DEAR SIR—Annexed I beg to submit to your Honorable Board my report for the quarter ending March 31, 1881, the number of prisoners received and discharged, the labor on which they have been employed, and the results accomplished by such labor during the quarter.

Blacksmiths—Made 64 and repaired and altered 74 iron bedsteads; made 98 window guards, 1 lattice stove guard, 204 pounds, 1 chopping knife, 6 boat hooks, 3 pair ice tongs, 24 stonecutters' chisels, 37 steel drills, 52 stonecutters' hammers, 60 steel points, 96 feathers, 8 pitching tools, 78 plugs, 1 drilling machine, 11 pickaxes, 1 iron wheelbarrow, 100 wheelbarrow spindles, 150 staples, 136 bucket handles, 374 bucket ears, 100 straps, 200 standards, etc. Also repaired carts, wagons, wheels, wheelbarrows, etc., etc.

Tinsmiths—Made 1,150 mess pans, 228 feet stove pipe, 200 quart cups, 100 wash basins, 498 bake pans; also repaired roof of prison, and tinware and utensils kept in order.

Carpenters—Made 728 coffins, 7 tables, 33 benches, 12 wheelbarrows, 24 pails, 22 tubs, 27 buckets, 111 doors, 2,438 lineal feet base, 1,689 lineal feet chair rails, 24 transoms, 36 stonebreakers' handles, 24 fine axe handles, 200 brush backs, 2,000 clothespins, 22 snow shovels, 1 runway for steamboat, 3 harrows, 4 chest boxes, 1,250 tallies; repaired 163 buckets, 10 tubs, 87 stools, 13 settees, 32 chairs, 40 blinds, 9 wheelbarrows, 31 snow shovels, and repairs on all vehicles belonging to the Department.

Tailors and Cot Makers—Made 50 woolen jackets, 954 pairs woolen mitts, 64 cots; repaired 721 woolen jackets, 1,324 pairs pants, 457 vests, 265 caps, 117 cots.

Broom and Brush Makers—Made 141 dozen brooms, 163 dozen scrub brushes.

Shoemakers—Made 1,480 pairs men's shoes, 1,770 pairs women's shoes, repaired 1,145 pairs men's shoes, and 268 pairs women's shoes.

At the Sewing-room, female prisoners have made 550 girls' petticoats, 300 dresses, 300 drawers, 150 chemises, 100 aprons, 200 diapers, 100 child's shirts, 425 boys' shirts, 30 women's dresses, 100 women's wrappers, 130 women's petticoats, 25 night gowns, 550 men's shirts, 222 towels, 150 crib sheets, 100 pillow ticks, 350 pillow cases, 20 bed ticks, 1,667 pairs shoes bound and repaired, 2,027 men's shirts, 392 undershirts, 1,977 socks, 187 women's dresses, 143 petticoats, 274 chemises, 143 stockings, 7 bed ticks, 13 sheets.

At the Stone Shed, the prisoners are daily employed cutting building stone, water table, window, door, and sill jambs, caps, lintels, etc., etc.

By prisoners employed at out-door labor the roads and sea walls have been kept in order, 2,700 tons of coal and 12 barges of dirt have been discharged.

The average daily number of male prisoners during the quarter has been 692. They have been employed as follows:

An average of 52 men at Randall's Island, making roads, unloading barges, filling in low grounds, and quarrying.
An average of 30 men at Ward's Island, working on new wing of Insane Asylum.
An average of 90 men in quarry.
An average of 95 men as stonecutters.
An average of 40 men as stonebreakers.
An average of 32 men as blacksmiths.
An average of 95 men as shoemakers, tailors, broom, brush, and cot makers.
An average of 15 men as tinsmiths.
An average of 48 men as carpenters.
An average of 40 men as gardeners.
An average of 25 men in bucket gang.
An average of 7 men as whitewashers.
An average of 5 men in building gang.
An average of 22 men sick in hospital.
An average of 20 men in prison and locked in cells.
An average of 2 men in Insane Asylum.
An average of 74 men in prison as hall men, cooks, waiters, runner, etc., etc.

