AN ORDINANCE to provide for the payment of Jurors in the Municipal Court of The City of New York.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

That, in pursuance to section 231 of the Municipal Court Act (Laws of 1902, chapter 580), as amended by chapter 431 of the Laws of 1908, it is hereby directed that the sum of two dollars (\$2) be allowed to each trial Juror for each day's necessary attendance by him as such Juror, at a term of any Municipal Court of The City of New York, held within The City of New York; provided, however, that no such Juror shall be so paid for attendance on any day on which he shall be excused from service.

No. 520.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, in relation to "Animals running at large and impounding the same."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Chapter 13 of part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York is hereby amended by adding at the end thereof a new subdivision to be known and titled as follows:

16—Animals Running at Large, and Impounding the Same.

Sec. 532. The Mayor shall appoint proper persons as masters of the public pounds, who, before entering upon the duties of their office, shall take and subscribe an oath or affirmation well and truly to execute the duties of their office.

Sec. 533. All horses, swine or neat cattle found at large in violation of this article may be taken by any person or persons and driven or carried to such place as may be designated by the Board of Aldermen as a public pound. It shall be the duty of the Pound Master or person having charge of such public pound to enter in a book, to be kept by him for that purpose, the names and places of abode of all persons who may bring any such horses, swine or neat cattle to such pound and the time of bringing the same respectively; no person shall receive any compensation for driving or bringing any horse, neat cattle or swine to any of the public pounds.

Sec. 534. If the owner of any such horse, swine or neat cattle, or any other person entitled to redeem the same, shall appear and claim the same at any time before a sale thereof, it shall be the duty of the Pound Master to deliver the same on receiving the amount of his fee for keeping and feeding the same, not exceeding one dollar for each beast for every twenty-four hours, and at that rate for any less period of time.

Sec. 535. It shall be the duty of the Pound Master, on making any delivery of swine or neat cattle before sale, or on payment of surplus money after sale, to obtain from the person or persons claiming the same, his, her or their name or names and residence; and once in each month to report to the Corporation Counsel the same, and the name or names of all persons claiming horse, swine or neat cattle, and their places of residence, the date when the same were sold or redeemed, and the names of the persons leaving the same at the pound.

Sec. 536. If no person shall appear to claim such horses, swine or neat cattle within three days after the same may have been impounded, it shall be the duty of the Pound Master to give three days' notice of the sale thereof.

Sec. 537. Such notice shall contain some general description of the beasts impounded, and shall be posted up in some conspicuous place at said public pound and in the City Hall of The City of New York, and shall also be inserted in two or more of the public newspapers published in the City.

Sec. 538. In case of the sale of any impounded horses, swine or neat cattle, the said Pound Master shall retain, out of the proceeds of such sale, sufficient to pay to the amount of his fees and all charges incurred by him on account of said horse, swine or neat cattle.

Sec. 539. If, after any such sale, and whilst the proceeds thereof remain in the hands of the said Pound Master, the former owner of any horse, swine or neat cattle shall appear and claim the same, it shall be the duty of the said Pound Master to deduct from the proceeds of such sale the fees and charges as provided in the last preceding section, to ascertain the name and residence of such owner, and to pay over the residue of the proceeds of such sale to the person so claiming to be the owner.

Sec. 540. It shall be the duty of the said Pound Master, once in every month, to account to the Comptroller of The City of New York for all moneys received or expended by him by virtue of this article, and to pay over to the said Comptroller all such moneys remaining in his hands, after deducting his legal fees and charges.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

AN ORDINANCE to amend the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York relating to "Stands within stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations."

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows:

Section 1. Article 4 of chapter 7 of title 2 of Part 1 of the Code of Ordinances of The City of New York, relating to "Stands within the stoop lines and under elevated railroad stations," is hereby amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as section 372 A and to read as follows:

