To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, The City of New York:
Gentlemen—On July 7, 1914, the Board of Aldermen passed the following resolu-

"Resolved, That, in pursuance of the provisions of Subdivision 8, of Section 188 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of one thousand eight hundred and seventy-five dollars (\$1,875), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Board of City Magistrates, First Division, for the purpose of paying the salaries of five Female Probation Officers, at \$75 each per month, from August 1, 1914, to and including December 31, 1914."

In reference to the purport of the foregoing resolution a communication was addressed to the Mayor, dated January 15, 1914, by the Chief Magistrate, which read in part as follows:

"Something over a year ago I undertook a reformation of the system of probation that existed in the courts. We had then ten men and ten women probation officers.

Two of these women are permanently attached to the Night Court for Women and one to the Domestic Relations Court. The other seven were scattered through the various District Courts. I believe the system loose-jointed and lacking in efficiency; that the people were put on probation haphazard without proper investigations; that a Probation Officer with a long list of probationers suddenly thrust upon him or her could not give the cases the attention they deserved. There was little, if anything, to do for most of the women Probation Officers, especially in the District Courts.

"All the probation officers, male and female, were taken out of the courts and brought to this building as a central headquarters, under charge of the Chief Probation Officer. The practice now is, when a Magistrate believes that the convicted defendant might possibly be put on probation with good effect, he sends the case to the central office, remands or paroles the defendant in the meantime, and then a written report within two days is made to him by the probation officer to whom the case was given here. This report has to be approved by the Chief Probation Officer. The number of probation cases has fallen off nearly thirty-three per cent., which means that discriminating investigation shows that that percentage of defendants were not worthy of the benefits of the system. Formerly one probation officer might have a hundred cases and another very few. Now, the cases are evenly distributed at headquarters so that all have the same burden of work.'

In a letter addressed to Mr. Henry H. Curran, Chairman, Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen, dated June 29, 1914, Chief Magistrate William McAdoo wrote as follows:

"Under the centralized system of probation work inaugurated here some time ago, no woman probation officers are needed in the courts, except in the Night Court for Women and the two Domestic Relations Courts. Those courts require the services of four women. The present centralized probation system is an immense improvement on

"Everybody who has impartially investigated the matter agrees to this. If I had 50 women on the pay roll and it was left to me, I would not put any of them in the courts. They are not needed there at all. Under the old slipshod way of doing things, one probation officer would have 10 cases and another one 100 cases. Now, the whole work is evenly distributed at the head office in this building, and the reports are all made in writing and signed by the officer. Since the five women probation officers were dropped,

Mr. McKay, the Chief Probation Officer, reports to me that 'we can get along fairly well without them, but that the service would be improved by the addition of two more women officers, making seven in all. I cannot, therefore, conscientiously, with the facts before me, recommend more than the reappointment of two.

"If I were to be governed wholly by sentiment and the kind feeling which I have for the deposed officers, I would recommend all of the five, but it is my duty to tell the

truth, to the Board of Aldermen and the other city authorities.'

Investigation shows that the present force consists of one Chief Probation Officer, 15 Male Probation Officers and 5 Female Probation Officers. From the records kept by Chief Probation Officer George D. McKay, it appears that for the five months ended May 31, 1914, there were 133 females placed on probation, of whom 110 were from the Women's Night Court and were looked after by the two female probation officers at that court, which represents an average of 11 cases a month for each. The one assigned to the Manhattan Domestic Relations Court made 59 investigations, an average of shout 12 a month, the one assigned to the Brony Domestic Relations Court made 64 of about 12 a month; the one assigned to the Bronx Domestic Relations Court made 64 investigations, an average of 13 a month. With the very low monthly average of the cases handled and investigations made by the present force, it would appear that no increase in the force is justified at this time. In view of the facts stated in the foregoing report, particularly as regards the results attained by the probation officers in the court referred to, it is recommended that the request contained in the resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on July 7, 1914, be denied.

Together with, and including the right to construct such rapid transit ailroad and for such purposes, and as incidental thereto, properly, adequately and safely to maintain, support, shore, buttress and underpin the said United States Court House and Postoffice Building and to excavate such soil and other materials under the said building and to remove such portion of the foundations, walls and floors of the said building as may be necessary for the purposes indicated and to remove and dispose of such soil and other excavated material together with such portions of the foundations, walls and floors of said building as may be necessary to remove for the said purposes without accounting therefor, and to enter into and take possession of such portion of the sub-basement of the said building as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing said rapid transit railroad and either temporarily or permanently to remove and relocate such machinery and appurtenances of the said building (including any and all subsurface pipes or structures used by or in connection with the Post Office) as may be necessary for the purpose of constructing the said rapid transit railroad, and for the purpose of maintaining, supporting, shoring, buttressing and under-pinning the said building and of making such excavations and removals, to such places and positions as may be determined and approved by the then Secretary of the Treasury of the United States or by such person or persons as may from time to time be directed by and be acting for such then Secretary of the Treasury to make such determination and approval. Together with, and including the right to the City to construct and maintain during the period of constructing the said rapid transit railroad, and subway or tunnel, a shaft and hoist at the westerly side and a shaft and hoist at the easterly side of the said building, at the locations as shown on the attached drawings hereinbefore referred to, for the purpose of removing such soil and other excavated material together with such portions of the foundations, walls and floors of said building from the said sub-basement to the surface of the street and for bringing in materials from the surface of the street to the said sub-basement, such shafts and hoists to be located, and to be of the kind, character and nature as shown upon the attached drawings hereinbefore referred to and made a part hereof.

To have and to hold the said temporary rights and easements unto the City, its successors and assigns during the period of the construction of and until the said subway or tunnel and rapid transit railroad shall be completed.
