

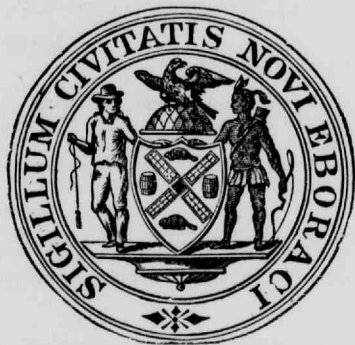

APPROVED PAPERS.

Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the Week ending January 3, 1880.

Resolved, That the Board of Health be requested to compel the persons occupying the vacant lots Nos. 136 and 138 Mulberry street, used as a storage yard for building sand, to properly inclose and roof the same, to the end that the adjoining property may be relieved of an intolerable nuisance.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 16, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That this Common Council, as provided in section 49, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, authorize and approve of the action taken by the Board of Police of the Police Department of the City of New York, in the location of a station-house for the police force of the Second Precinct at the High Bridge, on the easterly side of the Harlem river.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That the Comptroller be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw a warrant in favor of Michael Harrington, messenger of the Special Committee on apportioning the county into new assembly districts, for the sum of fourteen dollars and seventy cents, in full for bill annexed, and charge the amount to the appropriation for "City Contingencies."

Resolved, That two lamp-posts, with boulevard lamps thereon, be erected and lamps lighted on southerly side of Washington place, about sixty feet easterly of University place, in front of entrance to the Asbury M. E. Church, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to C. A. Cole to place and keep two ornamental lamp-posts and lamps in front of his premises, No. 1323 Broadway, such posts not to exceed the dimensions prescribed by ordinance or resolution of the Common Council, the work to be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Albert Crane to regulate, grade, set curb and gutter, and flag a space four feet wide through the centre of the sidewalks in One Hundredth street, from the Second avenue to the Harlem river, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction and supervision of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Resolved, That two boulevard lamps be substituted for the two street-lamps now in front of the Third avenue entrance of the building now occupied by the Department of Public Charities and Correction, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and boulevard lamps lighted in One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, from Fifth to Eighth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That lamp-posts be erected and street-lamps lighted in One Hundred and Twenty-seventh street, between Seventh and Eighth avenues, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That Croton mains be laid in One Hundred and Ninth and One Hundred and Tenth streets, from the Boulevard to Tenth avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps lighted in Southern Boulevard, from the present termination of street-lamps on said Boulevard to Westchester avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 29, 1879.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and boulevard lamps lighted in Madison avenue, from One Hundred and Tenth street to One Hundred and Fifteenth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That Croton water-pipes be laid in Tenth avenue, from Eighty-first street to connect with the main at Eighty-third street, as provided in chapter 381, Laws of 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That a lamp-post be erected, and a street-lamp placed and lighted thereon, in Teller place, opposite the rear entrance of the Melrose station of the Harlem Railroad Co. (corner of Fourth avenue and Teller place), under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the block bounded by Seventy-second street, the Boulevard, Seventy-third street, and Tenth avenue, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Stephen D. Hatch, architect, to erect a storm-door in front of the Boreel Building, 115 Broadway, as shown on the accompanying diagram, at his own expense; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, December 23, 1879.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Bernheimer & Schmid to erect a platform scale in front of premises known as the Lion Brewery, in Ninth avenue, between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Ninth streets, as shown in the annexed diagram, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Approved by the Mayor, December 31, 1879.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to M. Adolph Bernheimer to erect a bay-window, with balcony over the same, as shown in the annexed diagram, on premises known as No. 7 East Fifty-seventh street, the consent of the adjoining property-owners having been obtained, and is hereto annexed, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James Kehoe to erect a bay-window on the basement and first story of the premises on the northeast corner of One Hundred and Fourteenth street and First avenue, as shown in the accompanying diagram, the applicant being the owner of the next adjoining fifty feet north, and the consent of the owner of the next adjoining fifty feet south having been obtained, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That permission be and is hereby granted to the Chambers Street Cross-town Railroad Company (a company organized under the general railroad laws of the State of New York, passed April the 2d, 1850, and the several amendments thereto), to construct, maintain, operate, and use a railroad for passengers or freight, with a single or double track of iron or steel rail, with turnouts, sidings, switches, and other necessary appurtenances for the operating a horse railroad, commencing at the foot of Roosevelt street, thence through, upon, and along South street with double tracks to James slip; thence through, upon, and along James slip with double tracks to New Chambers street; thence through, upon, and along New Chambers street to and across Chatham street with double tracks to Chambers street; thence through, upon, and along Chambers street with a single track to West street; thence through, upon, and along West street, with a single track to Duane street; thence through, upon, and along Duane street with a single track to connect with double tracks at Chatham street and New Chambers street. Also from their tracks at Roosevelt street and South street, through, upon, and along Roosevelt street with a single track to connect with double tracks at New Chambers street, in the City of New York.

