President York submits the following rules and regulations, and moves their adoption:

The Police Board hereby adopts the following regulations and restrictions for the government of buildings, gardens, grounds, concert rooms or other places or rooms within The City of New York, in which exhibitions or performances are given, and which are licensed by the Police Board of The City of New York.

I.—Concert rooms or places, whether in building, garden, grounds or other places, licensed as concert halls or concert rooms, or places in which concerts may be given, shall be closed at 12 midnight, and shall not again be opened for public purpose before 5 o'clock in the morning.

II.—It shall not be lawful to exhibit on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room or other rooms or places licensed by the Police Board, any interlude, tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, play, farce, negro minstrelsy, dancing of any kind, or any entertainment of the stage, or any part or parts therein, or any equestrian circus, or dramatic performance, or any performance of jugglers, acrobats or rope dancing.

III.—It shall not be lawful to sell, deliver or give away, or cause or permit or procure to be sold, delivered or given away, any liquors, in any room, building, garden, grounds, concert room or other place or room licensed by the Police Board, between the hours of 12 midnight on Saturday and 5 o'clock in the forenoon on Monday. The term liquor, as used, includes and means any distilled or rectified spirits, wines, fermented and malted liquors.

IV.—It shall not be lawful to employ or to permit the attendance of any female to wait upon or attend, in any manner, or to furnish refreshments to the audience or spectators, or any of them, at any of the exhibitions or performances in any building, room or other place which is licensed by the Police Board. Nor shall it be lawful for the performers in any concert room or other place licensed by the Police Board to mix with the audience or spectators at any entertainment or exhibition in which such performers shall take part.

V.—It shall not be lawful to admit to any exhibition held under authority of a license granted by the Police Board any minor under the age of fourteen years, unless such minor is accompanied by and is in the care of some adult.

VI.—A violation of any of the foregoing rules, regulations and restrictions, shall operate and cause an immediate annulment of any license granted by the Police Board; and the Commanding Officer of the precinct in which the place or places so licensed are situated, and every other member of the Police Force are authorized, empowered and directed to act with reference to the place at which such violation is had as though such place had not been licensed.

VII.—It is made the duty of the Chief of Police, Deputy Chiefs, Inspectors and Commanding Officers of each precinct to see that these rules and regulations are strictly and rigidly enforced, and in addition to the reports required from the Commanding Officer of each precinct and from Inspectors of Districts, they are required to report to the Chief of Police, and to the President of the Board, on Monday of each week, with reference to each place situated within his precinct holding a license from the Police Board, and to specifically report whether any such place has violated any of these regulations, and report their action thereunder.

A vote being taken thereon the same are unanimously adopted.

On motion of President York the Rules and Regulations of the Police Department are amended by adding thereto a new rule, to be known as Rule 50, as follows:

Rule 50.

The Police Board hereby adopts the following regulations and restrictions for the government of buildings, gardens, grounds, concert rooms or other places or rooms within The City of New York, in which exhibitions or performances are given, and which are licensed by the Police Board of The City of New York.

I.—Concert rooms or places, whether in building, garden, grounds or other places, licensed as concert halls or concert rooms, or places in which concerts may be given, shall be closed at 12 midnight, and shall not again be opened for public purpose before 5 o'clock in the morning.

II.—It shall not be lawful to exhibit on the first day of the week, commonly called Sunday, in any building, garden, grounds, concert room, or other rooms or places licensed by the Police Board, any interlude, tragedy, comedy, opera, ballet, play, farce, negro minstrelsy, dancing of any kind, or any entertainment of the stage or any part or parts therein, or any equestrian circus, or dramatic performance, or any performance of jugglers, acrobats or rope dancing.

III.—It shall not be lawful to sell, deliver, or give away, or cause or permit or procure to be sold, delivered, or given away, any liquors, in any room, building, garden, grounds, concert room or other place or room licensed by the Police Board, between the hours of 12 midnight on Saturday and 5 o'clock in the forenoon on Monday. The term liquors, as used, includes and means any distilled or rectified spirits, wine, fermented and malted liquors.

IV.—It shall not be lawful to employ or to permit the attendance of any female to wait upon or attend in any manner, or to furnish refreshments to the audience or spectators, or any of them, at any of the exhibitions or performances in any building, room or other place which is licensed by the Police Board. Nor shall it be lawful for the performers in any concert room or other place licensed by the Police Board to mix with the audience or spectators at any entertainment or exhibition in which such performers shall take part.

V.—It shall not be lawful to admit to any exhibition held under authority of a license granted by the Police Board any minor under the age of fourteen years, unless such minor is accompanied by and is in the care of some adult.

VI.—A violation of any of the foregoing rules, regulations and restrictions, shall operate and cause an immediate annulment of any license granted by the Police Board; and the Commanding Officer of the precinct in which the place or places so licensed are situated, and every other member of the Police Force are authorized, empowered and directed to act with reference to the place at which such violation is had as though such place had not been licensed.

VII.—It is made the duty of the Chief of Police, Deputy Chiefs, Inspectors and Commanding Officer of each precinct to see that these rules and regulations are strictly and rigidly enforced, and in addition to the reports required from the Commanding Officer of each precinct and from Inspectors of Districts, they are required to report to the Chief of Police and to the President of the Board on Monday of each week, with reference to each place situated within his precinct holding a license from the Police Board, and to specifically report whether any such place has violated any of these regulations, and report their actions thereunder.

Resolved, That the Chief of Police be and is directed to forthwith cause to be served upon each Deputy Chief, Inspector and Commanding Officer of each precinct, including detective bureaus and commanding officers of squads in the Police Department, a copy of the resolutions this day adopted by the Board, making regulations for the government and restriction of places licensed by the Police Board, and also a copy of Rule 50 of Rules and Regulations of the Police Department as this day adopted, and that in the service of said rules and regulations and rule of the Police Department upon the officers before stated, the Chief call their attention to the provisions of law having reference to such places as contained in the statutes of the State and the ordinances of the City, and that he enjoin upon them a rigid and prompt enforcement of all such laws and the rules and regulations adopted in reference thereto by the Police Board.

Resolved, That Patrolman John Sheridan be advanced to the Fourth grade, salary, \$1,150; such advancement to take effect from November 16, 1898.

Resolved, That the Rhinelander Medal for Valor be and is hereby awarded to Patrolman John E. Schelpp, Fifty-ninth Precinct, for meritorious conduct in entering the burning building, No. 188 Harrison avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, about 3 o'clock A. M., April 14, 1898, and at the risk of his life rescuing Mrs. Schwartz and five children.

Resolved, That the Police Board hereby consent to the substitution of the United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, No. 140 Broadway, and the American Bonding and Trust Company, of Baltimore City, as sureties in the place of William R. Thompson and M. A. Early in the proposal of John Early & Co. for supplying the Police Department with horse equipments.

Resolved, That the Chief of Police be directed to issue a general order prohibiting members of the Police Force from attending horse races, ball games, and other public exhibitions, except when such member is on regular leave of absence for vacation granted by the Board, unless assigned on police duty at such places, and such assignment must be on the direct order of the Chief or Commanding Officer of the precinct, and where such assignments are made a record of such assignment in each case shall be entered upon the blotter.

No bid or estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The award of the contract will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect, and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract, by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, each in the penal amount of fifty (50) per cent. of the bid for each article.
