

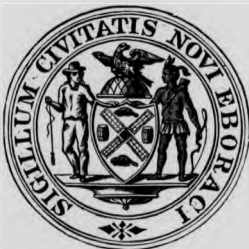

#### BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

FRIDAY, August 31, 1888,

The Board met in their chamber, No. 16 City Hall, pursuant to the following:

#### To the Members of the Board of Aldermen:

A special meeting of the Board of Aldermen is hereby called for Friday, August 31, 1888, at 1 o'clock in the afternoon, to consider General Order No. 456, being an ordinance to provide the necessary means for the support of the Government of the City of New York and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes, and for other purposes, pursuant to the provisions of law, in and for the year 1888, and to consider other General Orders and such other business as may be laid before the Board.

#### PETITIONS.

(G. O. 577.)

#### By the President—

Petition of owners of property on West Eighty-sixth street, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive, for permission to extend their area-lines ten feet from the line of the street.

In connection therewith the President offered the following:

Resolved, That the property-owners on West Eighty-sixth street, between West End avenue and Riverside Drive, be and they hereby are respectively authorized to extend their respective area-lines ten feet from the line of the street, on condition that all enclosures of the said area shall be of stone or iron, that all gates shall open inwardly, and that said areas shall be kept free from all encumbrance or structure other than the steps used for the ascent to the parlor story, and for descent to the basement; such permission to be at the pleasure of the Common Council.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

#### By Alderman Hubbell—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to M. Rice to place and keep two ornamental lamp-posts and lamps on the sidewalk, near the curb, in front of No. 287 Hudson street, provided such lamp-posts shall not exceed eighteen inches square at the base, and that the work be done and gas supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### By Alderman Tait—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Thomas Nash to place and keep a watering-trough on southerly side of Fifth street, about twenty feet west of Lewis street, provided that the work be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### By Alderman Rinckhoff—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Owen McGibney to place and keep a watering-trough on the sidewalk, near the curb-line, in front of premises No. 721 Eleventh avenue, northwest corner of Fifty-first street, the work to be done and water supplied at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### By Vice-President Dowling—

AN ORDINANCE to prevent the running of railroad cars upon the surface of any of the streets or highways in the City of New York, without providing conductors as well as drivers for the operation and management of such cars.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall not be lawful for any railroad company to operate any cars upon any portion of its route in the streets or highways of the City of New York, without providing, for the operation and management of every such car, a conductor as well as a driver.

Sec. 2. For every trip or part of a trip made by any car of any street railway company, in violation of the provision of the foregoing section of this ordinance, the company so offending shall be subject to a penalty of fifty dollars for each trip or part of a trip which such car shall so make, to be recovered by the Corporation Attorney, as in the case of other penalties.

Sec. 3. The Commissioners of Police are especially instructed to carry into effect and rigidly enforce the provisions of this ordinance.

Sec. 4. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 5. This ordinance shall take effect December 31, 1888.

Alderman Sullivan moved to refer to the Committee on Railroads.

Vice-President Dowling, as an amendment, moved to refer to the Committee on Public Works. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said amendment.

Which was decided in the affirmative, on a division called by Alderman Barry, as follows:

Affirmative—Vice-President Dowling, Aldermen Barry, Butler, Clancy, Gunther, Hubbell, McCarthy, McMurray, John Murray, Von Minden, and Walker—11.

Negative—Aldermen Fitzsimons, Rinckhoff, and Sullivan—3.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion, as amended. Which was decided in the affirmative on a division called by Alderman Rinckhoff, as follows:

Affirmative—Vice-President Dowling, Aldermen Barry, Butler, Clancy, Gunther, Holland, Hubbell, McCarthy, McMurray, John Murray, Sullivan, Von Minden, and Walker—13.

Negative—Aldermen Fitzsimons and Rinckhoff—2.

#### By the President—

AN ORDINANCE to amend an ordinance entitled "An ordinance to amend section 55 of chapter XLV. of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled 'Of nuisances and noxious things in practices,'" passed July 27, 1877, and the resolution amendatory thereof, passed September 17, 1877, and the ordinance amendatory thereof, adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 3, 1879, and approved by the Mayor, June 9, 1879.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonality of the City of New York do ordain as follows:

Section 1. Section 55 of chapter 17 of the Ordinances of 1866, as amended by the ordinance of July 27, 1877, the resolution of September 17, 1877, and the ordinance of June 3, 1879, is hereby further amended, and shall read as follows:

"§ 55. No person shall beat any drum or other instrument, or blow any horn or other instrument, or ring any bell or bells or other like instruments, for the purpose of attracting the attention of passengers in any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York, to any show of birds or beasts, or other things, in said city, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person use or perform with any hand-organ or other musical instrument for pay, or in expectation of payment, in any of the streets, avenues or public places in the City of New York, before nine o'clock A. M. or after nine o'clock P. M. of each day, nor within a distance of five hundred feet of any school-house, or house of public worship, during school hours, or hours of public worship, nor within a like distance of any dwelling-house or other premises, when requested or directed by any householder not to do so, under the penalty of ten dollars for each offense; nor shall any person or persons be permitted to perform on any musical instrument or instruments in any street, avenue or public place in the City of New York in contravention to the laws or ordinances of the United States, the State of New York, or the City of New York, enacted or to be enacted against the importation and employment of so-called contract or pauper labor, or against mendicancy under the garb of labor, and that with a view of a proper enforcement of such laws or ordinances, all persons shall hereafter be restrained from performing on musical instruments in the manner and places as above stated, without having first been duly examined, and properly licensed at the office of the Mayor of the City of New York, as persons not falling under any of the prohibitory clauses of the laws above referred to. The provisions of this section shall apply only to itinerant musicians and side-shows, and shall not be construed so as to affect any band of music, or organized local or visiting musical society, engaged in any military or civic parade, or in serenading, that shall comply with the laws of this State relating to parades in the City of New York."

Sec. 2. All ordinances and parts of ordinances or resolutions inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Which was laid over.

#### By Alderman McCarthy—

Resolved, That Thomas A. Ready be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York.

Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

#### UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

The President called up G. O. 456, being an ordinance to provide the necessary means for the support of the Government of the City of New York and the Board of Education, and for the payment of the quota of the State Taxes, and for other purposes, pursuant to the provisions of law, in and for the year 1888.

The affirmative vote of three-fourths of all the members elected being necessary for the adoption of the ordinance, and only fifteen members being present,

The President offered the following:

Resolved, That Rule III. of the Rules and Orders of this Board be suspended at the next meeting of the Board, and that the ordinance relative to the tax levy of 1888, and the other General Orders, be taken up and disposed of immediately after the reading of the minutes.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

#### MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS RESUMED.

Vice-President Dowling moved that this Board do now adjourn.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

And the President announced that the Board stood adjourned until Tuesday, the 4th day of September, 1888, at 1 o'clock P. M.