Provided, That not more than five cents shall be charged for any one passenger; and also, that said Chambers street Cross-town Railroad Company shall, at their own expense, keep in repair and good order the space within and between their tracks.

And in consideration of the permission hereby granted, the said company shall annually, on the first day of November of each year, pay into the treasury of the City of New York five per cent. of

the gross receipts of said road, and the amount of said gross receipts shall be determined by the sworn statement of the president and treasurer of said company, subject to the inspection of the books of said company by the Comptroller of the City of New York.

In Board of Aldermen, December 31, 1879, taken up and considered, as provided in section 13, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, and adopted, notwithstanding the objections of his Honor the Mayor, three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

Resolved, That Thomas Pearson be and is hereby reappointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York.

AN ORDINANCE to amend section 6 of an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled 'Of pawnbrokers, dealers in second-hand articles, and keepers of junk shops, relating particularly to pawnbrokers,'" passed February 24, 1875. The Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. Section 6 of the above-entitled ordinance is hereby amended and shall read as follows:

§ 6. The said book shall at all reasonable times be open to the inspection of the Mayor, all Judges of Criminal Courts, the Aldermen, Superintendent of Police, Police Inspectors, Captains of Police, and Police Justices of the City of New York, or any or either of them, or of any policeman who shall be duly authorized in writing for that purpose by any or either of them, and who shall exhibit such written authority to such pawnbroker, loanbroker, or keeper of a loan office.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolved, That the attention of his Honor the Mayor and the Commissioners of Police are hereby respectively called to the provisions of an ordinance which became adopted February 26, 1875, entitled "An ordinance to regulate the use of snow-ploughs and sweeping-machines by railroad companies and others in the City of New York," and they are hereby respectfully, yet earnestly, requested to cause the provisions of the said ordinance to be rigidly enforced.

Section 3 of said ordinance is as follows: "No such permit, or renewal thereof, shall be granted unless upon the express condition and agreement, to be assented to on the part of the company, proprietor, or corporation applying for such permit or renewal, that in case of any fall of snow so deep that the throwing up of the snow by any such snow-plough or machine will render the highway unsafe for travel, or make inconvenient the approach to the curb-stone, then, within twenty-four hours after any such fall of snow, and after the use of such snow-plough or machine, such company, proprietor, or corporation shall and will, at his or at their own expense, remove and carry away the snow thrown up by such plough or machine, and shall and will reduce the snow upon the highway adjacent to their tracks or lines to such level as will make convenient for all vehicles the approach to the curb-stone, and render the whole width of the roadway safe for travel; and that such snow-plough, sweeping-machine, or other instrument be so constructed as not to throw any snow or slush on the walks or buildings, under a penalty of ten dollars for every house, or sidewalk in front thereof, upon which such snow or slush shall be thrown."

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

The Comptroller presented the following communication:

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

In pursuance of the provisions of section 8 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the Comptroller hereby certifies to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the sum of sixty-three thousand two hundred and twelve dollars and thirteen cents is the sum to be included in the annual estimate for the year 1880, which, with the sum to be included in the annual estimate each year thereafter, is sufficient, with the accumulation of interest thereon, to meet and discharge the amount of the bonds and stocks payable from taxation, other than revenue bonds, issued after the third day of June, 1878, the date of the passage of said act, "by the time they shall be payable," as therein provided, and as shown by a statement of the same herewith submitted.

FINANCE DEPARTMENT, COMPTROLLER'S OFFICE,
December 30, 1879.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Upon examination of the claim of Walter R. Marvin and Willis B. Marvin against the city for rent of premises at No. 262 Broadway, owned by them and occupied by the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes, from the 9th day of September, 1872, to the 1st day of May, 1874, as provided by chapter 498, Laws of 1879, I find, and hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the amount due to be the sum \$2,420.20, which amount is to be appropriated and raised by tax in 1880, to be applied to the payment of said claim.