Sec. 372 A. Any license issued in pursuance of the provisions of this article shall be not transferable, with or without consideration, and any license transferred to another person shall immediately thereupon cease and determine, and the privileges thereunder come to an end. Any person who shall be guilty of a violation of the provisions of this section shall not thereafter be granted a license or permit or other privilege to keep a stand or stands within the stoop lines or under the elevated railroad stations for the sale of newspapers, or periodicals, or both, of fruits or soda-water or both, or of all the foregoing items, or for the blacking of boots. Further, any person found guilty of violating any provisions of this section by a Court of competent jurisdiction shall be subject to a fine of not less than fifty dollars (\$50), nor more than five hundred dollars (\$500). It shall be the duty of the City Clerk and the Chief of the Bureau of Licenses to have the language of this section printed in bold type on all applications for and licenses granted to persons under the provisions of this article.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York to an amount not exceeding three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000) for the purpose of providing means for the construction of a new Women's Prison in Raymond street; the construction, in connection therewith, of an Administration Building for the Raymond Street Jail; the painting of cells and interior walls of the present Men's Prison and the making of certain alterations in the Civil Prison of said jail; said work to be done under the jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn; and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three hundred and fifty thousand dollars (\$350,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

—be and the same is hereby amended by striking therefrom the words 'jurisdiction of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn' and inserting in place thereof the words 'jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Correction,' and be it further

At 8.12 p. m., 8.13 p. m., 8.38 p. m. and 9.50 p. m. respectively, the second, third, fourth and fifth alarms were sent out.

Fireman third grade Thomas F. Phillips, Engine Company 72, and Fireman fourth grade George A. O'Connor, Engine Company 72, were killed in the discharge of their duty at this fire.

January 11, 11.43 p. m., Station 727.

The fire occurred at Nos. 1801 to 1807 First avenue, a five-story brick building, 100 by 100 feet, occupied by iron works.

The fire originated in the cellar and extended throughout building through belt holes, flooring and ceilings; damage considerable.

Chief officers present were Acting Chief of Department John Binns, Deputy Chief of Department Duane, Chiefs of Battalion Dougherty, O'Connor, Kane, Sloan and Kenlon and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Galloway and Roan.

The services of nineteen engine companies and five hook and ladder companies were required, and the duration of fire was four hours.

Cause, unknown.

At 11.57 p. m., 12.02 a. m. and 1.48 a. m. respectively, the second, third and fourth alarms were sent out.

January 12, 4.11 a. m., Station 377.

The fire occurred at Nos. 45 and 47 West Twenty-first street, a six-story brown stone and brick building 50 by 90 feet, occupied by manufacturer of ladies' cloaks and suits.

The fire originated on the fourth floor and extended to the fifth and sixth floors by way of windows and flooring; damage considerable. Also extended to No. 49 West Twenty-first street, a six-story brown stone and brick building 25 by 90 feet, occupied by several firms, by way of cornice on roof; damage trifling.

Chief officers present were Acting Chief of Department John Binns, Deputy Chief of Department Martin, Chiefs of Battalion Ross, Shay, Skelly, Worth and Acting Chief of Battalion McGuire.

The services of thirteen engine companies, four hook and ladder companies and Water Tower 3 were required, and the duration of fire was two hours.

Cause, unknown.

At 4.54 a. m. and 5.02 a. m. respectively, the second and third alarms were sent out.

January 31, 9.21 p. m., Station 48.

The fire occurred at Nos. 19 and 21 Cliff street, a five-story brick building, 80 by 150 feet, occupied by manufacturers of enamelled ware.

The fire originated on the second floor and extended to all floors through hoist way and flooring; damage considerable.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Guerin, Chiefs of Battalion Duffy, Terpeny, Worth and Brogan.

The fire originated on the third floor and extended to the second, fourth and fifth floors and roof by stairways and elevator shafts; damage considerable.

Chief officers present were Chief of Department Edward F. Croker, Deputy Chief of Department Guerin, Chiefs of Battalion Galvin, Duffy, Norton, Terpeny and Acting Chiefs of Battalion Jennings and Sullivan.

The services of thirteen engine companies, searchlight engine 1, six hook and ladder companies and water tower 1 were required, and the duration of fire was one hour and thirty minutes.

Cause, unknown.

At 4.08 a. m. and 4.12 a. m., respectively, the second and third alarms were sent out.

Fireman first grade John J. McConnell, engine company 4, and Fireman fourth grade Thomas P. Eglinton, hook and ladder company 10, were killed in the discharge of their duty at this fire.

NOTABLE FIRES.

January 3, 8.23 P. M., Station 145.

The fire occurred at Nos. 159 to 165 Waverly avenue, a four-story brick building, 50 by 100 feet, occupied as store, dwelling and hall.