Hon. JACOB HESS, President, etc.:

DEAR SIR—I have the honor to report the following amount of labor performed by inmates of this Institution (and Work-house help) during the quarter ending March 31, 1881:

Out Door Improvement—Removing snow from roads, yards, and paths; cutting and housing ice; unloading, carting, and delivering coal to both Institutions; keeping roads and walks in good order and repair; carting ashes and dirt from boiler-house; preparing farm for spring work.

Carpenter's Department—Making new table for Tinner's machinery, new closet for dumb waiters in wash-house, 3 shoemaker's benches, step ladders for painters, bread box for wash-house, medicine box and soiled clothes chest for Ward F, 4 safety frames for stores in new wing, office box for records of 1880, 4 benches and 6 frames for matmakers, tables for Wards C, F, and theatre, 7 snow shovels, new counter with drawers for linen room, ventilator for ice house, box to cover water-pipe in hog pen, 3 benches for Ward A, bread table for annex and meat box for staff, mantelpiece in Assistant Physician's room, census board for Assistant Physicians' office; repairs to doors and reception rooms of A, C, G, and I; new locks on plumbers' and shoemaker's shops; several repairs throughout the building.

Painters' Department—Painting 44 bedsteads, 15 bath-tubs, 282 chambers, 12 dust pails and 75 window-guards; wood-work stained and varnished in Ward H; 2 coats paint and varnish on wood-work round kitchen; scraping and painting stairway (and sashes of same) leading from Ward E to cellar; reception rooms of Wards A, C, E, F, G, and I painted, varnished, and calcimined; painting and repairs in front of main building and to roof; 334 panes of glass put in.

Masons' Department—Scraping walls and ceilings of stairway in East Wing, Wards E and C and reception rooms of Wards A, C, E, I, G, H, and A; walls in cellar, main hall and Ward B repaired; new registers put in Ward H, and old ones reset in Hospital, Ward H; flues bricked up in mat-room and wash-house; bricks reset under stoves in annex; ceiling in Ward I pantry scraped and replastered.

Plumbers' Department—New pipes and elbows in wash-house and new gas-pipes in Ward K; repairs to water-pipes in Wards C, D, and E, urinals in C, D, E, water-closets in C, H, E, and main hall, tanks and pump in annex, bath tubes and faucets in B, wash-basins in steward's room and Ward H, waste-pipe and water-closet in wash-house, and general repairs to water and gas-pipes throughout the building.

Mat Makers—Mats made, 15 fancy rag, 4 Manila, 4 extra large bag, 6 medium size bag, 33 Kiar and 13 extra large Kiar ones; splicing and fitting new ropes for hospital and wash-house, elevators and coal dock; repairing canvass boiler cover in engine-house.

Tinsmiths—Making 384 chambers, 72 dust-pans, 24 tin dippers, 144 tin cups, 36 dish pans, 12 dust pails, 12 kitchen scoops, and 6 meat boxes, 6 horns for theatre, repairing copper drainers, boilers, dippers, cans, dish boxes and bread boxes for kitchen and Ward use and wash-house.

Shoemakers—1,245 pairs men's shoes, and 25 pairs women's shoes repaired; 5 sets harness repaired and attended to.

Tailors—7,027 articles of woolen clothing repaired, consisting of pants, jackets, vests, and blouses.

Sewing Room, Workhouse Help—Repairing 7,520 articles of linen and cotton clothing and bedding.

LABOR REPORT FOR FIRST QUARTER.

Carpenters—Made 3 ladders, 2 tables, 4 screens for patients in Pavilions, 1 census board for office, box for water bed, bars on store room windows, meat shelves, shelves in Attendants' rooms, fasteners for windows of Pavilions, steps and waste box for wash-house; repaired meat barrels and boxes, water-closets of Pavilions, doors and windows of Pavilions I, D, and E, flooring of Pavilions I and II, storm-doors of Pavilions D and E, locks in the several Pavilions, and keys fitted for same, chairs, benches, settees and rocking chairs; 28 panes glass put in.

Painters—Bath-rooms and water-closets in the different Pavilions painted, also Assistant Physician's room, census board and 8 iron bedsteads.