The Board proceeded to consider the Final Estimate for 1880.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$16,800 be allowed under the title "Claims payable under special Acts of the Legislature," to meet the claim of John Hogan, under chapter 495, Laws of 1879, subject to investigation and adjustment by the Comptroller. Also, the sum of \$2,420.20, to meet the claim of Walter R. Marvin and Willis B. Marvin, under chapter 498, Laws of 1879.

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$1,563.63 be allowed under title of "Claim of estate of William Walsh, formerly County Clerk." Amount appropriated to meet the claim of Rev. P. J. Martin, executor of estate of William Walsh, against the city, subject to investigation and adjustment by the Comptroller.

Which was agreed to.

The Board took up the Estimate of the Department of Public Works for consideration.

The Chairman moved that the items "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance," and "Strengthening Croton Aqueduct," be consolidated under the head of "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance, and Strengthening."

Which was agreed to.

The various items were unanimously agreed to, except as follows, viz.:

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$4,000 be allowed for "Removing obstructions in streets and avenues."

The Comptroller moved to amend, by substituting the sum of \$3,000.

The amendment was agreed to.

The question was then taken on the original proposition, as amended.

Which was agreed to.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$91,000 be allowed for "Repairing and Renewal of Pipes, Stop-cocks, etc."

Which was lost, by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The President of the Board of Aldermen then moved that the sum of \$81,000 be allowed for the said purpose.

Which was lost, by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The President of the Board of Aldermen then moved that the sum of \$75,000 be allowed for the said purpose.

Which was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor—1.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$60,000 be allowed for "Sewers—Repairing and Cleaning."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor—1.

Negative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments then moved that the sum of \$53,200 be allowed for the said purpose.

Which was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor—1.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$5,000 be allowed for "Street Improvements, for Surveying, Monumenting, and Numbering Streets."

The Comptroller moved to amend by substituting the sum of \$2,500.

The amendment was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

Negative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

The President of the Board of Aldermen then moved that the sum of \$3,000 be allowed for the said purpose.

Which was agreed to by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

Negative—The Mayor—1.

The Board then took up the estimate for the Department of Public Parks for consideration.

The Comptroller moved that the item "Maintenance and Government of Parks and Places—For Salaries," be inserted to read the same as last year.

The Chairman moved to amend by striking out the words "and also excepting the Superintendent and Engineer in Charge of Public Places, Roads, Avenues and Bridges, Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards."

The amendment was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor—1.

Negative—The Comptroller, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—3.

The question was then taken on the original proposition.

Which was agreed to.

The Chairman moved that the item "Maintenance Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards" be inserted as follows:

"For the Maintenance and Government of Public Places, Roads, and Avenues in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, including Supplies and Wages of Foremen, Mechanics, Laborers, Carts and Teams, and all persons employed in the work."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$15,000 be allowed for "Laying New and Repairing Old Walks in City Parks."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$20,000 be allowed for "Laying New and Repairing Old Walks in Central Park."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$20,000 be allowed for "Laying New and Repairing Old Walks in City Parks."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$25,000 be allowed for "Laying New and repairing Old Walks in Central Park."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Board then took up the Estimate for the Department of Buildings for consideration.

The Chairman moved that the sum of \$50,000 be allowed for "Salaries and Contingencies—Department of Buildings."

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved that the sum of \$71,500 be allowed for the purpose.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

Negative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

The estimate was then laid over, and upon being taken up, the Comptroller moved that the sum of \$71,500 be allowed for the purpose.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

The Honorable Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Police, held this day, it was

Resolved, That the resolution of the Board of Police, passed December 19, 1879, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer the sum of \$360.52 from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1878, entitled "Police Fund," to the appropriation for the year 1879, entitled "Contingent Expenses," be and is hereby rescinded, and in place thereof, be it

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be requested to transfer the sum of \$360.52 from the appropriation made to the Police Department for the year 1878, entitled "Police Fund—Salaries of Captains," which is in excess of the amount required for the purposes and objects thereof, to the appropriation made to the same Department for the year 1879, entitled "Contingent Expenses," which is insufficient to enable the Department to pay Elihu Root the relators' costs in cases of Geo. The President of the Board of Aldermen moved that the sum of \$400,000 be allowed for the said purpose.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor and the President of the Board of Aldermen—2.

