

Whereas, In the belief that competition in the production and supply of illuminating gas would result in a reduction of the price of that indispensable commodity to the people of this city, the Common Council, in the year 1876, passed a resolution, which was approved by the Mayor December 23 of that year, of which the following is a copy :
 "Resolved, That permission be and is hereby given to all incorporated gas-light companies to lay gas mains and pipes in the streets, avenues, and public places in this city, for the purpose of supplying gas to the city and its inhabitants, upon such conditions as may be first prescribed and approved of by his Honor the Mayor, the Comptroller, and the Commissioner of Public Works, who are now by law authorized to make provision for lighting the streets of the city;" and Whereas, The anticipations of the Common Council in this regard were, for a short time, realized, the competition between the Manicipal and Knickerbocker Companies resulted in diminishing the cost of gas fully thirty per cent. while the rivalry existed ; and Whereas, Quite recently it has transpired that, by some understanding with the old companies, this rivalry has been destroyed, and a combination or an agreement has been entered into by and between all the companies now supplying illuminating gas to this city, by which the price to the concess the cost of the production of illuminating gas, favored customers being supplied or sixty cents per 1,000 feet, while others are compelled to pay \$2.25 for a like amount of similar illuminating power ; and

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Lindo Brothers to erect and main-tain a bay-window at No. 1205 Broadway, northwest corner of Twenty-ninth street, the same to extend three and a half feet, as per annexed diagram, the consent of the occupants on each side has been obtained, and is hereto annexed, the work done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The driver of any vehicle who shall drive any such vehicle over or across any hose in use, or about to be used, or while laying in the carrageway after being used, in any street, avenue, or public place in the City of New York, by any portion of the Fire Department, for extinguishing any fire that may occur within the corporate limits of said city, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and on conviction thereof before any police magistrate, shall pay a fine of ten dollars, or in default of the payment of such fine, by imprisonment, provided such imprisonment

COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at the meeting held June 11, 1880.

Present—Hon. Edward Cooper, Mayor (Chairman) ; Hon. Frederick Smyth, Recorder ; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller ; and J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain. The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Mayor submitted the following communication from the Commissioners of Docks, which, on motion, was referred to the Comptroller, viz. :

Mayor and Chairman of Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York: SIR-At a meeting of the Board governing this Department, held this date, the following resolution was adopted, to wit :

"Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, pursuant to the authority vested in them by subdivision 11, of Section 6, Chapter 574, Laws of 1871, be and are hereby respectfully re-quested to direct the Comptroller of the City of New York to prepare and issue ' Dock Bonds of the City of New York,' for the amount of (\$250,000) two hundred and fifty thousand dollars, for the uses and purposes of the Department of Docks."

POLICE DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, June 8, 1880.

To the Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund :

GENTLEMEN—At a meeting of the Board of Police, held this day, it was Resolved, That the Chief Clerk be directed to communicate with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, transmitting copies of all correspondence relative to the subject (of repairs to roof of Eighteenth Ward market building), and requesting that the necessary action be taken to complete the repairs."

In pursuance thereof, I herewith transmit copies of letters, viz. : Commissioner of Public Works, April 18, 1880, May 24, 1880, and from the President of Board of Police, May 17, 1880.

It is respectfully requested that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will pass such resolution as may be necessary to cause the roof of the Eighteenth Ward market building to be properly repaired.

After a brief discussion of the subject, the Comptroller moved that the communication be referred After a brief discussion of the subject, the Comptoner involution that the comminated on be referred to the Mayor; and that he be requested to state in reply, that in the opinion of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund the Board of Police has authority, under the provisions of section 49 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, to make such repairs and to defray the expense from the appropriation for Street Cleaning, and that the rent paid for the premises by the Board of Police to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund being much less than the fair rental value of the premises, it is incumbent on the Board of Police to keep the premises in repair ; which, on motion, was carried.

LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1380.

CHAPTER 186.

An Act to repress and punish disorderly conduct on public conveyances. Passed May 0. 1860 ; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as fol-

lows Section 1. Any person who shall by any offensive or disorderly act, or language, annoy or interfere with the passengers of any public stage, railroad car, ferry boat, or other public convey-ance, or who shall disturb or offend the occupants of such stage, car, boat or conveyance, by any disorderly act, language or display, although such act, conduct or display may not amount to an assault or battery, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and any police justice or justice of the peace of the city or county in which any of such acts shall be committed, shall have jurisdiction thereof thereof.

Sec. 2. This act shall take effect immediately.
