the department that such change is proposed and an opportunity afforded the department to appear before the Commission in regard thereto. Where a change is made the reason therefor shall be given in writing to the department concerned. No service record shall be used as a basis for rating previous service in a promotion examination until approved by the Commission. Every officer or employee shall have the right, pursuant to such regulations as may be adopted by the Commission, to inspect his own service record prior to its submission to the Commission, and to apply to the department for a revision thereof, and to inspect his own service record after its submission to the Commission and to apply to the Commission for a revision thereof. The Commission shall have power to provide for the right of inspection by each employee of the service records of other employees in his department, holding the same title or performing similar work. For periods of service prior to the establishment of service records, or in the absence of such records, rating for previous service shall be based upon such certification as the Commission may require."

On motion, it was

Resolved, That Rule XV. (Promotion) of the Rules of the Municipal Civil Service Commission be and the same hereby is amended by changing Clause 12 to read as follows:

"12. Part IX.—The Prison Service—Persons who shall have served with fidelity for not less than five years in Grade 1 shall be eligible for examination for promotion to Grade 2. Persons who shall have served at least two years in Grade 2 shall be eligible for promotion to the next higher grade."

On motion, the application of the President of the Borough of Manhattan that the classification be amended by including in the Labor Class, Part II, the title "Mason (Sewer Repair)" was denied and the Secretary was instructed to inform him that it was the opinion of the Commission that the work proposed to be performed under that title was properly covered by the title "Foreman," and to request that steps be taken at once to secure provision for the employment of Foremen in the Bureau of Sewers.




