BOARDS OF LOCAL IMPROVEMENTS.

TWENTY-FIRST AND TWENTY-SECOND DISTRICTS, BOROUGH OF THE BRONX.

Minutes of Seventh Meeting of the Local Boards of the Twenty-first and Twenty-second Districts of the Borough of The Bronx.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen, the members of the Local Board, Twenty-first District, met at 2 P. M., March 10, 1898, at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, Municipal Building, Crotona Park.

Present—President Haffen, Councilman Murray, Alderman Geiger, Councilman Hottenroth and Alderman McGrath.

The minutes of the meeting of March 3 last were read and adopted.

HEARINGS.

One Hundred and Eighty-second Street, Sewer, etc., from Existing Sewer in Jerome Avenue to Aqueduct Avenue.

The petition of James E. Hussey, of No. 1180 Jackson avenue, and others, was read. On the representations made and in view of the fact that plans had been perfected for this sewer by the former Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, it was, by Alderman Geiger,

Resolved, That the said work be recommended to the Board of Public Improvements.

Adopted.

Bensonia Cemetery.

Messrs Welch & Daniels, counsel, representing the Parshall and Elton Estates, advocated the acquisition of the land included within this cemetery for a public park and playground.

A resolution of the North Side Board of Trade was read, as follows:

Resolved, That the North Side Board of Trade respectfully but urgently recommend to the municipal authorities of New York City the advisability and necessity of taking immediate steps for the laying out, acquisition and condemnation of "Bensonia Cemetery" as a public park and playground.

Mr. Welch, of counsel, read communications from Park Commissioners Clausen and Moebus, Senator Charles L. Guy, Assemblyman Richard H. Mitchell, Police Captain Timothy J. Creeden, Tax Payers' Alliance of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, Local Improvement Association of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, and from other property owners favoring the proposition.

Mr. Welch stated that large property interests in the immediate neighborhood were in accord also with the project and that the owners of the property involved were willing to make concessions to the City on purchase price. The question as to whether the cost should be paid for by the City or by the property deemed to be benefited was developed incidentally and President Haffen announced that he was in favor of the project if the cost were to be borne by the City. He added that under no circumstances would he favor it were the property owners to be assessed. Mr. Welch stated that that question might be eliminated as he had not raised it. Councilman Hottenroth said that it was a question that required serious consideration. President Haffen repeated that under no circumstance would he favor a recommendation for the purchase of the land if it were to be paid for by assessment. He thought that if this cemetery was a public nuisance that the City should pay the cost of abating it. It was suggested that counsel submit a brief or memorandum and the subject was then laid over.

Potter Place (Two Hundred and Fourth Street) Sewer, to Connect with Moshulu Parkway Sewer.

Petition of Bedford Park Taxpayers' Association, dated February 20 last, was read, requesting that a sewer be built in Potter place (Two Hundred and Fourth street) to connect with either Jerome avenue or Moshulu Parkway sewers.

On motion of Alderman McGrath, it was

Resolved, That this work be recommended to the Board of Public Improvements.

Adopted.

Webster Avenue, Change of Grade, North of Two Hundred and Thirty-third Street.

Communication of Caleb B. Knevals of February 4 last, representing Woodlawn Cemetery and the Associated Land Company, favoring a change of grade of Webster avenue, north of Two Hundred and Thirty-third street.

Engineer J. A. Doolittle, representing the same parties, appeared in favor of the above petition. The proposed change was shown on maps presented by Engineer Doolittle, and there being no opposition, on motion of Councilman Hottenroth, it was

Resolved, That this Board recommend the change of grade as petitioned for, if deemed advisable after report of the Chief Topographical Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements.

Petition of Max P. Wartenberg, W. A. Haight and others, was presented, and, on motion of Councilman Murray, it was

Boston Road, Gas-mains, Between Vyse Avenue and Lillian Place.

Secretary read a communication from Walter E. Goodwin, Esq., President Board of Trustees of the Pilgrim Baptist Church, Boston road and Vyse avenue, dated March 9, 1898, as follows:

MARCH 9, 1898.

Hon. HENRY GEIGER, Alderman:

DEAR SIR—I am instructed by the Board of Trustees of the Pilgrim Baptist Church, Boston road and Vyse avenue, West Farms, to apply through you to the Board of Local improvement for relief in the following case:

Two years ago the contractor in charge of the work of paving Boston road with Belgian blocks, found it necessary to remove the gas-pipes from the street in front of the church property, thereby cutting off the supply of gas from the church. The pipes were within ten or twelve inches of the surface.

Upon the completion of the work of paving application was made to the Northern Gas Company, who owned the pipes, to replace the same or to supply the church with gas by means of some other connection with their mains. The company refused, giving as their reason that the church did not burn enough gas to make it pay. This request has been renewed several times since then, and always met with the same response.

All this time the gas fixtures in the church have been forced useless. The congregation have been forced to worship by the light of kerosene lamps, and the evening services have been carried on at a great disadvantage.

Earnest efforts have been made by the church to secure their rights in the matter, but without success. The gas company has been reimbursed by the contractor for the damage arising from the removal of its mains. Will you not take steps to see that the gas mains are again put down in Boston road between Vyse avenue and Lillian place and that the company does its duty in furnishing the church again with the pipe service that was taken from it?

Van Doren, attorney, were presented by the Comptroller, having been received from the Board of Assessors on December 6, 1897.

Mr. Thayer, Mr. Shaw and Mr. Deering, attorneys, stated that they had no further objections to make to the assessment.

No others appearing after notice, on motion, the objections were overruled, and the assessment was confirmed, all the members voting in the affirmative.