Negative—The Comptroller and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—2.

The Chairman then moved that the sum of \$350,000 be allowed for the purpose.

Which was lost by the following vote, viz.:

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$300,000 be allowed for the purpose.

The Comptroller moved that the sum of \$296.50 be allowed for deficiency in amount for compensation of extra stenographers in Superior Court.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments moved that the sum of \$3,400,000 be allowed for the Board of Education.

Department of Police—Salaries of Clerk, Deputies, Stenographers, etc., increased from \$40,000 to \$60,000.

Fire Department—Repair Shop Pay-roll, increased from \$45,000 to \$50,000.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree to overrule the action of the Board of Aldermen on the following items:

Fire Department—Bureau of Chief of Department Pay-roll, increased from \$32,700 to \$37,700.

Common Council—Salaries of Clerks and Officers of the Board of Aldermen, increased from \$16,200 to \$18,000.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz.:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following preamble, resolution, and Final Estimate for the support of the City Government for the year 1880:

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment have considered the objections to, and rectifications of, the Provisional Estimate made by said Board on the 31st day of October, 1879, of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880); in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, which objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate made by the Board of Aldermen, were transmitted by the Clerk of said Board, under date of November 25, 1879, and presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1879; therefore

Resolved, That after such consideration of the said objections to, and rectifications of, said Provisional Estimate, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment does hereby make this a

FINAL ESTIMATE

of the amount required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each Department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, the year eighteen hundred and eighty (1880), in which is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the said city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to be raised by tax to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable during the said year; also the amount to be raised by tax annually, which will be sufficient, with the accumulations of interest thereon, to pay the bonds and stocks, payable from taxation, issued after June 3, 1878, pursuant to chapter 383, Laws of 1878; and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York, in said year, as follows:

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the meeting held December 31, 1879, was dispensed with.

The Comptroller offered for adoption the following preamble and resolution, giving the reasons for the action of the Board on the objections to and rectifications of the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, made by the Board of Aldermen.

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen, at a meeting held on November 24, 1879, made certain "objections to and rectifications of" the Provisional Estimate for the year 1880, which were presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on November 26, 1879; and,

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment duly considered such objections and rectifications, as provided by section 112 of the Laws of 1873; and,

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in making the Final Estimate for the year 1880, at a meeting held on December 31, 1879, overruled the objections and rectifications made by the Board of Aldermen in some cases, and agreed to and adopted them in other cases; therefore

Resolved, That "the reasons" for such action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in regard to each item, are as follows:

1. The increase of the appropriation made to the Police Department, for "Salaries of Clerks, Deputies, Stenographers, etc.," from \$40,000 to \$60,000, was agreed to, because that amount was believed to be necessary to pay the salaries of all the employees required by the Board of Police, other than the uniformed force, and the employees in the Street Cleaning Bureau.

2. The increase of the appropriation made to the Fire Department, for the "Repair Shop Pay-roll," from \$45,000 to \$50,000, was approved and allowed, for the reason that the increased amount was believed to be necessary to pay the force of mechanics and others required in the Repair Shops of the Fire Department in 1880.

3. The increase of the appropriation made to the Fire Department, for the "Bureau of Chief of Department, Pay-roll," from \$32,700 to \$37,700, was overruled, because the reasons given by the Commissioners of the Fire Department for the proposed appointment of two additional Chiefs of Battalion at salaries of \$2,500 each per annum, did not satisfy the Board of Apportionment that their appointment was necessary in the interest of the public service.

4. The increase of the appropriation made for the "Salaries of Clerks and Officers of the Board of Aldermen," from \$16,200 to \$18,000, was overruled, because the amount allowed for the purpose in the Provisional Estimate was deemed sufficient.

The Chairman put the question whether the Board would agree with said preamble and resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote, viz:

Affirmative—The Mayor of the City of New York (Chairman), the Comptroller of the City of New York, the President of the Board of Aldermen, and the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

The President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments presented a bill of Vanderpoel, Green & Cumming, and William P. Prentice, for services in the matter of The People vs. The Board of Health.