Plumbers and Tinsmiths—Put in air chamber in cistern pump, 36 feet 3/4-inch iron pipe, 2 stop cocks and 1 drip cock put in Pavilions I and II, 2 feet lead-pipe in water sinks Pavilion I, tin collar on stove-pipe of wash-house, 80 feet 3/4-inch pipe in dining-room sinks Pavilion I, 9 joints stove-pipe in men's dormitory, 12 door-wheels on No. 21 "scorchers," packing pumps, changing cold water to hot water pipes in Pavilions I and II, put in new grate and lining in stove of Medical Superintendent, new "fulcrum" on main pump, put in 2 feet pipe and 1 elbow in water-closet Pavilion II, put up and connected set of wash trays in wash-house, 3 feet waste pipe in Pavilion I, new lining in kitchen range, brass head to pump of Pavilion II; repairing and thawing pipes of all the Pavilions, repairing roof of Pavilion D, thawing and repairing sink pipes in Pavilions D and E, and 47 pieces of tin ware repaired.

Sewing and Mending—Made 135 sheets, 89 chemises, 16 pillow-cases 10 petticoats, 74 dresses, 134 aprons, 25 jackets, 12 shrouds; knit 81 pairs stockings, 60 pairs socks; mended 2,299 dresses, 105 shirts, 1,392 sheets, 3,475 chemises, 996 pillow-cases, 205 spreads, 228 night-gowns, 893 petticoats, 1,483 drawers, 63 socks, 1,671 stockings, 1,814 bed-ticks, 816 pillow-ticks, 208 aprons, 11 jackets, 184 hoods, 70 shoes, 20 pants, 18 towels, and 17 slippers.

LABOR REPORT.

Carpenters—Made 1 small table for kitchen, 2 new window-blinds, 2 covers for water-pails; repaired 4 arm chairs, 4 stools, 1 clothes-closet, 3 meat-boxes, 2 doors in drug store, 1 door in wash-house dormitory, shifted shelving in Nurses' room, Ward B; repaired windows in Assistant Physician's house, door in drug store; put on door spring and knobs on hall door; refitted room in Resident Physician's office, and same in general office; repaired 1 saw-buck; altered closet in Nurses' room, Pavilion A; put in 18 panes of glass, and kept the locks and keys in general repair, and done general repairing wherever needed.

Plumber—Repairing pump, pipe and water-closet pipe in Ward II; put in 2 feet 6 inches of 1-inch iron pipe and 1 1/2-inch elbow in Ward II; repaired pump-pipe, put in 6 feet of 1-inch pipes, and 1 1/2-inch elbow in Ward III; put in 3 feet 1-inch pipe and 1 1/2-inch elbow in Ward I; made new tin collar to stove-pipe, and put up on wash-house; repaired roof of kitchen and 6 pieces tin-ware; repaired roof of church; put in new bottoms in 6 tin pails; packed pumps, new leather and coupling to pump-chamber in Pavilion B, the same in Pavilion C, and repaired lead-pipe in bath-room; thawed out pumps and pipes in Pavilions B and C; repaired pump-pipe Ward III, pipes of range, and put in 2 feet of new pipe and 1 elbow in kitchen; handle to pump Pavilion C; thawed out pipes in all the wards; put on elbows on stove-pipes in Pavilions B and C; handle to pump Pavilion B; packed pumps in Pavilions A, B and C; repaired tin pails; made new leather to pump; cleared out water-closet, and soldered lead-pipes in Pavilion B.

Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid

and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered
to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall
be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by ad-
vertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily news-
papers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in
said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid
to him at his office on or before the first day of December,
in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed
to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following
section of this act.

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the
said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said
Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect
upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addi-
tion to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the
amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon
such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January
thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of
seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day
on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall
have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the
date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and col-
lected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred
and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of
this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a
charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of
twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on
real and personal estate within the City of New York,
upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and
street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton
water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu
of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum
per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the
officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears
of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest
upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum
per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest
at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now re-
quired by law to be calculated thereon. This provision
shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents
remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which
the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter
sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided,
however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to
affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assess-
ments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to
authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from
sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums
collectible for such redemption under the provisions of
existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the
City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement,
for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and
published in said city, immediately after the confirmation
of any assessment for a local improvement or street open-
ing in said city, that the same has been confirmed
specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its
